

Save money this Christmas by sending overseas parcels by surface mail. If you have presents to send to Australia or New Zealand, consider sending them by surface mail rather than air mail; but you will need to send them early. The rewards are considerable especially if you have several to send.

#### PETER BOLWELL

Peter wrote and directed all the Whimpletons pantomimes over some eighteen years and brought an air of calm control to a bunch of enthusiastic amateur thespians. Peter had been undergoing treatment for cancer during the last pantomime, which shows what a dedicated trooper he was. We believed that he was over it earlier this year. Sadly the cancer returned in June and he passed away peacefully at the Exeter Hospice on the 24th August.

His family held a celebration of his life at one of his favourite local spots, Taverners Farm Shop, Kennford. The celebration was well attended and I was proud to see many Whimpletons there to provide support to Jane and the rest of his family. Peter was a founder member of Slack Ma Girdle, who have provided the music for many of the pantomimes and, of course, are a busy and successful ceilidh band in their own right. The celebration was centred around music and Slack-Ma-Girdle played some of Peter's favourites in tribute to the lovely man.

Peter's daughter, a family friend and Jane shared with us their memories of Peter which soon had us smiling. The Whimpletons had been asked to do something that reflected his work with us, and I have to admit that caused some sleepless nights about what we could do. However, everything fell into place as it does with Peter and Simon Van Grudgings sang his song from the last pantomime, Ivanhoe. It was a perfect song that reflected Peter's ability to pluck old 'folky' songs from the ether and Simon sang it well, with all his usual enthusiasm, which was great. Emma Palmer also sang her own tribute to Peter, 'Pie Jesu', which was very moving.

Peter leaves a large gap in the Whimpletons, and in Slack Ma Girdle; we shall miss his amazing creativity, his calm aura and wicked sense of humour. I think we must be one of the few panto groups that had our own brilliant writer ... who was courageous enough to direct it as well!

Yes, we will miss Peter a lot but hopefully, over the next few weeks, the Whimps can all sit down and just think how lucky we were to meet and work with such a wonderful kind, creative writer, director and human being. He cannot be replaced, but the Whimps will continue to present pantos in Whimple that are funny and rude, in the style of Bolwell. We will continue what he started, and have some fun on the way - that's what he would have wanted.

#### Dear Reader

I shall not detain you for long this time. The councillors' work slows down considerably in the summer months while we take holidays/look after grandchildren/try to digest all the new legislation that's been dreamed up since Christmas.....Furthermore, a brief



holiday to celebrate a golden wedding in Seattle has become a much longer stay as we now anticipate a journey to Pennsylvania for a memorial service to a very dear friend killed in a car crash. All this means I have no access to my Council papers at the crucial time when I need to write my report. In the meantime it is fascinating to observe the American political parties gearing up to the presidential election in November as they do their electioneering in a very different way from England. The most obvious ways are the aggressive political broadcasts on television and the thousands of little flags that have appeared at the roadside for the dozens of candidates that are standing for various posts. Think how lucky we are as we never have more than two elections going on at the same time!

Being away in the Land of the Free does, however, give me a bit of thinking space, and I have been reflecting on the ticklish job of trying to help local people as much as possible. As with every aspect of Council work, it is impossible to please everyone and the problem of supporting those actually born and bred in East Devon can only be tackled within the constraints of the law. Whilst any Councillor can state categorically that all the stories of the big city councils buying up swathes of new houses in Cranbrook to re-house their less desirable tenants are completely untrue, we cannot ensure that lots of the housing will go to locals. The UK is also a free country and people may live where they choose. All we can hope is that the extra houses will bring down prices to a more affordable level.

If we are to help local people it must be done in other ways, and the most important measure is to secure jobs. For that reason I made myself somewhat unpopular a few weeks ago when, at a meeting of the planning committee, I supported a proposal to create a small light industrial estate on the outskirts of Sidford. While I share the concerns of many that this venture will take a bite into the green belt of land between Sidford and Sidbury, I also feel very strongly that the Sid Valley needs to be able to offer employment to the younger people who want to stay in the valley. Sidford is a village I have known for forty years from the time when it was very much a working village. Since then I have watched the laundry being closed, the little working farm in the centre of the village turn into a car park, shops die, and more and more houses being built and occupied, so often, by retired folk from elsewhere. Like Whimple, Sidford was proud of being a "working village", and - unlike Whimple - it is not a particularly pretty village as it is bedevilled by the busy road which runs through the centre of it. To my mind, creating jobs in this part of the Sid Valley would be a very worthwhile venture if the problems at the existing industrial estate near the old station cannot be resolved. It is a bit much when "incomers" dismiss the arguments in favour of helping young people born in East Devon by saying that they should seek work elsewhere in the country and return when they are older and can afford it!

There have been other dilemmas involving local people closer to home. This year there have been several instances of folk with close ties to Whimple seeking to build themselves a new house in the village so that they could return to the place where they were born. In one case the proposal was certainly very attractive, as it involved a number of improvements to road safety in the village and the provision of some much-needed allotments. But, in the end, the arguments against were too strong: other traffic problems would probably arise and the new homes would have been in a part of the village that was never intended for development. In another case, the piece of land was inside the village and questions of parking and access could be resolved. The end result might not be aesthetically pleasing, but no planning rules will be broken and the new dwelling will allow a local family to be reunited with the older generations who have always lived in the village. Let me assure anyone reading this that I have not found it easy to make the decisions I came to, and I hope you can see that all kinds of issues have been considered.

By the time you read this, Autumn will be well on its way and the Council will be back in gear again. What storms lie ahead? Next time the thorny question of moving the Council offices to Honiton might be worth looking at as well as what to do with the Knowle site!

#### Land's End to John O'Groats Update

On Saturday 7th July, at 11.30 a.m., twenty-six weary, excited cyclists arrived at John o'Groats having completed the 980 mile ride from Land's End in just over eleven days! I was among them and I welcome this opportunity to thank you all for your support.

There's no question that the ride was a great challenge and genuinely gruelling at times – pouring rain, high winds and a rotten cold (not to mention the growing fatigue) are not conducive to fun cycling. But inevitably one pushes on through these, if only to get to the next hitching post for the night where a chance of some measure of recovery is possible.



Highs and lows? Of course we had both, my lowest coming a week into the ride with the news from home that one of our dogs was terminally ill and we had to make 'that decision' in a hurry. That was not a good day.

By contrast my favourite day was the penultimate one, when we were blessed with glorious weather which showed Scotland at its best, and we came through a glorious glen from Helmsdale to Reay. The A897, which links the east coast with the north, is no wider than a Devon lane for most of its length and carries even less traffic. Battling a head-wind for the last 40 miles of the day I was suddenly overwhelmed by emotion as we glimpsed the sea at Melvich Bay and I realized, for the first time, what an extraordinary thing I'd just done!

Throughout the journey I was bombarded with messages on Twitter, FaceBook and texts wishing me well and encouraging me to *just keep pedalling!* 

Furthermore, the donations to Alzheimer's Society kept rolling in on my Just Giving page and by the end of the ride we were told that we had raised in excess of £78,000 between us!

My own contribution to that was over £3,500 and I want to thank specifically everyone who tossed a coin or two into the pot at my sponsored 'turbo ride' outside the Post Office one Saturday morning, everyone who scrunched up a note and squeezed it into the Alzheimer's pot on the PO counter and those who came to the St Michael's School (Heavitree) fete and gave over £150 there. You are the true stars here and without such generosity our favourite charities would all be struggling to survive. I know that Alzheimer's Society will be extremely grateful for your support so I thank you on their behalf.

When I finished the ride and got home a few days later I was exhausted and thought 'never again.' But the Tour de France and the Olympics are great motivators and suddenly, after Bradley Wiggins and Mark Cavendish's successes there, I'm not so sure...

# Jubilee Trees for Whimple Parish Field

You may have seen my previous article and posters on our application for a tree pack from the Woodland Trust, which will include a **Jubilee Oak**. We have had good news, and the project has now been approved by the **Woodland Trust**: we can go ahead subject to PC approval, who own and manage the Parish Field.

Why the Parish Field? Well despite the previous articles and posters we have not been notified of any other suitable sites, but I have had several snippets suggesting that the Field would be an excellent place, and would add to the pioneering work from Liz Silk, Sue Ayres and others who have brought the site to its admirable state today.



We do not have much choice on the contents of the tree packs as initially they are free (yes free!) but I would estimate that we will have a surplus of some species so again my plea goes out that if anyone knows of a piece **of public space** that would benefit from trees, then please get in touch with any of us Wasters!

Also we do need helpers in the autumn to help with planting, and of course aftercare, and would like very much to include young people. There will certainly be a photo opportunity for the **Jubilee Oak**.

This will be planted separately in a prominent place on the NE flank to hide an electrical pylon.

We have earmarked week ending 17th and18th November (am) for the Jubilee Tree planting, and will then start on the rest of the scheme which is designed to add to the existing copse, with flowering trees and a central glade. Wasters will be providing hot chocolate and since they lust after cake; a cake or two!

Please look out for posters with all the timing details. (weather??)

Remember, you can contact any of us Wasters if you would like to get involved. All you need is a fork, spade or shovel, and a stack of energy. There will first be a demonstration on how to plant a tree by Daniel Williams, a professional tree planter.

#### IMPORTANT PUBLIC CONSULTATION

MONDAY 1st OCTOBER from 3.00 - 7.00pm in the VICTORY HALL REVIEW of the VILLAGE BOUNDARY - Maps and Information

EDDC is currently in the process of developing a new Local Plan (formally the Core Strategy part of the Local Development Framework). As part of the process EDDC intend to produce two documents.

1) Local Plan 2006-2026 Document. This first document will set out strategic policy for development across East Devon and can be found on the EDDC website.

#### 2) Village Development Boundaries Document

This second document will be specifically concerned with development boundaries within our villages and will include allocations of land for development and other spatially defined policies that may apply to villages. It will set out policies and boundaries for development in all villages proposed for housing growth. In accordance with the strategy of the Local Plan 'new build' house numbers have already been assigned to villages throughout East Devon and Whimple has been assigned 20 new houses to be built by 2026.

In May the Parish Council put up a large notice on the council's notice board in The Square giving information about the **Village Development Boundaries Document.** 

At that time we were advised that the **Boundaries Review process** was as follows: Firstly, to identify possible development sites around the parishes.

Landowners wishing to propose sites for development were asked to complete a Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA) form by 29th June 2012. The SHLAA is a government requirement designed to identify potential housing sites that are suitable, available and economically viable to build on over 20 years.

#### The next phase was to assess the sites identified to ensure they were suitable for development.

The original SHLAA for East Devon was published in 2009 and some Whimple sites were identified at that time. There was a further opportunity to submit SHLAA sites as part of the local plan consultation of December 2011. In total over 450 sites across East Devon were identified during this time. All these sites together with the sites identified in June were to be considered against the 'developability' criteria by the end of August 2012 – the 'developability' criteria took into consideration the suitability, availability, achievability and ability to overcome constraints. Sites that met certain viability criteria and were technically suitable for building were to be considered and placed in one of two classifications:

- 1) Land that is available to be developed now and over the next 5 years will be considered 'deliverable'.
- 2) The remaining suitable sites will be classed as 'developable' and will be considered for development in future years but by 2026.

The next phase, Public Consultation, to be held on MONDAY 1ST OCTOBER 3-7.00pm in the Victory Hall is designed to give all of us the opportunity to view and comment on the map showing the 'deliverable' and 'developable' sites identified and to receive other information. Whimple has been assigned to build 20 houses and although we are not sure whether we have any influence in reducing that number, the Parish Council is sure that by being involved with the Village Boundaries process we will have greater control over the rate of development in Whimple and the development sites themselves. PLEASE COME ALONG AND SEE WHAT IS PROPOSED – let us know what you think and help ensure that the future growth of Whimple is decided by the people of Whimple and not by the District Council.

#### **Matt Hammond**

After sitting down and reflecting on a very wet and unsuccessful summer of cricket I found myself thinking actually perhaps it wasn't all that bad. We managed to play some cricket, we had some close games, we had some highs and some lows and there were some good individual performances. The first XI got relegated but the second XI had a good season and stayed in their league. Things then got put in to perspective.

On June 30th we at the Cricket Club heard the tragic news that one of our players had suddenly passed away. Matt Hammond, aged 36, had suffered with headaches and after a short stay at the RD&E hospital, he got transferred down to Derriford where tests revealed he had a ruptured blood vessel on his brain; complications followed in surgery and after two weeks in an induced coma Matt sadly passed away.

Matt leaves his wife Danielle and two daughters Isla six and Maia who is six months old. Matt was a PE teacher at Isca College and has been described by them as a 'loving, caring, inspirational and legendary teacher'. The funeral was held at Broadclyst Church which was full with many people having to stand - which in itself says how much was thought of him.

I was lucky enough to see Matt while he was in the RD&E and straight away he asked how we were getting on and how all the lads were, he was very positive. Matt was always very competitive on the pitch and played to win, but he had a great sense of humour, always playing jokes, he was also in charge of the music in our promotion season in 2010; I am not sure the older players agreed with some of his taste!

Since Matt's death, family and friends are rallying together to continue his good work in the school and local community as best they can. So, working through the Adam Stansfield Foundation, special community and school projects will be set up to benefit the local youth that Matt Hammond would have continued to inspire and support.

Hopefully next summer we will be holding a memorial game up at the Cricket Club, details of which I will put in future issues.



I had seen the original line-up for the Bonzo Dog Doo- Dah Band often in my home town of Bristol, and they were always bonkers on stage. Even with the late Viv Stanshall as a comparatively 'straight' front man, there was constantly something weird happening in the background.

# WHIMPLE AND DISTRICT VILLAGE PRODUCE ASSOCIATION

Having made the decision to move the Show from its usual date in August to the first Saturday in September so we didn't clash with the Olympics, there was always going to be some doubt as to how that would affect the entries. It was very reassuring to see such a wonderful array of exhibits. Although there were slightly fewer exhibitors this year there was a welcome increase in the number of exhibits which was a great relief.

For the record, there were 87 exhibitors who produced some 646 exhibits. The only disappointment was in the children's classes where the entries were short of their usual high number with sadly no entries in the Under 5's Classes..

However, the entries in the children's classes were of a very high standard which gave the judges a hard task selecting the winning exhibits. The trophy winners in these classes were Livvy Carter who won the Basildon Award; Thomas Tooze who won The Fletcher Cup and Chloe Betts who won The Children's Challenge Cup. The photography section with 148 entries, was again a difficult task for the judge with so many excellent photographs in all of the classes. The standard seems to get higher every year in this section and there were some amazing entries. The overall winner in this section winning the Paul Henry G.C. Memorial Cup once again was Gilly Curtis. The Arts and Crafts Classes had another wonderful display of skills. The joint winners in this section of the Len Rose Memorial Cup were Sherril Olive and Doreen Staddon and the Whimple Craft Cup was won by Rebecca Hart – good to see a teenager winning an adult class.

The flower arranging had another very high standard of arrangements giving a very colourful display of floral artistry. In this section the Frances Pratt Cup was awarded to Ceri Loosemoore. There were joint winners of The Roy Horsburgh Trophy, Doreen Staddon and Barbara Lambert, The Marie Louise Grout Cup, which is for the best exhibit in the flower arrangement as voted for by everyone who came to see the show, was awarded to Barbara Lambert. The Sandfords Cup which is for the combined 'Men Only' classes of a floral arrangement and a Lemon Drizzle Cake was won by Sam Palmer.

Once again the Homecraft Section was full of excellent mouth watering exhibits and the snooker table was positively overloaded. There were cakes and jams galore! The judge did wonder just how she was going to get through all the exhibits! Congratulations to Sherril Olive and Margaret Burrough who were joint winners in this Section and they shared the Sir Henry Imbert-Terry Cup.

The Pot Plant Section had a good number of exhibits with all the classes well supported. The winner of the Briar Shield this year was Colin Northcott. And last, but by no means least, there was another very good entry in the flower and vegetable classes. Despite the appalling weather over the summer months, all these classes were well supported. The judges did comment on the quality of the exhibits in spite of the very challenging growing conditions.

The Slewton Cup for the most points in the vegetable section was won by Colin Northcott and the runner-up in this section winning the Cranny Brook Cup was Paul Wilson. In the Flower Classes, the winner of the Win and Bob Shepherd Cup for the most points in this section was Steve Higginson and the runner up, winning the President's Cup, was Paul Wilson. However, when all the classes were combined and the points in both sections were added together, it was not too difficult to see that the winner of The Whimple Folk Cup was Colin Northcott. So, many congratulations to him on winning this magnificent trophy.

And then there was the Whimple Challenge Cup which was the third year of this new venture. Once again it was for the Scarecrow Competition and although we didn't have quite as many entries as last year, there were certainly some entertaining exhibits. Needless to say it was an immense task to determine which of these imaginative exhibits would get the magnificent trophy that was to be awarded. After much deliberation and checking of the scores, the winning Scarecrow was the one of Simple Simon which was expertly put together by the VPA. The runners up trophy was awarded to Angeline Rowe.

We were very pleased to have Marian Daniel to present the trophies and, on behalf of the Show Committee, Livvy Carter presented her with a bouquet and Livvy was also presented with a posy. We are very grateful to Edith Grout who arranged these floral presentations.

We were also very fortunate to be able to add some decorations to the hall this year and once again they had been expertly put together by the Children at the Primary School. So our grateful thanks to them for their very colourful creations.

All the judges remarked on the high quality of the exhibits in all the classes and they asked that these comments were passed on to all the exhibitors. They were so impressed with three of the exhibits that they awarded them with Certificates of Merit. These went to Alan Smith for his exhibit in the photography class for a Scenic View. The second went to Mike Ellingham for his very colourful outdoor tub. And the third went to Paul Wilson for his small Gladioli exhibit. So we extend our congratulations to them.

We are also extremely grateful to all our judges who give up their time to do this difficult task with such quality exhibits. 


