Whimple Post Office News

You may have recently read in the press that The Department of Work and Pensions has not awarded the Post Office the contract to continue to pay some benefits that have previously been paid via 'Giros'. We will lose this business during the next 12 months. We are assured that the DWP will work closely with the Post Office to help anyone being paid their benefit in this way to opt for a card account so that they can still access their money from a Post Office. If you currently have a benefit paid to you via a green giro, and wish to continue to withdraw your money from a Post Office then please speak to either of us and we will advise you.

On one hand we are assured that the future of Post Offices are safe, and no more branch closures are due, but the government are not putting any work our way, and it may well be that small branches will simply close as they are no longer viable.

Royal Mail increased the price of postage on April 4th – hopefully you saw the advance notices and stocked up before that date – any postage stamps that have printed on them 1st or 2nd class are always valid despite when, or at what price you purchased them, so if you were wise enough to buy some before the price increase, you will save 5p for every 1st class stamp and 4p for every 2nd.



I used to hear the cuckoo frequently in the past but now I never do, and yet it was a sound that was a sign of spring. Another sound I miss greatly is the hooting of an owl during the night in The Square. I wonder why? Another sight I miss enormously is the swallows. I had two nest in the drangway and to see them fly in and out was such a joy, and part of the summer pleasures when sitting under the beech tree on a warm sunny evening. It was like a display of ballerinas and now I can only dream of them. How often now is The Square empty of people but cars parked all over the place. Often visitors remark that there must be something special at the Church. In the early morning, you see all the school children in groups and they come back in the afternoon.

In the days when we had Webber's the Butchers, it was a constant flow. People came from all over East Devon and John Norman always happy and singing. In the spring, Derrick Webber press-ganged a team to clean up the brook and surroundings. Luckily we still have people sitting outside the New Fountain, our lovely village pub. And nearby we have our excellent Heritage Centre which is such an attraction for many visitors. Thanks to the dedication of so many there are new displays. It has gone from strength to strength because there are plenty of events organised. It is such an asset to the life of the village.

April and May are so delightful in The Square. Our garden club planted daffodils which brighten up our days.

For the beauty of the earth, for the beauty of each hour, For the love which we from birth Over and around us lies. For the beauty of each hour of the day and of the night For hills and vale, trees and flowers Sun and moon and stars of light For the beauty of human love Brother, sister, parent, child Pleasures pure and undefiled For each perfect gift of Him To our race so freely given Grace human and divine Flowers of earth and buds of Heaven

For many years I was a church flower arranger and one year I was invited to join the flower ladies of Alphington Church near Ottery St Mary, and we selected this hymn as a theme. I don't think I ever enjoyed a festival so much because of the pure simplicity, joy and love it expressed. I was also invited to the village of Combe Raleigh near Honiton when we chose 'All things bright and beautiful' as our theme. We all shared in giving pleasure to others and also to ourselves. The festivals at the Church of St Mary, Ottery and the Cathedral were grander enterprises but it was so rewarding to create beauty for the pleasure of others, in any of the churches.

I also used to do the Lady Chapel in Ottery each week, and one day I came with an armful of hawthorn, and when I arrived, the ladies said 'Edith, you can't take those in, they are unlucky. 'Chance was by my side because the unforgettable vicar Peter McGee said 'Ladies, this is not a pagan temple but the House of God who created every flower for the beauty of the earth, for the beauty of each

THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF 'WEIRD EASTER'!

The strangest Easter custom takes place in the Czech Republic, Hungary and Slovakia, where there is a tradition of spanking or whipping women on Easter Monday! Males throw water at females and spank them with handmade whips made of willow and decorated with ribbons at the end. The spanking is supposed to be symbolic and according to legend, females should be spanked in order to keep their health and beauty during the next year. It doesn't sound much fun for the women!

Finnish children dress up, soot their faces, and go begging in the streets carrying broomsticks. Sounds a bit like Halloween? In some parts of Western Finland they even burn bonfires on Easter Sunday, but there is no sign of Guy Fawkes. This tradition takes place to ward off witches flying around between Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

On Maundy Thursday in Verges, in Spain, a traditional "death dance" is performed which involves a parade down the streets of the medieval town. Everyone involved is dressed in costumes and the procession ends with frightening skeletons carrying boxes of ashes. The scary dance begins at midnight and continues for three hours into the early morning.

If the man of the house in Poland takes part in preparing the traditional Easter bread, custom has it that his moustache will turn grey and the dough will fail. So the lucky man of the house is banned from helping out.

In Switzerland, villages turn their fountains into Easter Wells, using paper streamers, flowers and painted eggs to decorate them. The tradition takes place to celebrate the symbol of water and its importance to the dry areas of the Alps.

In Germany, the tradition is to create an Easter fire out of used Christmas trees from the winter. The fire is seen as a symbol of the victory for the beautiful and sunny spring over the cold days of winter. Perhaps we should start this tradition in freezing Britain!

In Latvia, the traditional Easter game played by the children is similar to conkers – but with eggs. Players pair off and use hard-boiled coloured eggs joined together with string. Competitors bang the ends of the eggs together until one player's egg breaks. The winner is the player with the stronger egg. It sounds a bit messy to us.

The Easter bunny is the most popular symbol of Easter thanks to the Americans, but over in Australia they prefer to use their native marsupial, the Bilby. This is due to the fact that the rabbit has destroyed their land, crops and vegetation. No wonder they don't like the bunny! Yes, this is a BILBY. Didn't you recognise it?



Britain actually does have some unusual traditions of its own. At the Hocktide festival in Hungerford, the town's new police constable blows his horn to call all the men to the Hocktide Court in the town hall. Two men are then elected and parade through the streets giving women oranges in return for kisses! We wonder how they decide which men get to do that!



Community Use of the MUGA

During consultation for the parish plan, support for the MUGA to be developed as a community facility was strongly expressed.

As a result of negotiations between the Parish Council, Mrs Langley and the School Governors, community groups will now be able to use the MUGA as long as they agree to abide by the schedule of use outlined in the 'Management Scheme for Users' which can be found on www.whimple-primary.devon.sch.uk - Newsletters/ contact 67- 4th February 2011.

The school governing body is currently reviewing the lettings and charging policy which will go alongside the schedule of use and they hope to be ready to take bookings very soon.

Best Kept Village Competition

The application for this years entry to the BKV competition has been completed.

The competition isn't just about flowers and prettiness, it's about our sense of community and showing that we care for our environment.

How it works - Each village is credited with 100 points at the start of judging in early May. As the judges travel around the village, points are deducted for various things like the presence of litter and poor condition of different aspects of the village. The judges will be looking at the condition of our open spaces, notice boards and seating. They will look at the churchyard, cemetery and war memorials, car parks and sports facilities and at public and private buildings, gardens and allotments as well as footpaths and streams - they will in fact be looking at everything.

We've done well in the past losing a maximum of 10 points only - but we can do better. Let's show that we care for our great village and retain all of our 100 points.

You can help get started by joining with the Litter Pick on Saturday 7th May 10am in The Square OR by joining with the community and tidying your own garden and roadside frontage during the morning of May 7th.

Over the past forty years, Gordon Giltrap has graced the music business with his dedication to his craft and his affection for his audience. As one of the UK's most respected guitarists, he has consistently proved the adage that respect cannot be bought. It must be earned.

In the late Seventies, Gordon enjoyed a brief spell as a pop star, with a hit album (Perilous Journey) and two hit singles ('Heartsong' and 'Fear of the Dark'). 'Heartsong' was nominated for an Ivor Novello award, and is fondly remembered as the theme tune to the BBC's Holiday programme.

In 2008 Gordon received a Life Time Achievement award from the Newtonards Guitar Festival in Northern Island. Gordon regards this as his most treasured possession coming as it does from the land of his grandfather's birth and a country with a musical tradition close to his heart. Indeed Ireland has taken him to their heart. The largest guitar store in Belfast, The Guitar Emporium has engravings of some of the world's greatest guitar players on their front window. If you visit you will see engraved images of Jimi Hendrix, Rory Gallagher, Jimmy Page, Brian May and in amongst these greats there is...Gordon Giltrap. Needless to say the self-effacing Mr Giltrap feels very humbled by this superb gesture!

Many of you may already know Jim Causley, either from last year's 'Whimple Folk for Whimple Folk', the annual Whimple Wassail, or his nomination for the Radio 2 Folk award. Always amusing and very talented, Jim has kindly agreed to come back for this year's event and run the stage for us, so I'm sure he will be as entertaining for his 'home crowd' as he was last year.

Denbury Folk had their first public performance at this event last year. They went down a storm, particularly with the audience sing-alongs. Check out their rendition of 'Blooming Heather' from last year's event on YouTube. They are back again this year by popular demand, with a new selection of ditties for your delectation.





Today it is a day when children give presents, flowers, and home-made cards to their mothers. However centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home or 'mother' church once a year. So each year in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their 'mother' Church - the main Church or Cathedral of the area. Inevitably the return to the 'mother' church became an occasion for family reunions when children who were working away returned home. (It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work once they were ten years old.) And most historians think that it was the return to the 'Mother' church which led to the tradition of children, particularly those working as domestic servants, or as apprentices, being given the day off to visit their mother and family.

On the morning of Maundy Thursday, 21st April from 9.30 am to 12.30 pm we are again holding an **Easter Garden** children's activity morning, taking place in the Victory Hall. Hopefully by the time you read this there will have been a flurry of solar panels installed on many homes in the village.



100 years ago

The 1911 Census and Emily Wilding Davison

In these liberated days it's hard to imagine that only 100 years ago women were widely regarded as second-class citizens. Campaigning for the right to vote, the suffragette movement launched a long rebellion which famously saw some tie themselves to the railings of 10 Downing Street.

Emily Davison was so committed to the cause, that she gave her life for it. Noone is certain quite why she stepped in front of King George V's horse, Anmer, at the Epsom Derby on 4 June 1913. Some say it was martyrdom. But it could have been a protest that went tragically wrong (her return train ticket suggested she meant to leave Epsom).

So, Emily Davison managed to get herself onto the 1911 Census record as a resident at the Palace of Westminster by hiding there on census night. On the night of 13 July 1911, she hid in a broom cupboard in the Chapel of St Mary Undercroft in the crypt of St Stephen's Hall. Her actions on that census day had long been a rumour (not least because her conscientious landlady, at her rented flat on Coram Street in west London, filled in Davison's details even though she wasn't at home). But the release of the 1911 Census data showed that she achieved her objective.

Easter Eggs

Easter eggs are specially decorated eggs given every year to celebrate the Easter holiday or springtime. For centuries, eggs have been part of our Easter traditions...they are symbolic of new life and fertility, and are representative of resurrection.

The oldest tradition is to dye or paint Easter eggs, but newer traditions suggest giving chocolate Easter eggs, packets of sweets or plastic filled Easter eggs with money or small toys in them.



Easter eggs history is thought to date back to pagan times (they were pagan symbols), although there is no real evidence of this being the original origin of Easter eggs.

At Passover Seder, a hard-boiled egg dipped in salt water symbolizes both new life and the Passover sacrifice offered at the Temple in Jerusalem. The ancient Persians painted eggs for Nowrooz, their New Year celebration, which falls on the Spring equinox. This tradition has continued every year on Nowrooz since ancient times.

In Christian times, the Easter egg origin has symbolic roots...an egg represents new life because of the chick within it. The Easter egg tradition may have celebrated the end of the privations of Lent. In the West, eggs were forbidden during Lent as well as other traditional fast days. Likewise, in Eastern Christianity, both meat and dairy are prohibited during the fast, and eggs are seen as "dairy" (a foodstuff that could be taken from an animal without shedding its blood). It was also traditional to use up all of the household's eggs before Lent began, which established the tradition of Pancake Day.

Another Orthodox tradition is the presenting of red coloured eggs to friends while giving Easter greetings. According to a History channel documentary about Mary Magdalene and her role in Christianity, the custom derives from a biblical event. After the Ascension of Christ, Mary supposedly went to the Emperor of Rome and greeted him with "Christ is Risen", whereupon he stated, "Christ has not risen no more than that egg is red" (pointing to an egg on his table). After making this statement it is said the egg immediately turned blood red. She then began preaching Christianity to him. The egg is symbolic of the grave and life renewed by breaking out of it. The red symbolizes the blood of Christ redeeming the world, represented by the egg, and our regeneration through the bloodshed for us by Christ. The egg itself is a symbol of the Resurrection while being dormant it contains a new life sealed within it.

For years, eggs have been embellished and exchanged at Easter, resulting in a rich amount of traditional crafts. Ranging from simply dyed shells to intricate works of art. Decorated eggs can add colour to the Easter egg hunt or become precious gifts to treasure.
