



The Ultimate Running Challenge Hadrian's Wall

On the morning of the 22nd June I caught the plane up to Newcastle to make my way across to Carlisle in eager anticipation of the start of what was no doubt going to be a tough Challenge. On the train over to Carlisle the rain was lashing down and I was thinking "what have I let myself in for?". I registered that afternoon and got my timing chip and final instructions.

Saturday morning I woke early ready for 7.00am breakfast and final preparations before heading off to the start. It was still raining as it had been pretty much since I arrived. When I got to the Castle I was informed of a delayed start as the river had burst its banks and they were checking the course was still passable. At 8.30am we were off and the rain had stopped so things were looking up, apart from having to cover 69 miles over the next two days. We had barely gone a mile when we came across the burst river and were running though six inches of water, my moisture-wicking socks were going to have to work overtime! The first day was split into two sections of 15 miles and 17 miles. At the 15 mile point we were treated to sandwiches, cake, fruit and drink and when I



reached there after 2½ hrs we had still had little rain and not seen The Wall. Just after this point both of these were sorted, the heavens opened for 45 minutes and just after that we saw the Wall. This second section was more off-road and in many places waterlogged which made progress much slower, but I managed to get to the end of the first day in 6 hrs 6 minutes.

The camp site was soaked but did have excellent steaming hot showers and plenty of food. Again we had a good soaking overnight and some 250 campers woke with not quite so much enthusiasm as the first day. The second day was split into three sections, 13 miles, 17 miles and finally 7 miles, starting with a very steep climb. Again the first section was comfortable in just over 2 hrs, but then it started to get considerably more difficult. There were drink stations at 6 and 12 miles on the second section breaking it down. Getting to these points seemed to be the best thing to do. Once through this and at the final check point with 7 miles to go - surely I can cover 7 fairly flat miles in a couple of hours. But no it was $2\frac{1}{4}$ hrs later before I could see the finish. So I stopped for a quick picture, summoned my last bit of energy and ran for the line. I completed the event in 14hrs and 19mins.

So, finally a big THANK YOU to all those of you who gave so generously and helped me raise over £1,600. Sadly there could only be one winner of the holiday and the winning ticket, drawn by Alan Rowe (founder of the Baton), went to my Production Manager at work, so while he's away sunning himself I will have to do his and my own job - not quite what I envisaged!

District Councillor's Report

Many thanks to those who sent me good wishes for a speedy recovery from my fall – they seem to have worked! The good wishes that is.

I have just obtained from the Council Offices in Sidmouth a wonderful wall chart showing the social background, age, ethnic, educational and occupational profile of councillors in England. In a nutshell the profile (based on a 33% return) shows that the average councillor is male (68.5%) and white (96.3%). The average age is 59.7 years (72% are over the age of 55) and their average length of service is 9.4 years. The average councillor worked in the private sector (68.5%)



24% were drawn from the public sector and 7% from the voluntary sector. 75.8% have no caring responsibilities while 24.2% care for at least one dependent. 47.5% are retired, 21.0% have full time jobs, 14.6% are self employed and 9.5% work part time. Finally, 14% have educational qualifications below NVQ1 / CSE. 12% have NVQ2/ CSE, or O level, 13.6% have NVQ level 3, A level, or OND, 55.9% have NVQ4, Degree, Higher Degree or Professional Qualification. Finally, the political representation (of those who replied) is: Conservative 50.1%, Labour 20.8%, Liberal Democrat 22.0 %, Independent 5.4%.

This is an interesting profile: although the picture created is common amongst councillors in many respects it does not reflect the electorate as a whole and neither does it match the makeup of East Devon District Council. For example the percentage of female councillors at E.D.D.C. is below the average (22%) the ethnic composition is 100% white, the political profile is Conservative (73%), Liberal Democrat (17%), and Independent (10%). There are no Labour Councillors. Food for thought for any of you who might consider becoming a councillor in the future as there are many imbalances to address e.g. 50% of the population is female, the voting distribution nationally is about 33% for each of the three main parties, and only about 30% are over 55. Similarly, ethnic populations other than white are desperately underrepresented. However, people with high levels of academic qualification are very overrepresented – I'll leave you to decide if this is a good or a bad thing. Finally, the working experience is also lop sided with something like 60% of the working population being employed in the public sector but only 24% Of councillors are from this sector and as for caring in the electorate something like 50% are actually caring for one or more dependents (children, elderly and infirm parents or a sickly spouse).

The work of the Planning Committee continues apace, but this time I have been looking at another aspect of the Council's work, namely what happens if a member appears to have committed some kind of "misconduct". Under the Localism Act 2011 a new Code of Conduct had to be in force from 1st July 2012. Monitoring officers drafted a new Code for *all* Councils in Devon, and on June 27th a special meeting of the full EDDC met to ratify the Code and a new complaints process.

The membership of the new Standards Committee will be the chairman of the Council, four district councillors, two non-voting co-opted independent members and two non-voting co-opted parish council members. As the new code of conduct has only just come into existence there is, apparently still much work to be done as – guess what? Whitehall is not delivering the regulations in time! In addition, as only three weeks were allowed between finalising regulations and the implementation of the new code, the Council has recommended a full review in one or two years' time. So the draft code that has been accepted is still only a draft code, and "localism" doesn't seem very local.

The code consists of two parts – a general statement of councillor's public duties and private interests and a register of member's personal and pecuniary interests, which must be updated annually. Many details discussed at the meeting are, unfortunately, confidential.

Finally, I must report that the 'tree walk' at Cranbrook was very interesting, although we were somewhat disturbed when the first tree we saw with a fence around it to preserve it was clearly very dead! David Colman, the Council's Tree Officer, quickly put our minds to rest: dead trees are very important for the environment as homes and food for beneficial insects and the contractors are careful to preserve them. A lot has been learned about the volume of soil a living tree requires, and all the services have been planned to allow for every tree identified as important enough to be saved. The same goes for ancient hedgerows, one of which will actually form part of the "Town Square" being planned for the land beyond the hill where you can see houses under construction. David explained the complications involved in building a whole town from scratch: trees cannot always come first and the location of the railway station means that a copse of trees must go. The "run off" drainage areas cannot be left looking like attractive ponds because the site must not attract flocks of birds, given the proximity of the other sort at the Airport! A pity, as we saw a delightful little pond that afternoon with a family of foxes watching us from the other side, more scared of people on foot than the ones roaring around them on huge machines!



The Making of a Concert - Part 1

When you, the audience, arrive on a Saturday evening you will be greeted by one of the door attendants. They are usually husbands of performers ready to take ticket money or help with any queries. As you take your seat and look towards the choir stalls you will see five levels of staging. This is not hired from an outside company who would set it up for us, but it has been specially designed for the church, commissioned by the choir and erected the day before by willing helpers who are also singers. It is a massive job and without it our concerts would be almost impossible. Attached to the two front pillars are special lights to enable you to see us and for the singers and players to see their music. These too have been erected and connected by a member of the choir.

So now all is ready for the concert. But wait a minute! Who organised the refreshments that are served afterwards? Again we have a special team who hire the glasses, buy wine, soft drinks and snacks. They are also there on Friday setting it up. After the concert all the glasses are taken home by yet more willing volunteers who wash them up and return them to Sainsbury's. The really hard job is taking down all the staging immediately after the concert as we always leave the church ready for Sunday services. Doing that after performing for a couple of hours is no joke. All the scores are collected and a few days later another team of willing helpers meets, armed with erasers to rub out any extra annotations in the scores, so that they are returned in pristine condition.

That would seem to be it and for the short term it is. (To be continued next month).

There will be food and drink available throughout the dayans also a bouncy castle, sumo suits and other fun activities for the kids (and adults too).


Details will be again be displayed in The Square.

What do Bart Simpson, a smurf, a French maid, a fireman and various clowns have in common?

They all played in a charity cricket match at Whimple Cricket Club on the 15th July 2012

After a year of tests, operations and extensive physio, Nicki Parker was diagnosed as having Motor Neurone Disease in March of this year. This disease has confined Nicki to a wheelchair, unable to stand and with no movement in her hands and arms. It has also

affected her speech and ability to swallow. To enable Nicki to have some independence her employers at Devon Doctors on Call (DDOC) decided to raise funds to help towards the purchase of an 'Eye Gaze Computer' which she will be able to use through eye movement alone.

Various events were organised and DDOC wanted Nicki's sons Jamie and Matt to be involved in some of them - hence the cricket match between a Whimple Youth Team and a DDOC representative team playing in fancy dress.

The weather during the week before the match was atrocious and, as with most of this wonderful summer, the prospect of the game taking place was minimal. However on the day of the game the weather started dry and although the outfield was still wet in places (with a big puddle at fine leg!!!) under extreme pressure from DDOC organiser Julie Densham the ground was deemed playable.

Various stalls were set up together with a bouncy castle for the children (plus some brave adults!) and the game began shortly after 2.00pm in front of a very vocal and colourful crowd of over 150. The Whimple boys batted first and made heavy weather of the slow pitch, whilst some supreme bowling from the DDOC bowlers including the smurf and fireman and some dubious shot selections (reverse sweeps !?!?!?) kept the boys in check. The boys finally made a respectable total of 146, thanks mainly to a good partnership from Callum Lefebvre and Matt Simpson.

St Mary's Church Follow-up to the Village Survey

In the last edition of The Whimple News I mentioned that we had decided to allocate the analysis of the written answers to various questions from the village survey to small groups of PCC members to work through to see if there are common themes, areas where we could do better or good ideas that we can take forward as initiatives for the community. These teams are now starting to report their findings back to the PCC. However, as mentioned previously, there is undoubtedly no "magic bullet" that can transform things overnight, but the analysis of the responses will help to change our focus so that we re-direct our efforts to try to meet the needs of our community rather better.

For example, to the question "How can the church be more relevant to more people in the community?" there were broadly 8 common themes to the responses. These can be summarised under the headings:

- the role of the priest in charge i.e. a leadership position within the community, more visibility.
- community and pastoral involvement i.e. those in the church to be more visible in supporting other village organisations and perhaps developing a community support network, particularly for the elderly.
- welcoming (especially newcomers to the village) i.e. the face of the church (it is **not** an exclusive club) and also perhaps the face of the village - how do we get to know newcomers when they arrive and help them to integrate into the village clubs, organisations, etc.
- regular social events for the community run by the church but not just for church members and probably not held in church.
- use of the church building as a venue for non-religious events e.g. concerts, exhibitions, etc.
- more events and activities for children, youth and young families.
- more contact with the village school.
- shorter and more relevant sermons i.e. addressing the worries that people have today.

In response to the question about *styles and times of services*, there were as many who wanted traditional (no happy-clappy) services as those who wanted more modern services and several people felt the current balance was about right. Many people felt that services at 11 a.m. on a Sunday wrote off the whole day for doing other things with the family and would prefer either an earlier or later service and/ or perhaps something midweek.

The responses to *how the building could be made more fit for purpose* ranged from a vehement "do nothing - leave it all alone" to what amounts to "start again with a blank sheet of paper". However in amongst that was a very significant majority who would like the heating upgraded and a number of other comments about the current difficulty of access from The Square for the disabled and those who are now not as agile as they used to be.

The final question i.e. *other comments considered helpful to the PCC*, generally elicited responses that were already covered by the other questions, but perhaps one stood out as a moderate, middle of the road statement that probably will not satisfy either those who want no change or those who want radical change:

"Although the historic nature of the building is of obvious value, many historic buildings are now brought up to date and are renovated in a sympathetic, interesting way that can preserve heritage yet also reflect modern day usage. I do not think that the church should remain exactly as it is simply because of its age, but should reflect the many ages it has passed through, hopefully will pass through in the future, and be able to meet the needs of the community as a place of Christian gathering, working and worship."

The bottom line seems to be that whatever the PCC recommends in future with regard to the building, our services and our involvement with the community, there will be some who will want absolute stability and others who will want radical change. Our, perhaps thankless, task is to consult at each stage and to try to accommodate as many views as possible. However, when it comes to big decisions we know that even the General Synod has had to backtrack and finds great difficulty coming up with policies that everyone can accept. We are no different.

Perhaps the one bright (or hot) spot is that most of you want better heating in church. We have taken that on board, commissioned our architect to draw up some plans and are proposing to apply for a faculty (planning consent from the church authorities) to upgrade the heating. This will involve fitting some storage heaters to provide a stable background temperature and some under-pew heaters in the nave. Some of the radiant heaters currently in the nave will be moved to replace the ineffective heaters in the side aisles. Our aim will be to have this upgrade installed before the winter.

As for any other initiatives, we will discuss the responses with our new priest-incharge when he arrives in early September and seek guidance that allows us to move on in a consensual way.

Whimple History Society



Village Archive

Having joined the History Society when we first arrived in Whimple, it is only now that I have really discovered what a fantastic archive of village life we have. For tens of years volunteers have been gathering all sorts of artefacts, photographs and literature relating to every aspect of life in Whimple and it's available to everyone through the Heritage Centre. If you have a question about your house, your family or anything related to Whimple, those in charge of the archive will almost certainly be able to answer your questions or put you in touch with someone who can.

As a Whimple Parish Councillor I have been particularly interested in the council minute books dating back to 1894. Through a series of short articles I would like to share some of the issues that have occupied the council during the past 110 years.

I will start at the beginning and introduce the very first Parish Council formed under the Local Government Act of 1894. I quote from the minute book regarding the first meeting which was opened by an appointed overseer:

'The first Parish Council meeting was held in The National School Room, Whimple on Tuesday the 4th December 1894 at 6-30 o'clock in the evening. The overseer read the notice convening the meeting and called on the electors to choose a chairman. John Venn was proposed and unanimously elected chairman at 6.42 o'clock.'

Having taken the chair, it was his duty to receive nominations of candidates for the office of Parish Councillor and to take the votes by a show of hands in favour only of each candidate.

There were eleven nomination papers to be handed in. The chairman then asked if any of the electors wished to put any questions to any of the candidates – no questions were asked.

The chairman said there were eleven nomination papers and as only nine could be elected (the same as today) he asked whether any of the candidates were willing to withdraw – no withdrawals took place.

A show of hands was then called for in favour of each candidate.. The chairman declared the first nine duly elected.'

These were Messrs T Cooke, A Smith, H Critchett, H Imbert-Terry, W Brooke, H Godfrey, P Newberry, A Sanders, F Turl.

'The chairman then asked if any parochial elector demanded a poll – no poll was demanded and at the expiration of the minutes the meeting was closed. The minutes were signed by John Venn.'

The first minute book describes in detail the business and procedures of the first and subsequent meetings.

'The first Parish Council will come into office on 13th December 1894 and will continue in office until 15th April 1896. In every year on or within seven days after 15th April the Parish Council must hold an annual meeting. Three other meetings in each year must also be held. Every meeting is to be opened to the public unless the council otherwise direct.'

110 years later these requirements still apply.

Food Hub

700 questionnaires were delivered in the Parish to try to establish if a scheme to buy local and seasonal produce would be welcomed in the village. Nearly 50 people responded and the majority were all positive and recognised the benefits such a scheme could be.

Some people expressed concern over the potential of competition to the shop and Post Office and we apologise for not making it clear before the questionnaires were sent out that we hugely value Graham, Alison & Jim and would hope to work with them to avoid any unnecessary competition. We also ensured that Pithayes, Cotley and London Road Garage as well as other local producers and businesses had received copies of the questionnaire to keep them informed as we believe this could be an opportunity for them to benefit if they want to.

We hope this project will encourage people to buy locally and support local producers and businesses rather than people giving their business to the large supermarkets. The importance of the Village Shop, Post Office and Garage has never been underestimated and we strongly encourage people to use these facilities to ensure we can keep them open.

We hope the scheme will offer local/seasonal fresh produce as well as artisan bakery goods, local meat and the majority of things most of us use but with the emphasis on local producers or sources. Aiming toward convenience there should eventually be options to buy 'meal packs' for those busy people who want to cook fresh but don't have the time to shop for all the ingredients. Work needs to be done to confirm that prices can be competitive with a profit element that can go back to the community.

The aim of the project is to encourage people away from the over-packaged, much travelled and highly processed foods found in supermarkets and promote the everyday essentials our village businesses offer.

23rd November - Local Food ordering night – if there is enough interest in the food buying scheme we intend to invite producers to bring along samples of their food for you to try with the option to make orders to be delivered to the Village.

November - Community tree planting of 60 trees including a Jubilee Oak.



EPS - A NEW WAY TO GET YOUR PRESCRIPTION

The Electronic Prescription Service (EPS) is an NHS service that has been available in this practice from 18th July. If you need a prescription from your GP, your GP can send it electronically to the place you choose. In this area EPS is available at Boots and Coop pharmacies. Your prescription can be collected from a pharmacy near to where you live, work or shop if they are enabled for EPS.

Is this service right for you?

Yes, if you have a stable condition and you:

- don't want to go to your GP practice every time to collect your repeat prescription.
- collect your medicines from the same place most of the time.
- use a prescription collection service now.

No, if you:

- don't get prescriptions very often.
- pick up your medicines from different places.
- travel or work away from home a lot.

How can you use EPS?

You need to choose a place for your GP practice to electronically send your prescription to. This is called nomination. You can choose:

- a pharmacy or a
- a dispensing appliance contractor (if you use one).

Ask any pharmacy or dispensing appliance contractor that offers EPS or your GP practice to add your nomination for you. You don't need a computer to do this.

Can I change my nomination or cancel it and get a paper prescription?

Yes you can. If you don't want your prescription to be sent electronically tell your GP. If you want to change or cancel your nomination speak to any pharmacist or dispensing appliance contractor that offers EPS, or your GP practice. Tell them before your next prescription is due or your prescription may be sent to the wrong place.

Is EPS reliable, secure and confidential?

Yes. Your electronic prescription will be seen by the same people in GP practices, pharmacies and NHS prescription payment and fraud agencies that see your paper prescription now.


