As a lot of you will have seen, the shop is still on the market. There has been activity recently as we have changed agents and our new agent seems much more proactive so the sale is more visible.

It may take us a while to sel but it was always our intention to do this for a few years. The energy and commitment it requires is enormous and whilst we are really proud of what we've achieved, we are pretty exhausted.

We are glad that you are enjoying the longer opening hours. For us it has been nice to be open longer but it has been much quieter. We hope it is just that people are enjoying a bit of freedom out of the village but if there is something wrong with the service you are getting or the quality of the produce, please let us know.

There has been a lot to learn with the constantly changing Covid-19 requirements and there are some people coming into the shop who are understandably nervous. It is mandatory for customers entering the shop to wear a mask and we would still ask people to respect social distancing. We do still have a one way system in place and would ask customers of all ages to respect this and to allow time for customers to do their shopping. We have worked hard at trying to come up with the best solution for distancing but we are limited by the space so the position of the fridges is not ideal. We are trying to serve people as quickly as possible to avoid long waits in queues but part of us being a village shop is that we take time to serve customers who need a bit of extra support.

Tensions are high as people get scared but we would ask you all to be patient with us and with other customers. Some customers have dementia and hidden disabilities such as anxiety or lung conditions which makes wearing a mask difficult. We do not judge anyone for being scared or for not wearing a mask but if you feel uncomfortable please speak to us. We do not have to police people not adhering to the rules but we do have a duty of care to all our customers so we do want you all to feel able to come in and do your shopping safely. We are hugely grateful to our team for their hard work and want to look after them which is why we are really keen for people to follow the guidelines and pay by contactless card where possible to reduce the risks of cross contamination and save our poor hands from the constant use of chemical cleaners. We know it is a nuisance paying for small amounts on your card but we all really appreciate your commitment to helping us stay safe.

As in previous years we will be offering a pre-order service for your groceries over the Christmas period. Sheets are available in the shop and orders need to be with us by Sunday 20th December.

Just a reminder of our opening hours - weekdays 8am-6pm - weekends 9ammidday.

Post Office

The Post Office is open the same hours as the shop.

There have been changes recently regarding the price structure of overseas mail. There are now three zones and the prices have increased as, with the reduction in passenger flights, Royal Mail are using more expensive means of transporting mail. If you are thinking of posting overseas for Christmas you may want to think about acting early and sending parcels by land rather than by air. We are always happy to give advice. At the moment there are long delays in mail being sent to Australia and New Zealand so the last posting date has been brought forward to 4th December. Hopefully you will have seen the signs in the shop about this and also on social media so it is not a surprise.

The last recommended posting day (for post to get delivered for Christmas) is 2nd class 18th December, 1st class 21st December and Special Delivery 23rd December.

Christmas stamps this year depict images of stained glass angels.

Just a reminder that we offer a good range of banking services for all high street banks and a few others so, if you need to deposit a cheque or cash, this can be done with us. Cheques need to be put into a banking envelope (we hold a good stock of these for most banks), ideally with a paying in slip but if you don't have a slip just write the account number and sort code of your bank on the reverse of the cheque. Cash deposits for most high street banks can be done via your debit card.

The Post Office will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and Sunday 27th December as well as on 1st January. This will mean no cash withdrawals on these days - so please plan around this. The shop will be open for two hours on Boxing Day and Sunday 27th but, without the Post Office, there will be less back-up support.

We were sad to hear that Jo has retired from Talaton Post Office. We wish her all the very best and thank her for all the unused stationery very gratefully received.

Hello my friends,

As I write this we are anxiously awaiting the news conference to tell us what sort of Christmas we might have. The newspapers, as usual, are giving their various versions of what the Prime Minister will announce based on the usual combination of rumour, speculation and equal measures of doom mongering and fantasy, but what the final outcome will be I have no idea.

This last month has been curious in as much as it is lockdown but not lockdown, children have gone to school and many shops have stayed open whilst we are being urged to stay at home. On our dog walks I have noticed how much busier the roads seem compared to the first lockdown and all the while the news seems to suggest the virus is creeping closer to home. It is interesting to note how quickly we seem to have settled into a new normal, whatever that means, but it also feels a bit like, in our little piece of East Devon, there is a race between the vaccine and the virus. Strangely, even as the hope of the vaccine looks closer it is easy to feel an increased anxiety as we hear of cases mounting in our local schools and businesses. Added to this we can start to feel jaded by our efforts to keep ourselves and our community safe, all the while ensuring we reach out to others.

Dear Residents,

Here we are once again having to endure a lockdown to try to ensure the safety and protection of us all. I hope that when you receive this news letter you and your family are managing to find some sort of comfort during this difficult time.

Your district council are once again pulling out all of the stops to ensure there is a system of support for those that need it.

Our fabulous volunteers are busy behind the scenes getting flyers out there so that you will know who to contact locally for help. Others are getting food boxes ready for anyone who may



be finding it a bit tough and may need a bit of help to feed themselves or their family.

Meanwhile your district council are trying to keep everything ticking along as best as possible. Suez will be continuing to recycle for us, and our public parks will be kept open (hopefully some toilets too!).

If you have a smart phone and don't already have it, please download the East Devon app which has all sorts of information on it including a reminder of what is collected on which Friday - which is useful for me if my very own home recycling elf is away.

This month was special for me at EDDC. I put a motion to council, which was passed, that asked for gender neutral language be used within EDDC, that councillors with extended roles should be offered maternity pay, for our policy on sexist language and behaviour within council to be tightened and for all of our committees to have the leader of those committees to be addressed as 'chair'.

This may seem unimportant to some but many of us would like to see more women become members of our district council and therefore we need to make it a more equal and attractive proposition.

By May 2023 (election time) I would hope that far more women feel confident enough to enter into local politics.

Community Speed Watch

With an increase in complaints regarding speeding, a good option to consider would be 'Community Speed Watch (CSW)' There is now in place a new method for setting up a

CSW group. Initial requests for a new CSW Group can be submitted by any member of the community (18yrs or over), all requests for new groups are requested online, through CSW Online at: https://ww.communityspeedwatch.org/A minimum of 6 volunteers are required for a CSW Group to become active. I am happy to co-ordinate this (unless there is another willing volunteer in which case I am more than happy to offer assistance)! I know that our District Councillor, Kathy McLauchlan, asked residents at the start of the year to let her know if they were interested in joining a scheme but Covid-19 put the process on hold. I have spoken with Kathy who suggested I ask again that any resident who may have previously expressed an interest to email me with their details (Data protection rules sadly means Kathy cannot share the details she previously may have received with me). whimpleparishcouncil@gmail.com

'Who is responsible for maintenance to Hedges and Verges?'

This is often a question raised to the Parish Council.

Many hedges and trees grow on the edge of the highway and mark its boundary with private property. In these cases the adjacent landowner or occupier is responsible for maintaining them. This also applies to trees that overhang the highway or fall on to it. If you are unsure whether you are the owner check your property deeds or The Land Registry. For more guidance see



We have acquired some new display boards from Ottery Heritage Centre. Thanks to David Rastall and Margaret Burrough for organising transportation.

At the moment, we are considering the best way to go ahead with the AGM that usually takes place in March. We will be in contact with members as soon as a safe and sensible approach has been identified.

In the last update, it was said that our Treasurer, Mike Rovira, had secured a Govt. Grant of £10. Bit of a typo there – it was actually £10,000. Yay!

Finally, we are very grateful to Graham Potbury for laying a wreath at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday on behalf of all of us in the History Society.

During an early evening in October, looking out and seeing a beautiful field of corn, not quite as high as an elephants eye, or even climbing right up to the sky, but it was impressive. Next morning, it was gone – harvested, ploughed, raked and sown. In a week there were green shots appearing and in two weeks a rich carpet of green across the entire field. It's all part of the rural cycle of seasons. It's these activities in our village, which are so precious, as is the apple harvest, in the remaining orchards dotted round the village. We sit in an area of Devon's rich red soil, we are rural, but rooted in the twenty-first century with all that is positive and negative.

The immense pressures of development on the door step of Whimple, has been a feature of 2020. The year started with submissions from the majority of POW+R Group for the inquiry into the extension phase of Cranbrook New Town. It included a 19,000 word report on the impact of Cranbrook on Whimple and Rockbeare and the problems associated with a Developer Led Consortium, plus no Town Centre. POW+R had strong representation at most of the hearing sessions, challenged every section and were <u>very vocal</u> in our desire to protect our village.



The hearing was put on hold due to issues surrounding the viability of the scheme and is now back as a virtual hearing starting on the 16th November 2020. POW+R will have representation from three of our group, focusing on development east of Cobden Lane, including the proposed Gypsy and Travellers Site.

In August of this year, there was another 'bombshell', when plans were published under the title of the **Greater Exeter Strategic Plan (GESP)**. It would have accepted the principle of hundreds of acres of land to be developed, including a possible, bolt on extension to Whimple of up to 2,500 Homes. With a considerable number of forces in the village, emails to a large number of Councillors at East Devon District Council and the involvement of Kathy Mclauchlan, the council decided to withdraw from the derisory GESP.

If that wasn't enough then came one of the most divisive White Papers – Planning for the future, that is riddled with false information and acutely biased towards developers. It is full of criticism of planners, when they are purely implementing the requirements of the current planning law. In addition, the Government wants to take away key democratic areas of Local Government and centralise many systems. This is not linked to the Localism Act 2011, it's not localism it's vandalism.

POW+R is again on the case and each of our group made representation as part of the consultation process, by the due date of the 29th October 2020. This has included a comprehensive analysis of the White Paper and the completion of the questionnaire, which in itself is chronically biased and would not pass muster on any social-scientific feedback process. The PM has described the planning system as beginning to crumble; it is just not true. It's the power that developers have and holding back land that has already gained planning permission, which is one of the problems. Planning Departments are very streamlined operations with much being done online and with a high standard of professionalism, all with limited resources. It is just fundamentally wrong to use algorithms to make planning decisions – look what happened in the exam fiasco.

Now it's a waiting game for the Government to evaluate the responses to the White Paper.

The POW+R group are very pleased to see work on the Neighbourhood Plan for Whimple begin, at last, with the steering groups getting underway on this most important document. The Neighbourhood Plan will form the backbone of the village's defence mechanism, once ratified, and, as EDDC look to update the Local Plan in the next few years, the Neighbourhood Plan should inform that process. Without a Neighbourhood Plan, the village is completely defenceless against future encroachment from large-scale developers. Thank you to everyone who has got involved in this vital work so far.

POW+R is now looking for a new Chair and would welcome any input and assistance from members of the wider Whimple/ Rockbeare communities. If you would be willing and able to give up some of your free time in order to help protect the village from the expansion of Cranbrook and any other large development that is proposed, we'd love to hear from you! Please email us at contact@powr.live.

A busy year for POW+R and now at the beginning of November, the Country has gone into lockdown II, until the 2nd of December – well that is the Plan A. In our village life goes on as best as it can, but time does not wait for the cycles of the seasons to pass.




Why are we doing this?



YOGA - BUT NOT ON THE MAT

I'm going to talk about YOGA - No! Don't turn the page. This IS relevant to you.

OK, so yoga does have a bit of a stereotypical clientele (which I suppose I do actually fit into) - female - tick, middle aged - tick, slim - tick, searching for your 'inner goddess' - tick (obviously I). But the benefits of yoga can apply to us **all**. Even the English Rugby team, Daniel Craig, Lady Gaga and loads of teenagers during lockdown are doing it. So **do** read on and I will explain.

The first thing to say is that the yogic image of someone, aka the description above, contorting themselves in strange even dangerous looking, poses on a mat or sitting cross legged singing 'OM' is not really Yoga. It might be a part of it if you want it to be. However, the physical practice of Asanas (pronounced arse-nas!!) is only one aspect of the many disciplines. To put it simply yoga can be defined as

Taking part in an activity and directing one's mind without distraction or interruption. It is a quality or state of being fully absorbed in what you are doing.

So, you see, you don't need to be on a yoga mat to experience a state of yoga. In fact you probably experience yoga more than you realise. For example, singing, gardening, cooking, reading a really good book, painting, or even doing the washing up. If you are fully present in the moment, not worrying about the future or dwelling on the past, then you are practising yoga.

Sounds easy doesn't it? But take a moment to consider when you were actually in that state of complete focus. It might well be days, weeks, months ago. Our mental state is so often scattered or fixated on something that is NOT the present moment. Our modern lifestyles lead us to be multi tasking, problem solving and forward planning. We get very good at spinning plates, but often at a cost. Regular introspective practice IS good for you, it puts 'tools' in your health and wellbeing 'toolbox'.

Here's a teeny bit of science - when you are calm, focused and grounded you are in a Parasympathetic Nervous State. This means physically your heartrate is slower, breathing is deeper, muscles are more relaxed, and digestive system is functioning more productively. All good things, which in turn aid your sleep, energy levels, etc. Conversely when you are anxious, overstimulated or stressed, your body is likely to respond with shallow breathing, heart rate racing, poor digestion because you are in that 'Fight & Flight' mode, too much of this is definitely **not** good for your health.

There is plenty of research and evidence – I like this quote from a *Live Science* article by Dr Loren Fishman "It(Yoga practice) thickens the layers of the cerebral cortex, the part of the brain associated with higher learning, and increases neuroplasticity, which helps us learn new things and change the way we do things," WOW you can teach a (downward facing) dog new tricks!

And in a pandemic? – breathwork and mindful practice help improve lung function, stimulate the vagus nerve, improve immunity and help to reduce inflammation. ALL are extremely important for maintaining good general health.

Now, I am a yoga teacher and I know that if you do venture onto your yoga mat, or attend regular classes, then this can be a great benefit to your health and wellbeing.

As Dr Fishman suggests, regular practice helps us to create positive habits, rather than just reinforcing old habits, that might be limiting you. The reason is twofold

- 1. Exercise that has familiarity and repetition leads to calmness and peace of mind. Therefore, regular practice means you learn how to drop into this state, when the going gets tough family, work, health, even a pandemic!
- 2. Exercise that is also challenging and encourages attentiveness. In other words, you learn to be fully present in your body. Translate this into everyday life and you become more aware of how you are really feeling. This helps you to make more informed decisions.

Finally, you don't need to worry about the difference between a *Virabhadrasana* and a *Natarajasana*. You might never achieve, or want to even contemplate, a headstand (that's *Salamba Sirsasana* to you geeks). However, you may just find that trying to be truly present in certain moments of your day will bring a certain steadiness, focus, and calmness that you can return to whenever you need it most. That is one of the true benefits of Yoga and something we can all achieve if we put our minds to it. Anyone can be taught a downward facing dog. It is just a series of joint positions. Anyone can learn how to breathe properly. The bigger question is what do you want to do with the breaths you have today?





Whereas pupils in Beech Class have been designing and colour mixing, when producing some paintings and mixed media pieces of work which have been inspired by the coming of autumn.









