



Trevor Griffin, of Whimple-based cricket coaching company T.C.C., was honoured at a national awards ceremony earlier this month when he received the 'Chance to Shine' Coach of the Year Award.



The great and the good of the cricketing world came together at Lord's Cricket Ground to celebrate the work being done by Chance to Shine supported by Brit Insurance. The star-studded event was attended by the Governor of the Bank of England and Chance to Shine President, Mervyn King, England captains Andrew Strauss and Charlotte Edwards, along with fellow England players Chris Tremlett, Jade Dernbach, Lydia Greenway, Caroline Atkins & Jenny Gunn.

The judges were impressed with Trevor's energy, his friendly approach to cricket and education, his willingness to try out new ideas and challenge his own ability as well as the children, teachers and coaches he engages with on a day to day basis.

Speaking after receiving his award from England's Lydia Greenway, Trevor said "Tonight has been an amazing occasion. To be here in the Long Room at Lord's among so many people working to encourage grass roots cricket within state schools is very special; to win an award and be named Coach of the Year on top of that is an honour, something I'll never forget – it's completely out of the blue, I'm overwhelmed!"

The awards recognised the efforts of coaches, teachers and club managers from across the UK who are involved in the country's biggest school sports development initiative on behalf of the Chance to Shine charity. Locally, the project has been operating in over 20 primary and secondary schools in Exeter for the past 2 years as well as in other parts of the county, co-ordinated by the Devon Cricket Board.

Prizewinning Canadian Duo to Perform in Victory Hall



On Becoming a District Councillor – Part 2: Meetings, Meetings, Meetings

After all the excitement of winning my seat I now had to find out how to do the job properly. First I was sworn in at the Council Offices at Knowle in Sidmouth, once a very grand house, but with all sorts of additions and extensions which make it into a rabbit warren where a shiny new councillor can easily get lost. The room numbering defies logic and even Council employees may have no idea where a particular room is: they have learned by rote the way from their office to the canteen, the loos and the front door, and have no idea where anything else is. Now, in the course of my Council duties when I need to seek out an officer or attend a meeting I allow for "getting lost" time.



I was relieved and delighted to find that the Council run some excellent training courses for new members and I have found these extremely helpful in getting started. From this training I discovered that Councillors have three main roles: (a) involvement in the business of the Council at Knowle e.g. membership of committees and" think tanks" and participation in the planning committee and full Council meetings, (b) involvement in the work of the Parish Council e.g. attending Parish Council meetings and presenting my monthly report on what is happening at the Council, and (c) my responsibilities towards my constituents - helping individuals when they require advice or support in resolving some problem to do with the Council.

Whichever role I am performing it involves meetings, meetings and meetings! Council meetings can be morning, noon or night, Parish meetings are usually evenings, and constituents are any time. Meetings at the Council office can go on for up to eight hours and similarly, the Parish Council meetings can often be four hour blockbusters. There is some well validated research that suggests that meetings lasting more than forty minutes become increasingly ineffective, and there have certainly been a few where I have lost the will to live! As a new boy I have not been appointed to many committees but, by the same token, I think I should go to lots of the meetings to find out how they work, and how important they are in the administration of the Council's responsibilities. The Council Diary, known as 'The Knowledge', and published every week, seems to have an endless list of things to attend. However, much as they seem at times endless and interminable, they do provide an essential forum for the democratic process. And through these meetings I have learned to find my way around, found out what is going on, and met many interesting people. I very quickly realised that the current Big Issue at the Council is the Local Development Framework (LDF) and I have attended as many meetings of the Local Development Framework Panel (LDF), as possible. The LDF will, when adopted, replace the current East Devon Local Plan, in place since 2006. The LDF review must be completed by February 2012 if the Council is going to be able to resist any development proposals put forward after the "Localism" Bill becomes law.

Without it, we will not be able to refuse planning permission because we wouldn't be able to show that new building development planning had already been agreed in our area. This planning also includes town centres, environmental protection, climate change, housing policy for the elderly, housing viability, employment strategy, land monitoring of both employment land and domestic land, and a green infrastructure policy.

Over the last several months the LDF panel has been meeting every fortnight and in the last two months it has been meeting weekly with a final all day session on the first of November. The panel will finally meet to present its draft plan to the Development Management Committee on November 18th – too late for this edition. So next time I will report on the draft.

LOCAL ISSUES. I have been approached by constituents recently with three queries – all in the Daisymount area.

- (a) The strange new development close to Keeper's Cottage on the road to the Daisymount roundabout: I have enquired at the planning department about this, and it seems that a successful application to develop a garage had been granted by the Council several years ago. The time allowed to start development was about to expire so the owners of the land have made a start upon the development. By so doing they secure the planning permission in perpetuity and we might have to put up with this unfinished piece of landscaping for a very long time.
- (b) Willow View: The application to complete the Willow View site with additional chalet homes and further landscaping had been refused earlier this year, but Gordon Podbury turned up to the appeal with most of the residents in tow and they were delighted to see the appeal accepted by a whopping majority so he can now go ahead with completing this attractive site at Straightway Head.
- (c) Signage to the crematorium. Several residents from Whimple and Hand and Pen have reported that distressed mourners have been found wandering around, trying to find the crematorium, having missed the one and only sign at the entrance. Gerri Turner as Clerk to the Parish Council and myself, as District Councillor, have both presented written pleas to the crematorium company requesting some improvement in the signage, more particularly direction signs off the Daisymount roundabout and a second large sign at the crematorium entrance. Watch this space! **Cllr Martin Gammell**

A Few Facts about Christmas

Christmas was once a moveable feast celebrated at many different times during the year. The choice of December 25th was made by Pope Julius I in the 4th century A.D., because this coincided with the pagan rituals of Winter Solstice, or 'Return of the Sun'. The intent was to replace the pagan celebration with the Christian one.

In 1647 the English parliament passed a law that made Christmas illegal. Festivities were banned by Puritan leader Oliver Cromwell who considered feasting and revelry on what was supposed to be a holy day to be immoral. The ban was lifted only when the Puritans lost power in 1660.

In 1752 11 days were dropped from the year when the switch from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar was made. The December 25th, date was effectively moved 11 days backwards. Some Christian church sects, called old calendarists, still celebrate Christmas on January 7th (previously December 25 of the Julian calendar).

A traditional Christmas dinner in early England was the head of a pig prepared with mustard.

At lavish Christmas feasts in the Middle Ages, swans and peacocks were sometimes served 'endored'. This meant the flesh was painted with saffron dissolved in melted butter. In addition to their painted flesh, endored birds were served wrapped in their own skin and feathers, which had been removed and set aside prior to roasting.

In Victorian England, turkeys were popular for Christmas dinners. Some of the birds were raised in Norfolk, and taken to market in London. To get them to London, the turkeys were supplied with boots made of sacking or leather. The turkeys were walked to market. The boots protected their feet from the frozen mud. Boots were not used for geese: instead, their feet were protected with a covering of tar.

'Hot cockles' was a popular game at Christmas in medieval times. It was a game in which the other players took turns striking a blindfolded player, who had to guess the name of the person delivering each blow. 'Hot cockles' was still a Christmas pastime until the Victorian era.

Before settling on the name of Tiny Tim for his character in 'A Christmas Carol,' three other alliterative names were considered by Charles Dickens. They were Little Larry, Puny Pete, and Small Sam. After 'A Christmas Carol', Charles Dickens wrote several other Christmas stories, one each year, but none was as successful as the original.

According to historical accounts, the first Christmas in the Philippines was celebrated 200 years before Ferdinand Magellan discovered the country for the western world, likely between the years 1280 and 1320 AD.

It is a Christmas tradition that a wish made while mixing the Christmas pudding will come true only if the ingredients are stirred in a clockwise direction.

According to a 1995 survey 7 out of 10 British dogs get Christmas gifts from their doting owners.



Preparing for Winter

A team of volunteers is needed to help keep our village safe for everyone during the coming winter.

With winter just around the corner and the forecast of more snow and ice on the way, the parish council, together with many other councils, has registered with the **DCC Winter Snow Warden Scheme.**

During icy weather DCC commits to gritting Church Road and Broadclyst Road but as with last years widespread long-lasting severe weather sometimes even that is not always possible. **The Snow Warden Scheme, co-ordinated by Sue Ayres**, aims to help us keep our village footpaths and trouble spots on our minor roads in a passable, safe condition. You may have heard the stories of those who last year were afraid or unable to leave their homes because of icy paths and roads. With help from a volunteer team we aim to prevent that happening again.

We have already identified some village cold spots - the footpath from Dince Hill Close to the Jays, from the train station to School Hill, from Town Lane to The Square, from Rectory Close to the Post Office and from West View close to Dince Hill Close. Also, the road leading out of Chard Avenue, Knowle Cross Lane and the hill by Perriton Cross. If an icy footpath or section of road near you gave cause for concern and you would like some help please call Sue on 823082.

Last year many people did help themselves and others around the village but this year, to make sure everyone is safe, we would like to have a more co-ordinated approach . However, with all community projects we need you to volunteer to help. If you have any time, no matter how small and would like to join our team please call Sue Ayres on 823082 or email sue@reubenayres.com If you volunteer but find you are unable to help when contacted, it doesn't matter, you can help next time – but please register your interest.

The Snow Warden Scheme.

What are the benefits to our community?

To those parishes that join the scheme DCC is offering advice, guidance and training. They also offer Public Liability Insurance to all volunteers who help under the terms of the scheme.

At the beginning of the year the parish council was asked to locate and register all the village grit bins. The existing grit bins, together with a new one sited by the Cricket Ground, have now been numbered and topped up with a mixture of salt and grit.

Under the terms of the scheme the Parish Council has identified a space to store 3 tonnes of free salt and, with the help of James Baker from Holway Farm, this salt will be used around the village when and where needed. 

What do you want from your church in Whimple?

The church building of St. Mary's is an imposing feature in the centre of the village but what goes on there, who owns it and who looks after the building? Does it matter to most people in the village as they go about their daily lives? Who cares?

Many of you will be aware that our priest in charge recently moved on to another parish and the church is currently in the midst of a "vacancy" while we go about recruiting another priest to take charge of our Mission Community which includes Talaton, Clyst St. Lawrence and Clyst Hydon. Although this creates a few difficulties for us, it is also an opportunity to take stock, explore in which direction we want to go as a church and, hopefully, recruit a new priest who has similar values and a sense of purpose to help take us in that direction.

When you talk to most people who do not attend church regularly about "the church" they tend to think of the building, whereas most church-goers probably think of the church as a group of people. In reality it is both. The building facilitates the activities of the people and we are lucky in Whimple to have been bequeathed a fine building by our predecessors.

In the absence of a priest, responsibility for running the church falls on the two elected churchwardens and the Parochial Church Council (PCC), also elected from and by those on the church electoral roll. At this time the PCC is starting to consider our strategy for the next decade i.e. what sort of church do we want in Whimple in 10 years time? There will be some of you who live in the village who have absolutely no interest in the church building or what goes on inside it. At the other extreme are the regular church-goers and we talk to them in church and can canvas their views relatively easily. However, we believe there are also a considerable number of you who may attend church either infrequently or not at all, but who have an interest in what we are doing and any plans we may have for the future. These may include those who attend for Remembrance Sunday, Harvest, Songs of Praise in Village Week and perhaps also at Christmas and/or Easter. There may be some of you who never normally attend church, but perhaps want the facility to be there for a possible family wedding, baptism or funeral in the future. Others may simply look on the church as part of our village heritage. Yet others may attend a church, but not in Whimple as you may feel we do not provide what you require or perhaps you do not attend church because you feel there is nothing we currently do that fits in with your busy schedule.

It is important that our plans take account of all of your views and needs as the church belongs to the village, not just those who currently attend church services regularly. Some of you expressed views on the subject of refurbishing the inside of the church when this was discussed a couple of years ago at an open meeting. I joined the PCC after that meeting and became a churchwarden earlier this year. Personally I believe that we do need to evolve over time both in our use of the building and to meet the changing needs within our community. But we also need to ensure that we pay heed to those locally who have a perceived stake in the church and who we rely on to support the church in a number of ways, not least when we are fund raising.

I couldn't possibly spell out in a short article why I think the church is important to the village as a whole, how it is run and the issues we face, but the PCC is producing a fact sheet which we hope you will find interesting and also a questionnaire. These will be distributed to each household in the parish early next year. From the questionnaire we hope to gain a better insight into what the village wants from its church. Your views are very important to us as we move into a new era with a new priest in charge and I hope you will take the time to fill in the questionnaire and return it to us.

Thank you, in anticipation, for your support in this matter.

As we re-read the Oct/Nov issue of Whimple news we are reminded of the activities and hard work that go on in Whimple.




