

The Local Area Health Forum

I attended a Local Area Health Forum on behalf of the Parish Council and here is a resume of the meeting.

As of April 2013 the NHS is changing. We are all in a clinical group for Devon known as the WACKLEY group (incl Ottery St Mary and coastal towns) with 72,000 patients. Sadly the North Devon Health Trust has a huge deficit which will impact on the service provided locally.

There is a big push to save both the Ottery and Honiton local hospitals from closure. At present there are 12 used beds in the hospital at Ottery. The maximun the hospital can take is 24 but it is commissioned to run at 18. Finding qualified nursing staff under the new regime seems to be a problem.

The idea is to have urgent response nurses as the first point of contact in the community to understand the problem and then engage a GP if necessary to act as a 'one stop shop'. They also have a responsibility to follow up with helpers or charities as and when necessary. The Urgent Response nurses are available from 8.00am until 4.00pm Monday to Friday. The Devon Doctors out-of-hours service is available at other times. To speak to an Urgent Response Nurse contact the Coleridge Medical Centre on 814447 and ask for the nurse on duty.

There are a number of Community Nurses who are able to visit people should they be bed-bound and unable to get to the Medical Centre but this has to be arranged via your GP. On top of this there is a Hospital Discharge Facilitator to help people leave hospital. This service is not available at weekends.

The Government is currently having a big push on the assessment and treatment of Dementia patients. There is also a specialist nurse, called Debbie Cheeseman, who works out of RD & E and understands the issues regarding older people. A survey has found that in East Devon 21% of people are 65 or over and 5% of people are 85 or over (8% in Sidmouth!). 50,000 bed days are used by the RD & E for this section of society per annum. Two thirds of RD & E patients are over 65 with one third over 80.

We all appreciate the convenience of the Whimple Branch of the Medical Centre. However, an appointment is always needed.

I hope this is helpful and you now feel informed. The difficult part is ensuring good

communication between doctors and the communities they serve.

Ten Tors 2013

The build up for Ten Tors started for us back in October 2012 when we commenced our training programme. Whimple Explorer Scouts



section has recently joined forces with Tipton St John Explorers and both groups, as part of the East Devon District, had had a number of Explorers who were keen to take on the challenge. Initially we had one walk a month up until Christmas to give the young people a taste of what was in store. Then, after the festive break, those who remained started on over five months of training walks, one every other week all the way up until the fortnight before the event. All of these walks were on Dartmoor and starting with distances of around 10 miles in a day, gradually increasing up until the last three weekends where we ultimately ran full distance with overnight camping and walks of 35 and 45 miles respectively for our teams.

With the weather conditions we have faced this year training was incredibly challenging. Many of the walks were conducted with little more than a couple of hundred yards of visibility through the mist and others were undertaken in torrential rain and freezing cold winds. Throughout this time we were training the Explorers in the skills of navigation, endurance and camp-craft to get them to the necessary level to be able to complete the event unaided. For those who didn't make the final teams, credit must be given for their achievements during training and I hope that next year they will have another go.

Moving forwards to May and the event weekend: The leader team headed up to Okehampton on the Thursday to set up our base camp. It was a good job we got there early as the wind and rain picked up during the day and by lunchtime those later arrivals from other teams were struggling with canvas and poles in gale-force winds and torrential rain. Our old discoloured marquee however, stood the test while we huddled inside and enjoyed a well deserved beer!

Friday morning and the Explorers arrived. This day is quite administrative with team registration, briefings and logistics, including the demanding scrutineering process where every item of equipment is checked for suitability before allowing the children out on their own. The other key thing that happens on Friday is that the teams get assigned their routes. There are a total of 26 different routes which cover the three different distances (35, 45 and 55 miles). Our 35 team was assigned route N and our 45 team assigned route Q. Knowing which tors were to be visited then allowed the Explorers to work out their route planning, timings for each leg and allowed us to warn them of areas where they needed to take particular care.

Saturday morning and the campsite is awoken at 5.00am hours by the sounds of 'Chariots of Fire' coming over the tannoy – this is a tradition that dates back many years and sends shivers down your spine as the camp comes to life. After breakfast and a final kit check the teams walk through the camp up to the start at Anthony Style. The sight of 2,400 young people lined up across the hill is incredible and when the cannon is fired to signal the start they all disperse in different directions to begin their two day challenge.

This year, the weather was really against us and our 35 mile team, having passed Kitty Tor and Chat Tor successfully reached one of the manned river crossing points. The first team, from a different group to ours, managed to cross with the aid of the Dartmoor Rescue Group who subsequently made the decision to divert the remaining groups and escort



them across the river upstream in knee high water. Not a great start to the weekend to fill your boots with water that early and also lose over an hour of time due to the diversion. Our team pushed on to Lynch Tor across to Higher White Tor and South Hessary Tor before making camp at Black Tor for the night. 6.00am on Sunday and the team left Black Tor, travelled up to Great Mis Tor, then across to Beardown Tor, up to Sittaford Tor and finally on to Oke Tor before coming back in to camp as a full team of six at 15.06hrs. The 35 mile route N was one of the toughest on the competitors, with 40% of the participants on that route falling out. Apart from the team who got to the crossing first and didn't lose time, ours was the fastest group on the route.

Our 45 team had been incredibly strong through training so we were confident of a good performance, and they didn't disappoint! Their route went south past Watern Tor, Sittaford Tor, Combestone Tor and Pupers Hill, crossing right across the South Moor to Great Trowlesworthy Tor before heading back Northwards past South Hessary Tor and spending the night somewhere beyond. On Sunday morning they checked in at Black Tor, managed to briefly see our 35 mile team and continued on to Great Mis Tor and Lynch Tor. Beyond Lynch was the same crossing that had delayed the 35s the previous day, but by now the river had dropped and they continued on to Kitty Tor unimpeded before coming in at 12.02pm. They were the fastest team on their route by a good hour - the 4th 45 mile team across the line on any route and the 24th team overall out of somewhere around 380 that started. The time they came in on was identical to the fastest time on the same route last year, in conditions that were somewhat more glorious, so an amazing achievement by any standard.

So another year over for Ten Tors and another full house of medals. We begin again in October when, hopefully, some of the 45s will want to tackle the 55 mile distance, the 35s will try for 45 miles and a new batch of recruits take the first step and go for a 35 route.





Anniversary and a Few Reflections on Elections possibly boring, but important, especially for motorists

Gosh, it is exactly two years since I was elected to the job! Time has whizzed by and I am thoroughly enjoying the privilege of being your Councillor. I sense that I am starting to get the feel of the job, which is far more complex than I ever imagined. I have learned an awful amount about the workings of the Council and



the strains that are being put on it by the present economic crisis and the way central government is pushing so much work and expense down the line to local councils. This is an excellent idea, but it comes with very little extra funding. This makes me much more aware of the huge job that the District Council - the members and the staff - perform in providing the services they are responsible for and which we, as consumers, take for granted. Which brings me on to comment on the recent County Council elections. Above everything else, I was bitterly disappointed that so many people did not seem to know anything about the vital work of the County Council, and voted on issues that County Councils can do nothing about, like immigration or Europe. The candidates for the Sidmouth division held a hustings, and made it clear that they were not prepared to talk about those matters - or planning issues, which are District Council responsibilities. That left the audience with very few questions to ask! Yet they could have asked about so many matters affecting us, our families, our neighbours: children and grandchildren and old people, because it is the County Council which is responsible for schools, public health, council care homes, location of quarries (Whimple might find one even closer than Rockbeare Hill), roadside parking charges in towns and roads repairs. (See below) County Councillors have enormous responsibilities and we should have tried to find out which candidates are up to those responsibilities, not whether their opinions reflect our feelings about wider issues. I would even dare to suggest that an occasional 'blog' from our County Councillor would have helped the electorate understand more about the work of the County Council.

A Few Facts and Figures on the Election Results

I also looked at the County Council results to see how voters made their choice, which make an interesting activity for any student of psephology (The science of analysing voting patterns in elections). Yes, there really is an "ology" for this riveting activity! In the nine divisions in East Devon only two resulted in the winner gaining an outright victory by polling the majority of the votes cast. One of these was in Ottery Rural where Claire Wright polled nearly three times as many votes as her rivals. The other was in Axminster where the winning Conservative obtained 400 votes more than all the other candidates combined. Congratulations to them both. In the other seven divisions the candidates elected did so with a minority of the votes cast. In the two Exmouth divisions and in Seaton twice as many votes were cast against the winner as were cast for them. We can see the same minority wins right across the County of Devon and also across the country as a whole. This is what always happens with our "First Past the Post" system. This time round, several other parties put up candidates and that also complicated matters. With UKIP, the Greens and the Labour parties all fielding candidates, voters were given plenty of choice, although the results often ended up with no change!

Perhaps it is time to consider a different election process which will give a more representative council. With a bit more understanding of the Councils work as well, there might also have been a better turnout than the poor 35% Whimple and Broadclyst division achieved. And of course, congratulations to our own Peter Bowden for being re-elected.

County Council to Disown Potholed Roads

Here is a disturbing piece of news. In 'Asphalt News' (Yes – really!) I read recently that the County Council, which is as strapped for cash as everybody else, is considering down-grading the status of country lanes from 'roads' to 'byways. The Council has no legal requirement to maintain byways and would thus save a lot of money. This would, of course, be at the expense of the users of lanes who live on them or use them for essential travel – as we all had to do for a working week when Church Road was closed. The lanes are in a dreadful state , so let us hope that particular scheme does not become reality.

The Dog Mess Campaign

And now (at last!) to the services that the District Council provides - and which we take for granted - EDDC has just announced a new dog mess campaign titled "Pick it up" which is aimed at that small group of anti social individuals who refuse to pick up their dog's mess, or - even worse in some ways - who bag it, and then drop it at the roadside or hang it in a tree. The Parish Council pays out a large sum of money every month for the emptying of the red dog bins three times a week so it seems a shame that a few people choose to ignore the requests to pick it up. (By the way, did you know that if there is no red dog bin then it is legal - though rather unpleasant -to place the mess in an ordinary waste bin?) The District Council's strategy is to highlight local sites which are a persistent problem by spraying a message on the pavement in red paint. The idea of this is that a bold message in red psychologically confronts the offender next time they come past, so they will be shamed into picking up the mess in future. The red paint biodegrades in a couple of weeks so the council cannot be accused of vandalism. Let's hope that it is an effective strategy: I am certainly looking forward to seeing if it works. When I was campaigning many years ago in another part of the country I cornered the market on dog mess when I sent out a questionnaire on the issue. I received a huge number of letters! I didn't get elected but it did teach me that dog poo can be a big concern. So - well done the Council for starting this initiative and I wish them every success! Look out for red graffiti!

Local Heroine

Last week I turned up in The Square in Whimple to volunteer for the Great Litter Pick. Phew! What a hard job it was. We teamed off in pairs and covered an awful lot of Whimple. In two hours we collected a huge amount of litter from garden edges, roadsides and hedgerows. This is a sad reflection upon the messiness of people as even a small amount of litter can really spoil both the countryside and our lovely villages. Well done to these unsung heroes and heroines who turned out and made a difference to our environment, and a particular "Well done" to Sue Ayres for arranging it all! A good example of one of the many hidden services your local councils provide, without a hint of politics anywhere! Why not take part next year? It is quite hard work, but also very satisfying, and the more of us who take part the more we get done.



The beloved bumblebee is in trouble. This widespread, familiar and much loved insect is becoming a scarcer sight. Three of our 25 British bumblebee species have already disappeared. This is why Devon Wildlife Trust has set up its 'Get Devon Buzzing' campaign this summer to help the bumblebee and now you can help by making your garden more bee-friendly.

Bumblebees are important

Insects pollinate around three-quarters of our crops. Without them it would cost billions of pounds for us to do their job. Did you know that every tomato, strawberry and blueberry you have ever eaten was pollinated by a bumblebee? And yet bumblebees are in trouble.

Just like us, bumblebees need a varied diet to stay healthy. They like to drink nectar and eat pollen from a mix of different flowers. However, this mix of flowers is disappearing from our landscapes.

Help the bumblebee in your garden

Whether you have a window box, a balcony, a small garden, an allotment or a corner of the school playing field, there's plenty you can do to help bumblebees! Complete the garden to do list below to make your garden a haven for bumblebees.

Spring Concert Review

On Saturday 23rd March an enthusiastic audience gathered in Ottery St Mary Parish Church for a rare opportunity to hear Handel's great oratorio *Israel in Egypt* performed by the Ottery St Mary Choral Society.

The concert opened with Haydn's Symphony No 82 in C Major, performed by the orchestra under their leader, Sarah Greinig.

Israel in Egypt is widely considered a very challenging work to perform. Handel originally wrote the piece with several orchestral interludes, but he later removed these to produce a much shorter work. This therefore puts great pressure on the choir which has 28 choruses to perform with only one interval. Furthermore, 18 of these choruses are double choir pieces – sung in eight voice parts. The conductor, Malcolm Matthews, did a wonderful job of guiding his choir through such a difficult piece.

The Choral Society was joined by two well-known local soloists. The outstanding mezzo-soprano Rebecca Smith gave a clear, warm delivery of the soprano solo, as well as that of her natural range. The tenor, Leslie Baker, also gave an experienced and authoritative performance. As usual, the Society was able to use three accomplished soloists from among their members. Tenor Michael Gascoigne-Pees and baritone David Batty sang the duet *The Lord is a man of war* with clarity and conviction. Pip Gascoigne-Pees joined Rebecca Smith in the duet *The Lord is my strength* which was also beautifully performed.

After an immensely enjoyable evening the audience stayed to socialise with friends and choir members over a glass of wine. The retiring collection raised £230 for Hospiscare.


