

# WHIMPLE STORES 🙈

Autumn time is here again and we have stocks of seasoned logs and kindling to help cosy up in the dark nights. Tuesday and Friday we have delicious home-made cake delivered. Made in Rockbeare it is palm oil free and yummy.

It's a lovely time of year and we are looking forward to decorating the shop windows ready for Halloween. It's so lovely to see the little children in their costumes and the wonderful array of carved pumpkins.

We've had some wonderful summer produce and we are happy if you have a glut of produce to try to sell it for you. Some people sell us their produce and some people just bring it in for charity. If people do thie latter we generally treat it as though we were buying it at the selling price and put the money in the current charity pot on the counter. We are really happy to support our local producers and have a good range of local ciders, beers, apple juice, honey, eggs, cake and dairy products.

Time then to look forward to Christmas and don't forget you can avoid the Christmas Eve queues in the supermarkets by ordering your fruit, veg, bread, dairy and other provisions with us. We can have your order ready for collection on Christmas Eve and you can enjoy a mince pie and glass of mulled wine with us. Order sheets will be available and the shop will be open until noon on Christmas Eve.

#### Post Office

The Post Office will start to get busier in October and November due to the Christmas preparations. We only have one terminal so can only work as fast as that allows. If you just want to buy stamps, please let the shop counter know and if you are paying cash they will be able to help you.

Our collection times during the week are 11.45am and 4.45pm. Saturday collection is noon. To ensure your post or banking goes that day, please make sure you bring it in at least 10-15 minutes before collection time, as paperwork needs to go with end of day collection and we have to give this priority to make sure it goes every day.

Remember that there are restrictions as to what can be sent in the post so if you are sending anything with batteries, perfumes, nail varnishes, alcohol, etc please check first if the size you are sending is allowable. We are always happy to give advice on this and 'size and weight' prices and there are leaflets in store to assist you.

You will be asked at least 5 questions to ensure you are getting the correct service and your parcel is safe to send. This is for your benefit as well as a requirement to ensure mail is safe to be posted.

# Where are you sending your mail? When do you need it to get there? What is inside the parcel? What is the value of the goods? Would you like a signature?

General post covers loss or damage up to £20, signed for service up to £50 and special delivery from £500 to £2500. Special delivery is the only service that covers the postage of cash and jewellery.

Here are some of the last posting dates for Christmas - full details available in store:

Monday 10th December is the last day for International air mail post to Australia, NZ (Friday 28th September was the last day for International economy)

Tuesday 18th December is the last day for 2nd Class post

Thursday 20th is the last day for 1st Class post.

Saturday 22nd is the last day for special delivery options

For overseas cards it is worth mentioning that once the card goes over 20g in weight the price band increases. For cards under 20g going to Europe the cost is £1.25 and this increases to £1.55 for letters from 21-100g. For cards under 10g going to the rest of the world the cost is £1.25 and this increases to £1.45 up to 11-20g and then £2.25 21-100g.

The whole postal service sounds complicated but we are happy to help.

Don't forget that with more bank branches closing, you can do a lot of your banking at the Post Office. We can provide free cash withdrawals for most banks and for most High Street banks we can process cash and cheque deposits. Very often you will need to have paying in slips for this to happen but your bank should be able to provide these. The Post Office and banks are always working together to improve the banking facilities and we are happy to look at what services can be accessed from the Post Office for you.

We also can provide travel money orders and help you with travel money cards as well as helping you to access advice on other Post Office products such as finance, insurance, telephone services and savings. #### The Second World War - Telling the United States Forces how it's done!

In the History Society's archives we hold a pamphlet produced by Whiteways Cyder Company in connection with visits to Whimple by members of the United States Forces, who were stationed nearby during the Second World War. The visitors were first given a tour of the Cyder factory and then, (probably of much more interest to them!), they went to Whimple House Farm, which was a training centre for Land Army girls.

Reproduced below is the first part of the pamphlet, which contains some interesting, and surprising, details of how the factory was run during the War and the impact of war-time restrictions on its operation.

The pamphlet is signed by Mr. Ronald Whiteway, Managing Director, and, naturally, he couldn't resist a little well deserved boasting and a swipe at the German enemy!

A Course in War-time Farming For Members of the United States Forces Programme of visit to WHITEWAYS CYDER FACTORY and TRAINING SCHOOL FOR DAIRYMAIDS AT WHIMPLE HOUSE FARM (This scheme is run in conjunction with the Women's Land Army and the Devon County War Agric. Executive Comm.)

As the time allotted for this visit is so short, we think it may be more helpful if we print a brief description of what we want to show you, instead of trying to explain as you go round.

We are hoping to first take you through our Devonshire Cyder Factory, but, as the maximum time you can spare is half an hour, we are afraid it will have to be a very hurried visit. If you are late in arriving we may have to cancel this entirely and proceed direct to the Farm and Hostel.

## THE CYDER FACTORY

#### A Course in War-time Farming For Members of the United States Forces

Unfortunately, this is not a very interesting time of the year in a Cyder Factory as we are not actually making Cyder. Naturally, this work can only take place when the apples are available, which is from September to December. We then handle about eight thousand bushels per day. We hope that, if any of you are in this district in the Autumn, you will call in and see us. Our mills and presses are probably very similar to those used in America, and we think you would find a visit interesting.

We will first enter our Bottling Department, and you will see our machinery for bottling: this consists of a large Hydro soaker, sterilizer, rinser and drainer with a capacity of two hundred and forty dozen per hour. The bottles, either screw stoppers or crown corks, are then filled with Cyder which has been made sparkling with carbonic acid gas. They are then labelled, but war time regulations allow us to use only one label and no foil and even restrict us as to the size of label, so our bottles do not have the smart appearance of pre-war days. Perhaps we might ask you to excuse the rather dilapidated appearance of our factory, but you will realize the reason of this when we tell you that we are not allowed, during the war, to spend more than a hundred pounds a year in property repairs. Like all other factories, we are working under many disadvantages, such as shortage of labour and essential materials.

After inspecting the bottling, you will please turn right and we will see the various filters and also the six centrifugal clarifiers which get the Cyder partially bright and so ease the work of the filters. You will see that these are similar to a milk separator, in fact they are made by Sharples and come from your Country and are a most useful piece of machinery. We will pass through our Cask-Washing and Filling Department, and you will be interested in the modern method of scouring and sterilizing the casks by a jet of boiling water which is forced into casks at a very high pressure and absolutely cuts out any dirt or impurities from inside the casks.

You will now enter our Cyder Storage Building and we are rather proud of this as it is the largest installation of its kind in England, and, we believe, the world. The vats are made of re-inforced concrete with either glass or ebon lining and have a total capacity of nearly two million gallons. We will have some open with lights inside so that you can see how beautifully clean and sanitary they are. We will walk right through the series of buildings and into another building which contains the largest Cyder or Wine Vats which have ever been built.

There are four vats, each over seventy-five thousand gallons capacity. The Germans used to boast of their giant Wine Vat of Heidelberg as holding the record, as it contained fifty thousand gallons, so we are pleased to add this to other defeats of the Nazis!

No doubt you will now be ready for a glass of Cyder and we should like you first to taste our Rough Farm-Style Cyder from the wood, which is very popular in this Country. It is rather like your American Hard Cyder and is really an acquired taste: we expect you will prefer the Sweet Sparkling kind.

Please now return to your cars and we will proceed to: WHIMPLE HOUSE FARM

wish them all the best for their future.



### Village Week 2019


It's time to start planning Whimple Village Week 2019 and we are looking for some new faces to join the committee.

## NUTRITIONAL THERAPY WITH DEB

It seems most days we see or hear something in the news, talking about what we should or should not eat. Sometimes it's even about the same foods, other days it's about beverages. For instance, a recent report said it's ok for us to have a small glass of wine every day. Yet two days later, they say we should give it up altogether and now just to add a bit of interest, we've been told we should cut out the booze for at least two days a week! No wonder people are confused!

So what the health is going on and what's an upstanding Whimpolian to do about it? Why are there so many articles that say one thing about nutrition and our health, then turn things around and say another?

Well, some of these things have to do with advancing research. Every day, scientists are gaining more of an understanding about how the human body works — which is an amazing and complicated piece of equipment, by the way.

Another reason is due to our own body make up or genetic profile. Our genes are what make us the individuals we are, which also means we may react to foods differently from other people — even our own family members. Furthermore, our health depends not only on what we eat but how and where we eat it. Did you know that the majority of people do not sit down to eat their meals at a table and if they do, it's in front of the TV or some sort of device? All of these things have an impact on how our bodies react and respond, as do our moods, our stress levels, our environment and even the level of exercise we get everyday. So it's not a surprise there's lots of different information out there about what we should and should not consume. However, this does not mean you can eat what you feel like eating and still obey the latest directive! Sometimes the very things we love the most are the ones doing us the most damage.

Once again, the annual Whimple Flower and Craft Show did not disappoint. We did have some concerns that, with the excellent summer and lack of rain, there might have been a lack of exhibits in the vegetable and flower classes. Come the day, we were delighted to see nearly all the classes well supported with quality exhibits. As in previous years, the Village Hall was full of amazing exhibits from the many talented residents of Whimple and neighbouring villages. The main hall was its usual mass of colour with all the exhibits in the vegetable, flower and plant classes. These were complemented by the skilful exhibits on display in the billiard room. The Judges were again very impressed with the high standard in all the classes. For the record, we had 62 exhibitors in the Adult Classes and 12 exhibitors in the Children's Classes. This generated some 503 exhibits in total for this year's show which was a slight increase on last year. Looking back at some old records, in 2007 we had 105 Exhibitors with 601 exhibits! It was good to see some children entering the adult classes and winning prizes too!

The judges were again very impressed with the standard of the exhibits in the Children's Classes. This gave them a hard task selecting the winners. Although the number of entries was slightly down on last year, the exhibits were still of a very high standard. In the youngest class, for the under fives, Dexter Edwards won The Owen Cup. Joshua Plank won the Basildon Award for the five to eight years age group. In the nine to eleven age group it was Jemima Plank who won The Fletcher Cup. It was good to have some entries in the oldest age group this year and the winner of The Children's Challenge Cup was Grace Tierney. There was another excellent entry for the photography section with numerous outstanding photographs in the total entry of 101 photographs. As in previous years, the Judge had a difficult task in determining the winners in the ten classes. The standard seems to get higher every year in this section and again there were some very imaginative entries. The overall winner in this section, winning the Paul Henry G.C. Memorial Cup, was Gemma Olive. The Arts and Crafts Classes had another wonderful display of skills. In this section, the winner of the Len Rose Memorial Cup with the most points, was lenny Sanders. Sherril Olive was the winner of the Whimple Craft Cup for the best exhibit in the section.

The flower arranging had another array of excellent and colourful exhibits and the judge was very meticulous over her deliberations. In this section the winner of the Frances Pratt Memorial Cup was Doreen Staddon. The winner of the Roy Horsburgh Trophy was Barbara Lambert and the winner of The Marie Louise Grout Cup for the best exhibit in the Flower arrangement, which was voted for by everyone who came to see the Show, was awarded to Lucie Bolden.

The Sandfords Cup, which is awarded to the gentleman who gains the most points in the combined Men Only Classes of a floral arrangement and a cake, was awarded jointly to Andy Bratt and Mark Tierney. And so to the mouth watering Homecraft Section where we had another year with a wonderful display of culinary excellence! As usual, the judge had a difficult task in selecting the best out of a total of 51 exhibits in all the classes. This year the winner of the Sir Henry Imbert-Terry Cup with the most points in this section was Margaret Burrough.

Finally, we come to all the exhibits in the main hall and it was a relief to see such a good number of exhibits in these Sections, particularly the vegetable classes. There were 37 exhibits in the Pot Plant Section this year, all of a very high standard. With slightly less exhibits than last year, it was a little easier to stage them all. Once again, the exhibitor with the most points in this section and the winner of The Briar Shield was Colin Northcott. And so to the Vegetable and Flower Classes where there were a total of 228 exhibits this year. It was so good to see so many exhibits in all these classes which gave the judges plenty of work to do! Of the 43 classes there were only two with no exhibits. There were many individual class winners in this section but The Slewton Cup for the most points in the vegetable section was won by Mike Hawkins. The runner up in this section winning the Cranny Brook Cup was Donna Baker. The winner of the Novice Cup for the person entering the vegetable classes for the first time was Donna Baker. In the Flower Classes, the winner of the Win and Bob Shepherd Cup for the most points in this section was Mike Hawkins and the runner up, winning the President's Cup, was Graham Bidgood. Finally in this section, the winner of the Otter Nurseries Rose Bowl for the best exhibit in the Flower Classes was Graham Bidgood for his prize winning Decorative Dahlias. However, when the results for both sections were combined and the points in both sections were added together, the winner of The Whimple Folk Cup for the third year running was Mike Hawkins, so many congratulations to him on winning this magnificent trophy.

And finally, there was the Whimple Challenge Cup which was once again for a Freestyle Scarecrow. We retained the theme of a scarecrow hoping for a good number of exhibits and we were very pleased to have four excellent entries this year all of which were of a very high standard. The judges decided that best exhibit in this class, winning the Whimple Challenge Cup was made by Jeannie Vincent with Angeline Rowe taking the runners up cup.

This year we were delighted to have Mike Ellingham to give out all the prizes. Mike has been a good supporter of the Show over a number of years and we felt it would be very fitting to have him give out the prizes knowing that he was planning on moving out of the village. All the cup winners and Class winners have been posted on our website so can be seen there.

We would like to thank and congratulate all of you who made the effort to enter the Show for without you there would be no Show! We are also extremely grateful to all our judges who give up their time to do this difficult task with such quality exhibits. The Committee would like to express their thanks to everyone who helped us set up the Hall for the Show and clear up afterwards, it is very much appreciated. It is quite amazing that at 5.30 we were still in the throes of prize giving but by 6.30 the hall had been completely cleared and you would not have known the Show had taken place!

For those of you who were entering for the first time we hope you enjoyed the experience and we look forward to seeing you at next year's show. If there are any ideas that any of you have for the various classes we will be more than willing to consider them for the 2019 Show. For those who like to look forward, the Show next year will be on Saturday 10th August 2019!

Our next event will be on Friday 12th October in the Village Hall, when we will be having a talk by Elizabeth Holman on "How to Rejuvenate a Tired Garden" commencing at 7.30pm. After the amazing weather we have had this summer, this could be the ideal opportunity to find out how to give our gardens a boost for next year.




We had the most wonderful, amazing experience and are now on the posters butt naked promoting Calendar Girls the Musical for theatres across the UK.



#### History Society Talk by Annie Bassett

When I first heard that Annie was coming to talk to the History Society, I had to ask "But who is Annie Bassett?" However, even if I didn't

remember her name, I immediately recalled the press coverage of the first female football manager and was amazed to discover she lives here in Whimple. So, on a rather dismal September evening, I was amongst those who came to hear her talk :*Tragedy, Ambition and Glass Ceilings.* 

Annie started by addressing the question of ambition – it was never, she said, about money, but about being heard and achieving that most difficult of commodities, respect.

She was a grocer's daughter and remembered a home full of her mother's laughter, music and sitting on her father's knee, listening to the results and learning the names of football clubs.

Annie was 18 when she met her husband and sailed with him from Tilbury Ist Class to Sydney, Australia. Her mother sent parcels of M&S clothes for the children and at that time, in the 1960s, you had to book a phone call home to the UK a week in advance. However, the relationship with her husband was difficult – something Annie bravely talked quite openly – and on returning to the UK they separated.

Needing a job to support herself and the children, she set up Annie Bassett Promotions, which was based in a friend's double garage. As a now successful businesswoman, in 1985 Reading Football Club offered her the job of Commercial Football Manager. She discovered this to be something of a poisoned chalice when she turned up to find the previous chap, who'd been there for 16 years, had been sacked the night before. Realising the club was in the doldrums with largely empty stands, Annie set about raising the profile of the club within the town by taking a Roadshow into schools and improving the hospitality environment with a family enclosure, new toilets and a tuck shop. Two years later, with the club at last in profit, Annie was offered the role of General Manager with the words "OK Bassett. You get the job and if you get it wrong, I'll be a laughing stock for the rest of my life."

Unsurprisingly perhaps, the media went wild about the woman who had disrupted this bastion of masculine exclusivity. She was criticised for too much 'housekeeping' and not enough football. If the press could be unkind so could the industry itself. Ron Atikinson commented "A woman's place is in the kitchen and in the boudoir." Hmmm! The day to day management of the club also had its trials. There was the time the groundsman sheepishly turned up in her office with the dreadful news "We've put weed killer on the pitch instead of fertiliser!"

However, despite all the challenges, the impact Annie made was recognised. Channel 4 got in touch to discuss the film series *The Manageress* that was inspired by her achievements and in 1989 Annie became 'Woman of the Year'.


Eventually, Annie moved on to Birmingham FC – a much more difficult challenge, then Bournemouth FC and after that Fulham FC whilst she was also lecturing at Middlesex Uni. Mohammed Al Fayed bought Fulham and moved Annie and her team to an office in Harrods where she acquired one of the highlights of her career – a car parking pass for the store.

In 2003, Annie became commercial director for Exeter City where she was responsible for brokering the sponsorship deal with Flybe, which is still in place today. Shortly afterwards, however, she found herself out of a job and willing to take on anything to support herself and the family. She found herself covering books in a warehouse. Quickly spotted by HR, who maybe hadn't read her CV carefully enough, she was moved 'upstairs' to develop a training and mentoring programme which eventually she managed largely from a home in France.

Thirteen years ago Annie discovered and then moved to Whimple. Music still plays a large part in her life.

Annie closed by referring to her divorce as a tragedy – but as being something that reset her life and facilitated the regeneration which enabled her to shatter that 'glass ceiling'.

An appeal has gone out to church bell ringers around Britain to join in a major event this year to commemorate the centenary of the end of World War 1.

A national and international event marking the Armistice, will see more than 1,000 churches and cathedrals participate by ringing their bells simultaneously at 7.05pm on the night of November 11th 2018.

Pageantmaster Bruno Peek LVO OBE OPR is encouraging bell ringers to take part in Ringing Out for Peace. "We want this to be the most widespread ringing of church bells since the First World War," he said. "It would be a fitting and moving tribute to the 1400 or so bell ringers that we understand lost their lives during World War One".

Ringing Out for Peace is part of Battle's Over, a unique day-long commemoration of the end of the First World War taking place throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, and at scores of locations overseas, including Australia, Canada, Denmark, Somaliland, the United States and Germany.

It begins at 6am on November 11th 2018 with lone pipers playing Battle's O'er, a traditional tune played after a battle, outside every cathedral in the country. At 6.55pm buglers will sound the Last Post at more than 1,000 locations, where at 7pm WW1 Beacons of Light will be lit, signifying the light of peace that emerged from the darkness of war. At 7.05pm church and cathedral bells will be Ringing Out for Peace.


Whimple bells will be joining this tribute and this year Armistice Day, 11th November, is a Sunday as well. Whimple's bells will ring half muffled for the morning service of remembrance, as they usually do.

Supporting the two-fold initiative, across the country 1700 people have come forward to learn to ring bells – some returning to the art, others novices. This exceeds the aim to match the 1400 ringers who lost their lives in the Great War.

## **Remembering Martin Gammell**

I am sure many of you will now be aware of my Fiancé, Martin Gammell having passed away peacefully at the RD and E Hospital on the 12th August 2018. He was surrounded by our family and typical of Martin, the room was filled with sunshine, bird song, laughter and chatter, along with our Grandson playing his noisy steam train book, which Granddad had purchased!

Martin moved to Whimple from North Hertfordshire in 2004, after his 'final' retirement from many years teaching in both Further and Higher education. I use the word ' final' due to the countless times we have heard this over the years, with the first 'retirement' in 1993 after his heart attack and the last time after his attempt to stand again for the EDDC election in 2017.

Considering how many times Martin had endured serious illnesses over the years, it was his taste for adventure, intellectual curiosity, mischief and his ability to nurture and encourage others with their education, that would bring him back with a bounce every time. I mean, how many seventy five + year olds with poor health, climb to the top of the Scot Monument, especially having consumed a £30 shot of whiskey (don't ask) and decided we would travel to Peru for a friend's wedding on impulse!

When Martin moved to Whimple, he had no time for 'retirement'. He had achieved a childhood dream of living in and restoring a Railway Station and not just any station, but one with a working line. To a railway enthusiast this would be amazing, but to others the insistence on scrambling up out of bed at 3.00am in the morning, to view the mysterious works machinery on the line had its disadvantages!

Martin established himself as part of the Whimple community, throwing himself into village life and participating in various activities including volunteering at the Heritage Centre, where his beloved Whimple Train nameplate will be on view when the Centre re opens next year. He also became involved with the DA, OSM Heritage Society, NT and and OSM League of Friends.

Martin was very proud when elected to serve as EDDC District Councillor for Talaton and Whimple between 2011-15 and valued being able to help and support others within the community. He would always look to advocate and ensure fairness regarding planning applications, offer advice, support and time to listen to individuals concerns, frequently leading to a cold supper, given his sociable nature! After losing his seat in 2015, Martin continued to remain actively involved with the East Devon Lib Dems and Whimple Parish Council.

Alongside politics, Martin had a wide and varied number of interests; birding, geology, steam trains, learning Spanish, playing the flute and most recently walking old railway lines and viaducts, which were often very steep and 'breath taking' when pushing a wheelchair, but well worth the view and delight whenever we reached our goal.

I would finally like to say a big thank you to the people of Whimple for all the kindness and support shown to both of us, especially during the last year, as Martin's health declined further. As for me, I will remain in the Station House until it is sold and continue with the downsizing as planned. The Station House now feels very empty, without his lively personality and constant chatter. However, I am sure somewhere out there is another railway buff, like Martin who will be able to give the house the love it so rightly deserves - though on reflection maybe I should say someone 'similar', after all my Martin was a one off character, I think you will all agree...
