FRANCES MARY PRATT by Mike Mallett

Mrs 'P' moved to Whimple about 50 years ago from Thornfalcon/Henlade near Taunton, following the sudden death of her husband, Henry. She had already experienced a busy life as a Land Agent, and with the British Red Cross, but she was not one to dwell on past achievements.

On arriving in Whimple, she soon became involved with village life, whilst still retaining her association with previous societies, including Somerset Cricket Club. 'Mrs P' was still committed to supporting the clubs and associations in the village, which she had joined in the early 1960's. Even last November she organised the Royal British Legion Poppy Collection, as she had done for numerous years. Nearly 50 years of untiring work was devoted to the Whimple Flower Show, which was recognised when she was appointed President.

She supported many local events and organisations, which included the VPA, Cricket Club, Conservative Association, Whimple branch of the Royal British Legion, the History Society, the Scouts, Womens Institute, Mothers Union and the Parish Council. Who can forget the Sandfords Surgery which the Coleridge Medical Centre doctors used for 38 years, in her home, before the new surgery was opened?

Mrs 'P' was a local character who will be sadly missed.

A TRIBUTE TO MRS PRATT by Alex Spry

A wise lady who was always interested in what young people were doing today, right up until the end, Mrs Pratt gave over 60 years of her life to Scouting and Guiding. Prior to 1962 she was heavily involved with Scouting and Guiding at Hatch Beauchamp in Somerset and, on arriving in Whimple in 1962, got involved as Treasurer to Whimple Scouts, a position she held until 2002.

Being born during the First World War, and with her birthday being the 8th May (VE Day), Frances Pratt was very prudent with monies raised and was strict with us when we came to spend it! I'm sure, and know this has come up in many conversations I have had with Leaders past and present, that was one of her best known qualities! Frances (although I always addressed her as 'Mrs Pratt')would tell me stories of how the scout hut was built by fundraising, which came in the form of pancake races from the New Fountain Inn to the New Inn (now the Thirsty Farmer) , jumble sales and waste paper collections - with Fred Bastyan and Arthur Thompson pushing a hand cart around the village.

I got to know Mrs Pratt when I joined the Whimple Scouts in 1988 aged 13, from Feniton which had closed, but it always felt like she had known me since I was born! The best thing I remember about her was that she always looked forward to people visiting her and loved to see the children. In the 1990's, when, as Scout leader, I would take the Scouts around the village to collect waste newspapers (some things stay the same!), Mrs Pratt was a scheduled stop and if we were to forget, we'd be in trouble! On many an occasion the Scouts would not get back from paper collecting until after dark in the winter months and parents looking worried would say to them "Where have you been?", and they would say "Alex got talking to Mrs Pratt"!

On one occasion, Shelley and I took Graham our eldest, who was a couple of weeks old, round to see her. Graham was asleep in his car seat and as soon as we sat down in the front room by the three bar fire, we all started to nod off (a combination of me doing two rounds in the Post Office that day and plenty of sleepless nights) when Mrs Pratt suddenly shouted "Well that's alright, lets all go to sleep for an hour!"


What would be 'popping in' for five minutes would always end up as an hour, or even an hour and a half! But I wouldn't have wanted it any other way to be honest. It was like time didn't really matter, and, there wasn't a clock in her house that told the right time anyway! A welcome quality that many of us could do with introducing into this busy-busy life that we all lead now. I know that it is something I will try to continue, even if it doesn't quite suit the needs of my current employer!

It will be some of the sayings she used that I'll never forget – things like "Dig me out" for when we shouted through the door when visiting and "You'll do" when remarking about any of my DIY activities at the Scout Hut, or when repairing one of her many sheds and outbuildings!

Thanks Mrs Pratt – it was great to know you. Rest in peace.

Whimple Villages in Action presents



FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE




As I venture into my garden at this time of renewal and new life, I discover several pictures in nature's art gallery, all framed prettily in green surroundings. The first sight, under a shrub, is a charming group of snowdrops also called February maidens, nodding their white bells in the morning breeze. I am sure the fairies can hear sweet melodies like a peal. As I walk further up the path where my robin resides, I hear him calling and, as I look down, he is sitting on some dried birch leaves surrounding a group of sunny coloured winter aconites - it gladdens my heart. I usually come back into the house with a posy at any season of the year, which now creates an indoor picture.

Many people may be surprised to learn that Christmas – at any rate the ecclesiastical one – ends on 2nd February, Candlemass Day. It is marked with church processions of lighted candles. I remember so well when I was a young girl growing up in the splendour of the Swiss Alps, we all processed through the village with our lighted candles walking quietly to the churchyard where some of the special candles would be put by the graves of loved ones. Then we would return home with glowing cheeks from the frost, and eyes shining with joy. Candles have such a soothing effect and every morning I light a candle and think of my family and friends and send messages of love through the air.

I vividly remember that on coming home after our procession in the snow, a delicious meal was ready for us, called in French, Crepes de la Chandeleur, which, translated into English, is Candlemass Stuffed Pancakes, and I thought it would interest young budding cooks to prepare this very easy dish baked in the oven. For six people, make six pancakes in the ordinary way, place them in the bottom of a slightly buttered dish on which six slices of ham will be laid sprinkled with grated cheese; roll the pancakes neatly and pour a previously prepared tomato sauce over the dish and sprinkle with a little more cheese. Bake in a medium pre-heated oven for 15 –20 minutes, and hey presto, serve hot. It is yummy, and as they say in French, 'Bon appetit'.

They say March roars in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. Probably as it was known to the Anglo Saxons as the stormy one. There are a great number of feast days. 1st March is St David - Patron Saint of Wales, and people either wear a daffodil or a leek. Then comes St Patrick on March 17th - Patron Saint of Ireland. The Spring Equinox falls on March 21st when night and day are of equal length. This year as Easter is in April, Mothering Sunday falls on March 22nd, celebrated since Victorian times with church services when children offer little posies of garden flowers to their mothers. You will be quite surprised to know that originally it was the Sunday on which all the parishioners from all over the diocese came to visit the mother church – the Cathedrals. Exeter is still known as the mother church and in 2009 there will be great celebrations to mark the 1100th anniversary of the first bishop of the Diocese being installed in Crediton. In the summer a pilgrimage is being organised from Sherbourne Abbey to Crediton and the Archbishop of Canterbury will be there.



Each morning I wake up and enjoy the shapes of light coming through my window. As every day unfolds I feel the old rhythm of time ticking away relentlessly which I find comforting. The seasons follow each other and with Spring coming, new life surges forward, buds turn into leaves or blossoms, birds start finding mates and are busy building nests, children play by the brook. Our Square will look lovely with groups of daffodils gracing the brook edges, birds singing sweetly. Oh to be in Devon when Spring is here... and don't forget on Sunday 29th March British Summertime begins. We put the clock forwards for something nice to come, days are longer, more time to be spent in the garden.



My records now span 39 years, but it must be emphasised that they are the result of weather details taken in a garden in Whimple - two miles down the road it may be different.

A very heavy storm during the night of 29/30th October caused serious flooding in Ottery St Mary, where rainfall was said to be 3 to 4 inches. Also there was much flooding in the surrounding villages of Tipton St John, Feniton and, of course, Whimple.

I recorded 1.8 inches falling between 1.00am and 2.30am.






WARTS - NEW YEAR UPDATE 2009



White Pool - A Short History of Whimple By Caroline Ried

For hundreds of years, a small village has been hidden, tucked away between Exeter and Broadclyst, little more than a speck on a local map. But Whimple is in fact, a shining gold coin glinting brightly in a historical gold mine.

The name Whimple is believed to derive from the Doomsday Book where it is listed as WHIMPLA, a Celtic name meaning white pool or stream. Perhaps so named because of the thin stream which runs all the way through the village eventually joining with the River Exe.

Whimple has also been documented as GWYMPWLL - A Welsh word believed to mean 'white stream' as well as the Celtic GWYMPPWLL which is translated as 'fine stream'.

It is quite apparent that Whimple gets its long running name from the rather unimpressive stream which might once have been the life blood of the village but is now little more than a trickle, easily stepped over and forgotten.

It is possible to date the village back as far as 1001 when Exeter was besieged by the Danes who retreated to Pinhoe before moving East and passing through and burning Broadclyst and Whimple along their way.

The history of Whimple is quite clouded. However it was discovered that in the 19th century, the village had a booming agricultural business (which is still apparent today, farms being the main source of income) turning out flax and hops as well as a brick and tile works at Strete Raleigh. A tannery also turned out a profit in be early 18th century, but in 1857 it ceased to function.

The church of Whimple is the focal point of be village Square. In Saxon times it began its life as a small wooden two cell church on the current site. By 26th April 1846 the church that can be seen today was all but rebuilt, save the clock tower. W.B.Hoskins once described it as 'having little of interest except for a few carved bench ends'. But the local people of Whimple would disagree because the church has always been a place where family and friends congregate and it holds deep meaning for all those who dwell there.

In the late 20th century, cider making predominated the village when the Whiteway's factory began its trade and apple orchards popped up all over Whimple to keep the factory going. In its hey day Whimple boasted the largest cider apple orchards in the world. However, Whiteway's Cyder ceased to trade in the early 1990's and has been replaced by a new housing development, as has many of the orchards.

Throughout the years. Whimple has had many traditions such as Village Day which is celebrated every summer, but one tradition, which is perhaps the oldest, is Wassailing.

Wassailing is an orchard-visiting ceremony which gives prayer to the cider apples. It begins with the first Wassail song starting at the New Fountain Inn and the group then wassails one of the last 'Whimple Wonder' trees, finally ending at the cricket club where the full song is sung and mulled cider is consumed.

Wassailing is celebrated every year on 'old twelvey night' which is 17th January and it was first documented by Reverend Sabine Baring-Goud in his book 'Devon Characters And Strange Events' which was published in 1908. The wassail tradition carries on even to this day.

Whimple, White Pool or Fine Stream, is an old village with a long past but it is still thriving with its two pubs, village shop, Post Office and vets surgery.

Perhaps not as important as it once was to society, it is still safe to assume that this hidden treasure will be here for many more years to come.

Cranbrook

The October issue of Whimple News under the heading 'Help us find the sites for a massive expansion of housing' (East Devon Council's words) anticipated publication of the 'Issues and Options Consultation Report' on the levels and locations of housing to go in the Local Development Framework (LDF) which will replace the East Devon Local Plan.

That report is now available for consultation until 5.00pm on 13th February, and it contains at least one issue which could have a major impact on Whimple and its inhabitants. The most significant section is that part dealing with the Expansion of Cranbrook. Cranbrook is currently planned to accommodate 2,900 dwellings with supporting facilities and infrastructure although current policy recognises that it will grow beyond this size. The proposed changes to the Regional Spatial Strategy (with which the LDF has to confirm) propose 7,500 dwellings by 2026.

The report sets out eight options for expansion of Cranbrook - to the east, south, west and north-west - although no one of the locations would provide all of the 4,600 additional dwellings. The two options of most significance for Whimple are described in the report as follows -

Option 7 - Expansion to the east of the stream running between Hand and Pen and Southbrook - a gross area of 45 hectares, excluding the Knoll above the 50 metre contour accommodating up to 1,100 dwellings. With Option 5 this general location scored highly in the Exeter Sub-Regional Study. The Knoll and the land to the north is currently allocated in the Local Plan as a Green Wedge to protect Whimple's landscape setting and avoid coalescence with Cranbrook.

Option 8 - To the east of the lane between Little Cobden and Crockernhayes - a gross area of 77 hectares accommodating up to 1,900 dwellings. This area is currently allocated in the Local plan as a Green Wedge to protect Whimple's landscape setting and avoid coalescence with Cranbrook.

It should be noted that the eastern boundary for Option 8 runs from Hand and Pen along Church Road and the boundaries of properties along the western edge of Whimple down to Webbers Cottages, effectively merging Cranbrook with Whimple. Whilst the existence of the current Green Wedge is recognised, most of the other options similarly have constraints such as the Rockbeare Green Wedge, expansion of the airport or distance from the centre of Cranbrook.

Respondents are asked to indicate preferred options for expansion, if Cranbrook has to expand, to accommodate an extra 4,600 dwellings, and to provide comments to justify the response.

The report also contains a section on Promoting Vibrant and Sustainable Communities and asks whether the locations for future village development should be on a 'Facilities Based Approach' (ie in those villages with the greatest range of facilities and good transport links), on a 'Wider Issues Approach' (taking into account locally identified needs) or on an 'Alternative Approach' if neither of the other approaches is appropriate.

The full consultation report can be viewed on-line at www.eastdevon.gov.uk/planning-local-development-framework-2 where there is also questionnaire for either on-line replies or for printing off for mailing. The map showing all of the expansion options is on page 43 of that document. A paper copy of the document can be read in Ottery Library. You can also write or email comments to:



Keep Those Photographic Memories Alive For Longer

We all have favourite photographs which have a special meaning. However, old photos can become sun-bleached, scratched or creased, with this damage obscuring the original subject or becoming a distraction from the main focus of the picture.

With modern digital imaging techniques, it is remarkable how much of this damage can be eliminated in order to restore the original photograph. In many cases, it can be possible to pull out detail which is almost invisible on the original.

Further processing of the digital images can transform them in other ways. It is possible to add colour to a Black and White photograph in order to add more realism to the image. Another option is to 'remove' unwanted objects from an image. For example, if any of you still have the initial Parish Plan leaflet, you may see that the picture of the Post Office has no clutter (phone wires, TV aerial etc) – and looks much better for it, in my opinion! See the before & after images below.

If your kids are anything like mine, it is impossible to get them both smiling at the same time in a single photograph. However, maybe you have a decent picture of each of them that you'd like to combine into a single image. The Post Office photo below was taken on an overcast day. However, a bit of digital trickery can add a ray of sunshine!

Large Vehicles Driving through Whimple - or the Joys of Satnav

There has been a new development to life in the village over the past nine months. A plague of five axled vehicles are under the misapprehension that the shortest route from the A30 to Silverton is down Church Road and through to Broadclyst. There is a height restriction signed at the top of Church Road of 13' 3" but many of the drivers bringing these lorries along this route are from Lithuania, Belgium or other European countries and 13' 3" means very little to them as they do not use imperial measurements and many of these vehicles are under this height. They are not, however, able to navigate the road between the Church and the Post Office as it is too narrow and the bend is too sharp so they never even get to the bridge.

What fun it is getting them to turn round in The Square and return from whence they came. How exciting it is to see if they are able to turn round without removing part of our listed building. If we wanted to make any alterations to our building we would have to get permission from the District Council and, if history is anything to go by, we would have to wait for some time for the wheels of bureaucracy to grind their way to a decision. However, these lorries are able to remove roof tiles, guttering, rearrange the rendering and change the appearance of the building without recourse to listed building consent and at no cost to themselves. Unfortunately the same cannot be said for us as we have to find the insurance excess and the increased premiums caused by these crashes.

We can approach Highways at Devon County Council for help in ensuring that the situation is sorted out. We can, and did, and have received a beautifully worded but inaccurate Council non-statement statement informing us that they cannot do anything to redress the problem without putting restriction signs along all the roads leading off the old A30 and not just at the end of Church Road. This seems somewhat unnecessary as even drivers unfamiliar with British roads would realise that they cannot get down Cobden Lane or

Southbrook Lane. The decision to do nothing is arrived at on the grounds of cost. I cannot help but think that I should withhold the excess from my Council tax until they make a decision based on need and not cost. But then, maybe, I am a cynic.

We will continue our battle to get proper signage at the entrance to Church Road informing drivers that the road is unsuitable for long vehicles. If anyone feels as strongly as us that these vehicles should be kept out of the village we would greatly appreciate your support. Please contact me at the Javs in the Square.

Early last year Viv Leonard told me about an event called the Moonwalk, which involved walking the streets of London at night in a bra. 

SAFETY and SECURITY

Those important tasks that may be overlooked

Looking after smoke alarms

- Once a week test each alarm by pressing the test button till the alarm sounds.
- Once a year change the battery (unless it's a ten-year alarm).
- Twice a year open the case and gently vacuum the inside using the soft-brush attachment to remove dust from the sensors. If it doesn't open, vacuum through the holes.
- After 10 years it's best to get a whole new smoke alarm.

Mobile phone security

The security marking of property should be considered for two reasons. Firstly, as a deterrent against theft - economic security measures that deter theft are usually good for business and secondly, to assist police in solving crimes and to help the return of recovered stolen goods to their rightful owners.

Immobilise phone crime

Mobile phone networks can now stop stolen and lost phones being used on any network, even it the SIM card has been changed. Call your network provider, or if you do not know your network provider's number, call 08701 123 123.

This will enable you to get your stolen or lost phone blocked across every network, and help stop mobile phone crime.


