FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

Now that summer is in flower and nature is humming with butterflies, songs and scented roses, I am happy and contented in my garden. This simple poem by Robert Burns depicts the moment so well:

A Rosebud by my early walk
Adown a corn-enclosed bawlk
Sae a gently bent thorny stalk
All on a dewy morning
Ere twice the shades o'dawn are fled
In a' its crimson glory spread
And drooping rich its dewy head
It scents the early morning

So thou dear bird, young Jeany fair
On trembling string or vocal air
Shall sweetly pay the tender care
That tends they early morning!
So thou sweet rosebud young and gay
Shall beauteous blaze upon the day
And bless the parents evening ray
That watch thy early morning!

In the last week of April, as I was walking around The Square, a scent so sweet wafted through the air and as I arrived by the rosebushes I saw that they were in bloom; on the rooftop a blackbird was singing a happy air. It was magic. It made me think of a saying by Martin Luther, the German priest, Christian reformer and founder of Protestantism:- "Could a man make only one such rose as this he would be thought worthy of an honour, but the gifts of God in our eyes lose their value for their very infinity".

In nature's garden the rose has always reigned supreme, inspiring poets, painters, writers, composers and gardeners, not forgetting photographers, as a symbol of love, purity, tenderness, perfection of the mystic rose. It is the most sensuous romantic flower. Everybody has a favourite rose. I am greedy, I have three: Rosa 'Gallica Versicolor' also known as 'Gloria Mundi', which is one of the most ancient and is very vigorous. I have been able to give away many of these plants to my friends who find them delightful. The second is 'Souvenir de la Malmaison' beloved by Empress Josephine Bonaparte. Last but not least is Rosa 'Cecile Brunner' a miniature rose in colour of delicate pink and salmon peach, known as the gentleman's buttonhole, very scented and delicate.

In his delightful book The Little Prince, Antione de St Exupery said the rose was the flower of the heart. It is also known as the true image of life. I find that having a few roses in a slender silver vase by Jack's photo' is a heaven on Earth.

I am sure you are like me and love walking in the garden surrounded by beauty, colour, scent, melodious bird songs. Our gardens are also full of living legends. That lovely saying "gather ye rosebuds while ye may; old time is still a-flying and that same flower that smiled today, tomorrow will be dying" If you think of it, all the garden flowers originated from wild and simple blooms like the dog-rose. It is thanks to the sense of discovery, marvel of explorers and horticulturalists that their beauty was enhanced. Visiting gardens, opening your own garden to the public has become widespread and gives enormous pleasure to so many -wonderful places to explore and discover. I am thinking of The Lost Gardens of Heligan in Cornwall. Completely overgrown and abandoned to nature, brambles, nettles and all. Heligan is a modern day miracle; it provides a dazzlingly real experience of a lost way of life, almost something of the order of the world of science fiction.

By a strange coincidence which I call 'Holy coincidence' a few people met and discussed the subject of that desolate family estate which before the Second World War was such a show ground with the most exotic plants like the growing of pineapples no less. That group for some unknown reason fell headlong in love with that remarkable ghost, they all had dreams and, thanks to their passion, determination, their super human energy, enthusiasm and vision helped by a tremendous team of workers, they were inspired to bring back to life the beauty of the extensive Tremayne estate. As the new President of the United States would say "Yes we can". But what is so amazing is that this story does not end there. Tim Smit wrote in his book - The Lost Gardens of Heligan "I remember surfacing down the bottom of a flooded clay pit in October 1987 after a diving accident which I feared would do me".

It is from this day a new dream gradually came true – The Eden Project. It just exploded into one of the most gigantic adventures of such far reaching vision and the creation of it is thanks to teams of motivated gardeners and scientists. Millions of people visit it constantly and new ideas emerge, educating future generations in the art of horticulture. I have been very fortunate to meet Tim Smit at Heligan in 1997, when I was part of a group of garden lovers - Boxwood Garden Tours, created by a dear friend of mine Sue McDonald, a graduate from Kew. Tim Smit took us round and we too fell headlong in love with Heligan. An unforgettable experience and what I remember also was the special smile of Tim Smit.

I had a friendly smile I gave that smile away The milkman and the postman seemed glad of it each day I always give my smile away as thoughtless as can be And every time how wonderful that smile returns to me





Personally I shall be pushing for a 'surname beginning with B and drives a Mondeo' cup!

Oh What a Night.....

After many months of training and lives dominated by walking, the 16th May finally arrived and we caught the train up to London for the Moonwalk. The train was busy and at each station we watched as more women wearing their Moonwalk t-shirts got on. In the taxi on the way to the hotel we passed the entrance to the 'pink city', an enormous bright pink marquee where we were due to gather later that evening. After a leisurely lunch in Notting Hill and a restful afternoon back at the hotel we donned our decorated bras and walking gear and went to Hyde Park to register. Hyde Park was full of people in their pink or white baseball caps (pink meant you were doing the full moon of 26.3 miles and a white cap meant you were doing the half moon of 12 Miles). We waved goodbye to our gallant support team of Miles and Ed at the entrance, collected our space blanket and see-through plastic cape (in case it rained) and went to join the party in the marquee. There were 17,000 walkers this year and both the marquee and a large area outside were packed with women in their bras. The imagination and creativity that went into decorating some of these bras were amazing. The walkers were sent off in four groups - unfortunately Viv and I were in pink group which were the last to be sent off at midnight meaning we had over 3 hours to kill. The BBC Big Band, Blake (a classical pop group) and Paul O' Grady who did the half moonwalk, entertained us but it was still a long, cold wait when you are eager just to get going. Eventually our turn arrived and 4,000 members of the pink group did the countdown at the start line and off we went.

The first few miles were frustratingly slow due to the volume of people but it gave us a chance to marvel at the sight of the long snake of bobbing baseball caps as far as the eye could see, both in front of us and behind us. The atmosphere was fantastic; a few hardy supporters were out to cheer us all on - a few drunks woke up to see thousands of women stream past in their bras and must have thought they were dreaming! The atmosphere was great, a lot of the walk was along the Thames Embankment where late night revellers gave us some noisy encouragement and cars and taxis were tooting their horns all night as they drove past. We saw the London Eye lit up at night, the Houses of Parliament, Horseguards and walked right past Harvey Nicks and Harrods both of which were closed! The hardest time for me was between 18-24 miles when the body was tired but there was still a way to go. Having not lost sight of each other despite the crowds, on a long straight piece of road lined with trees the whole length, we got parted - I rang Viv who asked where I was and the best my tired brain could manage was - I am stood by a tree - luckily sense kicked in, we found a landmark and reunited. The last 3 miles were back in Hyde Park and soon we could hear the sounds of the loud speakers and the cheers as walkers finished. At 24 miles it felt really emotional to see Ed and Miles stood at the side of the path cheering us on - the boost this gave us sent us speeding over the finish line in a times of 7hrs 50mins.

We were fortunate to finish unscathed - all the training and the hydration and nutrition advice paid off - we saw many walkers being treated by medics, unable to finish.

It is an incredible feeling having finished the walk and I did enjoy it. Would I do it again? Probably not, there are other challenges that can be done. Would I recommend anyone else to do it? Absolutely.

I would like to say a huge thanks to the support team of Ed and Miles. Ed has been a constant motivator, his positive backing for this event has kept me going. He also deserves a medal for ringing me every hour through the night while we were walking to offer words of encouragement.

Also thanks to my friend and walking partner Viv whose idea this was, for the planning and inspiration and also the company on the miles we walked around Whimple in rain and shine.

Finally but by no means least, to everyone in Whimple who generously sponsored us and have been so supportive, a big thank you – unfortunately this means we will now be chasing you for your sponsor money. Hopefully I will see everyone in the coming days otherwise money can be dropped off in the post-box of Dairy Cottage.

Gina from Southbrook Lodge Clinic is not only our walking partner but has kept us both on the road with her fabulous massages.

One of the key features of the Moonwalk is the fact that you walk with your bra on show! A huge thank you has to go to Zena Calverley for creating us the most fabulous bras which certainly helped give us the courage to whip off our tops after just 2 miles!

Just like Marathon runners, Marathon walkers experience 'the wall'. For walkers it is less aggressive but lasts longer and kicks in at roughly the same point, which is anywhere from 17 miles. Just after daybreak I certainly felt as if I was at my lowest point.

I switched on my mobile and was instantly overwhelmed by the number of texts and messages of support that people had sent us during the course of the night. To all of you, thank you so very much – those messages really did see us through the hardest part of the walk.

Finally (just call me Kate Winslet!) thank you to Ed and Miles who have been brilliant in their support and encouragement from the moment we decided to embark on the whole Moonwalk thing.

Miles in particular deserves his own medal. One week prior to the Moonwalk I tore my calf muscle, ended up in A&E and then spent the following 4 days on crutches. Not only did he end up ferrying me to work and physio appointments but he also had to deal with the emotional fall out of me wondering if I was actually going to get to the Start line let along the Finish line!

Walk the Walk hope to raise £6 million from the event – money which will go to breast cancer research and for the care of those with cancer.



Game set and wrinkle repair

Luxuriantly framed by hedges and trees, the local tennis club's court is somewhat prone to shade and damp. Spring was the opportune moment for a facial and now the court is positively radiant. The full works – in the form of cleaning and moss removal - was performed by Paul Bartlett of Surface Cleaning Services in Sturminster Newton, Dorset. After six hours of high-density mist treatment, the greenish slippery layer that had built up – all the more easily since the repainting of the court two years ago - was removed to reveal a healthier complexion.

There is so much more to tarmac than meets the eye. It's quite sensitive - you wouldn't put bleach on it because a caustic reaction would result, producing an oily effect which would inhibit drainage. And pressure washers are far too abrasive: they break up the surface. It is important to ensure mud and grit are not carried on to the court for the same reason, said Paul. An expert with an evident feel for the substrata of the particular surface he is working on, Paul explained that tarmac courts are constructed over a sub-base with first a binding layer of tarmacadam and then a finer layer on top, which is porous too. The better the drainage through the pores, the drier and more moss-resistant is the court. The repainting of the court had inevitably partially blocked this process, allowing small depressions in which moss could accumulate. However, we were glad to hear that the court was in remarkably good condition for its age; that drainage was good (a litre of water poured onto the surface withstood the 'disappear in four seconds' test); and despite having been laid crossways rather than in long strips, the surface is fairly even. There are some cracks, but these can be repaired.

The tennis club has its cleanse, tone and moisturize work cut out. Weeds must be prevented, so spraying at the edges is always recommended, keeping an eye out for primitive Horse Tail and couch grass. (Couch rhizomes, you may be heartened to know, have been found to survive at a depth of fifty feet for fifty

years). The appearance of fine lines must be reduced (liquid tarmac an option). And every other year, the deep cleanse treatment will reinstate that breathability which tarmacadam so needs! In future, we shall have more respect for our court and employ the experts to care for it.

Because Whimple Tennis Club is worth it!

SCS also has a wood preservation department for the treatment of external wooden buildings and fencing. Wonder how they would appraise our historic 'amenity', now VACANT for some years, save for robins nesting.

Wasters of Whimple

Cardboard/plastics volunteer collections

Fashumble

If you supported this event, either by selling or buying, we hope you enjoyed it. 51 people offered 612 items for sale of which 170 were sold, generating £1,009 of which £908 was returned to the sellers. Some sellers sold nothing, with one person receiving over £100. We were delighted that 72 people came to the event. Some found nothing suitable to buy and some bought loads. Overall a profit is anticipated of £200-£300 which will go to Whimple Primary School to fund an eco project. It is great to make a profit and even better to see the recycling being enjoyed.

Most importantly, everyone seemed to have fun, including our valiant models. A huge "thank you" to them and to all of our Wasters team who worked very hard before, during and after.



Recycling facts

Councils are paid around £50-00/tonne for newspaper and £425-00 for Aluminium cans, but around £53-00/tonne for waste to landfill

Even if they received 1p/tonne for recycling it would still be cheaper to recycle than send to landfill. (WOW!)

Recycling is only rejected if contaminated, e.g. paint soiled newspaper, or put in the wrong bins

Recycling rates have tripled since 2001, but we lag behind Europe in general. Kerbside sorting has typical contamination rates of only 0.5% and is considered superior to mixed collection and conveyor sorting.

About 30% of plastic bottles are recycled costing councils about £100/tonne to collect, and £25-00 to sort. Baled bottles are worth £70 - 280/tonne depending on the plastic. They can then be used for more bottles, garden furniture, fleece jumpers and other containers.

A quick rinse in used water helps enormously

Food waste can be avoided by not buying too much in the first place and by checking your fridge regularly. 'Use by dates' are there as a guide. We are all equipped with brilliant senses of sight and smell and thet are very reliable!



The late Frances Pratt

Frances was a very modest person, who you had to ask the right question to unlock her stories. We ran an article on Frances in the February/March edition. Mike Mallett found out some more information about this well loved lady after we had gone to print, so I have included it as a separate item in this edition.

Frances never knew her father, who was killed in World War 1 when she was only 1 or 2. He was a woodcarver and, as a young girl, Frances found his wood carving tools and taught herself the basics of the craft. Later she attended a wood carving class and became a skilled carver, so much so that she created such things as fire screens and bellows. Frances joined a group of woodcarvers who went round to various churches in Somerset, and restored the carvings/created new carvings on the pew ends . In fact, some of her work is in Wells Cathedral, which she must have been very proud about.

The Royal British Legion - Poppy Appeal would like to extend our deep sympathy to the relatives of Mrs. Pratt. Mrs. Pratt ran the Poppy Appeal in Whimple and outlying villages for many many years, raising in the region of £11500 each year. 



Parking in The Square

In the Parish Plan Questionnaire, two years ago, many people were concerned about safety in The Square, particularly as it is often full of vehicles. A particular concern of the Parish Council is parking in the narrow part of The Square in front of Ivydene - emergency vehicles will not be able to pass when cars are parked here. The dustbin lorry is sometimes unable to pass - just imagine if this is an ambulance or fire engine! If you need to park in the centre of the village, especially for more than a few minutes, the Parish Council ask you to please use the free village car park off Webbers Close instead and please do not cause an obstruction to emergency vehicle access.

As this is a Conservation Area, highway lines of any colour alongside the stream would be unacceptable. In order to help improve the parking situation in the area, the Parish Council are providing two containers of plants. These will be situated opposite lyydene but will allow room for emergency vehicles to pass.

Summer time Crime Prevention advice:-

To combat theft this summer please consider the following:-

If you intend to spend time in the garden, ensure the front door is locked (particularly if your front door has an external handle).

Close windows at ground level and those that have access from a flat roof or are otherwise easily reached.

If you have opening restrictors that cannot be accessed from the outside, or your windows have a secure vent facility, then those can be safely used (this also applies to windows that tend to be left open overnight).

In offices that have doors open for ventilation try not to leave the office empty, no matter how short a time period, without closing the door and taking bags and jackets with you. Alternatively, it is always good practice to put such items into lockable cupboards or drawers even while in the office.

Do not be tempted to leave windows open in parked cars, as this is the perfect invitation for a thief; particularly if you have left valuable items in view.

And please leave dogs at home in this weather - even a car with windows partially open can heat up dramatically, causing distress or even death to the animal.

Car key burglaries

Many modern vehicles are proving too security savvy for thieves to steal; it is nearly impossible to gain entry without the keys. Burglars are now targeting homes with the sole intention of stealing the keys to high value or high specification vehicles.

The message is simple. Don't leave your car keys on view. Remove keys from front doors and make sure that they are not visible from your letterbox. Make sure that you not only close your doors but lock them as well. Ensure that you know where your keys are at all times, have another front door key cut and place it in an easy to reach, yet concealed place in case of emergency.


