News from Whimple Post Office



The 'Bank Holiday' season has arrived, hopefully along with some decent weather. If your benefit / pension day is on a Monday, you will be able to access your money on the previous Friday. Please note we are always closed on Bank Holidays, newspaper customers can arrange to have their papers delivered on Bank Holidays, just ask us and we will arrange this for you.

On 6th April the postage rates were increased, however any 1st, or 2nd class stamps purchased before the increase can still be used, in fact any 'old' stamp that you may have left over from Christmas is still legal. If in doubt please ask us.

Some of you may have had the experience of receiving a 'underpaid letter card' from the sorting office at Sowton, it asks you to put on the extra cost in the form of stamps and to post the card back to them. This is a new way of royal mail claiming back any money due to them by the sender not putting sufficient postage on the item originally, it also includes a handling fee. We are cut out of the loop with this system, and I'm afraid that the cards come directly from Sowton, we cannot intervene and can only advise you that if you wish to see what you are being asked to pay for you will need to go to the Sowton offices.

Most of these incidences are caused through confusion regarding the sizing of letters. Remember if you use an envelope larger than a piece of A5 paper (that's the size of Whimple News) or if the contents are thicker than 2×50 ps on top of each other then it will need extra postage. We have a size guide in the post office , and are selling plastic rulers with the guidelines clearly marked if you are still unsure.

Have you seen the second hand book basket outside the Post Office?

At the moment we are raising money for the scouts by simply recycling books and asking for a donation. The turn over of books in the past couple of weeks has been really encouraging with everyone benefitting from this , we would ask that books are in good condition and on subjects that are not too obscure !! If you are an avid reader do have a look, and if you wish to donate please leave your books in the post office, mainly so Alison can have a look first !

The sponsor forms are now available for those of you who would like to support Ruby on her Walk the Wight challenge. It is a 14 mile (and very ,very hilly) hike halfway across the Isle of Wight, and with the occasional bunny to chase she could easily clock up more. In hot pursuit will be her owners – probably more of a hindrance than a help. We are hoping for dry weather this year, the memory of last year's monsoon will never leave me. All money raised will go to the Earl Mountbatten Hospice in memory of Alison's brother.



St Mary's Church Re-ordering

The proposed changes to the interior of the church and its new extension have attracted a great deal of interest in the village, and beyond. The church was full for the open consultation with many speakers both for and against

the proposed improvements. The Parochial Church Council are now considering the views expressed at the meeting and the written responses they have since received.

The following two articles sent to Whimple News reflect those differing views on the proposed changes.



An Open letter

Dear Reverend Wilkinson,

Firstly, let us state at the outset that we are not Whimple residents and have never been. Just a middle-aged couple with friends in the village, hence with the opportunity to visit regularly. This we have done over many years now, from which we have a strong affection and fondness for Whimple. As the centre-piece of the village, its magnificent church cannot help but be a significant part of that, hence our interest in the plans to change it.

I have no idea if our outsider status excludes us from the debate and would understand if it did. However, our strength of feeling on this has prompted us to write, regardless.

We believe that the proposal consigns irreplaceable history to the skip, metaphorically and also literally, and that the retention of 12 of the middle pews does not alter that fact when put beside what will not survive: the other 12 middle pews (c. 500 years old), the side pews (c. 150 years old and the last to have been installed in a Devon church), the pulpit and choir stalls (dating back to the 1890's and 1900's respectively). Of course, the church's mission is to know Christ and to make Him known but, as with any mission, it cannot be pursued in a vacuum. Although you, and many of us, may consider that mission all-embracing, it should surely include an obligation to the wider community. In this case, an absolute recognition that at all times, and regardless of what the title deeds may say from the narrow legal perspective, the Church (large 'c') is merely the custodian of this church (small 'c') and its history and that it is your responsibility (some, we among them, would say duty) to deliver that, 100% intact, to future generations in perpetuity.

Of course, over the centuries changes have been made to the interior design of St. Mary's, churches in general and indeed (and inevitably) to ANY building that has been around for so long. We find it hard to believe, however, that any such changes can have been quite so radical as this or so irretrievable once executed. Contemporary life is characterised by such increasingly radical transformations made at an ever-quickening pace. In our view it should be the Church's policy to step out of this rat-race for change, especially where the changes countenanced are as inappropriate as we believe they are in this case.

Fashions come and go. Can you be sure that the a current preference for "open plan" is not just that? When it comes to casting aside a heritage of 500 years, that demands not just a pause for thought but, after the thought, its rejection. Once done it will never be able to be undone, and what is at stake is much too precious to remove from the inheritance of future generations, long after we have all passed on from this world.

As well as the question of historical heritage there is also an issue concerning the social fabric of the village and how the alternative to the 're-ordering' may actually better serve the interests of the wider village. We note the uses that the 're-ordering' is intended to help: breakfasts, Valentine's dinners, jazz suppers, children's holiday clubs, Mothers' Union meetings, coffee mornings. We have attended vour coffee mornings several times ourselves and have never encountered any problem with space or any other feature of it. But even if we had, life is all about weighing priorities, isn't it? The foregoing list may be "nice to haves" (and certainly hardly "essential") but if the only way of having them is at this huge cost to the church's history, then making do with the facilities as they already exist is preferable. We presume it's probably not the case either that the very existence of these activities is at stake, simply where they take place. An alternative would be to make a virtue of necessity and share the church's good fortune in its burgeoning numbers with the facilities available at the nearby Victory Hall, the scouts' hut and Whimple Cricket Club. In our view, a 'sharing' (and very Christian) solution that would be to the wider good of the village. It is important that ALL those other locations, not JUST the church, not simply survive but thrive and St. Mary's could be doing its bit in enabling them to do so rather than turning in on itself in this rather insular way.

This letter is in no way personal, just an attempt to give our views on an issue that we feel very strongly about, with hopefully food for thought on how abandoning the 're-ordering' may save the village as well as the church. To that end, you will see I have sent a copy of this e-mail to your Exeter Diocese colleague, the village magazine and the History Society.

Our heart-felt plea is "Please abandon this ill-conceived plan".

History versus Comfort

a personal view on the proposed Re-ordering of Whimple Church by Stephen Godsiff

Along with nearly 200 others, I attended a consultation meeting on 3rd March on the proposed re-ordering of Whimple church i.e. proposals to change certain features inside the church to make it lighter, warmer, more welcoming and the space more flexible to meet the perceived practical needs of the church in the medium to long term. To say the proposals met with a certain amount of hostility from many of those present is perhaps an understatement. As an issue for the village it seems right up there with the closure of the village stores and the railway timetable, although like with these issues, a few of the most vociferous contributors were those who do not use the facilities on a regular basis.

Rob, our vicar, outlined the reasoning behind the proposals and the rather tortuous process that must be followed before any changes can be made. He also explained why the wider public consultation process is taking place now rather than earlier when the PCC were first investigating possibilities for change and consulting with other interested authorities who have advised on and facilitated similar changes to other churches. I may have been in a minority of those present, but I was generally impressed with the presentation and the slides that showed what had been achieved in other churches.

At this stage I must declare an interest in the outcome. I regularly sit in church on the medieval pews that are the subject of much of the emotion surrounding the proposed re-ordering and I find them excruciatingly uncomfortable. I sit there rather than in the box pews in the side aisles, which are maginally less uncomfortable, because my wife sits there and I feel duty bound to sit alongside her. However when entering church my predisposition is invariably one of "this is the penance for my sins" and also perhaps "I wonder how long Rob's sermon is going to be today" rather than "I am here to celebrate God's love for me" and to listen to and understand His word preached by Rob. Hence I am in favour of moving the pews to a peripheral position and providing something more comfortable on which to sit.

It struck me while I sat there (uncomfortably) and listened to the issues and comments (some rather strident and barely stopping short of calling our vicar a liar) that the situation in the church is very similar to that which I encounter on a daily basis. I have lived in one of the oldest, if not the oldest, house in the village for 24 years. It is grade 2* listed and I need consent to carry out any work on the property that is more than simply cosmetic. At times this is exceedingly frustrating. It seems everyone has a view on my ancient building, yet to me it is home and I require it to have modern facilities and be fit for my purposes. Many of the comments from those consulted about changes appear ill conceived and no doubt those making them would object most strongly if such things were said about their home.

For example, I recently applied for listed planning consent to re-thatch the rear elevation of my property in water reed rather than wheat reed - the front elevation was done about 10 years ago because then, as now, I had been advised that water reed lasts longer and is more cost-effective (NB. I pay the bills, not those consulted). When this went to the Parish Council, the minutes record "No objections, but the Parish Council prefer to see locally grown wheat thatch used to support English industry rather than water reed imported from Poland". There was nothing in my planning application that mentioned Poland. I have yet to conclude a contract with a thatcher for the work and hence do not know from where the reed will come. When the front thatch was replaced the reed came from Norfolk. I can only assume, therefore, that perhaps Poland annexed Norfolk when it joined the EU and no-one told me! It seems that some people extrapolate facts to suit their own agenda.

If some historical zealots had their way, I am sure they would require my house to be returned to how it was in medieval times with a hole in the roof to let the smoke out and a fire in the middle of the sitting room floor. Luckily all they can require me to do is not make any further changes to the structure and the key architectural features. However, the only reason the house has survived this long is that in the past it has been allowed to adapt to prevailing circumstances and requirements. If the house had remained in a time warp of some past century it would, slowly but surely, have become less fit for purpose and, while of undoubted curiosity value, would not have been a place where people would wish to live in the modern world. Consequently, the fabric of the house would probably not have been maintained and it would have slowly decayed.

Similarly, I believe the church building is home to the church community and it must be fit for their purpose otherwise it will become little more than a historical monument and a memorial to Christianity.

It was mentioned at the meeting that Christianity has survived for 2000 years so no change is needed. However in this country atheistic, secular sentiments and the forces of modern multiculturalism are attacking it as never before in the 1100+ years since it was introduced to these shores. Perhaps it will survive in Whimple, but it would be complacent to assume that we do not have to actively encourage it and the church building provides a focus for the work needed to maintain and build our mission community.

The existing building has survived because it has been allowed to change and adapt in the past to meet prevailing circumstances. The Victorians recognized that and pushed through the re-orderings in 1845 and 1902 - perhaps there wasn't as much consultation in those days! I believe the requirement now is that the building needs to be more light, warm, comfortable, flexible and welcoming so that it can be used more frequently than just one day a week for services. It is currently a very expensive building to maintain for such relatively little use. It may then facilitate the growth of our congregation and particularly appeal to those younger members in our community who generally respond more positively in less formal surroundings. It is notable that virtually everyone directly involved with

youth work within the church is in favour of a significant re-ordering.

Having said that in principal I agree to a re-ordering, I consider the key elements not covered in any of the presentations were the costs, assurance that the money can be found without inhibiting other church activity, and assurance that the work can be carried out without unduly disrupting the normal workings of the church during any refurbishment period. Before I apply for consent to change anything in my house I cost the changes and do small cost/benefit analyses to confirm in my own mind that what I am doing will both enhance the property and be good value for money. I also ensure I have money available and plan for possible disruptions. Perhaps the next stage of this process could be to look at the various costs; both initial capital costs to carry out the work and also ongoing costs associated with proposals such as upgrading the heating. It may be that when these are properly explored the project as a whole may not be feasible. In which case, perhaps a less ambitious plan may need to be considered or an incremental approach to the changes.

The bottom line seems to be that we can change either radically or by evolution, or leave everything as it is, effectively in a time capsule. Whether we like it or not, change is part of the world in which we now live and most people have an expectation of reasonable standards of comfort. I know that my wife's late mother, who lived in an annex to our property for over 20 years, would have been very excited by the prospect of being warm in church! The secret is therefore to manage the change to meet our needs while still preserving what is worthwhile from the past. However, just because something is old, it does not necessarily follow that it is worth preserving.

Paradoxically perhaps, if a no change option is imposed, I believe this may prove more costly to both the church and the community in the longer term. The building will continue to become less fit for purpose in a modern context and hence I can speculate that over a period of time various things may happen. The church i.e. the people, could move elsewhere to a building that better suits their needs. If that happens those concerned only with the history may need to consider whether they can maintain the existing building to preserve in situ what they believe to be significant features. A much worse alternative, in my opinion, would be if a number of the younger and the more active members of the church eventually become frustrated at the thwarting of their efforts to make the church a more vibrant, living space at the heart of the community, and hence they choose to worship elsewhere. That, in my view, would be the beginning of the end of the church in Whimple.

Something else said was: "In order to ensure the church's future, we may need to sacrifice a little of the past". I agree, but I also consider it is not a simplistic choice of "Are you for or against the changes" as some posters around the village would have us believe. 





Its a family affair

It was when I was giving a lick of paint to our new office, showroom and workshop that I reflected how good it was that our family company had moved to Whimple. In fact, just as Adam, one of our workforce who had volunteered to help me, and I had finished and were standing admiring our hard work that my wife's cousins, Jan and George Begent drove up. It really was like the last piece of the jigsaw had fallen into place.

It was in October 2006 that the journey began when my nephew, Andy Brooker, a master stonemason and hand letter cutter, decided to move his young family from London to Axminster. He had been trained by his Grandfather who had been anxious to pass his skill to a family member after he had found that his son, my brother -in -law did not have the aptitude or indeed the patience to become a letter cutter. Andy attended letter cutting college and art college and went on to hone his skill as a "journeyman" letter cutter in London.

Tony Langmead who had a memorial masons business in Exeter; another family firm that had been established for over 100 years. Tony was happy to give Andy his hand cut work as none of his staff had this skill but he also told Andy that he was selling the business. After a little detective work it was discovered that the whole business would have been moved away from Exeter which, as it was the last working monumental masons in the area would have been a great pity. It was then that Andy, my brother-in-law Bob, my wife and I decided to try to buy the business. We were successful and took over in December 2006.

In October 2008 we moved our main showroom onto Exeter's Pinhoe Road and turned our attention to the workshop which had been in the same location for 100 years and was unsuitable to modem working We set about trying to find a new location where we could establish a new production unit, open another showroom and have a purpose built area for Andy's hand cutting. We were keen to stay near to Exeter and really wanted to go to Whimple as Jan and George now lived in the village and it was perfectly positioned for us. After looking for a long time we found a excellent unit at 'Country Estates' on the old A30. 500 yards from Hand and Pen! So here we are, it's a great feeling to be working together as a family in such a traditional craft industry.
