WHIMPLE STORES

Just a reminder of our opening hours - weekdays 8.00am to 6.00pm - weekends 9.00am to midday.

Most of you know that the shop has been for sale since July 2018. The only real offer we have had was early on from someone who wanted to change it into a cookery school. We have had interest and have current interest but no firm offers.

This puts us in a difficult situation because we need to see an end date to running the shop. So we will be looking at other options such as leasing. Either way we will be carrying as normal for the time being and will keep you all informed of any new ideas that are put to us.

We have been running the shop with generally one person as it has been pretty quiet during the last few months. We have found this to work well so far but we will change things if trading settles back into a routine. At the moment the busy times vary but generally late morning and early afternoon is busy so we have two people working between noon and 1.00pm to help with this. Generally two people are also there from 5.00pm to close also. Sometimes the queue looks enormous but if people are outside of the shop and are distancing correctly, that may mean that only 2 - 3 people are waiting.

If you think you have a transaction that may take some time, please try to come in between noon and 1.00pm or after 5.00pm.

Post Office

The Post Office is open the same hours as the shop.

We offer a good range of banking services and postal services with Royal Mail and Parcelforce. We are always happy to advise you.

We effectively look after the Post Office for them and receive a commission for doing that. It is a separate business to the shop and we can't combine transactions. Basically the Post Office sells postal services and provides banking services. All other items – such as stationery comes from the shop.

Royal Mail are offering many new services and not all are available at the Post Office and not all online postage can be accepted by us. Please read the details carefully when buying services on line. If it says post must be taken to a Royal Mail Centre then this is not a Post Office and the nearest centre is in Sowton.

We always need to weigh things being posted so please help us by putting items on the scales and passing them over to us for processing. Also, if you are sending items overseas you will need to complete a customs label. We are happy to give you a label to complete before you bring your parcel in. Each item in the parcel should be weighed and listed on your customs label and the whole form should be completed in block capitals and be clearly legible.

Whimple Victory Hall

On 7th April the hall will be 101 years old and has been a real asset for the village ever since. We've had a tremendous response to our current fund-raising drive for hall refurbishment and a recent very large donation will take the amount on the thermometer to nearly £12,000.

We are currently undertaking initial investigations on the fabric of the hall and will report in a later edition of Whimple News how we are getting on.

We have managed to remain open for the School and Pre-School throughout the last year having undertaken extensive steps to ensure a Covid secure environment and undertaking additional cleaning.

We are delighted that we will be able to open up to a small number of regular exercise groups from 17th May whilst still following Government regulations; the rule of six or two households, social distancing, hand washing and face masks with full adherence to our 'Covid Risk Assessment'.

Full relaxation of Government rules on 21st June will enable us to fully re-open for hire and to hold events such as Soup and Sarnie, but this will depend on confirmation nearer that date.

From the 1st May we will be welcoming back our guests to the garden of The Thirsty Farmer, for the first time this year.


We will be serving hog roasts and wood-fired pizzas from the garden.

If the application goes to 'Committee' then this will be in April at the earliest, due to Easter it is more likely to be May

In the meantime, our plans are continuing to look at financing the purchase of The New Fountain Inn as a Community Asset.





If you are passionate about your local community, we need you. Parish Councillors can make a huge difference to the quality of life of local people and how local issues are dealt with. We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect the communities they serve to put themselves forward

We are an active, nine Councillor strong organization, which meets regularly (12 Parish meetings per year and monthly planning meetings).



A vacancy for a Parish Councillor has arisen and we are looking for a community-minded, energetic and committed person to join the team and take on this challenging and rewarding role.

There are a few legal requirements for being a Parish Councillor and to qualify you must be:-

- A British or Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of a European Union country
- 18 years of age or over
- On the Parish electoral register for the Parish of Whimple
- Lived in the Parish of Whimple, or within three miles of its boundary, for at least a year
- Been the owner or tenant of land or other premises in the Parish of Whimple for at least a year and/or have you had your principal or only place of work in the Parish of Whimple for at least a year

In addition there are a couple of disqualifications that prevent an individual becoming a Parish Councillor. These are:-

- Not the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order
- Within the last five years, been convicted of an offence in the UK, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, which resulted in a sentence of imprisonment (whether suspended or not) for a period three months or more without option of a fine

• Disqualification from being elected a member is set out in Section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972

She had received a written answer and in turn had forwarded it on to me. Interestingly it originates from someone in 'Community Relations' by the name of Megan! (forgive me - it's Megan Hayward).

"I have spoken to our team who are working in the area in order to find out some more information for you. The team have confirmed that these platform end gates are being installed at every station in the area as an anti-trespass measure.

These gates won't impact the local residents but have been introduced as a deterrent measure to potential trespassers.

I hope this information has been helpful. Thank you for bringing this to our attention.

POW+R News

There is much talk about unity, working together for the common good. There is national unity, but there is also unity of flying the Devon Flag of Saint Petroc – the relatively new flag with a green base with black cross with white edge.

However, there is also the unity of the people of Whimple, which has come alive with the threat of the New Fountain being closed and the car park becoming a building site, all within our precious conservation area. It was clear, in the first public consultation period that the opposition was vehement, immense, deep felt, passionate and angry. East Devon District Council, according to their website had 68 letters of objections, which is a significant number. The agents than submitted a detailed letter trying to counter the objections, one by one. This instigated another batch of correspondence to the Planning Department, including from the POW+R Group. This was submitted on the 8th March 2021 refuting the comments made by the agent, with meaningful and accurate evidence, in a detailed 20 page report.

The New Fountain application is now awaiting decisions by our local authority. Let's hope for a positive outcome for Whimple.

At the same time, the East Devon District Council has put out to consultation the New 'Local Plan' for the district. It forms the framework/blueprint for development in the District Council Area for the next 10 years. Planning applications are guided by the principles laid out in the Local Plan, both cartographic and written policies and procedures.

After the NDF (National Development Framework), which sits above the Local Plan, this is the most important document for the Planning Department in each five year period. Under the Local Plan are a host of Neighbourhood Plans, developed by parishes and town councils. However, the Local Plan should be guided by the decisions taken and the democratic process of individual parishes.

Our group has made submissions to EDDC, as part of the consultation process for the latest Local Plan 2021. This will shape the future of East Devon for another 10 years, especially in respect to housing needs and other planning issues. In business this would be the Strategic Plan.

One of the issues flagged up in this, was the line being drawn to the expansion of Cranbrook eastward, which should stop at Cobden Lane. As a group we are awaiting the response from the Government Inspector. Comments have been made on the less than satisfactory design standards of new housing developments.

Cranbrook still has no Town Centre after 11 years, together with poor infrastructure, in a 'developer led' scheme, which has more recently been deemed a failure, as too much power is held by the developers not by the local people.

One other matter that has been questioned is the need for good outdoor spaces for recreation and physical well-being, which has been heightened during the pandemic.

When researching to provide meaningful feedback on the new Local Plan, it was very evident, that some of the parishes in East Devon have developed and written some outstanding neighbourhood plans. These have already influenced planning decisions for unwanted development. So far 18 have been completed in East Devon.

It is regrettable that Whimple is still some way from completing this task, which is unfortunate as it has great impact on the emerging District Local Plan.

Once again residents will be aware that POW+R group is working for a better future for Whimple and Rockbeare. If you want a challenge, we need a new Chair and would welcome any input and assistance from members of the wider communities. If you would be willing and able to give up some of your free time in order to help protect our village and Rockbeare from the ever expanding of Cranbrook urban sprawl, and any other developments that are proposed, we'd love to hear from you! Don't forget to vote in the Local Elections on Thursday 6th May, for Police and Crime Commissioner and Devon County Council. A large turnout is good for democracy and gives a strong message that here in Whimple and Rockbeare, local issues matter.

Why is the Devon flag 'green'

Green is said to be the colour that is most associated with Devon because it is the colour of the county's rugby team, the official colour of Exeter University, and is the colour of Plymouth Argyle FC. Green also for the hills, black for the Dartmoor sky and white for the salt sea that laps our shores.

It became official in October 2006 when Devon County Council raised the flag outside County Hall in Exeter.

We wish all villagers well, good health, contentment and a vaccine jab.

A PLACE OF EXECUTION.

In Latin the word 'furcus' means a gibbet or a gallows; the English translation is 'forches'. Whilst reading recently an article about the origins of Barnstaple I was interested in a reference to Forches Field and another to Forches Cross near Newton



Abbot, both of which were known sites of execution. Death by hanging was introduced to Britain by the Anglo-Saxons as early as the fifth century, gallows being an important part of Germanic culture. Executions were a very popular form of public entertainment, drawing large crowds including thieves and prostitutes.

"Executions are intended to draw spectators. If they don't draw spectators, they don't answer their purpose." Samuel Johnson (1709-1784).

On the road between Whimple and Broadclyst there is a place called Forches Head and I wondered if this was a possible place of execution as it is on a spur of high ground overlooking a relatively flat area, ideal for a gibbet or a gallows.

I have checked with John Allan, who is extremely knowledgeable on all matters archaeological and historical. He is the archaeologist for both Exeter Cathedral and Glastonbury Abbey, and he confirms that it is highly probable that it was an execution site. There are several similarly named places throughout Devon associated with execution.

Gallows were used to hang the victim by the neck until death whereas on a gibbet the victim was either hung in chains or a purpose made iron cage dying some days later mainly of thirst. The body would remain hanging in full view for several weeks or months to deter other possible criminals. The last public hanging was in 1868.

As it was forbidden for the bodies of executed criminals to be buried in Consecrated ground, maybe there is a cemetery near Forches Head.

Understanding Autism

It was 'World Autism Awareness Week' from 29th March to 4th April 2021.

Autism is not an illness. ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder), ASC (Autism Spectrum Condition), AS (Aspergers Syndrome) and ND (Neuro Diversity) are all on the autistic spectrum. It means that, from birth, an individual's brain is wired differently to most of us. 'Neuro Diversity' is the most appropriate term.

A person with Autism is processing information in a different way. Their 'wiring' may cause them to have physical limitations as well as processing differences which is why Autism is assessed on a spectrum. Someone may have physical and neurological limitations and another may have neurological capacity in excess. For people in the middle to top end of the spectrum it is not always immediately obvious. For a lot of people they may have other health issues too.

There are day-to-day challenges, particularly for children. Hyper-sensitivity is common and smells, tastes, sounds, touch and light can overload the senses. Imagine a child with autism sitting in a noisy classroom with the sun streaming in and being asked to process information. It's not that the information can't be processed but there is so much noise and light that his or her brain is trying to process first. Or imagine sitting in a classroom day after day that isn't stimulating because you have already understood what you are being taught. Many ND children can be obsessive and their brains allow them to memorise and list vast quantities of information. Imagine being a child that can't catch a ball – with no spatial awareness. They aren't chosen to be in teams, they aren't asked out to play. Frustration mean that Autistic children are three times more likely to be excluded from mainstream school.

So living with this condition is difficult and even more challenges are inflicted by how we live right now. Getting a diagnosis is painfully slow – Devon (DAANA) are currently assessing 2017 referrals. So a child aged four who was referred pre-school will now be in primary education. A child aged eight will now be at secondary school and a child aged 21 will now be classed as an adult. After diagnosis there is a fight to get the support your child needs to find the right services for them. Getting the right support helps not only the child but also the school. The majority of schools are amazingly supportive and helpful and for many of us the suggestion to seek diagnosis came from school in the first place. But schools have to abide by guidelines and they have little resources to accommodate differences. A child that is overwhelmed can have a meltdown or shutdown which can be seen as being disruptive behaviour. It is just an overload of the senses and with the right set up and options for relieving those overloads the problems can be kept to a minimum.

For ND children the safe haven is home. A safe haven allows the child to be themselves but inevitably home is where the frustrations of the day get released so this can be often tense and tiring. Equally, it can also be hugely rewarding to see how well your child has done but it can also be hugely frustrating that they have had to face so many unnecessary challenges.

Given there are many challenges but why do parents of ND children feel so passionately about changing their world?

We see a uniqueness in our children that gives them so much potential in a world that they cannot easily access. They think differently, they are creative and honest. If they love something they give it 100% of their attention so they have great focus and attention to detail. All of these traits should make them very employable and an asset to any business but only 22% of autistic people are in employment.

We see amazing art work, read fantastical stories. We see loving, kind children just trying to be themselves in a society that wants them to 'fit in' quietly. So if you see a child 'kicking off' don't judge them. Don't judge the parents for letting it happen and if you are a parent – don't apologise for letting it happen. With very minimal changes the education system and society could make the lives of ND people much easier and we can all start with kindness and tolerance of difference.

Here are five things that challenge autistic brains - they look minor but if you think about them you will realise how current society excludes those with neuro diversity:

- 1. They feel anxiety about changes or unexpected events
- 2. They can be under or over sensitive to sound, smells, light, taste and touch (this is called sensory sensitivity)
- 3. They need time to process information, like questions or instructions
- 4. They face high levels of anxiety in social situations
- 5. They have difficulties communicating and interacting with others





SPRING INTO YOUR SPRING CLEANING

I ould never call myself a domestic goddess, particularly when it comes to cleaning. However, I don't know about you, but when the daffodils are blooming, the days are getting longer and I can open the windows and let the fresh air fill the house, then I'm up for a bit of Spring Cleaning.

Also, being a creative and resourceful soul who wants to live as naturally, and economically, as possible, making my own cleaning products is a no-brainer.

I started a few years ago when my teenage son was suffering from itchy skin and I seemed to have a stuffy nose and sore throat. After reading several articles concerning the dangers we have in our own homes regarding commercial household products, I began to create my own. For example, here are a few facts to get you thinking -

- Household cleaning products are as a bad for lung function as smoking, a recent study has shown. Øistein Svanes of the University of Bergen, Norway, carried out the research on more than 6,000 cleaners over 20 years. He found that women who worked as cleaners, or regularly used cleaning sprays, for 20 years were found to have lung decline equivalent to smoking 20 cigarettes a day over the same period. They were also 40 per cent more likely to develop asthma.
- An average home has 62 toxic chemicals. Many are in cleaning products such as laundry detergents, cleaning sprays, spray polish, fabric softener, dishwasher tablets, rinse aid etc.
- Since WW2, 72,000 synthetic chemicals have been produced. Obviously, these can be very useful. However, we are now discovering that many of these can be harmful to the environment and ourselves.
- Common damaging ingredients in our homes are Chlorine, Detergents, Formaldehyde, Synthetic Fragrances, Triclosan, VOCs (Volatile Organic Compounds).

When you think of inhaling some of these small particles from cleaning agents that are meant for cleaning the house and not your lungs, maybe it is not so surprising after all. Also, chemicals do not just enter your body through your nose, they are absorbed through the skin. Fragrances are designed to linger so you are constantly in contact with them.

A Window on Whimple's Weather - January/February

Welcome to the second weather summary compiled from Whimple's two weather stations, one from Slewton Crescent and the other from Cobden Lane, live streaming local weather data;

January – Taking over from the warmest decade on record, 2021 started with 10 days of bitterly cold weather – the coldest being -5.6°C on 1st January. Although not as affected as much of the UK, Storm Christoph brought wet and windy weather to Whimple with over 22mm of rain on the 20th and sustained South Westerly winds of 55kph and gusts of 75kph on the same night. Christoph gave way to clearer, colder weather, before milder and wet again from the 26th. Total rainfall for January was 108mm, well above the South West average of 74mm, and temperatures were below normal.

February – Started mild, with daytime temperatures mostly over 10°C, but was transformed abruptly by storm Darcy (popularly referred to as "The Beast from the East 2") bringing cold and snowy weather to much of the Country on the 7th. Fortunately, the storm was not as severe or prolonged as its 2018 predecessor, however, there was some disruption in the East of the UK. Whimple saw its lowest February temperatures of -2.8°C on the 9th and 11th and wettest day on the 14th with 13.7mm of rain, as mild air returned. Total rainfall for the month was 72.4mm, slightly above average. February ended with a period of dry stable weather with clear skies and cold nights. Recording sub-zero temperatures for the last three days of the month bringing heavy ground frosts but sunny, mild days and coinciding with a spectacular full **Snow** moon on the 27th.

Hello my friends,

As I sit to write this we are days away from a sobering anniversary, one year to the day to our first lockdown. It is hard to believe how naïve most of us were back then as the virus gradually took hold of our country. Recently I came across an email I sent out to those our churches email list as the situation spiralled towards the unthinkable. Here is an extract:

'I write to you in the midst of a crisis, because, let's be honest, that is what it is.

As our prime minister pointed out this is the worst health threat in a generation, none of us have experienced anything like this before. In a very real sense, we are off the map. This virus poses a real danger to many of the most vulnerable people in our country and many other countries. New updates from local and national government and in our case the Church of England are coming out so fast it is hard to keep track of what is going on and how one should react, but it seems certain that things are going to get a lot worse before they get better.

Families are going to lose loved ones to this pandemic; an event that has been predicted for decades has arrived and, it seems, we are not prepared. We cannot change where we find ourselves, but we can change what happens from now on.

So, what can we do? To be honest, I can't give you an exact idea of how things are going to play out in the coming weeks and months, but here are a few of my thoughts: This virus reminds us of our shared humanity with all of God's people, it doesn't respect national boundaries, skin colour, gender, sexuality, class or religion. We truly are all in this together.

It also reminds us we are not immortal; life is a fragile and wonderful gift we should not take for granted and, we are not all powerful, this tiny organism is wreaking havoc around the globe and for all our ingenuity and science, at the moment at least, we seem powerless to stop it.

For now, we can start small in our own communities, ring our elderly neighbours regularly to make sure they are ok, help out that family whose breadwinner will have to work extra hours due to staff shortages, collect provisions for someone who has had to self-isolate, find creative ways to help the self-employed in our community who face financial hardships. Give what we have to spare and sometimes that which we do not.

Do not give in to fear. We can be a face of love and compassion and hope.

Eventually some sort of normal service will resume, it is not clear now how long that will take, but the disease will reduce, in all likelihood a vaccine will be developed and life will start to look more like it used to. The challenge will then be to not forget what we felt like right now!

If we hold on to this feeling and channel it, when this is ove,r we can vow to change the world. What if this event became known in history as the year the human race woke up? What if this event helped us understand what it felt like to be frightened and helpless in the face of something we cannot control, an experience so many millions around the globe live with most of their lives - and we vowed to make it stop, not just here but everywhere. Around the globe, every day, thousands die from diseases and conditions for which cheap and simple cures exist and much of the world turns a blind eye because it is happening somewhere else. Well not today. Today, we are all vulnerable to this pandemic'

Looking back on those words written hastily to try and reassure folks I am struck by many things:

- 1. I had no idea how bad things were going to get and for how long. Although we have been affected by the virus in this part of rural east Devon we have escaped relatively lightly compared to many inner cities where the death toll has been staggering.
- 2. I had no idea how awful the effect would be on so many people's mental health, this will be one of the things which lingers on for a long time when we have finally tamed this virus.

But also:

3. How amazingly the virus would redefine this village and parish, how remarkably people would rise to the occasion, how lights would be lit in the darkness by so many acts of simple human kindness. How folks would give and give and give and how many would benefit from that.

For me, as someone who believes in the defining power of love as the most powerful force in the universe, this has been the defining aspect of the last twelve months. As I pause on the anniversary of the first lockdown to remember in prayer those who have died, those who have been damaged and those who have struggled, I shall also give thanks for the rekindling of the power of communities to love their neighbour as themselves.



Exeter Historic Buildings Trust Establishing a Modern Medicinal Garden at St Nicholas Priory



Originally founded in 1087, St Nicholas Priory is Exeter's oldest building and has a rich history from Benedictine monastery to city museum.

In 2018 Exeter Historic Buildings Trust acquired the priory from Exeter City Council. With the assistance of the National Heritage Lottery Fund, the Trust repaired and reopened the buildings and established a busy programme of tours, performances and events.

Last summer we turned our attention to improving the garden, which we wanted to reflect the priory's history and monastic origins. Working with our dedicated team of garden volunteers, we decided to establish a modern medicinal garden, which would echo the both the monastic and Tudor history of the priory. Medicinal, or 'physick', gardens were common to monasteries for treating the ailments of the community, while Tudor gardens made extensive use of herbs for culinary, medicinal and decorative purposes. Once complete, it will be one of only two such gardens in Devon and Cornwall and we are excited about the new ways it will allow us to interpret medical, garden and monastic history. The Trust has secured a grant from the Finnis-Scott Foundation for the work, which will be starting as lockdown eases. We are always looking for new volunteers at the priory and we are especially keen encourage gardeners to join us.

We are also excited to welcome visitors back this Easter for outside tours of the priory and its environs. Our popular outside tours with resume on 4th April and will run every Sunday throughout the spring. All tours will of course be socially-distanced, with small tour groups of five people plus one of our knowledgeable guides. Election of Police Commissioner



On the 6th of May this year people will have the opportunity to vote for their choice of Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. This is an important post as it is the role for the provision of our policing.

The Police and Social Responsibility Act 2012 (all 116 pages of it) abolished the then Police Authorities and replaced them with a single Commissioner. Unlike Police Commissioners in the USA the holder of the post does not have any Policing powers and there are safeguards in the Act to ensure the operational independence of the Chief Constable in all matter's in relation to the deployment of his or her resources and officers.

The Commissioner together with the Chief Constable has to draw up a Police and Crime Plan which reflects the Policing concerns of the public and on which the Chief Constable can be held to account. The Commissioner has to set the budget and determine the council tax precept. He or she has to appoint the Chief Constable and when necessary dismiss that person and also publish an annual report.

The Office of the Commissioner and those specific tasks are overseen by a Police and Crime Panel made up of local councillors. They have to approve the budget, the Police and Crime Plan and the appointment of a Chief Constable.

The Commissioner has to administer a separate fund designed for supporting victim support in all its forms together with safeguarding and some re-habilitation programmes. This requirement is laid out in the Police and Crime Commissioner's Code of Conduct.

The successful candidate will have to swear an oath of impartiality in the discharge of his or her stewardship of the role.

The vote itself on the day is based on the AV model (alternative vote) where a 2nd choice can be made. If a candidate doesn't get more than 50% in the first count the second choices of the lowest scoring candidate are also counted and so on until a candidate gets more than 50%.

To summarise the Police and Crime Commissioner is your directly elected representative regarding policing in your area and has a duty to ensure effective policing.

It may be prudent to apply to your local authority for a postal vote if you have concerns about polling in person.


