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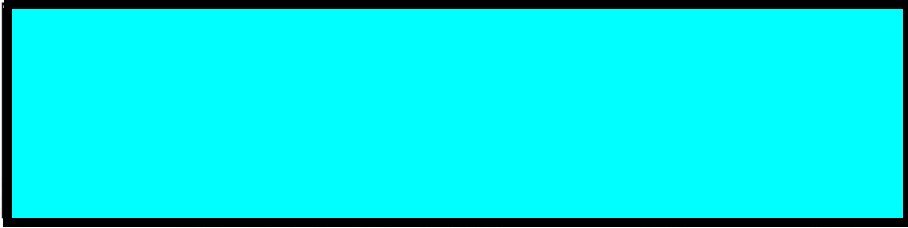

FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

To help or bless the whole wide world
Is far too much for me
But in my gentle sphere I'll try

Something unusual is happening lately in England: folks grumbling about everything they can think of and this is a very new trait of character. English people were always well known for their stiff upper lip. It is such a pity for happiness is more or less independent of wealth or poverty, good or bad times. Happiness is within ourselves. Fortunately in our village, the community spirit is still very strong and that came to the fore after two families were hit by a terrible blaze which completely destroyed their homes.

For years, I have walked past those two dear cottages with a wisteria growing round the porch of the one and a lovely rose at the entrance of the other. They were sitting comfortably beside the little stream off the road from somewhere and down the winding lane. It was a little corner from another world where children were playing so happily, birds singing sweetly and the perfume of the roses wafting through the air. It was like a bit of heaven breaking through the veil, of this world.

Alas today on my first visit to the blaze, all that is left are the charred remains, a broken table, and sadly a solitary roller blade shoe. You can imagine my great sadness and yet suddenly my spirits were lifted when I witnessed a small miracle. On the burnt out skeleton of the cottages, a rose tree is in bloom, not touched at all by the raging fire. When I saw it, there were two beautiful roses and I thought that augurs well for the future: one rose for HOPE, one for LOVE.

During the following days when I passed for my daily walks down the leafy lane, more roses were in bloom and their faint scent touched my nostrils. Now after weeks of desolation, there is renewed hope, day by day something is happening, new scaffolding has been erected, a completely new temporary roof is covering the cottages to help dry the interior out for reconstruction. Very friendly young workmen are there daily. The lower windows have been boarded up; also padlocks have been fixed on the doors leading to the garden, protective trellis put up, a no entry sign to protect the property from intruders. After all it is still the houses of the blaze-hit families.

Above all we are very grateful to all of you who entered, for after all, without your entries there would be no show! 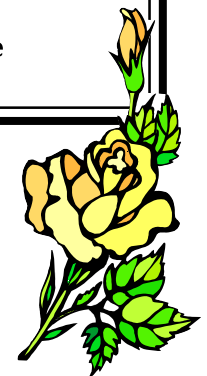
Our first concern naturally was for the affected families who had lost everything. Can you imagine waking up in the morning with nothing left not even a toothbrush? Immediately two help Funds were launched at the Post Office and at The New Fountain. Carly and the children found a temporary roof over their heads until such times as the cottages are rebuilt. We miss them in The Square.

I was also immensely impressed by the efficiency and speed with which the Fire Brigade dealt with this blaze because the flames spread so quickly due to the thatched roof. One of the firemen was hurt and needed treatment with a specialist water gel, but that was the only slight casualty, which was remedied on the spot by paramedics from the Ambulance service. Every emergency service was on hand and The Square was full of fire appliances, a canteen and everything necessary to deal with a blaze of this magnitude.

All is now quiet and serene in our beautiful Square and there is great hope that the families will be able to move in again when all is rebuilt. The wisteria is still there and the rose tree too with one single rose.

Your fears are not unfounded, according to Reader's Digest; your house is most at risk at this time. The last thing you want is to arrive home tanned and relaxed to find that your house has been broken into!

Suddenly, you are stressed out by the feeling that someone else has been through your most personal things, not to mention the damage they may have caused.

The **good news** is that most burglars are opportunists, so the key is not to leave any signs that could reveal your absence. Here are ten simple steps that you can take to beat the burglar and ensure you don't suffer any unwanted holiday surprises:

1. Cancel all newspapers and milk deliveries and ask a neighbour to make sure the free papers are pushed through the door.
2. Make sure your postman pushes the mail right through your letterbox. Remove any internal cages to stop them becoming crammed full.
3. Disconnect your telephone answering machine and never leave a message saying that you are away on holiday.
4. Ask a neighbour to mow the grass and clear any leaves from the front of the property or make sure you do it just before you leave.

Local tale

Imagine a winter evening, dark and cold, and a young lass coming home from working at the Big House near Whimple in the 1930s. Fearfully riding an old bike towards the village and heading for Talaton, she suddenly sees an old man coming towards her in the dark lane. With thumping heart she rides forward and as she nears the figure she recognises her grandfather.

We only knew her as Mrs. Look-In and met her in the late 1980s but she told us when she was a young girl she worked as a housemaid at the Big House. During the week she lived there but at weekends she would cycle home to Talaton and often, when the weather was bad or it was very dark, her grandfather would meet her and walk beside her with a torch along the unlit lanes to Talaton.

She said although her day was spent cleaning out fires, of which there were many, and keeping them replenished, general housework and running messages for all and sundry, the money she received for being a very lowly junior housemaid would buy very little these days, but the few shillings came in very useful at home.

One incident she remembered very clearly was when other members of staff took her down to the cellars and locked her in for a while. She screamed and shouted but knew the family was away.

She has never forgotten the bats of Strete Raleigh!

Volunteer?

- ☹ Not me I haven't the skills, knowledge or time to do anything else!
- ☹ Not me I'm too old (or too young)
- ☹ Not me I don't have anything to offer really.

None of the above are true. Everyone has something to offer the community in which they live, and many people are already involved in volunteering, although they don't see it as that when they do someone's shopping, walk their dog, run them to the doctors, or a hundred and one other acts of kindness.

Voluntary action or volunteering is simply the giving of your time to someone other than a relative, for no monetary reward, and about half the adult population is involved in formal volunteering for organisations in the U. K, giving an average of 2 hours per week.

So, why volunteer? to use skills you have or gain new ones, to make new friends, to get out of the house, to enhance your CV, to have fun, because you feel you have something to offer, to mix with people who are different from you, to travel or anything else you can think of all are valid reasons.

How can I find voluntary work? Many people find voluntary work through word of mouth, through friends, or by looking at window displays, notice boards or the internet. Increasingly, people come up with their own ideas. The A30 campaign was voluntary action volunteering in a less traditional guise. A group of parents starting a playgroup are also volunteers, though they might not use that term to describe themselves.

You can also contact the East Devon Volunteer Bureau who can offer information on vacancies throughout East Devon and advise you on all aspects of becoming involved in voluntary action such as which organisations are looking for volunteers, how to get a community group started to do your own project, what to expect as a volunteer.

We can make introductions or give you the information to follow up for yourself.

The Bureau is at The Volunteer Centre, Dowell Street, Honiton, EX14 1LZ. It is open to callers from 10.00 - 3.00 Mon Thurs and 10.00 - 12.00 Fridays. The Co-ordinator, Judith Kemp, will meet you in your locality if travel is difficult for you, evening appointments can also be made. We are a registered charity and make no charge for finding volunteers for community groups.

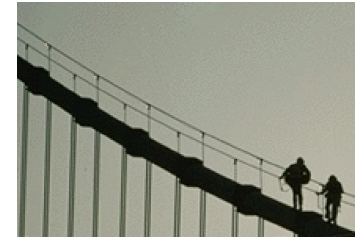
BRAINTEASER
