Family and friends acted as his pallbearers, and poignant tributes came from his three daughters, Sam, Becky and Michelle during the service, led by Rob Wilkinson. Barry

McConnell, the Exeter City footballer from the village, who Paul and Gill had sponsored over the years, gave an excellent and fitting tribute to Paul, including several stories and memories that had us all smiling and remembering him warmly. As Barry said, the one word that summed Paul up was 'generous' - generous and never wanting to steal the limelight whether it was donations or support to raffles, organisations or events in the village that he loved so much. Paul was a strong part of Whimple and, speaking personally, he was one of the reasons that Nicky and I chose to live here, some 15 years ago. We had been house-hunting over a couple of weekends, and having viewed Dairy Cottage, we thought that we should test the pub over the road. It was around midday, and the pub was quiet. Once Paul had found out we were house-hunting, he picked up his coffee and came and sat with us, and told us all about Whimple, and what went on. That conversation really sold the village to us and when we moved in he went out of his way to introduce us to many people from the village as they popped into the pub. In mentioning that to several other people over the last few days, we discovered that he had also made them feel really welcome when they had first moved to the village.

So from us, thank you Paul for all your kindness; our thoughts are with Gill, Michelle, Chris, Sam and Becky at this time, and all the best for continuing the business of the New Fountain as a village pub.

### PAUL MALLETT 1950 – 2011 by Gill and Mike Mallett



Paul was the second son of Henry and Vera and was born in Politmore Hospital, where Vera worked as a theatre nurse. His appearance coincided with an Exeter City home match which was mildly inconvenient to Henry who was a staunch supporter. Vera could see that Henry was fidgeting and suggested he went to the football. Perhaps this was the reason for Paul's strong affinity with Exeter City Football Club, having a trial with them as a youngster and then as a loyal fan, and later as a sponsor of players Barry McConnell, Steve Flack, Lewis Tasker and Ryan Harley. Paul would often don these players' shirts behind the bar or wear his treasured 1981 Cup Run City Scarf.

Paul attended Broadhembury School, Norwood (Exeter) and Shebbear College in North Devon. He began work at Lloyd's Bank, Sidwell Street, Exeter, before moving to a variety of other branches. He then joined Hiley-Payne and Coxwell Financial Advisors in Topsham and then became an independent financial advisor in his own right.

When he heard that Devenish Brewery were selling off the New Fountain Inn, he decided to save it from development or becoming part of a chain. He hastily put a package together with Phil Roberts (ex Exeter City player) to save the local. After various changes in management, Paul and his wife Gill have run the pub together for several years trying to keep the traditional ambience alive with much support from their faithful customers. During this time Paul has been both Chairman and Treasurer of the local Publican's Association.

Paul married his first wife Jackie in 1969 and moved to Ottery St Mary where they raised daughters Sam and Bec. He has four grandchildren – Sophie, Lloyd, Amy and George. Paul and Jackie went their separate ways and Paul returned to Whimple where he met and married Gill. Paul and Gill have two children, Chris and Michelle.

Sport played a large part in Paul's life, playing football for Escot Rovers, and cricket for Whimple and Whiteways on the Richard Whiteway memorial ground, and he

fought to keep sport in that location. He participated in darts and skittles, and once tried Banger racing. He also enjoyed attending local point-to-point racing.

Paul and Gill had a passion for maintaining local traditions and enthusiastically encouraged Wassailing , Morris Dancing, and hosted a meet of the East Devon Hunt every year. Prizes were donated to local fund raising events.

Paul joined forces with the late John Shepherd to provide Whimple History Society with a building for the Heritage Centre, known as Lockyer's Linhay, in respect for John's family who in times gone by, had been licensees of the New Fountain. Sadly, John did not live to see the completed dream.

Paul enjoyed sponsoring local events and competitors, and within the last year, the New Fountain team won the Commando Challenge and Billy Bloomfield beat Eric Bristow at a Charity Darts event. Through his connections, he managed to take small groups of customers to meet celebrities such as Uri Geller, getting him to bend spoons, and also with thanks to Dennis Calver, and Harry Rednapp, who Paul predicted to be the next England manager.

A diverse range of entertainment has been seen at the pub with the half yearly Rotary Quiz always eagerly looked forward to, various Morris dancing troupes and the unforgettable Mr Bumble and the Bumble Show, with the Three Camels, Georgie the Butterfly and the elderly Mr Bumble standing on his head whilst drinking a half pint of light ale! It may have been his last show that brought the ceiling down, creating a good story for the Express and Echo. Other celebrity visitors included Captain Sensible and Swampy; City players Barry McConnell, Steve Flack, Jimmy Giles, John Hare, Alan Banks and Ivor Doble, for whom Paul had the utmost admiration.

Reading instructions and rules was not Paul's forte and Gill had to keep a close eye on things, making sure that someone other than Paul let off the annual fireworks displays. His only ever entry in the Village Flower Show was disqualified because he decided to peel the onions!

Paul will be sadly missed by everyone, but will, no doubt, be remembered as a village character for many years to come.

His family would like to thank all friends, villagers and customers for their help, and messages of support following their loss and for their attendance at the funeral.

Special appreciation goes to the ambulance crew and paramedics, and Billy and Jules Bloomfield who tried to help him at home, and the Doctors and nurses at the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital. Also to Karen, Geoff, Tracey, Mike, Pam and Jackie for their help with the day of the funeral, to everyone who kindly provided food, and to Ben Silk and Geoff for helping the family to get the pub up and running again.

A collection was made for CLIC, a charity chosen because Paul's Mum suffered with leukaemia and at the time of writing, this amounted to £1,109.00. Many thanks to everyone who donated in memory of Paul.

### FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

Having been brought up as a young child in the Swiss Alps, the only form of transport was horse and cart or large sledges in the winter. The milkman, baker, and coalman all delivered in this way. As we lived at the top end of the village our walks to school were a good half hour going downhill, whilst taking a little longer on the way home - because of going uphill! I don't ever remember having our parents accompany us, and even in the most severe of winters or weather - the school never closed.

Need I say it, but in those days, 'health and safety' measures were thankfully unknown. There were challenges of course and when we met them, it made us feel more grown up and responsible. As one of a family of seven, we were soon trained in all kinds of sport, walking being the most pleasurable, mainly because it opened our eyes to the majesty and grandeur of the changing seasons.

Skiing and mountain climbing were two of our other great outdoor activities. I vividly remember with great joy our summer skiing expeditions, being very high up travelling with rucksacks on our backs enclosing a week's provisions and arriving after hours of climbing with skis which we had fitted with awl skin to facilitate our ascent (otherwise it would have been one step forward and two steps back). At the high mountain passes bordering with either Italy or France we would be faced with either the Matterhorn or Mont Blanc (the highest peak in Europe). One of our team would never travel without his trumpet in his rucksack so that when we reached one of these passes he would whip out the trumpet and play Hayden's brilliant Trumpet Concerto. Whenever I hear it now in concerts or quite frequently on the radio, it brings a smile to my face as well as joy to my heart.

Summer holidays we often spent with the goatherd, walking for miles all day and as we went admiring the alpine flora, the variety and vibrancy of colour as well as the smell. It was an unwritten rule that we would always make sure to find a rock to sit on so as not to flatten those delicate flowers.

Swimming had its own challenges in those cool mountain lakes, sometimes being extra bold and breaking the ice. It sure was invigorating!

When I first came to England as a student, then as a secretary to an advertising manager of the international firm of Nestlé, a few of us joined the rambling club - being a cheap and pleasant way to discover England as well as making friends.

The under manager at Nestlé provided us with shilling tickets for the 'Gods' in The Royal Opera House at Covent Garden. As our digs were in West Ealing we often walked all the way home from the great metropolis.

Subsequently, when I married and lived in Brown's Hotel just off Piccadilly Street, I discovered another great aspect of London walking - which was in the magnificent parks. We spent many a pleasurable hour savouring the peace and quiet, away from the hustle and bustle of constant city traffic.

What fun we had, unfortunately at 92 I am now the only survivor of those days - but I do have my memories.

It takes days of practice to learn the art of sauntering. Commonly we stride through the out-of-doors too swiftly to see more than the most obvious and prominent things. For observing nature, the best pace is a snail's pace.

A few landlords followed Paul Hayman until to our great pleasure, Paul and Gill took over, and during that period, all our visitors, family and friends from England and abroad, loved Paul's welcome. He always had our favourite table ready, and we so enjoyed Gill's wonderful cooking.

When I celebrated my 90th two years ago with an open house at the Manse, Paul provided the glasses and Gill made some wonderful nibbles, so delicious that we soon ran out. What is so extraordinary is that their daughter Michelle celebrated her 18th when I celebrated my 90th and we have a great affection for each other.

I will remember in God, dear Paul who I will alas see no longer but who will rejoice with me on another shore and in a greater light. And to Paul's family, my love and affection in their great loss. They are so well loved in this village.

Our Annual General Meeting was held on 19th January 2011 and yet another packed meeting reflected on a very active and successful year for the VPA, not least the immensely successful Annual Flower Show. Fortunately the principal officers on the Committee agreed to stand again and were unanimously elected into post. The only change this year is that Mick and Ann Street will be in charge of the Annual Flower Show with Andy Bratt taking a short sabbatical from this role. The Committee thanked Andy for the successful running of the Show, especially the 2010 Show which was outstanding.

The first event this year will be a talk by Brian Carlson. This will be on Fuchsias and Pelargoniums and will be in the Village Hall on 4th March 2011, starting at 7.30pm. More details nearer the date.

Our annual Spring Coffee morning and Plant Sale will again be at the beginning of May in the Village Hall with a date to be arranged. This has been a great success in recent years and we will be looking for the same success this year. Hopefully we will be able to provide a wide range of plants but if there are any specific plants you would like us to grow please let us know and we will see what we can do! The Annual Flower Show will be on Saturday 13th August 2011, again in the Village Hall. We will shortly be looking at the schedules to agree the classes for this

year's show, particularly the Photography and Flower Arranging Classes. We will endeavour to get this information out to you as soon as we

can so you can all start planning ahead.

Following the huge success of the Village Challenge at last year's Show, we are now considering what the theme will be for 2011. It will again involve a Scarecrow Competition but this year there will be a different theme. The Challenge will be open to groups or individuals, so watch this space for more detailed information!

### Wasters of Whimple

We hope you all had a good Christmas and enjoyed the Snow.

#### Recycling.

The new kerbside recycling seems to be very useful for the kitchen waste but it still seems easier to take all plastics to the recycling centres rather than separating out bottles. Taking this



together with cardboard and tetra packs meant that even with the missed collections the bin didn't overflow in our average family home.

There does still seem to be a need for trips to the recycling centres and we will be investigating ways to help the community with this over the coming year. It is worth keeping the paperwork that came for the new recycling service as this was very useful to show what can go into your green boxes. On top of this a visit to the Devon County Council website will provide details on what they can recycle at their centres.

#### Solar Village

Well it has been a hectic few months. As mentioned before we were delighted that 60 people attended our Solar Energy presentation with more than half putting their names forward for quotes. There have been a lot of issues to think about. Some people having planning to deal with, some with small roof space/viability and all having to decide which supplier to go with.

We estimate at this stage that 15 people have already signed up to either free or investment panels with another 5 who may well go ahead. If 20 properties sign up for an average installation this should save 24 tonnes of CO  $^2\mathrm{per}$  annum in Whimple. That is amazing but we suspect that some installations will be larger than average and that we are well placed in Devon to exceed the average productions.

We will be monitoring the panels closely to see how each package is working. We have members of our group who have chosen free panels and members who have invested so we hope to be able to offer useful real information as to how these are working. Remember the Feed in Tariff scheme is available for 10 years although the generation tariff may be reduced in April and will be reduced in future years. This tariff is fixed in the year you start so those who have currently signed up will be earning 41.3p/kwh (roughly £1,000 - £1,600 each year for an average house depending on size of installation) and this is index linked for 25 years.

If anyone is interested we can provide copies of our original paperwork.

Whimple is a large village with good amenities and it needed two visits to look round and do justice to all it has to offer. Whimple is fortunate to have a railway station stop on the main line between Exeter and Waterloo, although it must be frustrating that only some of the trains stop here. The nucleus of the village is The Square where the parish church, shop and small Post Office are situated, with the railway station, two pubs, school and the Victory Hall close by. The shop opens directly onto The Square and is well-patronised. The through road from the 'old' A30 is narrow in places and flanked by older and more traditional residential properties here and near the centre. The village spreads over a wide area with more recently built housing estates in between old properties.

The village is a pleasing place to visit and we found much to appreciate. Care has been taken by most property owners to maintain their front gardens and fences in keeping with the local environment. There is little commercial activity, but the pub car parks and general stores are tidy and accessible. The railway station has been updated in recent years and is neatly kept with no apparent litter. Verges and roads were very clear and we saw no litter there either. All the notice boards were in good condition, as were most seats and public spaces. We were impressed with the village field and its outdoor fitness circuit, both of which are cared for and clean, without being overmanaged. The cricket pitch adjoining the village field is immaculately kept and a small stream provides a natural boundary between the field and a pleasant housing development. Children in Whimple are well-served by play provision — we observed two areas set aside, one containing swings and rockers for younger children and another grassy area with a small shelter and table where older children and young people can enjoy some space and bring along their BMX bikes and boards.

We were unable to gain access to the parish church but noticed that the churchyard was trim and recently mown, with long grass having been cut back around the tombstones but allowing some scope for wildlife. There is also a cemetery on the outskirts of the village which is a pleasing site to visit and where the formal ranks of tombstones and memorials blend in well with the surrounding fields and trees. A few memorials do need a bit of tidying and weeding, but this does not detract too much from the overall impression.

The village hall is frequently used by groups of all ages and although there is a current building project in progress the materials were neatly stored in a small area next to the village surgery. The school is of course fenced off, but we could see that the playground with its useful pagoda-style canopy between classrooms had plenty of interesting visual material for the benefit of both pupils and parents.

The small public car park a few yards down the road from the village Square is tidy and litter-free, bordered by foliage and abundant verges which make it a pleasant place to park for a little while. The several footpaths linking different areas of the village are clearly marked, with just one or two signs needing a little attention. Footbridges across brooks and streams have been well maintained and they enhance the leafy pathways.

We found much evidence of a thriving community in Whimple, with notices around the village giving details of local events and fund-raising activities. Unfortunately we did not manage to visit the Heritage Centre on its one open afternoon. The attractive laminated map supplied was <u>detailed and helpful</u> for planning our route. The village website, WhimpleOnLine, was set up a year or so ago. There is potential here for giving useful information about village matters and events and we hope that more local residents will contribute news and views. We felt that Whimple is a safe and very pleasant place to live and visit with much to offer.


The first thing that struck us, before we even visited the village (from the very useful map), was the abundance of amenities and we found them no less impressive in real life. So many sites so well maintained; indeed, the cricket field was being mown as we visited and looked most impressive as did the Parish Field Play Area. There was pleasingly little litter here. However, the Play Space backing on to Elizabeth Close was less well cared for. The signs were overgrown, old and quite difficult to read. There was litter inside and out (very close to a bin) and the graffiti boards, although a good idea, were looking in need of repair, removal or replacement.

The Victory Hall and surrounding parking area deserve a special mention being very good, with colourful, beautifully planted and maintained flower beds. The School Yard was very well planned and the children were enjoying it to the full. We were impressed by the signs on the gate requesting motorists to drive carefully. The children's' artwork made them <u>very</u> special and not easily ignored! The Heritage Centre was open, staffed by a very knowledgeable and helpful man and being used by the school children; obviously it is a very real asset to the community.

The churchyard was very well cared for as was the war memorial, likewise the allotments and cemetery. Seats were found to be well placed, welcomingly clear of weeds and in good condition save for one near the cricket field. The pubs were welcoming; we had a good meal in the Thirsty Farmer and the lavatories inside were spotless. Footpaths were generally good, stiles clear etc, as were the streams.

We visited both the Post Office and the Village Stores and found them well-stocked and the people friendly. We did find quite a bit of litter and the odd dog mess around the village, although bins were provided for both.

The thing that we found very patchy was the condition of private gardens. The buildings were generally well-maintained and it was good to see a cob house being revamped; however, a very sizeable minority of the gardens were in need of quite a bit of TLC. We appreciate that it must be difficult to get everyone on board in a large community, but their lack of enthusiasm lets down an otherwise near perfect village.

### Our Ann

After months of time-consuming training and hard work Ann will be off again on 28th February 2011.

Unfortunately, the original scientist had to pull out forcing the team to have to find a suitable replacement in double-quick time! The fourth and final member of the team was only secured as recently as mid January. This is just a small example of how tight a time-line they have to work in.

The format of the expedition will run a little differently this year as they will have to allow extra time for all aspects of their expedition to be filmed for a documentary. It is believed the documentary will invite a more global audience not only due to the nature of their work but because of the involvement of the other nationalities. They really will be 'Team International' what with Ann (being the <u>only</u> woman) who will be sharing leadership with an American over an Australian scientist and British filmmaker.

As the latter two of them have never been on ice before they will be completing a 'mini-expedition' starting around 10th March by sledge-hauling to the scientific ice base that Catlin are setting up in Deer Bay, Nunavut State, Canada (anticipated duration - ten days). It will only amount to about 50 miles or so, but will give the team a chance to get to know one another, help the novices to learn to look after themselves on ice, get used to filming at -40° in the dark and checking equipment as well as drilling holes in absolutely appalling conditions!

Although the ice station will be in the same place as previous years, they won't be setting off from there. Instead, it is their intention to fly up and start their expedition from the North Pole around 30th March. This time they will be moving southwards which will make for a trickier expedition, because as the season becomes warmer it is inevitable that they will experience much more movement in the ice as well as more open water than if they had been travelling in their usual northerly direction.

The main aim this year is to profile the \*thermohaline (temp & saline) structure of the Arctic Ocean which is causing concern for scientists because, as the ice is melting, it is putting huge quantities of fresh water into the Ocean. Scientists need to investigate how much effect this is having on the stability of the Arctic Ocean as these changes can affect circulation (conveyor belt) not only 'locally' but 'globally', as well as the overall effect on world-wide weather patterns.

One of the most physical and arduous tasks they must complete is having to drill holes through over 200 meters of ice each evening to drop three different sensors into the water to collect said data. If that wasn't enough - they will also be measuring the thickness of the ice again, snow density and of course profiling every surface feature as well as hauling a very heavy sledge.

It is anticipated mid May that Ann (and the rest of the team) should be off the ice. A little, personal statistic worthy of note - at the end of this expedition Ann will have completed over 408 days hauling a sledge in extreme conditions in Polar Regions - which amounts to over a year!







#### WHIMPLE BRANCH SURGERY UPDATE

There are now two GP consulting rooms and two Nurse Treatment rooms at Whimple. All the rooms will be equipped for general use by either a doctor or a nurse. The aim will be to gradually increase the number of surgery and clinic sessions at Whimple to accommodate more patients from the surrounding area, rather than asking them to travel into Ottery.

As a receptionist is not available at Whimple branch surgery, a patient check in screen is in operation. Please check in via the computer screen in the waiting room when you arrive. It is very easy to use and will alert the GP or Nurse that you are in the waiting room.

In due course the Practice Nurses plan to increase the number of appointments they offer at Whimple to include asthma, hypertension, carers etc.

The Whimple surgery provides an ideal environment for training doctors. The aim of our GP Trainers will be to utilise this facility increasingly in the future.

#### PRACTICE NURSE TELEPHONE TRIAGE

Telephone contact with the practice nurses has now changed. The practice nurses are running a new telephone triage service called 'on the day nurse'. The 'on the day nurse' has allotted time between 10:30am and 12:00noon to manage queries from patients. The type of queries the nurse can deal with remain the same i.e. travel vaccinations, immunisations, wound care and general health enquiries. A nurse is available during the afternoons to deal with urgent problems and all other queries are dealt with the following morning by the on the day nurse.

To help us please make sure that the contact number you leave is current and if you are not available between 10:30am and 12:00noon please let the receptionist know the most convenient time to be called back.

This is a new service and we would welcome your comments and feedback.

#### **GP TELEPHONE TRIAGE**

The GP telephone triage service is available every afternoon. All requests for same day appointments are triaged by the doctor on the day. The doctor will often be able to sort a problem out on the phone however if you need an appointment to be seen in the surgery, or occasionally a home visit, the doctor will arrange this for you whilst you are on the phone
