

FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

There'll always be an England
While there's a country lane
Wherever there's a cottage small
Beside a field of grain

"I have learned much from little cottage gardens that help to make our English wayside the prettiest in the temperate world. One can hardly go into the smallest cottage garden without learning or observing something new"

These were the words expressed by Gertrude Jekyll, the very first lady of gardening. Born into a cultural and artistic family. She had grown up in the Surrey countryside where she learnt to identify the flowers, trees and birds, and grew to love the cottage gardens. It is certainly thanks to her vision that the gardens of today have a more informal and simple air than in Victorian times. One of the joys of visitors to our own Village Square is the sight of long established cottage gardens. Usually in our cottage gardens there is no set pattern and originally they were not created for the casual passer-by as they are mostly enclosed by hedges and walls. Planting is very spontaneous and whenever there is a space, in goes a plant very often given by a neighbour or friend or cuttings taken elsewhere. There is little or no exposed earth, which helps tremendously with weeding as often here is also a scattering of seeds to add to the hotch-potch. If it was not for cottage gardens many of our cherished flowers could well have disappeared. Cottage gardens are the real home for hollyhocks, old-fashioned English roses and, for good measure, an apple or plum tree. Gardens are colourful, bright and cheerful and above all very informal; what a jumble. They are very pleasing to the eye, and nostrils too, because aromatic flowers will always scent the air. Village gardeners are lovely people, they commune with nature, the creation and they know all about the seasons. That is why our annual outings with the Village Produce Association, so well organised by Pauline Rogers, are so popular. It is the day you meet kindred spirits.

The 19th of June was a very special day for gardeners and garden lovers in our village. Members of the Whimple Village Produce Association opened their gardens for charity and what a tremendous success that turned out to be. Over five hundred pounds was the money raised; to be divided equally between the Ottery Hospital and the WVPA to fund our annual Flower show which will be staged on August 14th, a Saturday afternoon.

The 19th June was enjoyed by all who took part and our numerous visitors on that wonderful sunny summer afternoon. We reached out and shared our love for the beauty of the earth, for the beauty of each hour. I had visitors from Holland who were particularly interested to learn that Jack's family are of Dutch origin who came to England with the Huguenots. De Groot was the family name, which became Grout once they settled down in this country. De Groot means the great. My Dutch friends were thrilled to see a Dutch rose called De Grootendorn in memory of that family. A great variety of people came; friends from neighbouring villages, and from further away Petersfield, Ugsborough were all enchanted by what they saw in the different gardens, which all have the stamp of the person who has created them. Over the many years I have lived in this village, I have been invited to look at all which were opened to the public with my faithful airedale and when I met so many garden enthusiasts. What a variety of expression, design and interpretation even in the smallest gardens. The three gardens I had not visited before, I made sure to go and see them privately. The Station House and two new gardens in Slewton Crescent owned by new members of the WVPA and as is so delightful amongst the gardening community I was greeted with open arms, that in itself was an experience which I would not have liked to miss. The pleasure to share is certainly the greatest gift of all. A couple of new members have also dedicated their time to making the corner by the railway bridge by Grove Road always colourful and well tended as is the little flower bed by the Victory Hall. This is real community spirit and so encouraging.

Garden fashions have come and gone but they had no real effect on the real old-fashioned English cottage garden. The general ideas are as valid as ever and are far less time-consuming in a world where armies of gardeners in the great country house are an almost extinct race. I will finish by quoting the wonderful poem of Rudyard Kipling, a favourite of my father's:-

Adam was a gardener
And God who made him sees
That half a proper gardener's work
Is done upon his knees
So when your work is finished
You can wash your hands and pray
For the Glory of the garden
That it may not pass away.






and the Vicar (Graham Gibbins) for their tireless efforts with the washing up







A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A TRAFFIC CENSUS

Have you ever looked at other road users and wondered where they were going and why....and just being generally nosy? I have to put my hand up to that. Recently I had the chance to be 100% nosy. Great! I had obtained employment working on a traffic census for one of Devon County Council's business partners, and so spent a thrilling week standing at the side of various roads in the county, asking motorists questions about destinations etc.

The purpose of the survey was to take a random sample of all road users at different locations, to find out where they had last stopped/where they had started their journey and the purpose of that stop, plus their next stop and why, and how often they made that journey. The data gathered would then be analysed to support various traffic forecasting models.

My first day was down in Dobwalls, near Liskeard...with a 04:20 alarm so that I could catch a minibus at Sowton ready for action at 07:00!!! Once we were there, we were issued with handheld computers on which to record the data as we interviewed. Eventually I could rattle through the questions in less than 2 minutes and allow the motorists to carry on their merry way with minimal interruption.

Basically we took over a secluded lay-by that meant our survey was away from the main road, and a police officer directed 6 cars in at a time, where 6 of us waited to ask the questions and enter them on our computers. Although we had limited time, a polite approach worked wonders – you would soon work out who wanted to get away quickly, or who you could have some banter with. On one occasion, as a car load returned after a good lunch, I was asked if I wanted to know what they had eaten, knowing that I had enjoyed warm sandwiches. I gracefully declined. We had 3 hours on then an hour off, and if we were really good, one of the 'work hours' would be sat in a car doing the vehicle count...i.e. using another hand-held computer to record traffic in both directions, broken down by type of vehicle. When the temperature got too hot, these special counting computers gave up and we had to use pen and paper! That first day was so hot – we kept our bottles of water near us to help keep our voices going.

One of my next days was completely at the other end of the weather spectrum...we had been warned that rain was on the way, but not even my trusty hat, kagool and over trousers could protect me. I had rain coming down my neck, through my trousers and filling my shoes!! One of the survey days was at Alphington by Sainsburys...because the survey was scheduled to take place at the traffic lights, we would only be asking questions whilst the lights were at red. So we only had time to ask the questions and then enter the data when the lights went onto green. What a test of speed and memory!

Some of the star responses included -

'and when did you last stop?' Answer - '7 years ago'

'and where will be your next stop?' Answer 'Home'. 'and where is that please? Answer (pointing) 'over there'. I was confused with one reason for the journey being 'taking the kids to school' when there were no children in the car...I had visions of 2 children stood outside their home wondering why mummy had driven off so quickly.

The majority of people were very helpful and helped to make the day pass; some people did not want to take part, which was an option, and so we let them pass through. It was worrying to see how so many people are in such a rush/are late for appointments, and how that affects their mood and driving styles!

So next time you are stopped, remember, it only take a couple of minutes, and it is a human being asking the questions!



We are all grateful for the immense amount of hard work several people from the parish put into the project, not just selling tickets (where the Village Shop did a great job, too) but in publicising, providing refreshments, preparing the Church and clearing it away afterwards ready for Sunday Services. The Church Restoration Fund received £225 from ticket sales and donations, after expenses. This is something I would like to do again sometime but, of course, it does depend also on other people. I would love to hear other views.

"It was refreshing to have a musical programme that was not dominated by popular classics. The Telemann Overture made a beautiful intro. and it was hard to believe that the well-balanced Mozart Symphony which followed could have been written by someone so young. After a delightful interval in summer-evening light and a sip or two of wine in the company of others, villagers and visitors from outside Whimple, we returned for Derek Browning's 'Colemere Concerto'. It is difficult to be critical of a new piece. I enjoyed the concerto, particularly the second movement, but despite the excellent musicianship of the soloist, am not sure that the writing fully exploited the tonal qualities of the oboe d'amore. That said, there was plenty of texture in the piece to hold everyone's attention and the concerto was enjoyable as a whole. The Haydn Symphony provided a dramatic conclusion to the evening and, sadly, seemed to be over too quickly, leaving the audience waiting for more. Let's hope we can have the pleasure of something similar in Whimple Church next year"
