We are pleased to announce that after many months of negotiation and protracted delays, we will be starting a Parcel Service at the end of September. The service is the Post Office 'Drop and Collect' and works in conjunction with our Pazone machine and Royal Mail.

The Parcels will need to be weighed and packaged and the postage purchased online before being dropped to the Stores. We will check the weight and size, print a label if required and store the parcel ready for a Royal Mail collection – potentially twice per day. As well as pre-paid parcels, the service will also support pre-paid Special Delivery letters and parcels, pre-paid Parcel Force large and bulky items, pre-paid International Tracked and Signed items and pre-paid standard overseas parcels.

All that is needed from you is that you wrap, weigh and measure the parcel, select and pay for the postage on Royal Mail's website, print the postage label or get a barcode and then bring the parcel to Whimple Stores for acceptance and a receipt. Home shopping returns are also enabled. We want to make sure that everyone is included even though some villagers may not have the online technology to purchase postage, so we are seeing how we can provide a postage purchasing facility in the Stores. Come and talk to Rory if you think you may wish to use such a facility.

The Collect part of the 'Drop and Collect' service is that you can arrange with the parcel sender to have parcels that would be sent to you via Royal Mail to be sent instead to Whimple Stores for your convenience. This is very handy if you are unlikely to be at home at the time when parcels would normally be delivered. You can also arrange for Royal Mail parcels that are already on the way to be diverted to the Stores for your later collection.

We hope that this service becomes very popular with our customers and that we are able to attract parcel customers from surrounding areas as well. The continued existence of convenience stores such as us is only possible by providing a large range of services such as coffees, teas and parcels on top of the usual food and drink.

Please be patient with our staff as they get to know the new service. We are anticipating returning customers who used to bring parcels to us in large batches. We will work with our regular customers to leave the parcels and pick up the receipts later, but it may mean that sometimes queues could develop.

If you wondered why wine has recently increased in price, the government introduced a new ("simplified") alcohol duty scale on August 1st and this had the effect of pulling wine into the same category as strong spirits (above 4.5% alcohol content). The duty on wine increased on average by 4% which then gets magnified by producer and wholesaler margins ending up with around £2 extra on a bottle of wine. We are still purchasing some wine at the old wholesale prices and will keep the same price on these wines for as long as possible but we know the increase will eventually flow across our whole range. There is a smaller duty increase on beer and cider.

The price of stamps is increasing on Oct 3rd. with 1st Class going to £1.25, 1st Class Large to £1.95 and 2nd Class Large to £1.55. 2nd Class stamps remain at 75p. These are very large increases and we are holding good stock to cater for demand. As demand is high, our wholesaler has supplied us with some gummed stamps (remember the old days of lick and stick!) and Christmas stamps which are all perfectly usable and very pretty.

We were very honoured to be invited to present the prizes at the Whimple and District Gardening Club's Flower and Craft Show in August as a thank you for our support. We are always very pleased to be able to support Whimple's community and charity events by selling tickets at the Stores and advertising events in our very busy 'community' section of the front window.

Please continue to use Whimple Stores as much as possible as that will help us to continue to provide a well stocked, active and friendly shop.

On a final note, we are very sorry to announce that Karen Brown has left us to work more locally to where she lives in Ottery St. Mary. Karen has worked at Whimple Stores for seven years and transferred to us when we took over from Jenny and Mark. She taught us how to be good shopkeepers and we are very grateful for her guidance and support. Good luck Karen!

Ground Hog Day

Do you ever feel like your life is on a bit of a loop? Different day but same stuff, the daily grind of life? Well, I suspect you are not alone.

In 1993, Groundhog Day, an American comedy film starring Bill Murray was released based on the story of a cynical television weatherman covering a story who becomes trapped in a time loop.

Realizing that there are no consequences for his actions, Phil begins spending loops indulging in binge eating, one-night stands, robbery, and other dangerous activities, using his increasing knowledge of the day's events and the town residents to manipulate circumstances to his advantage. Eventually, he focuses on seducing Rita, another reporter, using the loops to learn more about her so that he can try to sleep with her. No matter what steps he takes, Rita just isn't interested, particularly when Phil tells her he loves her. Phil gradually becomes depressed and desperate for a way to escape the loop even committing suicide in a variety of ways. He eventually tries to explain his situation to Rita, using his detailed knowledge of the day to accurately predict events. Convinced, Rita spends the rest of that day's loop with Phil; she encourages him to think of the loops as a blessing instead of a curse and finally Phil realizes that his feelings for Rita have become sincere and decides to use his knowledge of the loop to change himself and others: he saves people from deadly accidents and misfortunes, and learns to play the piano, sculpt ice, and speak French.

Rita witnesses Phil's expert piano-playing skills as the adoring townsfolk regale her with stories of his good deeds. Impressed by his apparent overnight transformation, Rita successfully bids for him at a charity bachelor auction. Phil carves an ice sculpture in Rita's image and tells her that no matter what happens, even if he is doomed to continue waking alone each morning forever, he wants her to know that he is finally happy because he loves her. And the cycle is finally broken. He is reborn, his life has a purpose and all because of love.

Are you stuck in some sort of Ground Hog Day? Do you need to be reborn through love?

Well, I have good news for you. You can. Through a love which is the single most powerful force in the universe, so powerful in fact it overcame death, when Jesus was raised from the dead.

Now I know few people today actually believe in a physical resurrection of Jesus, but I do. I can't prove the resurrection to you scientifically or otherwise. Neither can I convince you of the truth of the resurrection. However, I can point you to reflections of the resurrection that happen all around us. You see echoes of that miracle happen and they happen every single day.

Alcoholics are raised from the dead when they sober up. Drug addicts are raised from the dead when they clean themselves up and break the chains of addiction. Nations are raised from the dead when they admit their faults and commit themselves to new ways of living. And I would add, whenever friends, neighbours, or enemies reconcile there is resurrection. Every sun rise begins a symphony of resurrection. Whenever and wherever lives are changed and transformed there is resurrection (whether God gets the credit for it or not).

But we don't always see these things, too often we are still just stuck in that loop, and even when we do see them, we don't always connect them to God's greater plan for us and for all of humanity, we don't always connect them to the resurrection of lesus Christ and the love of God for the world.

As Christians the resurrection of Jesus Christ marks both the beginning and the end of our life, because baptism is a resurrection from an old way of living and the first step in ending the ground hog day of ordinary human life and resurrection is also the gift which Jesus promises when our life here on earth is over. And all because of love. You see, if the whole of Scripture could be summarized in one sentence it would be this: God loves you! and the resurrection would be the exclamation point at the end of that sentence.

Did you know that only in the state of Texas is June 19th a holiday. "Juneteenth," as it is called, commemorates the day in 1865 when Union Troops landed in Galveston, Texas, and General Gordon Granger fulfilled order number three by enforcing the Emancipation Proclamation and freeing all the slaves in Texas, a law which had been passed two-and-a-half years earlier but this news hadn't reached Texas. The Emancipation Proclamation had been the law of the land for two-and-a-half years but the slaves in Texas didn't know anything about it. They had been freed without knowing it. Someone had to tell them.

There's a whole world out there that has been freed, raised to new life, re-created but doesn't know it, who live lives of guilt, regret and fear when actually they are free if only they choose to be. How about you? We tend to think of baptism as something which happens to babies when they are a few months old but anyone can get baptised at any age; because what baptism is, is the beginning of a new life if you are 1 or 101. A fresh start, an adventure begun on a journey with Jesus.

It is why the big stone bowl we call the font we use for baptisms is near the front door of churches, it signifies baptism as entry to the church and a new way of life.

And if you think but I don't know enough about the Bible, it doesn't matter, if you have stuff in your past, it doesn't matter, if you have doubts, it doesn't matter. Being baptised, being a Christian is not about thinking we are perfect, far from it. Every Sunday Christians come to church not because we think we are perfect or have it all sorted, but because we are certain we are not and don't. We walk past the font again, we come with all our worries and troubles of the world, weighed down with our regret and guilt and fears and we are raised up and sent back out into the world as God's new creations.



THE VILLAGE HALL EXTENSION PLAN UPDATE



The plan to build a new hiring space on the North side of the current hall is underway. The ball started rolling when the Management Trustees met with a local architect at the beginning of August. Following that meeting we arranged a Geomatics Survey of the whole site. The ground plans the surveyor produced will help the architect determine the best location, alignment and dimensions of the new extension.

The next stage is to agree a building plan that will provide us with everything we need and will fall within our budget. It is easy to daydream (and we have definitely done that) and get carried away with fancy design ideas but we acknowledge that one of the first steps is to be realistic about the build costs. We are told that a standard, single story extension will cost around £1,500 - £2,000/m2, add to that 15% for fees and permissions and a 20% contingency for unforeseen costs. We currently estimate that we will need around £400,000 to build our extension and to follow through our commitment to replace the main hall roof – although this figure may change when the architect lays out more formal plans in the coming months. We currently have £145,000 in our Buildings Account. We think this is a good starting point but it is definitely not enough.

The short fall needs to come from somewhere; we will of course be combing the internet for grant opportunities and seeking support from commercial sponsors and other groups.

We will also be pursuing other fundraising activities.

This is where the whole community can help. Depending where you look, the population of the village is said to be around 2,200. If 1,500 people donated just £50 over the next year (that is £1 a week or £4 a month) we would raise £75,000. If 100 people held a fundraising event and raised £100 we would have £10,000.

So I ask all of you – would you like to help your community to raise funds for a much needed improved village Hall? Please give the future of our village hall some thought. Look out for more information and more specifically look out for the big FUND RAISING THERMOMETER, it will be back.

TEN QUESTIONS WITH JESS BILLINGHAM

If you haven't been to Whimple station recently, you are missing a treat. As well as the colourful tubs and planters that have been created by FoWST (Friends of Whimple Station), there are two colourful welcome boards designed by Whimple School students. Also, being positioned along the fence at the back of the platform is an extremely creative and professional piece of artwork by local student Jess Billingham. I managed to catch her before she starts University this Autumn, to ask her all about the project..



How did you first get involved with FOWST?

My mum really volunteered me!! I was nearing the end of my A Levels which included Art and I thought it would be fun, so I agreed. Also, my friend Romily Orla agreed to help me paint the first base images, and Lucia Boyden created other bottles with me too. But I have enjoyed completing the project by myself and staying focused.

It must have been quite a task. How did you go about it?

I was asked to do a mural and it was suggested by FoWST that it could be something to do with cider and apples to reflect the classic Whimple heritage. When I was little I had an obsession with drawing mugs. I still have the sketch book which is full of my mug drawings. I wanted to paint something that I would really enjoy doing, so I thought about bottles and all the Whiteways history.

Did you need to do any research before you started?

First I went to the station and realised how big the space was!! Then I went to the Heritage Centre for some inspiration as they have a large collection of Whiteways bottles. I thought it would be cool to do a timeline of these designs. I set up a meeting with Tina Kelly and she had dated all the collection, which was really helpful. She went through everything with me and I took photographs in order and selected the designs that were most popular, or ones that I knew I'd enjoy creating.

Is there a particular style or artist that you wanted to base your work on?

I was planning on a kind of Andy Warhol sort of style , a little bit Pop Art , not too realistic with colours that exaggerate.

Do you have any favourite bottles?

Yes I like the 'Baby Pom' and the Sanatogen and the barrel shaped Armadillo. I'm also looking forward to painting the glass jug one. I did think the cans would be my favourite, but they have turned out to be the least enjoyable as they are too straight and it's hard to make them look decent.

Are you happy with the finished project?

I am and you can definitely see that I've progressed over the year. You can see that my painting skills are much improved in the later bottles. It is nice to know that every time I go to the station they will be there and others will get to see them too. I am proud of that.

Who or what influences your artwork?

This summer I've been doing some water colours in Sidmouth by the beach which are really pretty. Also, I did a ten session workshop on abstract landscapes in acrylic with Sue Fould which was really, really good. I enjoy doing abstract landscapes, and mixed media. Having a really basic beginning of the painting and then going back into it with bolder stuff. I suppose my style is still evolving though.

Where are you going at the end of the summer?

I'm going to Leeds to study Fine Art with History of Art. In fact I used some of the bottles in my portfolio and discussed this community project in my interview so I think it helped me get an offer. I would eventually love to have a career in the arts world, that's my aim.

You have had a gap year before university, what have you learned from your experiences?

1. Do your research before you start working for someone. 2. My ski season has given me a good work ethic, as it was really hard work. 3. Travelling has helped me become more independent and organised. And 4. How much I need to talk to my mum! I called her almost every day.

Will you miss Whimple?

I love Whimple and coming back to the village. We moved here when I was seven years old and it's a perfect place to grow up. I love our garden and I am so glad we moved here. I went to Whimple School then caught the train to Exeter College for several years. It's just good fun here though. Dear neighbours,

What a busy time at East Devon. In the months since my last message, I've been thrilled to see plans put in place for the first new (and zero-carbon!) council houses to be built in the district for many years, as well as the beginnings of a 'Nature Emergency' declaration and associated recovery plan – but that's just the start. We are undertaking a comprehensive evaluation of car parking charges following changes made in the last few years, proactively completing a 'Corporate Peer



Challenge' to understand where the Council can improve its core services for residents, and moving forwards with a public bin review to make sure this service is financially sustainable as well as providing the right facilities. Work is also ongoing to implement the findings of the Public Toilets Review that was concluded in Summer of last year, including refurbishing the most important sites.

Closer to home, at Strategic Planning Committee I have been working on the village's behalf to ensure concerns regarding the protection of our countryside are properly reflected in an updated vision for the emerging Local Plan. I'm also looking forward to seeing provisional plans for walking and cycling networks around the Clyst Valley Regional Park – just West of the village – coming forward from Devon County Council very soon. As I write, a planning appeal by public inquiry against East Devon's refusal of permission for the solar farm at Marsh Green is ongoing, where I have been working hard to support residents participating in the inquiry, including offering my support as an expert witness. Last but by no means least, following feedback from residents, engineer visits have been made to the Slewton Crescent play park to ensure all equipment is safe for use, with sharp edges removed, and a contractor has been booked in to address gaps in surface treatments.

Coming up, over the next month or so I will be working with the Parish Council to substantiate our understanding of the infrastructural constraints around the village, again as a contributor to the Local Plan, as well as ensuring that feedback from Whimple regarding how the District Council works with parishes is properly heard as part of East Devon's Peer Challenge. I will also be raising concerning reports in the press regarding the financial situation of the County Council, particularly in light of the large number of messages I've received regarding the state of our roads and the lack of response from Devon Highways.

As always, if there are any issues you'd like to raise with me, I'm available at todd.olive@eastdevon.gov.uk or on 07925 847933 to discuss or make an appointment. My regular, no-appointment surgeries are ongoing at The Hive, opposite the Thirsty Farmer, where I'm available 4pm-7pm on the first Monday, and 8am-12pm on the third Monday, every month – it'd be great to see you.

Thank you for all the kind support shown to us since leaving Whimple Stores.

Mark has gone back to working part time for the governments Animal Health Department and has been very busy helping to control bird flu and I have been doing some Post Office cover for an old friend in Stoke Canon.

Missing the social interaction of working in the shop, we now have a shop in Ottery St Mary. I have always enjoyed trying different types of craft and I am always amazed at the amount of skill and talent there is in local crafters. Our shop is called Gorunya which we believe is a Cornish word meaning unite, consolidate, bring together. We like the idea of our space being a place for meeting up to learn new skills and to sell local craft, homewares and gifts, which have been made with consideration to the environment. It seems crazy to be buying things from all over the world when we have so much available on our doorstep or at least we should be ensuring things are made without harming people.

We have a lovely range of homeware items and gifts already but are always looking to extend our ranges, if the right products come along. We have cushions and throws made in India by a business that ensures workers and their families are supported and fairly paid and treated. We have wooden products made in Devon from fallen trees. We have beautiful hand towels, made by a lovely young lady in Ottery, as well as local paintings, hand painted cushions, pottery and poetry collections and TextArt books all made within, or around, Ottery.

Sneaking in some family favourites – we have some beautiful polymer clay pieces made by my nephew's partner and we have prints of Harry's artwork and some of his lino cut and etching prints. He has a little studio in the shop, where he can produce more work and, hopefully, we will be adding print workshops to our list of fun projects.

I am very much enjoying being creative and teaching people new skills. We try to change our workshops every month. September was a Japanese month for us. We had workshops on different crafts including Sumi-e which is meditative painting and making Kanzashi fabric flowers. Our courses are for anyone who wants to dabble, aiming at a basic grounding in the craft before you decide if you want to take it further. We provide all materials and instruction needed to complete a project, but with minimal waste intended. This saves buying lots of bits before you decide if you like the craft and helps us to keep the cost down.

A Window on Whimple's Weather - July/August 2023

The topsy-turvy weather continued in Whimple (and much of the UK), with the record-breaking heat and drought of June being replaced by one of the wettest and coolest Julys in a long while! Although August recovered to a degree, summer never really returned in all its glory.


July – The month was unusually 'mobile' with south-westerly winds dominating, driving in showers or a few longer spells of rain. The heaviest rain (totalling 32.3mm) and strong winds (gusts to 51km/h) were on the 14th/15th as a deep storm rattled through, cancelling many summer events in its wake. Other notable wet, cool days were on the 4th, 10th, 22nd and 26th. Even Village Day was impacted on the 8th with some heavy showers early afternoon. The only brief ridge of high pressure was between the 17th and 21st with the temperature reaching 24.6°C on the 19th (which was the *average* temperature reached through flaming June!). There were also a couple of unusually cool nights for July, on the 26th down to 6.1°C at Cobden – outside the 'heat island' of Whimple!

August – The unsettled theme continued into early August, with two storms crossing quickly from the west during the 2nd and 5th, the latter named Antoni, giving Whimple's windiest day of the month, with gusts to 46 km/h. At last on the 6th the sun began to shine again and on the 9th it also began to get warmer. It stayed reasonably warm, but not hot, until the 25th when temperatures dropped markedly. In that mid-month spell it was often humid with sunshine at times, but also a wet and windy day on the 18th with storm Betty. The last week of the month was noticeably cooler and fresher, and the final day very soggy! Overall, not as wet or cool as July, but still not that summery.







Planning History

Sometimes it is best to look back at issues to gain a deeper understanding of the present situation. People do say, we have seen it all before, but nobody does anything about it. Since the beginning of the 20th Century some of the greatest minds in planning new towns have created some outstanding settlements to live and work in. The first two new towns were Letchworth and Welwyn Garden City, in Hertfordshire, which owes a great deal to the Arts and Crafts movement. Both towns had a mixture of private and social housing with a full range of schools, shops, factories, public amenities and transport infrastructure. The towns were designed to be self-contained, sustainable communities, with houses built to high standards with tree lined boulevards. It was created as a Utopian vision of planning by Ebenezer Howard. Today, Letchworth is still owned and operated according to Howard's initial intentions, by a direct successor to FGC Ltd, Letchworth Garden City Heritage Foundation.

Towards the end of the Second World War, attention was directed to the post-war reconstruction of Britain's towns and communities. The 1946 New Towns Act established an ambitious programme for building new towns. It gave the government power to designate areas of land for new town development. A series of 'development corporations' set up under the Act were each responsible for one of the projected towns.

Stevenage, in Hertfordshire, was the first new town created by the post-war Labour government in 1946. Ten others followed in the next decade, including: Harlow, Basildon, Hemel Hempstead, Bracknell and Crawley. Most were intended to accommodate the overspill of population from London and other major urban centres. Other new towns have followed including the city of Milton Keynes which was set out on a grid pattern with a network of footpaths and cycle ways. The development corporation engaged with some of the top architects of the day and insisted on planting one million trees.

The key issue is that all these new towns were led by Corporations, which acted in the interests of the people that lived and worked in the towns to maintain certain standards. Cranbrook was a totally different concept, as a developer-led new town, where developers take the major role of planning decision making, in consultation with other stakeholders. Developers' key motivation, first and foremost is profit. Cranbrook was started in 2011 and although there is a small neighbourhood shopping area, there is still no town centre, which looks to be delayed till 2024. There is a large Morrison's under construction, which looks like an industrial warehouse. There are still narrow roads, there is still is a lack of amenities and it is a high density urban development of basic architecture. It seems that lessons from history have not been learnt, especially building a sustainable community.

Looking from a historic perspective, the original plan for Crawley was to create a town capable of growing to accommodate a population of 50,000 within 15 years. By the time building began on the new neighbourhoods, the population target had increased to 60,000. It is now 120,000. The POW+R Group will continue to be ever watchful on each stage of the Cranbrook development.

Latest Government Policy

There are new changes to national planning policy with regard to onshore wind which take forward the proposals which were put out to consultation. This includes amending the planning tests for proposed onshore wind developments to make clear that suitable locations can be identified. Local authorities can more flexibly address the planning impact of onshore wind projects as identified by local communities. The basis of these changes is that it will now be important that local decision makers are able to take a more balanced approach, considering the views of communities as a whole.

Whimple Neighbourhood Plan

A report has been written on the feedback on the draft East Devon Local Plan Consultation in relation to Whimple. This will form part of our Neighbourhood Plan.

POW+R Group is appreciating that the last lap is taking more time to complete than anticipated. We have redistributed some of the final sections of the Plan amongst our team. We have now to complete: Transport, Agriculture, Renewable Energy, Power and Climate Change, Potential Use of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Monies, and to finish Natural Environment. In addition much more has been achieved on developing the WNP Policy Statements, born out of the evidence gained from across the Whimple Parish.

POW+R Group continue to be proactive in protecting our village against anything that would harm the distinctive character of our community.

As the calendar turned to August, that could only mean one thing, our annual Flower and Craft Show. Although this year's show will not go down as a record breaking show, the quality of the exhibits was certainly as good as they have ever been. This was endorsed by the judges after they had completed their deliberations. For the record, we had 26 exhibitors in the adult classes and 7 in the Junior Classes giving a total of 33 exhibitors. Not to be outdone by her sister, it was Emily Shaw who won The Fletcher Cup for the nine to eleven age group. Hopefully next year we will be able to have entries in the youngest and oldest classes!

The Photography classes always produce some excellent exhibits and the judges once again commented on the very high standard. The quality of the photographs gave the judges a very difficult task but eventually Margaret Burrough came out as the overall winner in this section winning the Paul Henry GC Memorial Cup. This year there was one photograph that stood out for the judges and they awarded a Certificate of Merit to Donna Baker for her entry in the class for "Sunset", so congratulations to Donna for that. The Arts and Crafts section once again demonstrated what skilful residents we have in the village. The overall winner in this section was Gilly Curtis who won The Len Rose Memorial Cup. The Whimple Craft Cup for the best exhibit in this section was awarded to Sarah Dunster-Ashworth. The Homecraft section never fails to deliver a wonderful display of mouth watering exhibits giving the judge the unenviable task of deciding which exhibits were the best. However, after much sampling it was Sarah Dunster-Ashworth who was the overall winner in this section and received the Sir Henry Imbert-Terry Cup. The judge was so impressed with her Millionaires Shortbread, that Sarah was awarded a Certificate of Merit for this, so many congratulations to her for that.

And so to the flower arranging classes where, although not quite as many exhibits as previous years, the standard was as high as ever. The overall winner in this section was Sarah Dunster-Ashworth winning The Frances Pratt Memorial Cup and the runner up, winning The Roy Horsburgh Trophy, was Graham Edwards. With two outstanding exhibits in these classes, it was not surprising that the cup for the best exhibit voted for by everyone who came to the show, The Marie Louise Grout Cup, was shared by Sarah Dunster-Ashworth and Graham Edwards who got an equal number of votes.

Last, and by no means least, we have the Classes for the Vegetables, Flowers and Pot Plants. Despite another year of very testing growing conditions, we did have exhibits in nearly every class which was good to see. However, and perhaps not surprisingly, there were not as many exhibits as last year, but here again, what was on display, was according to the judges, of a very high standard. Somewhat surprisingly, and for the second year running, the winner of The Briar Shield for the most points in this section was Paul Wilson! In the Vegetable Classes, all but one of the classes had exhibits and there were some wonderful entries in these classes. The Flower Classes did not disappoint and there were certainly some outstanding exhibits to admire. As with last year, we had a number of new winners in these classes which was good to see. So to the winners in these two sections. The winner of the Slewton Cup for the most points in the vegetable classes was once again Mike Hawkins. The runner up in this section, winning The Cranny Brook Cup was Donna Baker. In the Flower section, we had joint winners of The Win and Bob Shepherd Cup for the most points and these were Mike Hawkins and Sarah Dunster -Ashworth with the runner up, winning The President's Cup was Paul Wilson. The Otter Nurseries Rose Bowl for the best exhibit in the Flower Section went to Michael Hawkins for his wonderful cacti dahlias. Now, when all the points in these two sections were added together, we eventually came out with the winner of the Whimple Folk Cup and once again it was Mike Hawkins who took the honours, so many congratulations to him. A full list of cup winners is included with this edition of the News.

We were delighted that Rory and Sharon from the Whimple Stores very kindly agreed to present the prizes this year. After all the hard work they have put in, together with Sabrina, in supporting the Village since they took over the running of the Whimple Storers, we thought it would be a nice gesture to invite them to present all the prizes. So, a huge thank you to them. On behalf of the Show, Lucy and Alice Shaw presented them with a patio rose and a beautiful bouquet of flowers.

We would like to congratulate all the cup winners but most of all everyone who took the trouble to enter the Show, especially those of you entering for the first time. We are, as always, extremely grateful to all our judges who give up their time to come to the show to judge all the classes. We would also like to thank all those people who so kindly helped to clear the Hall after show, it was very much appreciated. We hope you all enjoyed it, particularly those of you participating for the first time. After all, without your entries, there would be no show! For the record, next year's Show will be on Saturday 10th August 2024, make a note of it!

We have four more events to round off our year, the first of which will have taken place by the time this edition of the News goes out. That will be a talk by Caradoc Doy entitled "Plants to Grow for Winter Colour". This promises to be an excellent talk and a report will appear in the next edition. This will be followed with our last coach trip for the year which will be to the National Trust Dyrham Park near Bath on Wednesday 1st November. A booking form is included with this report. Once again we will be staging our ever popular Quiz night. This is on Friday 10th November and will be in the Village Hall commencing at 7.30pm. This event is only £1.00 per person to enter and teams of up to six will be very welcome to join us for this very

entertaining evening! Our last event of the year will be an opportunity to make your own Christmas Wreath, apologies for using the "C" word so early! This will be on Friday 8th December from 7.00pm to 9.00pm. The workshop will be run by Sarah Dunster-Ashworth and Katie Gentle who will be supplying all the material to enable those who come to make their own wreath to take away. The charge for this will be £24.00 for 1 or 2 people to make one wreath which they can take away. If anyone wants to come along just to observe, then this will be only £2.00 per person. Numbers will be limited for the wreath making and will be a ticket only event to be able us to manage the numbers and tickets will be available from the Whimple Stores. We hope to have some seasonal refreshments as well!

Finally, a plea for some help! Over the last 12 years we have run a number of very successful coach trips. The organisation for this has been carried out by Doreen Staddon and Brian Nelson. Doreen has informed us that she intends to stand down from our Committee at our next AGM in January and therefore we are looking for someone to take over her role working with Brian to plan and organise these trips. Back to school...

Since we've been back to school, the year 5s have been going into the library in the morning to do some maths. Year 4s have been doing maths in the classroom both doing similar things (such as times tables work)1-4 digit numbers.

In science we have learned about solid, liquid and gas. Solid is like an ice cube and inside it has little particles. The particles are so close together it makes it so solid. When the particles spread apart it turns into water (liquid). When it turns into gas, all the particles are free.
