

To all Whimple Stores customers we would like to wish you a very happy New Year and to say thank you for the wonderful messages in the Christmas Cards that you sent and which we proudly displayed around the shop.

On the evening of Christmas Eve, we re-opened the shop at 7pm to provide hot drinks for Whimpletons who had assembled for the Christmas Carols. As in 2022, we donated £1 per cup sold to the charity being supported by the carol singing event. This Christmas Eve we raised £134 for Devon Freewheelers which together with the contents of the collection box on the counter and collections in the Square came to £341. We estimated around 200 people attended the Carols which was blessed with good weather and a great team of musicians.

Our newest member of staff, Sue, who started in December has settled in very well and is getting to know our customer names and their preferences.

As we are now well into January at the time of writing, we are sourcing products for events that seem very close already. We have a good stock of Valentines cards and will make sure that we have plenty of chocolates for the last-minute panic on 14th February. Mothering Sunday follows in less than a month on 10th March and Easter Sunday is early this year on 31st March. We have Cadburys Crème Eggs already in stock and on the counter and will stock a range of Chocolate Eggs.

If anyone is extending Dry January into February, we have zero alcohol beers and wines. Again, please ask us to point these out as some of the brands such as Gordons' make their zero alcohol products look very similar to the alcoholic products.

Walkers have introduced a new range of crisps aimed primarily at Vegans with meaty flavours such as BBQ Pork Ribs and Flame Grilled Steak. Please don't ask us to explain the rationale why vegan products should taste of the products that vegans have given up, but the big plus in these new flavours is that no milk or wheat products are used in the flavour coating. Good therefore for lactose and gluten intolerant people.

Finally, thanks to everyone who responded to our request to visit us at least once per week and in that visit to buy one thing that would have otherwise been on your supermarket shop. This helped to boost our sales in December. Since Christmas though, the shop has been very quiet, punctuated occasionally with busy moments. We again ask for your support to ensure that Whimple retains its Village Store which benefits so many members of the community that cannot make it out of the village to the nearest Supermarket or do not have the resources to organise supermarket deliveries.

Hello my friends,

Happy New Year!

It is hard to believe it is 2024 already, I still haven't got used to putting 2023 on letters and documents. But then, time is a curious thing, isn't it? VILLAGE HALL EXTENSION PLAN UPDATE

A budget of around £400,000 was set to replace the roof on the main hall and to build an extension. We currently have £148,000 in our Buildings Fund.

The hall's Management Trustees, with the help of a local architect, have settled on a simple floor plan that would meet the needs of the community. The plan is now in the hands of a Quantity Surveyor who will carry out a preliminary cost analysis, that is to say, she will let us know if the agreed floor plan falls within our desired budget. If it doesn't we will have to either make some changes or raise more funds. This is something we will think about in the coming months.

We had planned to replace the main hall roof this summer but we have been advised to wait and either carryout out the work when the extension is built or do it after completion. The current roof is a poorly insulated single skinned metal structure. Our plan is to replace it with an eco triple skinned roof that has an integral insulation layer. This will reduce our heating costs and will ensure the hall is warmer in winter and cooler in summer.

I hope to be able to give you more news and show you the final floor plans in the next addition of Whimple News.

In the meantime our attention is focused on raising the additional £250,000 required. We are still searching for large grant opportunities but sadly in the current climate, these are few and far between. If you know of a possible grant opportunity then please let me know.

On a more local front we have set up a '100 Club' called the 250k CLUB – more information can be found within this edition and at the village hall - I hope many will support this initiative. A series of community fund raising events have also been arranged – again please see the poster within this edition and come along.

You may have noticed the Thermometer is back on display at the front of the hall. Let's try and get the red markers to the $\pm 400,000$ target as soon as possible.

A second hall or hiring space available to the whole community during the day, every day of the year is much needed and will benefit everyone now and into the future.

Whimple Victory Hall management trustees are launching a major fundraising drive in early 2024 to raise the £250,000 required to fund our extension plans. The £250k club will provide the local community with a great way to support us whilst having a bit of a flutter! Here's how it will work...

- 1. Participants pay £6 a month (or £72 annually). This buys you one membership number (that we will allocate), which enters you into the monthly draw.
- The prizes will total 25% of the annual income and we anticipate that there will be three prizes each month. The remaining 75% will be put towards the hall extension fund.
- 3. We are hoping to make Direct Debits available but otherwise payment will typically be by standing order. These can easily be set up if you use mobile or online banking, or alternatively by completing a standing order mandate form which we can provide. However, if required we will also accept cheque or cash payments for lump sums.
- 4. The draws will be carried out by management trustees generally during monthly committee meetings. Sometimes, however, we will alter the draw date slightly to coincide with events like 'Soup n Sarnie' so that we can draw the numbers live to add to the excitement.
- Winners and their prizes will be announced via the hall's noticeboards and via social media. The winners will also be contacted directly, so that their prizes can be paid.

Supporting businesses and the local community in Devon and the South West

Dear neighbours,

A chilly Happy New Year to everyone! As I write, January is budget season at East Devon District Council, and there have been some changes to national planning policy that I wanted to draw to everyone's attention.

Firstly, though, some good news. A few months ago, East Devon's play park team attended the Slewton play park to attend to some defects in the equipment and surfacing in order to make it safe. Partially as a result of that visit, the engineer's team applied to our Capital Allocations panel for funds to completely refurbish the play park – and I was



delighted to vote to approve this in late December. Our budget for next year still has one or two hoops to jump through, but it's fairly safe to say we can look forward to a new play park soon.


More generally, you may have seen in the news recently issues nationally to do with local government funding – including potentially for our own Devon County Council. I'm pleased to say that, mainly due to growth in business rates receipts from growth around the Sky Park and Science Park, East Devon currently finds itself in a sound financial position. That may change in the mid-term but as yet we don't have a decision from government on that – it has signalled that it intends to take away some £5m a year of East Devon's annual business rates receipts, which we are currently expecting in the 2026/27 financial year, but not yet confirmed. For context, that would see East Devon's budget cut by 25% - on top of the more than 20% reduction in spending power for district councils that we've seen since 2010. A concerning prospect.

You may also have seen recently the Secretary of State responsible for planning and housing, Michael Gove, and indeed our own East Devon MP, talking about changes to national planning policy that have, in their words, made the so-called 'standard method' for calculating required housebuilding rates only "advisory" – with the implication that places like East Devon can get out of relatively high numbers stipulated by this government requirement, including avoiding the need to designate 'new towns' to meet those numbers. Followers of Strategic Planning Committee at East Devon will know I spoke at our early January meeting to make absolutely clear that this is absolutely not the case: while the government has slightly changed the game for some city councils, and for those that have statutory 'green belt' designations, for the rest of us – including East Devon – the requirement to keep building has not been relaxed at all.

I know many residents are concerned about loss of countryside to 'Persimmon boxes', particularly with work ongoing on a new East Devon Local Plan. Please do rest assured that I, and my colleagues on Strategic Planning Committee, are very much trying to stay on top of this and see the best possible – and least harmful – outcomes for this process, though our hands are substantially tied by national government policy. Closer to home, I'm also working hard with the Parish Council to make progress on the Whimple Neighbourhood Plan, which again should help – and we are hoping to share more news on a concrete timetable in the coming weeks.

HIIIIII A bit of railway history



The SR West Country Class Light Pacific 'WHIMPLE' was built at Brighton in 1946, SR No 21C125. It was initially named 'ROUGH TOR' for just a few days, from the 11th to the 23rd April 1948, and renamed 'Whimple' on 3rd May 1948. It was rebuilt without the original air-smoothed casing in 1957. Allocated new to Ramsgate, it soon moved to Stewarts Lane specifically for working the 'Golden Arrow' and other Continental expresses.

Later it moved to the Western Section at Exmouth Junction before returning to the Eastern Section at Bricklayers Arms and Ramsgate. It finished its days back on the Western Section at Eastleigh and finally Bournemouth from where it was withdrawn in July 1967. After a period in store at Salisbury, it was cut up at Cashmores, Newport in March 1968.

The last freight working from Furzebrook, on the Swanage branch line, to be hauled by steam was on Friday, 20th June, 1967, when rebuilt 'West Country' class Bulleid Pacific No. 34025 'Whimple' performed the honours

A Window on Whimple's Weather - November/December 2023

Apart from a brief cold spell at the end of November and first few days of December, the last two months of 2023 were unusually wet and mild. December was also a dull and very windy month.

November – The month started off very unsettled as Storm Ciarán rattled in from the southwest and the centre passed almost directly over Whimple in the small hours of the 2nd, resulting in a very wet day, but strongest winds were across the Channel Isles and N France, comparable to the 'Great Storm' of 16 October 1987. Storm Debi arrived on the 13th but severe weather was this time away to the north. Strongest winds for Whimple were on the 19th, with gusts to 53km/h around midday. Only 4 days were dry in the month: 19th, 24th, 25th and 28th. However the 25th bucked the trend for the month: being unusually calm, sunny and cold, with a low of -4.1°C in Cobden Lane.

December – The stormy theme continued during the whole of December, with 3 named storms: 9th, 10th, and 27th: Elin, Fergus and Gerritt. So apart from 2 sunny, cold days to start, the rest of the month was even windier, duller and wetter, than November, with almost 3 times average rainfall. The 3rd and 4th were both very wet days with 43mm total. A brief respite of higher pressure and dry weather lasted between the 13th and 18th, and thankfully a very mild and dry Christmas Eve enabled a large crowd to gather for carols in The Square! Storm Gerritt gave a very wet and windy day on the 27th and there were more gales on New Year's Eve with gusts above 60 km/h causing some damage.

Just 10 Questions with Sarah Hogg of Yelland Farm.

I chatted with Sarah, to find out more about MacKenzie and Kellar, one of Whimple's local cottage industries, and her love for Holly, Hazel, Pixie, Dixie and many more of her Shetland Sheep.

1. Do you have a farming background? Absolutely not. I was a real 'townie' growing up in Bristol. Later in life my husband, Alan, and I lived in Exeter and ran Apex Scaffolding Ltd from 1991. We ran the business together until I retired in 2016. We lived nearby in Fairmile, before coming to Whimple but had always wanted to live in the countryside.

2. Why did you decide to rear sheep? When we bought the farm, it was a redundant farm and came with two big fields at the back and we used to let local farmers graze their sheep or cows here to keep the grass down. Then we decided this is silly, why don't we get our own sheep? So we bought six ewes and one ram and it has just grown from there. We just love the life, I suppose. It's very rewarding, especially around lambing. We love this time of year and creating this sort of English farming life. The ewes are kept, we don't sell them, we just sell the first-time ewes for breeding so the flock doesn't get too big. There are ewes in the field that we have had for many years. One has just turned fourteen and we call her Badger!

3. Why Shetland Sheep? My granddaughter's friend at school was living on Dartmoor and her family wanted to change their flock to Dartmoor Sheep, so we bought their six Shetlands. I was a little unsure as neither of us knew anything about raising sheep and it seemed such a responsibility. But we took the plunge and now we are up to forty five sheep.

4. I understand they all have names, can you recognise each of them? Yes, they've all got names. We got the first sheep in 2015, started lambing in 2016 and we still have two of our original ewes - Peppa and Salty. They all have a black stripe on their faces but they do all look slightly different. Alan will come down from the field and say 'Dora's limping'. We are obviously more familiar with the friendlier ones, but they all have their own personality. They are farm animals but they can be friendly, although we don't underestimate the young rams who can be quite feisty. However, they become friendly if you treat them right.

5. How do you manage with the lambing and shearing? It really lasts from January through to June, what with caring for the mother and then giving special attention to April born lambs or weaker lambs. Dougie is our ram and we only breed from about twenty ewes as we don't want to increase our flock too much.

6. **Was the first lambing season scary?** Yes. Although Alan had helped Lester Bowker the previous season because he wanted to just be enjoying it before we got our own lambs. I think this was really helpful in showing Alan what to expect and what to look for. In fact ALL the farmers around here have been extremely helpful. - guiding us, giving us useful information and assisting with any jobs or providing a bale of hay etc. Actually Shetlands are quite good at lambing on their own out in the field. Although we do like to bring them in to keep an eye on them.

They are really great mums and the lambs soon grow strong, with a bit of tender loving care. Actually this is the first year we are not actually going to be lambing as it is our 25th wedding anniversary and we want to take a bit of a holiday!

7. The Shetland breed sounds lovely. What about their wool, is that special too? It has a very good crimp (the zig-zag quality). It is extremely soft, and one of the wools that is often used for jumpers. It washes so well too.

8. Is working with small local industries important to you? Yes, we have Dan who comes to shear for us once a year. He is fairly local and enjoys shearing small flocks. He is so caring and respectful of the animals. Also, he is very understanding of our way of doing things and he knows we love them. Due to the small amount we receive for each fleece I phoned up a local spinning company and a weaving mill to see if we could create some beautiful woollen products. Only having a small volume is difficult and not really very cost effective, but keeping the production local IS something I wanted to do. We produce blankets, wraps, scarves, and obviously the wool. A friend knits the snoods, berets, pom-pom hats and that sort of thing. I get a lot of pleasure from it and thoroughly enjoy being fully involved in choosing natural colours. I really do love being so hands on and I'm excited that we have a new design coming out this year.

9. Any advice for other cottage industries or local traders? Do your research and really consider your basic costs before you get too involved. We really had to learn on the hoof and we did make mistakes but we have learned from these errors. Now we have the expertise, we can build on this for the future.

10. **Finally, do you see yourself staying in Whimple?** I think we struck gold by coming to live in Whimple, twenty years ago. When we moved here we fell in love with the house, and the view. Over the years since we've been here we've grown to know and love the village, and have become part of the village life. Both of us have said we wouldn't want to move away from here, even when we have finished being sheep farmers. It's a lovely village and we've become involved in a lot of the village activities. I enjoy it and have made a lot of friends here. So, we will be staying I'm sure.

The Protect our Whimple and Rockbeare Group, founded in 2019, is all about protecting what matters to us in these two villages and also their hinterland, especially the western border of our Parish. It is not only about inappropriate development but our way of life, our community and sense of pride in our village.

On Christmas Eve, the Whimple village square filled with about two hundred villagers gathering in festive spirit, with mulled wine from our village store. On the 17th January, the old twelfth night, well over one hundred took part in the Wassailing, from Anglo Saxon term, wæs hæil, meaning, 'Be healthy'. This ancient ritual was built on the belief that, by making a lot of noise, banging drums, clashing sticks, and firing off guns, the trees will wake up for the New Year. Branches of the trees are hit to encourage the sap to start flowing and to frighten away evil spirits that might be hiding amongst them. This helps to ensure a good crop of apples and a good few flagons of cider. The Whimple Wassail started at the New Fountain Inn and finished at the Cricket Club, followed by some tasty pasties which were especially good. It's great to see the people of Whimple coming together in the spirit of comradeship.

Of course we also do need to keep an eye on what is going on in planning terms. There has been little news from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities Website. On the 12th December 2023 East Devon District Council, invited residents to participate in a crucial consultation process aimed at shaping the future Council Plan, which moves on from the consultation which took place at the end of 2022. The Council outlined its roadmap for the work on the Local Plan over the next four years, and covers the key priorities of the council: better homes and communities for all; a greener East Devon; a resilient economy; and quality service delivery. The closing date was the 18th January 2024.

Whimple Neighbourhood Plan

2023 was the year when most of the detailed analysis of the data and writing up the draft of the Neighbourhood Plan took place. We have completed Sections 1 – 14. The last sections are Section 15: Potential Use of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Monies. The information from the village survey has been written up so the final statement can be drafted. Section 16: Implementation and Monitoring and finally Section 17: Closing Statement. If everyone from the WNP Team pull together we are on target to complete the draft by July 2024. Two years ago we kicked off the 'We Love Whimple' project, and now we are nearly there. Big thanks to all our team.




