Thank you to everyone for their kind wishes, cards and gifts over the Christmas period. We are sorry we didn't have time to send cards out to everyone but we appreciate your custom, support and friendship.

Listening to all the new year press coverage there are a few issues that we are pleased to say we have been aware of for a while.

We only sell small cans of energy drinks and we don't sell more than one can to children before school and if they want to buy more we check with parents first.

We are very conscious of recycling and our cardboard and plastic film wrap is taken back to Bookers for recycling. We are allowed to do this because we sign up to Bookers scheme and have applied for a trade waste licence. We try to avoid plastics by selling loose fruit and veg and we do monitor our products and try, where possible, to stock the most environmentally sound products. We are always striving to find products that don't use palm oil and try to encourage people to reuse carrier bags rather than supplying new ones.

We don't have a minimum spend on card transactions and do not charge for card use and cash withdrawals from the Post Office do not incur any charges.

Our takeaway cups are recyclable and we are always happy to fill up your own reusable cups.

It is nice to know everyone is catching us up!



Your Parish Council

Whimple Parish Council exists to represent the interests of the whole community. The Parish Council consists of nine unpaid volunteer elected Councillors who work hard to understand the needs of different people in the community in a non-political culture. Occasionally there will be conflicts of interest requiring sensitive judgement and making difficult decisions, in an open and reasoned way, is something that the local council strives to do well in.

To be effective, the Councillors need to be well informed about the diverse local views. The Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire which should be launched in the coming weeks (*apologies for the unforeseen delay*), is just one of the ways of capturing feedback.

Probably the most important source of information sharing, hearing about current issues and evidencing decision making is to attend the monthly Parish Council Meetings held in the Victory Hall. The Parish Council meet twice a month, normally on the first Monday in the month for a Planning Meeting and then on the third Monday in the month for a full Parish Meeting. The Agendas are published on the Wednesday before a meeting on the Parish Notice Board in the Square and on the Parish website http://whimpleparishcouncil.weebly.com. After the meetings the minutes are published in the same manner normally within 3 working days of the meeting.

The Councillors welcome attendance by residents to the Parish Council Meetings and a full list of dates are displayed on the Notice Board and website. This is your opportunity to 'have a say' and also be informed of both significant issues and matters of interest that impact the Parish.

For many people, it is the satisfaction of acting on behalf of their local community that encourages them to become councillors. You need to be over 18 and a qualifying citizen of the Commonwealth, the European Community or the Republic of Ireland. You will work with other councillors to serve the community and are tasked to bring local issues to the attention of the Parish Council and help make decisions on behalf of the local community.

The diversity of the Parish Council is its strength with councillors having different backgrounds, enthusiasms and interests. By working together as a team, councillors provide a service to the community. A councillor has responsibility to attend the Parish Council meetings when summonsed to do so, consider agenda items, take part in voting and respect decisions made by the majority of those present and voting and ensure the council is properly managed. The Parish Council has a code of conduct which deals with councillor's obligations about their conduct including the registration and disclosures of interests.

Are you interested in local issues? Are you able to commit time to attend meetings and associated duties that may be delegated to you as a councillor (such as a snow warden for example)? 

WHIMPLE VILLAGE PRODUCE ASSOCIATION Garden Competition For Young People

Starting in 2018' the VPA will be running a gardening competition for young people. There will be three age categories as detailed below. It is open to young people living within a radius of 5 miles from Whimple Church.

Competitors will be asked to look after a small garden at their home or at a friend's/ relative's house or part of an allotment and become involved in planning, decision making, and routine work. If actual garden plots are not available, big planters may be substituted. We would like you to maintain a small number of ornamental plants and common vegetables or salad crops. You must be involved in soil preparation and sowing seeds, both for your garden/planters, and using your own sown transplants. Two VPA members will visit you in late May and July, take a look at your efforts, and chat to you about your general knowledge of gardening and the garden/planters you are managing. They will score your efforts and a cash prize will be awarded to the winners at the Flower Show in August 2018

Prizes: Age 5-10 £15 : Age 10-15 £25 : Age 16-20 £40

Specifications:

Age 5-10 only. (contact details will be requested at handover)

You will be given a container in which to grow your plants. You must grow two small annual flowers (trailing types best e.g. trailing lobelia, dwarf petunia) and two salad crops (bunch or single plants e.g. lettuce, rocket or radishes).

The first three weeks of November were very mild, cloudy and damp and overall it was a relatively dry month, especially compared to last year. November ended on a cold note and this continued through most of December, with some hard frosts, but no snow. In terms of rainfall, prior to the festive period December was quite dry but this changed with a lot of wet and windy weather between Christmas and the New Year. As a result, December turned out to be the wettest month of the year, followed by September and July. Total precipitation for 2017 was 831.3 mm (32.73 inches), compared to 834.4 mm (32.85 inches) in 2016. By way of context, the wettest year recorded in Whimple since 1969 was 2012 (1265 mm; 49.80 inches), and the driest was 1975 (677 mm; 26.65 inches).

Whimple History Society Tales of Whimple

The Murder of Police Constable Potter

In the last edition, we told the heartening story of how an abandoned baby, Thomas La Drawer, was adopted by a Whimple family and became part of the village community.

However, the most idyllic of places sometimes have a darker side. Sadly, Whimple is no exception, as shown by the shocking murder of the Whimple village constable. This terrible incident became a virtual legend within the Police Force.

P.C. John Tremlett Potter was a quiet man, loyal to his comrades and trusted by his superiors. He commanded a great deal of respect in the Force.

For some months he had received reports that petty theft was taking place at the offices of Whiteway's Cyder Company. P.C. Potter arranged with the company to have access to the offices in order to keep watch and hopefully apprehend the culprits. On the 17th January 1938 he set out from his home to walk to Knowle Cross but purposely only took his torch, leaving his truncheon and handcuffs behind as he intended to return home for supper before continuing his shift.

However, he did not return home and his wife and son assumed he would return at midnight when his shift finished. At 3am Mrs Potter could wait no longer and telephoned Sergeant Abrahams at Ottery St Mary. Her son, William, went to look for his father at the factory but returned home after he had found the door to the offices secure. Sergeant Abrahams and a colleague also searched for their comrade but found nothing untoward at the offices.

At 7.00am the following morning Mr Ronald Whiteway arrived at the factory and on entering the offices found P.C. Potter lying in a pool of blood and with severe head injuries. The policeman was immediately taken to the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital where he subsequently died from his injuries on 2nd February1938.

The hunt started for his assailants.

Suspicion fell on two employees of Whiteway's, Stanley Clarence George Martin and Leslie George Downing. Martin had facial injuries on turning up for work the day after the attack and Downing's fingerprints were found on the office window. When interviewed, Downing admitted that they had broken in to the offices but had found nothing worth stealing. They started to leave with just a bag of sweets when they encountered P.C. Potter. Downing stated that the policeman failed to notice him and he was able to escape and he caught the 9.28pm train to Exeter.

Martin was grabbed by P.C. Potter and a lengthy fight ensued which ended after Martin had hit the constable several times over the head with a metal chair. He then left by the main door, securing it behind him. He later confirmed that Downing had not been involved in the fight.

On the 18th February, Downing and Martin were committed to trial at the Central Criminal Court on two charges:

- 1. Jointly murdering P. C. Potter
- 2. Breaking and entering the offices of Whiteway's Cyder Company and stealing therefrom.

The trial lasted only five days.

Martin was found guilty of the murder and sentenced to death. Downing was found not guilty of murder but guilty of office breaking and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.

After petitioning for a reprieve from his death sentence, and supported by public outcry, Martin's sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life. He was finally released in 1950 and, perhaps surprisingly, returned to live in Whimple.

P C Potter's funeral was held in Whimple and attended by police officers from all over the country, who provided an honour guard for the coffin. A fitting send off for their comrade who had given his life in the line of duty. P.C. Potter's grave lies in the churchyard of St Mary's Church.

Mrs Potter and her son received overwhelming sympathy and support and police officers from all over the country and members of the public contributed to a fund set up to assist them. Whiteway's Cyder Company was a major contributor to the fund and the monies raised were used to purchase a plot of land and build a house for them to live in. The house, Lyndon, is next to the Heritage Centre.








Where did Piss Poor come from? Interesting History

They used to use urine to tan animal skins, so families used to all pee in a pot and then once a day it was taken and sold to the tannery......if you had to do this to survive you were 'Piss Poor'.

But worse than that were the really poor folk who couldn't even afford to buy a pot.....they "didn't have a pot to piss in" and were the lowest of the low.

The next time you are washing your hands and complain because the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be. Here are some facts about the 1500s:

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May and they still smelled pretty good by June. However, since they were starting to smell, brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odour. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, "Don't throw the baby out with the bath water!"

Houses had thatched roofs of thick straw, piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "It's raining cats and dogs."

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, "Dirt poor." The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance-way. Hence: a thresh hold.

In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme: Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old.

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off.

It was a sign of wealth that a man could "bring home the bacon." They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat.

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the upper crust.

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a wake.

England is old and small so the local folks started running out of places to bury the dead. So they would dig up coffins and would take the bones to a bone-house, and reuse the grave. When reopening these coffins, one out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realized they had been burying people alive, so they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift) to listen for the bell; thus, someone could be saved by the bell or was considered a dead ringer.

And that's the truth. Now, whoever said history was boring!!!



Travelling with your pet

Now is the time of year when we look forward to the summer holidays and for lots of us, that can mean taking our furry friend along too. The Vale Vets team are here to tell you what you need to know before you go.

Since 2000, the Pet Travel Scheme (PETS) has allowed cats, dogs and ferrets to enter the UK from certain countries without being placed in quarantine. Animals resident to the UK can now travel to most European countries as well as more distant destinations. From 1st January 2012, the PETS travel scheme changed such that dogs and cats can move freely between PETS-scheme approved countries provided the following conditions are satisfied:

- 1) The pet must have a permanent microchip implanted, which lots of animals already have.
- 2) The pet must be vaccinated against rabies after microchipping. This can be done any time over 12 weeks of age using a licensed vaccine. Boosters are given according to manufacturers' recommendation.
- 3) The pet must have a PETS passport signed by an official veterinary surgeon, confirming the above conditions have been met.
- 4) Some destinations require an additional export certificate. It is important to check with DEFRA for specific conditions requested by the country you wish to travel to.
- 5) There is a 21 day wait after rabies vaccination before travel abroad and/or entry into the UK is allowed. This is to allow time for the vaccine to take effect.
- 6) There is a requirement for a veterinary certified tapeworm treatment 24-120 hours before return to the UK. Travel companies and ports will often help you locate a veterinary surgeon for this.

If you are travelling to a country not listed on the PETS scheme, additional conditions must be met. This means starting this process at least 4-5 months before you expect to travel. A blood sample must be taken a minimum of 30 days after rabies vaccination. If the test is successful, a three month wait must be observed following the date of the blood sample before your pet will be allowed back into the UK. If the blood test does not prove adequate antibody levels, your pet will require a second vaccination and blood test. It is also important to contact DEFRA and check for any additional requirements of travel to specific countries.

We recommend making sure your pet is protected against ticks and sand-flies during their period of stay outside the UK as these can carry a variety of disease which we rarely encounter in this country. It's also important to consider whether your pet enjoys travelling, changes in environment and temperature or whether they may prefer to stay at home. If you have any questions, please contact your vet.

Above all, enjoy your holiday!
