

The Cricket Club are busy with events and History Society talks have re-started. We have an update on the activities of the POW+R group who are responding to the Cranbrook expansion plan. There is also an update on our own Neighbourhood Plan. This plan is vital to the future of our village so look out for the consultation weekend on 12th and 13th February and please make sure you complete the village survey due to take place shortly.

On other planning matters, the CPRE tell us of their unease about the increasing number of holiday lets in our area and they express deep concern about the planning application for a massive solar farm at Clyst Hydon, not very far from us, which they strongly oppose, as perhaps should we .

We owe a big 'thank you' to Rory, Sharon, Sabrina and their team who, despite the challenge of taking over the shop and Post Office immediately before the Christmas rush, coped admirably. They now need to make some changes to the Post Office opening hours which are explained in their article.

We all take the simple act of breathing for granted, as we all do it all of the time. However, Sarah's 'Ten Questions' show that maybe there is more to staying alive than we had originally thought.

WHIMPLE STORES 🙈

We would like to start by commenting on how very welcoming the people of Whimple and surrounding areas have been to us since we took over the Whimple Stores. We climbed a very steep learning curve on how to run a village shop and Post Office. We had many Christmas cards welcoming us to Whimple and some very nice gifts to help us feel at home. Thank you very much for the warm welcome.

The first couple of months were a baptism of fire. We are very grateful to Mark and Jenny for helping us to transition. They held significant expertise that was only available to us for a limited time. The potential of losing this expertise meant that Rory and Sabrina had to adapt very quickly to understand the quirks of 25 different suppliers of food and other products and the permutations of 130 customer's newspaper orders. But we are now there and settled in.

Our strategy since November has been to keep the stores well stocked and to provide a friendly and respectful service to Whimple residents. Stocking fresh produce is tricky as too much will lead to wastage and too little leads to disappointment and lost sales. We are looking at changing a couple of suppliers who will deliver smaller quantities, more frequently, to ensure that we are able to maintain the correct balance.

Please do let us know if we are not selling your favourite or essential produce and we will endeavour to get products in to fulfil customer demand. We also plan to try new products and will provide 'tasters' if we are able to do so hygienically.

Sabrina was able to move in to the house next door to the Stores just before Christmas after an urgent rewire and repair work, making the management of the Stores a lot easier and cutting out her commute from Axminster. In particular, as the Post Office accounting procedures can run late into the evening, Sabrina can work into the evening while partner James and step daughter Karina prepare supper. Luxury!

We have recruited two villagers to work part-time in the Stores; Judith and Sarnia who are being trained to be able to run both the shop and the Post Office along with Karen. Sabrina will be on call when needed freeing up her time to handle ordering, accounting and book-keeping (which is almost a full time job by itself!) without clocking late hours. Other part-time staff members are Lynn and Karina who cover stocking up and weekends and of course Rory and Sharon.

The Post Office counter was fully staffed throughout November, December and January to cover the peak demand as we had queues stretching to the door. Unfortunately, the fees paid by the Post Office for each transaction do not cover the cost of the staff to perform those transactions. We do recognise that the Post Office is an essential community resource and have discussed, as a team, how to continue to provide postal and banking services for Whimple but on a cost neutral basis.

So, we are making a change to the opening times of the Whimple Post Office from February 1st to help with staffing and accounting. Whimple Store times are unaffected.

The Post Office opening times from Monday to Friday will be 9.00am to 12.30pm and then 1.30pm to 5.00pm. Saturday will remain the same from 9.00am until noon.

We are also making changes to the way that certain complex transactions are conducted. When the Stores are open and the Post Office is closed, cash withdrawals will be possible with a small fee charged to cover our card fees. Electricity and Gas pre-pay keys can also be topped up.

Detailed information is available from the Stores Staff if required. We hope this does not cause anyone too much inconvenience.

You may have noticed our Tiger (a large stuffed Tigger from Winnie the Poo) in the window to help celebrate the Chinese New Year in February. We have bunting inside the shop, chopsticks and prawn crackers too! We plan to theme the window for different upcoming events or to announce new product lines so make sure you keep an eye out for changes.

With Valentine's Day also approaching, we are stocking hand-made charity Valentine cards (supporting Auto-immune Disease Charities), and our normal Valentine cards, Prosecco and Chocolates.



APPEAL HEARING DATE

On the subject of appeals, I am sure you have now heard that a date has been set for the Secretary of State's Inspectorate Hearing.

This will be FEBRUARY 15th at 10.00am, so not long now!

If you have had an email regarding this you will have read that it will be a virtual meeting and anyone interested can express their interest in being included, either as an observer or a participant.

Anyone wishing to attend the hearing must make that interest known to the Council as soon as possible prior to the hearing, either by email or telephone after reading the Hearing Attendance Information set out below. When contacting the Case Officer, it would be helpful if you could confirm whether you want to take an active part in the proceedings or anticipate attending just as an observer. Here is the official guidance:

Hearing Attendance Information from Bob Capon, Case Officer, EDDC

If you feel that taking part in the hearing is right for you in whatever capacity, you can participate in a number of ways:

To take part using video, participants will need to have access to Microsoft Teams (via an app or web browser). This link gives further information on how to use this. https://support.office.com/en-us/teams.

Alternatively, you can take part by telephone. Calls would be to an 020 number which will incur charges. https://www.gov.uk/call-charges

If you just wish to observe the event, you should make that clear in your response to the Case Officer. If you wish to take an active part in the proceedings, please make clear in your response whether you wish only to appear at the hearing and make a statement, or whether you would also wish to ask guestions on particular topics.


Registered participants in whatever capacity will receive individual joining instructions, providing details of any requirements, guidance and support, whether ioining by Teams or telephone.



This was recently re-discovered and digitally repaired, and is shortly to become part of an exciting new display for the summer. 

Hello my friends,

Firstly Angie, the boys, and I want to wish you all a very Happy New Year. Thank you for the many Christmas cards and gifts which arrived at the Rectory, they really warmed our hearts.

So, the clock has struck midnight and we are in a new year. Of course, in reality, the way we humans measure time is an illusion and seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months and years are just labels we have given to periods of time to help us begin to place ourselves within it. Christians believe our God, who made all, is outside of time. However, for us mere mortals, time matters. We have a fixed amount of it and the jump from 2021 into 2022 is significant because for most of us oldies our personal clocks are ticking down. What will we do with 2022?

The last twelve months have been rough for many people. It seems a lifetime ago when I watched the news of the COVID outbreak in China, blissfully unaware of how much this terrible virus would impact all our lives, the terrible death toll, the economic damage, the damage to our mental health and our relationships. Sometimes it feels a bit like we are all living in some sort of science fiction film, only one which doesn't end.

Many of you will know I used to be a police officer. One of the forces I served with was Surrey Police and its proximity to two major airports necessitated all its officers spending time training for major incidents. Such incidents in general would be classed as anything from a plane crash to a flood or something like the Grenfell Tower tragedy. Part of this training involves planning for the psychological trauma which such events inflict, accepting this trauma will occur is part of dealing with it. Knowing what you or others are going through is related to that which you have been a part of. However, one of the key elements accepted in major incident training is there is a defined end to the active phase of the incident. This end allows an assessment of the holistic damage to individuals from physical to mental health and the implementation of strategies to deal with that.

COVID is a bit like a slowly unfolding major incident, only one which doesn't seem to have a defined end, not yet anyway. The PM first started talking about profound effects on social gatherings on the 16th of March 2020, we endured a COVID Christmas in 2020 and narrowly escaped one this year. COVID is still firmly a part of our everyday lives and looks like it will be for some time. However, we need to recognise the trauma for many is there, damage already done and still being inflicted. It can be manifested in both obvious ways and in more insidious forms, from our mood to our relationships.

The true outcome, the true cost, is hard to judge as no country has ever been through this before, so we are all learning but I fear one result is a new sort of pessimism creeping into many of our conversations. This is hardly surprising given what we have all experienced. I am a bit of a cynic myself, working on the frontline of policing can do that to the most optimistic of people but I recognise it can be a dangerous trait. I hear it now increasingly in conversations about what 2022 might bring.

It is easy to feel apprehensive, anxious, even fearful of what the future may hold. But the thing is, the future is ours, it belongs to all of us, we get a chance to shape it. Tragedies and struggles will always occur no matter what we do but we get to choose how we react. Even in the depths of lockdown we got to choose how we would treat it, treat others; would we think only of ourselves, or would we reach out in any way we could to friend, family or stranger alike to light a candle in a dark time.

I do not know what 2022 will hold, there will probably be some dark times, tough decisions, struggle and certainly suffering but we can choose to accept that and look for the positive and be forces for the good, the beautiful, the hope filled.

In this way 2022 is no different to any other year. History is determined by people who looked forward and decided how to shape the future. Contrary to popular belief, it is not the politicians, movie stars or social media influencers who make history, it is the millions of ordinary people like you and me who, in billions of tiny ways, decide to make the world a better place, right where they are, or who do not. We write the pages of history, second by second, minute by minute, hour by hour. You see, every morning when you arise, you get the choice to start again, that is why they call now, the present, because it is a gift. If you are reading this, God has given you a present, called 2022, how will you use it?

My prayer for you all as we enter into 2022 is yhat you will know who you are and why it matters. You are children of the creator God, who chose to love you before time, because of this you will never not be loved and will never be alone. And, it also means what you do matters, God has a plan for you and through you he wants to change the world.

We would love to see you in our services this year but no matter who you are or what you believe, know our churches are quiet places of peace and sanctuary that are there for you. If it is ever helpful, we would love to pray for you, so just email us your prayer requests.

What is happening at the Victory Hall?

Firstly, here are some facts about our village hall.

- The main hall is 100 years old.
- It is a second hand YMCA hut which arrived by train from Plymouth in 1920.
- It was erected when the population of Whimple was just over 700
- Like other village halls, it opened with a Billiard Room and billiard table we still have them today, one of a few remaining.
- The toilets, kitchen and committee room were added in the mid 20c
- The hall is a registered Charity
- It is managed solely by volunteers from the village Trustees
- In 2018 the population of Whimple was said to be around 2300

So, there can be no doubt – Whimple is definitely in need of a better village hall, one that would suit our growing village. There is also no doubt that a small group of volunteers cannot achieve this goal alone. We need the backing and support of the whole community.

My name is Sue Ayres and I recently took over as Chairman of Trustees at the hall. Thanks to the leadership of the previous Chairman, Maria Wallis and the recent centenary fundraising initiative, our village hall is in good health - given its age. Many thanks go to those who made a valued contribution. That said, time has come to look to the long term future of the hall and to undertake a major overhaul. We already have available funds of over £100,000 but we need to more than double that figure to make the hall fit for our changing community – hence our long term plan to raise funds through grants, donations and events. The Open Day, planned on Saturday 2nd April, will give us a chance to tell you what will be happening over the next 3-5 years and beyond. Please come and support us – we cannot do it alone.

In the meantime, to bring us up to date and in- line with other village halls, Rob Davis is leading an exciting new project to replace our existing Audio-Visual Systems. The new systems aim to provide everything needed to support our hall users and their various activities – from talks, fitness classes, film shows, music events, school assemblies, parties – to larger theatrical events and more. The benefits to our village will be enormous. The project is in the very early stages and Rob is looking at funding options to cover some of the cost – so fingers crossed everything goes to plan.

Defibrillators in Whimple

There are now two defibrillators in Whimple. The one provided by Whimple Parish Council is kept in a box in the porch of the Victory Hall and the other is housed in the hallway of the pavilion building at the Cricket Club.

Although the Cricket Club defibrillator is indoors, it can be accessed using a key kept in a keylock box on the back door. The code to this has been given to the Ambulance Service. Access is easier when the pavilion is unlocked, but the defibrillator can be available even when it is locked.

If you think you may need a defibrillator, ring 999 and ask for the Ambulance Service.

Once they are satisfied that the machine can help, they will tell you what to do next. An ambulance will be dispatched at the same time so going to fetch the defibrillator will not delay specialist medical help. The defibrillators are easy to use. Step by step audible instructions are given by the machine once it has been switched on.

After it has been used it is important that you let the Defibrillator Co-ordinator know so that arrangements are made to ready it for use again.

No one can claim, as the New Year develops, that news across the UK is not uneventful. It seems to go against the grain, that conversation in shops, pubs and work places are not local issues, but nation issues. Energy bills going up, national insurance going up, virtually six million people waiting for operations in the NHS, plus the staff shortages across various sectors of the economy, including care. In addition, the events that happened during the covid lockdowns at No 10.

In dealing with people, across all aspects of society, it is vitally important to be honest, have integrity and be trustworthy and explain things as they are. POW+R Group have always endeavoured to bring news of items that look like they will affect life in our village. Also, what we as a group are trying to do about these issues.

New Fountain Inn Application 20/2481/FUL

We have delivered a number of documents to East Devon District Council vehemently opposing the above development with robust and sound planning grounds. The application is now the subject of a non-determination appeal, which is to be heard by the Planning Inspectorate under the Informal Hearing (virtual) process; with a provisional date of 15th February 2022. The application was eventually refused on the 22nd December 2021, with some positive action by our District Councillor, Richard Lawrence. It was considered that there was a fundamental conflict between the proposal, the evidence and local and national planning policy.

Cranbrook Development Plan

This has been on the POW+R Group radar since it was founded in April 2019. POW+R Group was advised on the 17th January that the Cranbrook Plan has reached the proposed main modification stage of plan making. This means that in conjunction with the independent Planning Inspector, and following a direction from her, a schedule of changes has been prepared. These represent potential changes to the submitted plan and follow lengthy public examination sessions where the Inspector has heard evidence from a wide range of local people and organisations.

There is a six week window to make observations to EDDC, ending on Monday 28th February 2022. Further information is on the EDDC Website. POW+R Group made specific responses to all 19 'matters'. Cranbrook Town centre is still a grassy field after over 10 years that Cranbrook has been in existence.

Whimple Neighbourhood Plan

POW&R Group are now pulling together with the Parish Council, making the preparations necessary for the first Parish Consultation.

The principal consultations will be by a questionnaire to each resident on the electoral roll within the parish. We appreciate there was a consultation in 2018, but there have been significant changes affecting our village since then, such as plans for Cranbrook expansion and changes in planning policy both nationally and at district level.

This is a vitally important document as it sets out local planning policies that will form part of the wider development plan and be used in determining planning applications and other local policies. The Whimple NP Team aims to make this consultation as open and inclusive as possible, including every citizen of the parish and the business community, government bodies, national and regional organisations and statutory authorities. We aim to ensure that the analysis of the information reflects the general views of the village and participants comments. The desire that the cumulative evidence is: robust, honest, transparent and fair, to support the choices made by local people and the approach taken. The evidence will show succinctly the intention and rationale of the policies within the draft Neighbourhood Plan.

It is YOUR feedback that will determine the issues you have regarding the shape of the village of Whimple for the next 30 years - your feedback is important in the creation of the Whimple Neighbourhood Plan. It will also lead to formulating an appraisal of the housing options, infrastructure, transport, education and the built and natural environment. The questionnaire is very detailed but this information is needed as evidence from the residents of the parish of their desires, needs and aspirations.

The questionnaire will be sent to each address in the Parish, as well as on-line. This will be supported by a weekend consultation in the Victory Hall on the 12th and 13th February 2022 (Saturday 10.00 am– 2.00 pm and Sunday 1.00 pm – 4.00 pm). Signs will be displayed around the village with more details. The key theme to this event, as it is near Valentine's Day, is 'WE LOVE WHIMPLE'. The responses will be evaluated by the autumn of 2022 and a draft Neighbourhood Plan will go out for any comments. It will then be revised and, in theory, gain agreement by EDDC to go out to a parish referendum. It is anticipated that this will be by the 1st March 2023. The final 'made' Plan will be a legal document that will stand in its own right and have 'weight' in the planning process.

If you want to be part of the process to 'Protect our Whimple and Rockbeare' we would love to hear from you! The Neighbourhood Plan will be achieved by: ambition, determination and cooperation.

We wish all villagers well, good health and contentment, and let's get the NP show on the road.

Just Ten Questions .

Over the past two years, whether we like it or not, we have all become concerned about our respiratory health. This bodily function that most of us rarely thought about has become a daily topic of conversation and sadly many people have suffered from breathing difficulties and chronic conditions. So, not an interview in this edition but rather ten interesting questions about breathing.

1. Why do I need to learn how to breathe? I've been breathing my whole life.

According to James Nestor in his Sunday Times best-selling book (see end of article) * - 'No matter what we eat, how much exercise, how resilient our genes are, how young, skinny, or wise we are - none of it will matter unless we breathe correctly. Researchers have found the missing pillar in our health is BREATH. It all starts here'

2. How many breaths do I take?

By the law of averages, you will take approximately 670 million breaths in your lifetime. Approximately 20,000 breaths on average per day. Perhaps when reading a typical length fictional book, you will take about 10,000 breaths. Medically 'normal' breathing in modern times is between 12-20 breaths a minute with an average intake of 0.5L per breath (much more frequent breathing than our ancestors).

3. Did our ancestors breathe as we do?

Yes and..... No. Early mammals grew noses to warm and purify the air, throats that guided air into the lungs, and alveoli (a network of sacs) that remove oxygen from the atmosphere and transfer it into the blood. This ability to breathe efficiently whether fast or slow, consciously or unconsciously enabled our ancestors to hunt, catch prey, escape predators etc. However, their shapes of nose, jaw and mouth were quite different to ours. About 1.5 million years ago our respiratory pathways began to change. For example, in colder climates noses grew narrower and longer to heat up air more efficiently. Wider and flatter noses developed in warmer climates as this was better for inhaling hot or humid air. As speech developed, the larynx sank, lips became smaller, the tongue slipped further down the throat. Weirdly all these adaptations that allowed homo sapiens to survive meant that it would make it much harder for them to breathe.

4. How does this affect us all today?

Scientific research has shown that the way we breathe has got noticeably worse, particularly since the industrial revolution. It suggests that ninety percent of us are breathing incorrectly and either causing or aggravating a host of chronic diseases! It is estimated that forty percent of today's population suffer from chronic nasal obstruction, and around fifty percent are habitual mouth-breathers.

5. What kinds of health problems are we encountering?

Modern day respiratory problems include – snoring, sleep apnoea, asthma, anxiety, attention deficiency, psoriasis, hyperactivity disorder, inflammation, nasal polyps etc.

..... on Breathing

6. Aren't snoring and sleep apnoea quite normal, especially as we get older?

No. It comes from poor breathing habits. However, we can retrain ourselves to breathe through the nose at night time.

This is good news as it means our bodies will lose less water, the pituitary gland that controls important hormones will work more efficiently, and we can even improve mental functions and concentration.

7. Why is our nose so important?

The nose is crucial because it clears air, heats and moistens it. But you probably didn't know that the nasal tissues are also involved with the triggering of chemicals and hormones that lower blood pressure and ease digestion. A woman's menstrual cycle responds to nasal functions, so too do our heart rate, blood vessels in our toes, and even how we store memories!!

'Few of us even consider how the nostrils of every living person pulse to their own rhythm, opening and closing like a flower in response to our moods, mental states, and perhaps even the sun and the moon' James Nestor.

8. Is it good to exhale fully?

Absolutely. But many of us don't exhale to our full capacity. By learning to extend our exhalations we move the diaphragm (a large muscle beneath our lungs at the base of the rib cage) up and down a bit more, allowing air to move freely out of our lungs before we next inhale. Trained singers and athletes improve their performance this way, but it is also very beneficial for asthmatics and emphysemics.

9. What can we do to improve our breathing?

There are so many breathing exercises and a host of suggestions posted on the internet, in publications, on social media etc. This can be confusing, especially if it is something that we haven't really bothered about in the past. But there are some simple things to try -

- <u>Breathe through your nose rather than your mouth whenever possible.</u> inhaling through the nose forces air against the tissues at the back of the throat, making airways wider. These tissues and muscles get 'toned' and therefore breathing is easier.
- <u>Concentrate on just one fluid movement from inhale to exhale</u> to help increase energy and focus the mind.
- <u>Breathe less</u> This doesn't mean breathe slower, but rather to take fewer inhales and exhales in a smaller volume. Even for just a few minutes a day, this can increase our endurance, improve cardiovascular function and boost muscle mass. It helps our bodies perform at peak capacity.
- <u>Don't hold your breath when working</u> This is particularly relevant to those of us on phones, computers, tablets etc. When in a state of perpetual distraction e.g. when using devices, we often hold our breath for 30 seconds or longer as well as shallow breathe erratically. Steady breathing is much better for us when we are doing sedentary tasks.

10. Are there simple exercises to try? **

There are many, for example in yoga practice, or singing training. But this simple <u>Coherent Breathing</u> exercise is a good starter. It is calming which helps the heart, lungs and circulation to work efficiently

- Sit up straight, relax shoulders and belly. Exhale
- Inhale softly for about $5\frac{1}{2}$ seconds, letting the belly expand as air fills up the lungs
- Without pausing, exhale softly for 5½ seconds, bringing the belly in as the lungs empty (Each breath feeling like a circle)
- Repeat at least TEN times, or more if possible

Dr Andrew Weil made this 4 - 7 - 8 Breathing Method popular. It promotes deep relaxation and sleep

- Take a breath in and exhale with a 'whoosh' sound
- Close the mouth and inhale through the nose to a count of 4
- Hold for a count of 7
- Exhale completely through the mouth with a 'whoosh' to a count of 8
- Repeat this cycle for at least 4 breaths

**Always consult a medical professional if you have respiratory concerns, or before trying any practices

* Much of the research and information comes from a fascinating book '*Breath - The New Science of a Lost Art'* by James Nestor. Well worth a read. It will open your eyes (as well as your nostrils!!) Sarah Thackeray






A Window on Whimple's Weather - November/December 2021

Whimple's two weather stations have now made it through their first year! Data is aggregated from Slewton Crescent and Cobden Lane, and live streamed onto the internet:

November – This was a relatively pleasant autumn month, with above average sunshine, mild temperatures until the 21st and mainly dry until the 26th. Pressure rose strongly during week one and temperatures peaked on the 8th with a balmy 15.6°C. A cold front on the 20th ushered in cooler northerly winds and a few night-time frosts. A deep depression (Storm Arwen) came down the North Sea bringing heavy showers and strong north-westerly winds on the 26th and 27th. For the month as a whole, rainfall was well below average with only 18.8mm recorded and total sunshine was about 18% above normal.

December – A much wetter month, especially in the first and last weeks, while from the 11th to the 31st there was almost no sunshine apart from the odd hour here or there! With all the cloud cover, there were only three overnight frosts and generally we were in a very mild south-westerly airflow. Strong winds and rain swept in from the west late on the 7th with Storm Barra, followed by high pressure building for the next two weeks, reaching an unusual high of 1041.2mB on the 17th. An unsettled end to the month, included a very wet Christmas Day afternoon which led to some flooding across the village, as 27.7mm fell in just a few hours. The year then ended with three extremely mild days and nights, saving some pounds on our heating bills, with the very high current costs of energy.

Holiday lets versus local homes, the winners and losers

A recent CPRE report examined the impact of second homes and short-term tourism lets on popular holiday areas, including Devon. The figures are sobering. They show that since 2016 the number of short-term listings in Devon has increased by a whopping 800%. This coincided with a 3% fall in the number of rental homes available between 2016 and 2019. (The figures for the two 'Covid Years' are not yet available so we cannot know for sure that property owners are removing homes from the rental market to benefit from the online holiday-let boom, but we strongly suspect that's the case).

At the risk of stating the obvious, tourism is vital to Devon's economy. Since the coming of the railways all those years ago, businesses across the county have flourished, providing services to the visitors who flocked to the South West to enjoy the beautiful coast and countryside. The growth of the package holiday industry and budget airlines may have badly dented domestic tourism, but the travel restrictions imposed as a result of Covid-19 have boosted holidays at home once again.

The massive downside of this tourism boom is the growing shortage of properties for Devon residents to live in year-round, creating virtual ghost towns during the winter and not just in South Devon's traditional hotspots. In scenic villages in North Devon and Torridge, in the small towns and villages of Dartmoor and Exmoor and right across to East Devon, you'll also find empty home after empty home with a key safe by the front door, waiting for the influx of holidaymakers in the spring.

Online booking sites like Airbnb and Vrbo have made it easier than ever for visitors to book a staycation. They've also created a lucrative opportunity for investors and second homeowners to make more money from their properties by turning them into short-term holiday lets.

We know that the South West economy benefits from the money holidaymakers spend but surely there has to be a limit to the seemingly endless supply of holiday accommodation on offer, especially when it affects the lives of local people and harms the viability of their communities. Buying their own home has long been beyond the reach of many young people and key workers because of high house prices compared to the average local wage. Is it now the case that they'll no longer be able to find a rental home either?

Devon CPRE's evidence-based report in 2018 concluded that more than 60% of new homes being built in the county were not being sold to local buyers. The housing needs of Devon residents are being pushed down the queue while the affluent turn a nice profit. It's completely unsustainable. Local people are often led to believe that new developments will provide affordable homes for local people, but we know only too well that there's a massive gap between the number of affordable homes developers initially promise and what they deliver. People are tired of being duped for profit. Surely, they too deserve to gain something from new growth and development? There's no simple solution to this undeniably grim state of affairs but the key is surely Planning with a capital 'P'. The current system that allows endless greenfield housing developments without meeting local needs for homes - or supporting infrastructure and services like extra school places or GP surgeries - certainly has scope for improvement!

We cannot go back in time, but to make the right decisions for the current situation we need proper and accurate data - and policies that offer sustainable solutions.

Devon CPRE objects to 'flawed proposals' for a 174-acre solar farm on sensitive lowland plains in East Devon

The campaigning local environmental charity Devon CPRE has submitted a comprehensive 16-page objection to East Devon District Council, spelling out why a large solar development at Clyst Hydon should be refused (planning application 21-3120-MFUL). The charity's latest objection to a solar farm in open countryside comes just weeks after it launched a Crowdfunder campaign to fight such applications across Devon - donations to the growing 'battle chest' already total more than $\pm 7,500$. www.crowdfunder.co.uk/devon-cpre

The Clyst Hydon proposal comes hot on the heels of an application for a 69-acre solar farm over five fields at Axminster (Beavor Grange Solar Farm, planning application 21/2992/MFUL). It's expected an application will soon be made for another large solar farm near Whimple (Horton Solar Farm).

In mid-December, Lightrock submitted plans for a 49MW solar power plant in open countryside next to Peradon Farm at Clyst Hydon. Devon CPRE says the scale of the solar array and its infrastructure would harm the landscape and environment for the whole of its 40-year lifespan, while also removing seventeen pasture and arable fields from food production.

In its detailed objection to EDDC, Devon CPRE says the Planning Statement and documents submitted in support of the application contain many unsubstantiated assertions and inconsistencies. For example, there's no evidence to support the claim that the solar farm would power approximately 15,000 homes and offset approximately 21,000 te of CO₂ emissions per year, nor is there a proper ecological impact assessment.

The proposed solar farm at Clyst Hydon would include:

- 76,032 solar panels the total length of the arrays is about 43km/26 miles
- 21 inverters in large industrial containers
- 1 substation measuring 50m x 70m
- 12.2km / over 10 miles of two-metre-high security fencing
- more than 130 CCTV cameras
- about 3.7km / 2.3 miles of tracks made of nearly 4,000m³ of stone.


Devon CPRE energy spokesperson Dr Phillip Bratby says, "This proposal would result in the industrialisation of 174 acres of farmland extending about one mile from north to south and 1.3 miles from east to west.

Robust information must be provided before such an important planning decision can be made, one that will affect the landscape and the environment for decades.

"The applicant has not calculated the CO₂ emissions directly and indirectly produced by the solar farm (its carbon footprint). These include the CO₂ emissions produced during the mining, processing, refining, manufacture and transport of all major components and the construction, maintenance, decommissioning and disposal of all components. All these factors must be calculated as part of a *whole life carbon assessment.*"

Paytherden residents have set up a community campaign page, Paytherden Solar Grass Not Glass paytherden.co.uk

Devon CPRE Director Penny Mills says, "We are a small, independent charity fighting these solar farms application by application and they are coming thick and fast across the county. In East Devon alone, we are facing the prospect of three new ones - two currently in the pipeline at Clyst Hydon and Axminster - and one expected to be submitted soon near Whimple. Across the whole of Devon we are losing thousands of acres of farmland that we need for food production, a far better use of our land in this country than inefficient solar panels. 


On 12th April we have John Lowe speaking about 'the boys' Homeward Bound. Intriguing.




Happy New Year! I still find it hard to believe that it is 2022.
