Most of you will have heard that we have put the shop on the market. We have worked really hard for five years and we're pleased with how kind the village has been to us. The whole enterprise takes up so much time - not just the time the shop is open but the admin time required means we have very little spare time and we would like to spend more time with our family and doing other things.

We have been told it is likely to take a couple of years to find a buyer and complete, but even if we found a buyer immediately it would take six months, so we won't be going anywhere very quickly and as we are selling as a going concern, we assume new owners will keep things as they are for a while.

We had a problem with our bread supplier and we are now on a fixed order to help him. We have increased the order as we kept running out very early, but if you want to order any bread we need to get the order to him before 2.00pm so please contact us as early as possible.

We have had some bread brought back because it wasn't very fresh. Please don't hesitate to bring anything back to the shop if it is not up to standard. We would rather know about a problem and try to address any issues. Everyone makes mistakes but if there is a pattern with a problem it is easier to sort it out so if it is just that you don't like certain products or would like us to try stocking something different, please let us know and if we will do our best to help.

We have, for a while, stocked a range of gluten free and vegan goods. From ingredients to treats there should be something for everyone. As well as these choices we continue to try to cut waste and buying fresh fruit and veg avoids the plastics you get in many supermarkets and you can buy as much or as little as you need so avoiding waste at home. If you need any specific orders of fruit and veg we just need to know the day before to order them in.

Post Office

We have had enquiries about our office code for people making on-line enquiries with the Post Office. Our code is 5885191 and if you use this in your application we receive a credit. We have limited paperwork in branch to help with Post Office products but we can make requests for you to be contacted by a specialist about financial and savings products, insurance, mortgages, travel cards and home telephone and broadband. We would just need to take some details from you in branch.

If you are holidaying abroad and need currency, we stock Euro's but can order in other currencies. If you order before 1.00pm most days it should be delivered before 1.00pm the next day (Friday, Sat and Sun excluded). If you are ordering over £400 worth of currency you may get a better rate online. You can still have it delivered to our branch and again if you order before 1.00pm it should be there by 1.00pm next day.

We are always happy to give you current rates and any advice you require on posting parcels. As a general rule with parcels, the Post Office is very competitive on prices for parcels under 2kg and if you are regularly sending parcels over this weight you can benefit from a 15% saving on every transaction with Parcelforce when you become a member with them.



Tales of Whimple

"Heigh-ho! It's off to work we go.....aged eight" Whimple Parish Apprenticeship Register 1803-1843

Children who could not be cared for by their own family because they had no parents or came from a poor family, were a problem to the Poor Law administrators of a Parish. Such children frequently lacked any means of support and were too young to earn their own living. The Poor Law Act of 1597 gave Overseers of the Poor and Churchwardens the power to set these children to work, and so a large number of the children, known as pauper children, were put out as apprentices by parish officers.

The normal starting age of Parish apprenticeships was eight until 1815 and nine from 1818. Boys were invariably apprenticed until age 21 and girls to 21 or marriage if earlier. When a Parish wanted to bind a poor child, the parishioner they had chosen as master or mistress had to take the boy or girl or pay a fine to be excused. Generally, the Parish paid any apprenticeship fee and two copies of the Apprenticeship Indenture were written - one was usually kept in the Parish Chest, and the other by the master or mistress until the apprenticeship ended, when it was presented to the apprentice.

The obligation to take apprentices rested on owners of all large properties or land owners. Records show that in Whimple nearly all apprenticeships were to farmers or gentry. This meant the apprentices carried out unpaid farm or house work in return for maintenance. There were a few exceptions to those taking apprentices, such as two Innkeepers, a Topsham Limeburner (who owned property in the Whimple Parish), a tailor, two butchers (perhaps also farmers since they held property), the Rector, two 'widows' and a baker, who took an apprentice by consent not obligation.

Parents were obliged to allow children to be apprenticed by the Parish if they received Poor Relief and it relieved them of the maintenance until their children reached the age to support themselves. It also debarred poor children from schooling beyond age eight or nine but in this age they probably would not have received any further education anyway.

The Whimple Parish Apprenticeship Register appears to show the last apprentice completed his term in 1850. The practice became rare from 1837. Between 1803 and 1836, 117 children in the Parish of Whimple were apprenticed. A fifth of this total – 23 in all – came from two families and four other families accounted for 25 between them.

Today, the idea of sending such young children away from home to work seems incomprehensible but in 1893 one elderly Whimple lady, who was apprenticed at the age of seven, spoke highly of the advantages of the system and the kindnesses she met with in her childhood.

TALE VALLEY CHOIR

Sunday 1st July. St Mary's Church Whimple

But a stone's throw from Tale Valley on the afternoon of the 1st July, this relatively recently formed choir delighted the not insubstantial audience in the church. Emma Palmer, the founder and leader and conductor of the choir said at the outset. "It's refreshing to have an audience that outnumbers the choir"; the suggestion being that word has got around.

The programme of the event said the choir tackles 'some very eclectic music with great humour'. Well I guess that must be true. They all (well most, anyway!) sang with gusto (apart from the quiet bits) with smiles on their faces but you don't often hear the word 'very' before 'eclectic'. It seems entirely apposite.

I should confess here that I am a groupie, with a spouse in the choir and, because of that, I know how much work goes into each performance; no laurel resting for them. (I do think however that I would go along spouslessly to performances as joe public). On this occasion they, singing in five part harmony (sometimes eight), were required to learn by heart nineteen new songs. About a year ago the choristers (singers, chanteurs....? they will probably answer to most descriptions) acquired uniforms of coloured shirts. Since then, suitably zapped up, they are no longer allowed to hold any music or words in front of them at performance. The benefit is obvious to the audience with the whole choir projecting their voices horizontally.

In the very short time of three years, the choir has given a number of performances in Talaton, Payhembury, Feniton and even London, to name a few. The songs are new to the choir each time. No erstwhile repertoire with a couple of new ones for them. Emma drives them hard and they love it; home rehearsals incorporate a few expletives maybe – but they pay off.

On this particular Sunday we had a few 'themes' kicking off with drink: Gin and Tonic, Come Landlord Fill the Flowing Bowl, Drink to Me Only, Chanson Bachiques ('drinking song' for the non-multilingual).

Later, not content with French we were treated to Brollopsvisa (a Swedish wedding song sung in Swedish) linguistically approved by some Swedish members of the audience, then Zulu - Shona Malanga, Irish - St Patrick, spirituals, pirate songs (You Can't Hold a Good Man Down), Purcell (one about cakes for the lady and another about hay mow'd) and The First Time Ever, made famous by Roberta Flack (but in fact written in 1957 by Ewan MacColl for Peggy Seeger).

There was American, Arctic and Shetlands. Oh and jazz...the list goes on. I have a complaint that there was no Italian, but maybe next time!

So, one cannot fail to be impressed by this choir with its range of music, tongues and continents. The programme's description of 'very eclectic' seems very (!) apt.

Punters were afforded an additional treat on this day. Hannah Bown, a young, composer and classically trained soloist sang two sets of songs: Song to the Moon (Dvorak), The Sun Whose Rays (Gilbert and Sullivan), Lover come Back to Me (1928 from the Broadway show 'The New Moon' (Sigmund Romberg and Oscar Hamilton II) Hannah finished with On My Lips Every Kiss is Like Wine (from Giuditta by Franz Lehar).

Hannah has a First in Applied Music, has sung at many important venues including the Edinburgh festival and the Proms. Her accomplishments are many; she continues to sing, study and teach.

Hannah was accompanied on the piano by John Draisey an accomplished choirmaster, organist, conductor and singer, are highly active in and around Exeter.

Whimple folk will know how Emma Palmer 'works' tirelessly for music in the village (she never makes it look like work) - but other Devon villages are not spared her contribution either. Whatever she does, and certainly with this choir, you are left with the feeling (and maybe this choir experiences this feeling too) that this is her main (and only) project and one suspects that this would apply to all her choirs and singing groups.

You have had my view but it was well received by all. Other members of the audience were heard to say: "It brought tears to my eye" (only one eye?) and "Exquisite".

We were granted an encore and probably could have pushed for more but the choir needed a rest and we all wanted a drink.

If you haven't heard the 'TVC' yet you should go along to a performance.

You will be in for a feast that can be professional, yes but certainly engaging and generally a lot of fun. Emma is lethal with a tuning fork.





A massive "Thank You" to everyone who has supported our dental volunteering trip to Cambodia.

Your generosity enabled us to provide toothbrushes, materials, manpower and support for outreach dental clinics in rural farming communities and schools. The smiles of gratitude from adults and children said everything.

Freya and I had an emotional and rewarding two week experience, working in very different circumstances from British dental surgeries!

For our first outreach we made our way to Prey Veng Province, three hours to the East of Phnom Penh, working with the charity One-2-One. We had a team of five trainee Cambodian Dentists working as translators/ decontamination assistants/ clinicians, four Dundee 4th year dental students, four dental nurses, Freya, Isabelle and Jac as our non dental oral health instructors, a trained Cambodian dentist, our team leader Simon, and myself.

Our task for five days was to screen, relieve pain, promote prevention and give oral hyglene and diet advice to a Junior High School of around 650 pupils. The charity had been invited to attend by the three star general of the Cambodian People's Party.

We were warmly greeted, although their mission was different to our charity, as a political electioneering for votes (Polling 29th July 2018), they had offered free dental treatment to the community. On our first day we didn't get our heads above the parapet and we were swamped with adult patients seeking treatment.

Everyone needed something, so we set our oral health team going through the school classes, identifying children in pain, and starting the education programme, whilst the dental staff fought the fire, in the makeshift clinic in a classroom.

The second day, we arrived at 7.30am to see a snaking queue of police, teachers and adults with young children, all waiting along with the smiling General. Our hearts sank -the children were not their priority, but votes!

Again our oral health team did a sterling job, and we were now running an efficient clinic together, so by lunchtime managed to have some free space to see the children in pain. One of our support workers had identified a girl in need of treatment, who was psychologically nervous and always held her hand to her mouth due to her insecurity and pain. Tara, one of our Dundee dental students set to work, aided by Simon our team leader, and a miraculous transformation occurred. She ended up being an ambassador, encouraging the children in pain to attend our clinic, finally always grinning, and bringing us Cambodian sweet delicacies to try.

In the final 3 days, we saw the majority of the school for oral health education and fluoride toothpaste toothbrushing, alongside community adults and children in the clinic. It was sad to see the enormous amount of dental decay, with the majority having over 9 teeth affected, many just abscessed roots in the jaw remaining, and all under the age of 16. It was obvious that we couldn't change everything here and much damage had already been done. To invoke change, we would need to see parents and younger children, to enable us to be more effective at preventing disease. As it was, we had brought a service to a poorly paid farming community, miles from a dentist and for free.

On our last evening before we returned to the city, we had a BBQ laid on by our Cambodian Dental Trainees. A lovely evening shared with our new colleagues at the end of a tiring, but successful week, even sampling blood cockles, snails, and marinated beef. A bit of dancing freestyle followed!

On Saturday morning, we rose early to go to the charity HQ to help with food preparation. Five days a week, in three slums around the city, this Christian charity provides meals at lunchtime for children. It costs around \$100 to feed around 100 of them. In our Dentaid project we all felt we wanted to contribute another day to helping these underpriviledged children, whose families are being gradually driven out by the reconstruction of the city. No provision has been made for their relocation in housing and their future is bleak. Although these children had little apart from the clothes on their back, they were rich in smiles, happiness and affection for each other.

From the slums, we had an afternoon visiting the Choeung Ek Killing Fields, tranquil and serene, despite the atrocities that occurred both there and the other 300 or so killing fields across Cambodia. We then followed on to the Tuol Sleng Genocide museum, which was equally heartbreaking.

The evening was very quiet and reflective - we both felt physically and emotionally challenged at the end of our first week.

Our next destination, Kampong Cham, was three hours north of Phnom Penh on the Mekong River.

Dr Nhep (a gentle petite lady in her 60's) provides outreach with her Cambodian dental students. Facilities here were limited - just a folding chair, fixed with a wooden cross and using a sponge as a headrest.

We saw workers and community members, relieving their pain and giving diet and oral hygiene instruction. They were so gracious and respectful. It was really amazing to observe their tenacity, when they had obviously suffered pain for months.

The following day the clinic moved to an infant school, where we managed to see around 170 child patients and the health team helped with brushing and fluoridated their teeth.

A long, hot drive next to our final destination, Siem Reap, where we liaised with a new charity 'See Beyond Borders' who work in schools around the area, providing running water, health education and teaching support to the school staff.

Here we engaged with teachers, community leaders, parents and children, offering a handwashing forum, toothbrush instruction with fluoride toothpaste and diet advice to reduce the frequency of sugary snacks and drinks.

The parents seemed empowered to help their children and are positively making a difference in this poor district to their lives and their families.

We saw some incredible sights on this trip, finishing the final day with the Temples of Angkor, but it is the smiles, the humour and humility, being accepted by this incredible nation of people that has been so destroyed that will stay with us.

Positivity, a truly unforgettable experience that Freya and I will never forget, and, hopefully, a legacy for change in the future.



Life skills

On Tuesday the 3rd July Year 6s went to the Donkey Sanctuary to do Life skills, which involved learning about the Coast Guard, the Fire Crew and the Online Safety Security

- 1) The Coast Guards: The Coast Guards have a very important job to look out for danger in the sea. They have 3 different types of flags the first one is the red one for danger, so do not to swim surf in the sea past the flag, it means that there might be a rip-current and it's dangerous to swim. The next flag is a green one that means it's safe to swim but not safe to go surfing or sailing. Lastly the white and black flag which means it's safe to surf but not safe to swim.
- 2) The Fire Crew: The fire crew has an important job for saving people's lives in many things like car accidents, fires and they even save animals. They showed us how to test our smoke alarms at home by pressing the button on it which takes no longer than ten seconds.
