

FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

Mountain gorses shining blossoms Do you teach us to be glad When no summer can be had Blooming in our inward bosoms? Ye who God preserveth still Set as lights upon a hill Tokens of the Wintry earth

This is the kind of weather when we need a good book, some soothing music to listen to and a good fire. It is only sunny days that make for memorable and sometimes unexpected sights when the eye is taken by surprise. I think particularly of the golden flowers of the gorse. I remember a day in February 1988 when Jack was so ill on a terribly windy and wet early morning when I found a bunch of golden gorse smelling sweetly by the front door. It was put there by Betty Williams from the Post Office with a little note simply saying 'Thinking of you'. Since then I always think of those golden fragrant blooms as a message of hope. Throughout Britain you will find the prickly evergreen ever -blooming shrub known as gorse, furze or whin in hedgerows, on commons and in poor soil at any time of the year. Shakespeare in one of his poems said 'When gorse is out of bloom kissing is out of season'.

Another Spring flower which has a special place in my garden and affection is the snowdrop. The little snowdrops are a very welcome sight each year in February/March, their nodding white flowers serving as a promise that the floral year in the garden is about to begin. It has long been a symbol of hope. The legend has it that Eve was weeping in her barren garden after the Fall of Man when an angel comforted her by blowing on to a snowflake and turning it into a snowdrop. A flower bloomed and hope was born.



Early monks travelling back and forth to Rome brought the flower to England and it has become naturalised, originally near monasteries. It also became a church flower and on Candlemass, 2nd February, the image of the Virgin Mary was taken down and snowdrops were spread in its place. In this way the snowdrops earned the common name of Maids of February, Candlemass bells and Mary's Tapers. However, their presence in churchyards gave them an unlucky reputation. Even today, I have met village people who will not take snowdrops indoors. As I am not superstitious, I just don't take notice of such sayings. I vividly remember taking a Bunch of snowdrops to put in the Lady Chapel at Ottery St Mary Church for Candlemass, when I was greeted at the door by someone who said it was unlucky. Fortunately, the vicar, Prebendary Peter McGee, was there and I never forget his words – 'This is not a pagan temple but the House of our Lord and these flowers are part of his creation'.

In February there are quite a number of festivals apart from Candelmass. Saint Valentine's Day Feast of the martyred bishop of Terni in Rome. Sending cards, flowers and messages of love to loved ones is only a recent introduction. Originally in Roman times the 15th February was celebrated and called Lupercalia. It was celebrated in Lupercal cave where Remus and Romulus were supposed to have been found suckling the wolf – lupus. That is the origin of the city of Rome.


Then there is Shrove Tuesday or Mardi Gras or Pancake Day. It has been the custom for centuries to eat rich things before the long Lenten Fast. 'A Feast before a Fast', which lasts from the end of February until Easter on the 11th April this year. Have you ever tried to make cob-nut pancakes? – quite delicious, and a novel way to bring a bit of zest into your Shrove Tuesday celebrations:-

For 12 pancakes, take:-

2 eggs, 225ml/8fl. oz. water & milk mixed, a pinch of salt, 110gr/4oz. plain flour (sifted), 10gr/half an oz. castor sugar, 25gr/1oz. melted butter, 50gr/2oz. cob nuts.

Liquidise the eggs, milk & water, salt. Add the flour, sugar and butter and liquidise for another minute or so. Stand in a cold place, covered, for two hours. Thin out with a little milk if necessary. Cut the nuts very finely and add to the batter with the sugar. Have a hot pancake pan ready, and make nice thin pancakes. Serve hot with cream and sugar.

Very yummy!



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
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NEED A GRANT?

THREE GENTLEMEN OF WHIMPLE.....

A cautionary travellers' tale of the hazards of mixing football at Exeter City (The Grecians) with South West Trains and a tipple or several along the way

20.51 hours - lively debate is well in progress when the train reaches the next stop at Feniton. A decision has rapidly been reached to operate Plan B – to enlist the taxi services of the good wife of one of the party. Probably easier for her to find the Station at Honiton rather than Feniton. While the discussion rages, the train doors open at Feniton. There, smiling broadly under his official cap, is the unmistakeable figure of Alex Spry. Not a bare knee in sight. Rather bemused, he asks our travellers what they are doing on the train at Feniton, noisily berating a South West Trains official. The tale to date is rapidly repeated, probably now with some embroidery. "But we're not getting off here either". Train doors close. Alex is still smiling, but with a confused expression. Train moves on to Honiton, where disembarkation is finally achieved.

My records now span 33 years of weather statistics in Whimple. I think it has been agreed that 2003 was a very dry year in most parts of the UK. I have to go back to 1981 (28.49 inches) to find a drier year.

We have lived in this garden for over 45 years and have a pond of some 90 yards circumference with a central island. There was no visible water in the pond for eleven weeks. We cannot remember it completely drying up since we have been here, until this year.

My apologies to those familiar with metrication - age has wearied some of us!

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
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WHIMPLE HISTORY SOCIETY

FRED FINCH

We were saddened to learn of the death in December, of Fred Finch, formerly of Gateshayes Cottages. Fred was well known in the village, and one of our valued delivery team for a number of years. His daughter, Nikki, wrote a wonderful tribute to Fred for the funeral – below is an extract of the content.

"Fred was born in Ashington, in Sussex on 14th May 1922, to proud farming parents. He became a member of the Steyning Young Farmers, and entered many local shows with his father's bulls from the farm, winning many rosettes.

During the war, being a farmer, Fred was exempt from being called up, and so, as part of his duty, he served with the local fire service. He had a good voice, and also played the organ in Ashington Chapel. He met and married Julie in Betchworth, and then bought a farm at Beaworthy, where he farmed for 10 years, raising his young family of Nikki, John and Andrew. He sold the farm in 1969 and then took a herdsman's job at Yellands, where he worked until the early 1980's. He then became self employed, doing relief milking for local farmers. At 65 he decided to cut down on the relief milking and devote some more time to his hobbies of gardening, photography, amateur dramatics and singing. He made 2 trips to Canada to visit his niece and nephew, once going down through to San Francisco in a camper van.

In 1997, he took everyone by surprise by taking a trip to Pakistan climbing the Hindu Kush for Mencap. He raised between £2000-£3000, and was very proud of this achievement.

Fred became ill shortly after celebrating his 80th birthday, and spent his last 12 months at Aphin House in Exeter, where he was a popular resident."

We extend our sympathy to Fred's family at this time, but also give thanks for such a full and energetic life, and his wonderful contributions to the community.

Fair point – but Tin Tak, beware if you come to the Whimple panto!!

Torquil's co-writer was Trish Lenehan, who has also starred with the Whimpletons. Trish was great as Aladdin, and rolled her eyes constantly in support of her slow-witted character. Trish also had the 'luvvies challenge' of lying unconscious front stage for some 10 minutes whilst other business went on around her – and not a movement or breath was seen or heard. No change there, then!

Maddie was there as an assistant to a very sexy Widow Twankey (Darby Allen) and Joss did a sterling job as the lad carrying the boards that announced changes of scenes.





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

EASTER - A TIME OF RESURRECTION

The resurrection of Jesus Christ from the tomb is one of the truths which Christians declare and celebrate at Easter time. But you might well ask, 'What evidence is there that Jesus Christ was raised form the dead'?

Consider the following:


- Jesus' body had disappeared from the tomb. If the women who went to the tomb on Easter Sunday had gone to the wrong tomb the authorities would have quickly pointed out their mistake to them. If the authorities had removed the body they would have subsequently produced it in order to stop the spread of Christianity - they never did. If the disciples removed Jesus' body what possible motive could they have had for preaching that he was alive and being prepared to suffer and die for such a fairy-tale?
- Jesus was seen by many people. The Bible informs us of ten separate occasions when he appeared to different people, at different places.
- The change in the disciples behaviour. Immediately after Jesus died on the cross the disciples were despondent and disillusioned. Yet within a short period of time their actions were totally transformed. Once they had seen the risen Christ they became confident and courageous and fearlessly told everyone that Jesus is alive.
- The practice of 'tomb veneration' was common at the time. But there is no record whatsoever that Jesus' tomb was venerated. Was that because he wasn't there any more?

The evidence for Jesus' resurrection, when considered with an open mind, is undeniable. Indeed, so great is it that Lord Darling, a former Chief Justice of England, once declared there to be "such overwhelming evidence, positive and negative, factual and circumstantial, that no intelligent jury in the world could fail to bring in a verdict that the resurrection story i s true."

You are personally invited to join us as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ at St Mary's church.

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
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WHIMPLE AND DISTRICT VILLAGE PRODUCE ASSOCIATION

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STREET LIGHTING A COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY SAFETY

Good street lighting is a very important feature in community safety, and it is a proven fact that they contribute to community and road safety.

I am sure on many occasions we have all noted that a light or sign was not illuminated as it should, and the next time we pass we again note it is still not working. Devon County Council wants to know when a street light or illuminated road sign is faulty.

If the lamp has failed then the sooner it is repaired the safer we all are in Whimple. The Electric company gets paid for the energy, whether the light or sign is lit or not.

Although the County Council carries out routine checks on street lighting and road signs, they also want the public to help spot any faults and report them quickly.

If anyone notices a light or sign not working please contact the fault line by telephoning 08705 561851 and help to improve local safety. Anyone can report faults.

When calling, the person notifying the fault will be asked for:

- the town/village
- the street/road involved
- the exact location
- the reference number of the street light or illuminated road sign.

There is a reference number on some columns at eye level.

Many of the presents bought at Christmas may have serial numbers on them as a security measure. A reminder that it is good practice to make a note of the serial number and file it away safely. Also don't forget to postcode items, marking pens are readily available at stationers and cost less than £1.00.
