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
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Ed the Ed

A reminder that we stock the food recycling bags, the price of which remains at ± 4.25 for a roll of 52 which represents very good value.



District Councillor's Report

Welcome to the New Year, traditionally a time to look forward to a new and bright future full of hope and cheer so I wish you all a happy and prosperous year in 2014. Personally, I am glad to see the end of 2013 as it has been a year of funerals for me so I look forward to 2014 with some hope.



Pithayes Farm, Whimple:- a Lesson for all Parish Councils.

As you probably know, there have been several planning applications for Solar Farms in the Whimple area this year which have all been approved by the planning committee. However, I have noticed as the year has progressed that there has been a movement in the thinking of the planning committee members against this proliferation of Solar Farms. This movement in thinking appears to have culminated in the rejection of the Pithayes application at the Chairman's delegated meeting at the end of October, meaning that it did not have to go through Planning Committee scrutiny. From the number of queries that I am still receiving about this application it is obvious that not everybody in the ward has heard that it has been rejected, for which I apologise.

Whimple is not yet out of the wood on this one however, because there is always the possibility that the application will go to appeal where our decision could be overturned by the inspector. So watch this space for any updates. What I hope that this planning decision means, in a wider East Devon context, is that it shows that it is possible to challenge the current torrent of solar farm applications.

The Sudden Rush of Housing, Planning Applications in the Ward

Talking to a Talaton resident just before Christmas about the sudden appearance of two separate proposals for quite large housing developments in the village of Talaton, compels me to mention that no hard and fast maximum number has been established for any community in E.D.D.C. by the Local Plan. The numbers established are merely the current minimum that every community must establish. Thus, for Talaton the number five is merely the minimum number that the plan has proposed between now and 2026. Similarly the number twenty is only the minimum.

You may remember that last year the Council asked landowners to indicate parcels of land that they may wish to develop in an attempt to create a bank of possible building land in the individual parishes. At the moment, the N.P.P.F. (the National Planning Policy Framework - whose dominating principle is to encourage and facilitate the development of housing) dominates the local plan and until the Council's new plan has been accepted it will continue to do so (See my comments upon this later). In addition, do remember that the Planning Committee may propose acceptance or rejection of a particular proposal but, in reality, our decisions to reject plans can always be overturned on appeal. Finally, remember that in the second half of 2013 the government has been changing the framework of controls on building by introducing a variety of measures that increase the number of houses being developed at the expense of office accommodation and other categories of non domestic buildings.

The consequence of all these innovations has been that the democratic function of the electors becomes more important in attempting to prevent excessive housing development occurring.

The Experience of Feniton, an example of more than the Minimum Number

An article in the Honiton Pullmans reminds us just how much more than the minimum number the planning process can throw up. The 'super inquiry' into potential housing development at Feniton (where developers are appealing against rejection of their plans to increase the size of the village by 40%) is a grim reminder of how planning can get out of control. This meeting was scheduled to be held at the Bowling Club but as the date has drawn near it has been realised that this is too small to accommodate the numbers of interested residents intending to attend. The new site is going to be the Flybe Training Academy near Exeter Airport, which raises some questions about accessibility as the only transport available will be private car so some villagers may not be able to attend

A Rumour about the possibility of development in railway provision on the Waterloo to Exeter line.

A fellow councillor in conversation with me last week mentioned that he has heard that serious talks are taking place between the County Council, Network Rail and the engineering firm that carries out the bulk of its rail engineering work. The gist of this rumour is that another doubling of the track at the Exeter end of the line is being seriously considered to enhance the number of trains that our line can carry. Remember, this is not official but a very tenuous comment and is not to be treated as a concrete fact yet.

The Local Plan Inquiry

The timetable for the inquiry into the Local Plan has been announced and is available on E.D.D.C's website at www.eastdevon.gov.uk/progofficer where details of the inspection dates and subject matter are laid out. Lasting just under a month the inquiry will start on February the 11th and will cover all aspects of the draft plan which we are all now so familiar with. These include housing, affordable homes, employment, tourism and retail, climate change and the natural environment. In addition, there will be sessions on East Devon's seven towns.

The job of the Inspector will be to consider whether our Local Plan meets the requirements of the 2004 Compulsory Purchase Act as well as with the guidance laid out in the N.P.P.F. Let's hope that this time round the plan is accepted and we can regain some control over the process of planning locally.

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

The remainder of our talks are dedicated to the commemoration of the centenary of the Great War and will support the work being undertaken by the Society and villagers to research the names on our War Memorial, as well as the numerous local and national events being held live and on TV.

On Friday 21st March, following our AGM, members of the committee will present readings and poetry with a WW1 theme.

On Friday 25th April we will host Yvonne Bell, a renowned speaker and authority on all Edwardian matters, and she will entertain us with her talk 'Love and Marriage Edwardian Style'. This is a humorous but well researched look at aspects of life leading up to the War and will be a perfect scene setter for more serious talks to follow.

On Friday 19th September Dr. Anthony Saunders will explain 'The Evolution of Trench Warfare' and help us understand how and why soldiers of both sides lived (and died) and fought in these vast systems that epitomise this terrible episode in history.

On Friday 21st November Lt. Col. Tim Courteney will inform us of the role of our own Devonshire Regiment in WW1. I can assure you that no one has more knowledge and experience in this field and we are privileged that he has agreed to talk to us.

All our talks are held in the Victory Hall and generally start at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome, although there is a small charge of £2.00 to non members to help cover our costs. We do hope that you support the talks which we believe will be both entertaining and informative.

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News from Whimple Stores

Thank you to everyone who supported us over the Christmas period. We hope those who ordered provisions for Christmas Eve found it a nicer experience, to pop into the local shop for a mince pie and everything packed ready for you, than visiting the supermarkets. Some of you do order from us during the week and weekends and we are always happy to do this.

We are delighted that so many of you are enjoying the excellent quality and flavour of the Dartmoor Beef. They did have a problem with the vacuum packer on their burgers but they have assured us this has now been sorted and they will soon be adding lamb to their supply. We keep some frozen joints, etc in the freezer and can order in any special requirements – let us know by Friday for delivery the following Tuesday – meat is vacuum packed for a longer life i.e. beef usually comes to us with a seven day shelf life. Some of you are also enjoying the wonderful fresh fish from Frank Houldin. You can phone him on a Tuesday night 01823 277669 to place an order and he will deliver it to the shop for you to collect on Wednesday.

A delivery from Little Pod is expected soon. They produce an excellent high quality vanilla paste and they are based in Farringdon. A teaspoon of paste gives a great flavour to a Crème Brulee and wonderful black flecks you would expect from a vanilla pod. If you like cooking and use a lot of pods, you may find this a cheaper and easier alternative.

As you can imagine we have been forced to do the majority of our shopping at the shop and we have found this to be beneficial to how we eat and how much we spend. We buy what we need, and no more, and we know many of you like to pop in for a handful of mushrooms or one parsnip. This means that our cost of food has gone down even though some things are obviously more expensive in the shop. Of course, this only works if you have time to pop in every day or so but we have less waste at home from food and packaging.

To avoid too much waste in the shop we try to buy little and often but this sometimes means at the end of the day stocks run low and we did have a few blips over the Christmas period when orders were missed either by ourselves or suppliers. We try to stock a good supply to service what has previously been demanded but sometimes demand fluctuates and we are left with too much or too little. We reduce the price of bread if it has been on the shelf for 2 days but this should still have a good few days freshness as we bag it as soon as it is received. We are much happier to have little on the shelf at the end of the day and if you know you can't get to us until later in the day, feel free to call us on 01404 822316 and we will keep things back for you.

As always feel free to make requests for us to stock items and we will try to source things. We are still working on the Fresh & Green veg box scheme. If are you interested in a weekly or fortnightly box, please let us know. Produce will be local and seasonal costing ± 9 or ± 12 a bag.

Our charity man has collected £8.51 for Movember (donation to be made to Prostate cancer UK) and £31.88 for Whimple Scouts (this includes nearly £15 from the sale of community produce). We haven't yet counted out the December/ January collection for NSPCC.

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NEW APPOINTMENT SYSTEM By Dr Sam Cole

Our appointment system has been operating at maximum capacity for the last few years. We have all been working very hard to provide enough appointments yet we realise that some of you have found it difficult to make an appointment with your own doctor within a reasonable time frame.

As we reported back in the summer we have all been involved in looking at ways to improve your access to our services. Our patient numbers are increasing and our patients' problems are becoming more complex. More work traditionally done at the hospital is being done by your GP or practice nurse. We have tried to take all of this into account as we designed the new appointment system.

Our new system will encourage you to see your own registered GP. This is by far the safest, most effective and efficient way for both patient and doctor. It means that, when you see your own doctor, the appointment will be about you and your current problem rather than being asked to go over your past problems with a doctor who does not know you.

We realise that your own doctor may not always be available. To ensure that you can usually get an appointment with a doctor who knows you (and in some cases will get to know you) our GPs are going to work in teams. Therefore, if your own doctor is unavailable, you can see or speak to another doctor within the same team. Behind the scenes this doctor may already be reviewing your test results, signing your repeat prescriptions and reading your own doctor's post.

For routine, non urgent appointments we would like you to book appointments two to three weeks in advance. This enables us to manage our urgent appointments more effectively.

For times when you need to see a doctor within the next few days, perhaps you are not getting on with your new medicine or you are having a flare up of a problem you have already seen your doctor about, you may be offered a telephone consultation. Your doctor will then be able to deal with your problem over the phone or find you an appointment to see them.

For times when you feel very unwell and need to see a health professional today PLEASE phone our receptionists who will ask you some questions about the nature of your illness. The receptionists will then be able to find the right appointment for you. This may be with our excellent team of nurse practitioners who will be managing most minor illnesses, freeing up the duty doctor to deal with more critical episodes of illness or it may be that the duty doctor will call you back and see you themselves.

As many of you already know there is not much a doctor or nurse can do about viral coughs, colds and sore throats. We would encourage you to self treat your minor illnesses at home. Your pharmacist will always be able to give you advice if you need it.

Our highly skilled, experienced and caring practice nurses, health care assistants and phlebotomists will continue to offer a comprehensive range of services to support your health and well being. We also offer a limited number of 'nurse on the day' appointments for urgent nursing requests.

Our fantastic team of community district nurses are available to treat at home our housebound patients. Please only request a home visit if you are too unwell or frail to come to the surgery. If you think you need a doctor to visit you at home please call the surgery before 11.00am. You can often be more appropriately treated and investigated at the surgery rather than at home. Through the HELP scheme we offer transport to and from your doctors surgery for appointments Please ask the receptionists for more information.

To get ready for the new appointment system during January our GPs will be offering appointments outside their usual availability to clear any backlog of patients who need to be seen.

By changing our system we hope that you and your doctor will be able to return to a more personalised service with your own GP managing their own patients.



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We as humans practice preventative health care for ourselves (cleaning our teeth, taking vitamins) however have you ever thought about preventing disease in your pet? In fact, of the most common ailments suffered by pets, many are very easily preventable with little cost involved. Some common preventable problems include:

Fleas and Worms

Fleas are not only uncomfortable for your pet, but also for you! Fleas rapidly multiply in your house and cause painful bites. Fleas also carry a range of other diseases that affect your pet and can also cause a fatal anaemia in young animals. Regularly treating your pet for fleas with an appropriate medication can save you and your animal a lot of discomfort. REMEMBER - NEVER apply a dog spot-on treatment to your cat, it can be fatal.

Worms can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and malnutrition especially in young puppies. Some worms can cause serious health problems in humans, especially during pregnancy and for young children. Worming your pet every three months with an appropriate medication is recommended.

Tooth decay

We always clean our teeth, but have you ever thought about cleaning your pet's teeth?? Nearly all animals over seven years have some form of tooth decay. This leads to infections and bad breath, and can make heart problems worse. This may result in your pet needing an anaesthetic to remove teeth which can be a very lengthy procedure for an elderly animal. Fortunately cleaning your pet's teeth even weekly can dramatically reduce the risk of tooth decay.

Pyometra (womb infection)/mammary tumours/testicular cancer/ prostate problems.

Animals that are not neutered can get a range of hormone related problems including womb infections, mammary tumours, testicular cancer and prostate problems. Neutering your pet at an early age can reduce the risk of contracting these problems sometimes by 100%. Neutering also prevents unwanted litters, straying, scent marking and aggression.

Infectious diseases

Vaccination against many of the more common fatal diseases (including parvovirus, leptospirosis and kennel cough), is usually annually and is relatively inexpensive.

Many veterinary practices now run schemes that allow you to budget for your preventative health care. This generally involves paying a monthly fee which allows you to pick up all your flea/worm treatment and vaccinations without paying at the time. These schemes usually come with added benefits including discounted neutering/dental care/food and out of hours fees. Visit your veterinary practice today to help promote a happy and healthy life for your pet!

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Changes to charitable giving at St Mary's Whimple

St Mary's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has decided to alter the way in which it gives to the charities it has chosen to support. Rather than sending cheques from PCC funds, the PCC has decided to give to the work of the local, national and international charities it supports in the following ways:

Firstly, the third Sunday Celebration service each month will focus on a particular charity and an offering will be taken at that service to support their work.

Secondly, there will be periodic events (for example, coffee mornings), to raise funds for these specific charities as well as providing opportunities to bring community folk together.

Thirdly, we will continue to invite speakers from these charities to speak at the Men's and Ladies' breakfasts that take place two or three times a year.

The charities that the PCC will seek to support in these ways are:

January: St Petrock's, the Exeter based charity which works with the homeless. St Petrocks also benefits from the proceeds from our village carol singing and the gifts of Harvest produce.

February and March: El Shaddai, which works with street children in India. The PCC has a standing commitment to support a child's education through this charity and this will continue.

April and May: Exeter Street Pastors, an inter-denominational Church charity which responds to urban problems, engaging with people on the streets to care, listen and dialogue.

June and July: Mothers' Union Overseas Fund, helping families in adversity all over the world.

Sept and Oct: Tear Fund, the international Christian charity which seeks to alleviate poverty and to transform communities through local churches

Nov and Dec: Christians Against Poverty, a national debt counselling charity working through a network of centres based in local churches

We will continue to donate the offerings from the Remembrance Sunday service and the Christingle service to the Royal British Legion and The Children's Society respectively.

The PCC hopes that these steps will not only help to alleviate some of the financial pressure that the church is facing at present, but will also help us to be more proactive in promoting and raising the profile of the charities it supports.



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Christmas Concert

The annual Ottery St Mary Choral Society Christmas Concert took place on December 14th. There were two main works, the Great Organ Mass by Haydn and Mozart's "Linz" Symphony, as well as some excerpts from Handel's Messiah. 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Advice and treatment for hair and scalp disorders

Having spent the last two years commuting from Whimple to London for monthly tutorials, I graduated from The Institute of Trichologists as an Associate Member in September 2013. I then set up Exeter Trichology, a dedicated clinic specializing in the diagnosis and treatment of diseases of the hair and scalp. This is only the second trichological clinic in Devon. I first became interested in trichology some twenty years ago after suffering a diffuse hair loss and scalp condition and sought the advice of a trichologist in Gloucester. Having previously trained as a registered nurse, I took a career break when I had my children, and it was only when my youngest child started school that I was able to fulfill my ambition.

With so many sources of information available today it can often be overwhelming for anyone suffering from hair or scalp disorders. Television, newspapers and the internet may give misleading advice to people who are often curious and sometimes vulnerable to find the latest products and treatments for "miracle cures".

Hair loss

Whilst many men anticipate age related hair loss, hair loss in women is usually unexpected and unwelcome at any age. 45% of women experience some type of hair loss by the time they are 50. Female pattern hair loss is the commonest cause of hair loss in women and prevalence increases with age.

Male pattern hair loss or androgenetic alopecia is an inherited condition accounting for 95% of cases of hair loss in men. Around 40% of men show noticeable hair loss by the age of 35! The rate of hair loss is extremely variable, some men go completely bald in under five years but most take fifteen to twenty five years to progress. Of course male and female pattern hair loss is only one type of hair loss and there are many other reasons why we lose our hair, from hormone changes during pregnancy or the menopause, nutritional deficiencies, poor hair dressing techniques, periods of illness, medication and scalp damage or disease or any combination of these factors.

The most important thing about hair loss is to seek advice from a specialist. There are currently only two FDA approved products for treating androgenetic alopecia, Minoxidil (Regaine) and Finasteride (Propecia), the later only being approved for use in men. Results differ with each individual and are not guaranteed. Early diagnosis and treatment is desirable as treatments are often more effective at arresting progression of hair loss than stimulating regrowth. There are no over the counter treatments that are going to grow hair, despite their claims! However

there are measures that can optimize hair growth and improve the appearance of your hair with the right diagnosis and treatment.
