


I am grateful for each dawn and each day seek and try to do some

So one day a basin., next day a bath in the car.. hurray. . such excitement! No excuse now Monsieur le Plombier! Wrong. Oui Madame, mais j 'ai beaucoup de travail, so now he was too busy to plumb it in! How very trying. He has promised August so maybe by Christmas! C'est Ta vie en France.

Meanwhile on a more cheerful note, we've had a friend of our electrician who was an expert on tree cutting. The house is surrounded by huge conifers and one or two rooms resembled the black hole of Calcutta. Well the local tree surgeon arrived (his normal job is working in an ice cream factory) with a hired chain-saw, which he had obviously not handled before, and, yes you've guessed it, no ladder. All we have is a long roof ladder. Well imagine someone with a chain saw running, climbing a wobbly ladder up a very slim and tall conifer with me trying to keep the ladder safe. Huge branches crashing down around my ears.. The 'tree surgeon' balancing on one leg just to reach that little bit further and me imagining the tree surgeon crashing down as well with me underneath it all with the chain saw still running. Paul is hiding inside in total disbelief that all of this is actually happening with health and safety and all that.

So far we've had five Finnish guests, two weeks of two French families and then some Germans. Where are you Brits and Dutch folks then?

One day I went to our local branch of the Credit Agricole to pay in some money. Tres simple you would think? Non! Because our branch is in Caen, they required a branch number. They had no record of a branch number even though it was the same organisation. I suggested they look at their computer but I had said the wrong thing. Madame this is France, we have no record.

So I left the bank, or tried to, as in France we have a system where when you enter you go through a vault with a lot of button pressing; after that more button pressing and then you are in. Same procedure when you leave, I thought. Non! I got stuck in between two elderly French ladies who only spoke Occitain to make matters worse and we couldn't go forwards or backwards. We started banging the glass but as the glass is bullet proof no-one heard us. After a little panic attack from the old lady and a nervous laugh from me we decided to wait until someone else tried to get in.. bearing in mind it was nearly closing time, we could be there for a long time. Suddenly our frantic hand movements were seen and we were rescued by a kind bank lady.

Back home I get on my bike and cycle up a very steep hill in 35°C to go back to the bank to inform them I could not find the local bank code. So there I was with my 500 Euro note (a ridiculously large note some one had given us as payment for our rental villa). Very few local shops accept 50 Euro notes, let alone 500. Enfin, having been told there was nothing they could do, she suggested she could break down the large note into 50 euro notes. Hurray, common sense at last. To my absolute amazement she rummaged in what looked like an old shoe box under the counter where all notes were thrown in, and handed me money in 50, 20 and 10 euro notes in a bundle that resembled a monopoly game payment, all mixed up. Not very professional.

Today I took Paul for a walking tour of the village - he needed the exercise you see. So we toured the local church which only has one service a month; the local bar and the local sights. We met a very interesting chap who is multilingual, aged 85 and had the very first transplant in France. He lived in Holland for three years as a child and knew both my parents' families!



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BIG NIGHT IN! - Villages in Action

ANGATA – The Music of Mali Miracle Theatre – 20, 000 Leagues Under The Sea

Whimple residents have recently been able to experience two cultural events organised by Big Night In/Villages In Action.

In November, Angata, a truly outstanding group of musicians and dancers from Mali performed in the Village Hall. The drumming was amazing, and those in the audience who had attended the drumming workshop earlier in the day were able to show off what they had learnt too. Very impressive. Unforgettable was the sight and sound of

the man who played the balaphone – a type of xylophone with hollowed out gourds underneath – whilst holding it in his teeth and running up and down the length of the Hall. (Not a sight I would ever have expected to see in Whimple Village Hall, but I now realise anything is possible in this extraordinary multi-functional building). By the end of the evening virtually everyone was on their feet and singing. The sheer energy, skill and good humour of these musicians was a joy to experience.

In January, we plummeted "20,000 Leagues Under The Sea" with the Miracle Theatre who are based in Cornwall. This play succeeded in being a bizarre comedy whilst also making some serious points about our fishing industry and our world. The inspired use of audio-visuals, with images projected onto the backdrop, provided an exciting and unusual set. My one reservation was the 'suitable for over 7s' label, with the implication that this was children's theatre; some of the issues and jokes I think were more suitable for over 13s!

Both of these shows would not have been out of place – and indeed have played – in major theatres in Exeter or Plymouth. Yet they have also toured rural villages thanks to the support from Villages In Action. As with so many things in rural areas, it's a case of 'use it or lose it'. These sort of events really do need local support to make them happen and to continue. So look out for the next Big Night In!

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

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
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DECOMPOSITION NEWS

We held our first AGM on 19th, and Peter Bowden was elected as a Director, so your garden 'waste' is well represented within the village now.....We have also finished laying down hardcore tracks at the site so the Tipper can access the windrows. Both these improvements were financed from the CRED fund that exists for community groups setting up environmental projects. (The hardcore was in fact local recycled crushed concrete and makes a perfectly good road, it's cheaper than quarried material and doesn't leave holes in the ground!) The Tipper is more civilized that a tractor and trailer, but surprisingly not quite as agile in tight corners, so we might have to prune the mirrors!...

We are often asked why we cannot take kitchen waste. We would actually very much like to, but unfortunately it's governed by the animal health regs. which exist to prevent the spread of certain diseases. This means that it cannot be windrowed with garden waste, but has to be composted within special containers where specified temperature targets can be met. The regs. do not affect home composting , however, so do carry on using your own compost methods for this interesting material!

Please call me if you would like our general purpose compost delivered. ($\pm 2.50/$ bag) For those who are interested in the technical aspects of growing I have an analysis available.

2004 was a fairly average year weather-wise in Whimple. The 34 year average rainfall is 39.44 inches so we were below the average.

On the 22nd June when I recorded 1.6 inches, the South Hams recorded 2.5 inches. The Met Office claimed it was the lowest June depression for at least 100 years.

The 7th July was also fairly stormy, 0.8 inch of rain but 60 mph winds felled many trees in East Devon.

On the 15th August I recorded 0.9 inch of rain when Boscastle received 2 inches in 2 hours.



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

A smoke detector which warns: "Do not use the Silence Feature in emergency situations. It will not extinguish a fire."



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
