

Post Office News

Postage costs have increased on 27th March. Feel free to come in to check the cost of parcels you are sending.

On the plus side, small and medium parcels, sent via the 'signed for' service will see a reduction in cost and all parcels will now have a unique reference number so that you can see if it has been delivered.

Regular 1st and 2nd class mail will still only cover the value of goods up to £20 with the signed for service covering the value up to £50. Anything worth more than this, or any cash, vouchers or jewellery or anything that needs to be delivered 'next day' or documents that would be difficult to replace should be sent via 'Special Delivery'. This is a more expensive service, but more secure as your mail is kept separately from the regular mail and is fully trackable.

Just a reminder that the Post Office sells the services provided by Royal Mail. We no longer have a sorting office so the Posties delivering the mail don't have much connection to the Post Office and once the mail leaves us it is the responsibility of Royal Mail. If you have any complaints about the service you receive from them we have a stock of forms you can use to claim compensation for lost mail and phone numbers you can use to make a complaint. You can also access the Royal Mail website for assistance. Hopefully you won't need this information as the majority of post is delivered safely, on time and with due care but we can help you contact the right people if you have any problems.

Tales of Whimple

The Whimple Midwife

From the early 1900's to 1920 Whimple drew on the Broadclyst and Ottery St Mary District Nurses for all nursing services. 1921 saw the arrival of Nurse Sheasby, the first Whimple based nurse. After leaving the training college in Plymouth, Whimple became her first, and only, post as she married Herbert Breyley and became a true 'Whimplite'. Her practice was to cover an area from Clyst Hydon to Rockbeare; Talaton to Broadclyst.

Immediately upon arrival she was met by an anxious father-to-be from Talaton, whose wife had gone into labour. When she asked how she was to get to Talaton she was shown a bicycle. Never having ridden one before she told the father-to-be to go on ahead and get everything ready and then proceeded to teach herself to ride! She arrived, battered and bruised from falls but in time to deliver the baby.

Nurse Sheasby went to live in Bridge Cottage (or The Reading Room) with Mrs E Dunn. There was no telephone, so a slate was fixed in the porch with the list of houses and times where the nurse could be found each day.

In 1927 a second-hand Austin 7 car was purchased and George King, of King's Garage, taught the nurse to drive. Naturally, after so much bicycle pedalling around her area, the car became her pride and joy and it was forever being cleaned and 'bees-waxed' – a process that had unexpected results on one occasion when a swarm of bees descended on it and Gertie Ruttley had to be fetched to remove them!

Driving down the lane just past Down House towards Whimple one day, the car turned over on its side, just after passing George Rowland. Nurse Breyley got out through the roof and between them the car was righted and she continued on her way unharmed.

It is said Nurse Breyley was averse to reversing and would go well out of her way to avoid doing so.

A new invention of gas and air apparatus to assist mothers in labour was introduced. The first time it was used in Whimple, the nurse tested it herself to be sure it was working. As it is odourless she was not convinced the apparatus was in order and took a second deeper breath and promptly fell across the bed! The patient was quite convinced then that it worked!

It was at this time that nurses were instructed to cease treating terminally ill patients when they were also attending a confinement. Many other changes were taking place, which affected everyone. The National Health Service came into being in 1948 and, now that all services were free, the District Nursing Association was disbanded.

Shortly after there were moves made to bring all mothers into hospital for the delivery of the baby, though the District Nurse still carried out the ante-natal and post-natal care. Gradually the nature of the nurses' work changed.

Changes were also taking place in Whimple. Nurse Breyley retired and she was followed by Nurse Tucker, who married and became Nurse Belcher. She was the last nurse to reside in the village.

Mrs. Foukes noted that because of the many years Nurse Breyley cared for the village, and the whole-hearted way she became part of the village scene, most of the villagers' reminiscences were concerned with her and her care and generosity to her patients.



A chat with Paddy Macwatters of The New Fountain Inn



We are so lucky in Whimple to have two excellent pubs, when many villages of our size have lost theirs altogether. Perhaps it says something about how many of us like to spend our free time...or it could be that rich, cider heritage flowing through our veins...

Our most recent landlord is Paddy Macwatters, who took over the running of The New Fountain Inn just before Christmas in 2016, so I popped in to have a chat with him for The News. (He began by offering me a free drink at the end of a long day, so that was a good start!).

Paddy grew up locally around the Exmouth area. His family had a long history in hospitality, with his grandpa running a well-known pub in Cornwall and his parents also being in the industry. He started working in pubs, helping out in the kitchen during his teens and then throughout his college years in Somerset. At that time he was studying Sports, Maths and Media in Somerset, but he decided that cooking was his real vocation when he left college.

Paddy returned to East Devon and began his formal training with Nicola Davey, who owned Baraza in Sidmouth at the time. She encouraged him to take his NVQ on day release and started him on his professional career.

He did consider going back to college to study again full time, but decided to 'learn on the job' and worked in various places, until finding himself back with Nicola in the Exeter Museum restaurant from age 22 to 25, which he really enjoyed.

After a brief time in his next employment at The Devon Hotel, he heard about the position of Head Chef at The Fountain, under the new ownership of Dominic and Steve, deciding to go for it. He was delighted to be offered the role and to finally have his own kitchen, as such.

After 18 months, Dominic offered Paddy the opportunity to take over the lease of The Fountain, as he had decided to move on and concentrate on his other work. Paddy, as we all know, happily agreed!

Taking over the reins took a little longer than expected, meaning that he took the big leap very much closer to Christmas than he had hoped, and he admits that he had a challenging time getting to grips with running his first pub - but has loved every minute. He would like to mention how supportive all his locals and the staff were at that time, which gave him a real boost of confidence.

Paddy now feels he would like to progress the pub a little, in his own way, starting by reintroducing more events - beginning with the popular Steak Nights.



In readiness for the warmer weather, he hopes to develop the outside area of the pub to include some comfortable seating, with the potential for BBQ's and afternoons chilling in the sunshine.

In summary, Paddy intends to grow The New Fountain into a very sociable, active pub for the Village, holding regular events and get togethers, whilst remaining a good 'local' with traditional values, encouraging drinkers and diners alike by offering quality, affordable food and great beer.







WILD WEATHER IN WHIMPLE - KEN WAS RIGHT!

For over 41 years, Ken Burrows recorded the rainfall in his garden along Lily Pond Lane. He published his figures annually in the Whimple News and thought they were fairly representative of the Village. One mile down the road, he noted, it might be different.

From our house, approximately one mile along Holly Ball Lane, we can see Ken's house. We watch the weather sweeping in from the West. When the tree at Gateshayes Farm disappears into the coming storm, we think "Here comes the rain", but, so often, it is not to be. The rain, somehow, stops at Whimple and might slide along the valley to Clyst St Lawrence. Of course, it is black as night in Cullompton and they would look and think the same about us.

Now, you remember from school that your Geography teacher would talk about 'relief rain'? This happens when a hill causes the cloud to rise and cool - then down comes the rain.

This does not seem to happen around here. Everywhere has its own microclimate and Whimple is about 60 metres above sea level. Ken's house is 65metres above and we are 110 metres.

We have been recording the rainfall for the past 15 years and, from the following figures, you can see that Ken was right. From 2002-2010, Ken's annual rainfall was 38.3 inches and ours 29.9 inches - quite a remarkable difference over I mile and 45 metres altitude difference.

Over the longer period our average is about 31 inches.

Several years ago, I showed Ken my figures and he said that I was the only person ever to have talked to him about it.

Simon Foulds is now recording the weather from Dince Hill Close. Interestingly, his figure for 2015 was 32.85 inches. Ours was 29.6 inches. Again, what a difference a mile can make.

Recent pronouncement from the Met Office weatherman assures us that rain falls from the sky. How much falls on you depends upon where you live....

We look forward to seeing you at all these events as it looks like being an even busier year that before. Paul Wilson, Hon. Secretary







Farewell from Peter and Ann

I began the first draft of this report full of thoughts on achievements and ambitions and whatever the future might hold. Yesterday I watched the news reports with real apprehension as I recognised the site of murder and mayhem that I have walked along so many times in the last ten years or more *en route* to meetings with the great and the good. Nevertheless our lives must go on and Ann and I are viewing our future in ways we had never considered possible as we set ourselves the task of emigrating to join our family in West Australia.



In the meantime we are trying to adjust to form filling on a major scale, the inevitable "we don't really want to take Grandma's old green vase with us do we?" and HOW MUCH!!!!; are commonly heard phrases from dawn to dusk. Hiding favourite artefacts away before they are consigned to the 'charity' box is a new hobby of mine. Some big advantages include having only a few meetings left in the diary to fulfil and, as a fellow councillor said would happen, we are getting some of our lives back.

I for one will miss my red tractor, occasional evenings happily listening to the grass grow and especially the days spent cheering on the Chiefs to ever greater glory. The nearest decent rugby team anywhere near to our new home will be nearly 400 miles away and they don't even serve pasties – the Australian equivalent is a chicken sausage and definitely not on my menu!

All the same we have reached a time where reflections of the past twenty years fill a lot of our thinking time. Ann and I moved into Bradcott House in 1998 just after the 1997 flood, knowing that there was a risk but one we were prepared to take. Ann had joined the WI (led at the time by Lucy Smith) and soon trained to become a WI County Advisor. Politics unexpectedly interfered in my life. First I became involved in the Parish Council and then in the County Council as we began the long campaign to see the flood risk alleviated and 50 homes at risk better protected. I stood as a candidate in 2007 (District) and 2009 (County) succeeded and ultimately achieved regular re-election until standing down this year.

The 2008 flood condemned us to a caravan in the drive for some months surviving what felt like the coldest winter on record but we will never forget the support and kindness shown to us by so many. Countless friends have been made, our dog Baggins became a local character, you have quite rightly voiced doubts about my sanity, but we have always felt welcome in this fantastic place. There is no doubt that our move to Whimple was the best decision we have ever made and leaving will be a huge wrench.

I look back on a fantastic career and retirement. Forty years before the mast took me around the world more than once, (three times in one six month tour) and led me into all sorts of adventures that remain in my mind's eye.

Meeting people of all nationalities, fantastic seascapes, some amazing memories and some scary moments when God and nature held the upper hand. Then retirement - when life is supposed to slow down, and peace overwhelms. Whoever told us that fibbed! Charging around the bush rounding up stray cattle is one thing; being chased by a Tiger Snake is entirely another.

Life in the slow lane evaded us somehow. Potholes and strategic planning, safeguarding, school governance, and ruddy solar panels became new subjects to understand. Frustrations became evident as budgets were cut and the public purse dwindled. This led to different ambitions as politics and the needs of everyday living struggled to co-exist. Nonetheless I am pleased that my work with the Fostering and Adoption services has done so much good. Meeting a foster or adopted family is a particular joy and seeing the faces of children that have been offered another chance by some very special people generates smiles everywhere. Of all my many experiences my involvement with vulnerable children has been the most satisfying.



Caring for your pet's teeth

Like humans, cats and dogs have a set of baby teeth that fall out and then have a set of adult teeth that need to last for the rest of their life!

Caring for these teeth will help ensure your pet doesn't suffer from any of the problems associated with poor dental hygiene,

- Plaque and tartar.
- Swollen/painful gums, sometimes receding from the teeth leaving them loose or falling out.
- Bad breath, caused by bacteria (not nice for them or us!). In severe cases the bacteria can enter the blood stream, potentially damaging internal organs.

What can you do to help prevent dental disease?



Brushing

We brush our teeth every day, so why not brush your pet's teeth too?!

There are many different pet toothbrushes and toothpastes available. Don't use your own toothpaste as this is not safe for pets. It is best to start brushing your pet's teeth from a young age so they learn to accept it; however, it is possible to start slowly and gently with an older pet too.

Diet

Feeding a biscuit diet that your pet has to crunch on can help to keep the teeth clean. There are many specially formulated dental diets that contain everything your pet needs. Dental chews can also be used to keep the teeth clean. Remember, these contain additional calories so reduce daily ration to allow for this.



Anti plaque water additives

It is possible to add a special solution to your pet's drinking water. This contains antibacterial agents and an ingredient that helps stop plaque and tartar formation. This can be purchased from your Veterinary Surgery.

Dental treatment

Sometimes it may be necessary for teeth to be cleaned at the vets. In order to examine the teeth and scale them, it is usually necessary for them to have a general anaesthetic. Some teeth may need to be removed during the procedure. This can be a lengthy and costly process and is not often covered by pet insurance.

So prevention is definitely better than the cure!

A Veterinary Nurse can check your pet's teeth (normally a free service), and will be able to advise you on the best dental care for your pet.
