#### THE VILLAGE FLOWER SHOW

A heavenly odour fills the hall
That strangely non-committal of all
Of parsnips, people, grass and sun
And onions – all rolled into the fun
In eager queues we gardeners trot
To see what prizes we have got
And swell the chorus of praise
That roars and rattles round the place

How time flies!.....I cannot believe it is already time to think of writing my next article 'From My Window in The Square'. When I came to Devon many years ago, I never missed the flower shows, they are such fun and tell you a lot about village life and village people. Each year I study the local schedule with enthusiasm and marvel at the people who compile it because, without creative classes, there would not be good entries. I have been to shows in different guises:- As an interested visitor, going from stall to stall with a keen eye for the outstanding displays and making a note of my favourite. Then as an exhibitor when Jack was still here and our anticipation and hope carried us for weeks.

I remember when, at the West Hill Show, we not only exhibited flowers, vegetables and fruit, but for me the dog show was undoubtedly the best value. The majority were family pets, but there were also a few who had been taught

ring behaviour. When under the scrutiny of the judge, they behaved like Hollywood starlets. Not so our beloved Dalmatian Spotty Muldoon, who invariably showed his fondness for his family and many friends when he saw them at the ringside, by licking everybody and trying to win over hearts. It was hilarious. He also liked to pose for photographers, he knew he was so handsome. From the smallest to the cuddly 'Dulux' sheepdog, they were a great attraction and certainly were the centre of everyone's attention.

Over the years, it follows that I became a judge and, for me, that is the most difficult and daunting thing to do. They say that beauty is in the eye of the beholder and how true that is. I remember a judge in the flower arranging space who only liked subdued pinks and blues, unlike another one who liked vibrant colours. I certainly prefer village flower shows to big country shows or even Chelsea, which are so perfect, but don't tell you much about the aspirations of the exhibitor and the joy felt to participate and the final prize giving. Long may village flower shows live.

It was with tremendous interest and pride that I studied the Whimple Village Parish questionnaire summary of results, which show undoubtedly that the community spirit in our village is hale and hearty. Having lived here for twenty-five years and having been one of the members who took part in the very first village appraisal, under the chairmanship of the late John Shepherd. Our findings then were most interesting and revealed that the community spirit then was as strong as it is today. What excellent news with so many young families with children living here with an average age of forty to fifty-nine. Congratulations go to Michael Ellingham, who has devoted his time to this cause since his retirement. There is still one problem, which is national as well as rural, and that is the house market for first time buyers. I am amazed that a tiny cottage in The Square costs a fortune, almost six times the price we paid years ago for the imposing and substantial Old Manse. It certainly makes you think.

I have a dream, a lovely dream, which I am sure many people in the village share with me. I sincerely hope that one day our elegant Square will qualify for a medal in Britain in Bloom. The dream also includes the creation of a Community Shop, like they have in other villages, and is so successful in nearby Talaton. We could even incorporate a coffee/tea spot, what with our Post Office it would be a perfect blend. Something we could be proud of. Living in the Old Manse makes me feel far more a custodian than an owner of this historic house. I look after it with great love and care so that it will still be there for future generations to appreciate and admire. It is one of the most photographed houses. The position is ideal, near the pretty bridge crossing the brook. It is so charming to see many young children still throwing 'Pooh Sticks' to see them float down, simple little pleasures which I witness every day.

Having been a successful hotelier with Jack for years I would have the experience and knowledge to run a community shop, even putting a small fund for its creation. Alas I have no longer the physical stamina, even though I still have the same enthusiasm. Who knows someone younger may start the ball rolling?

My home and my garden are a reflection of my idea of heaven. I love to walk through The Square and reach out and smile at people young and old and it is always with love in my heart that I walk back and feel immensely grateful for living in such a community.

And now I am old and sitting in the sun I sometimes think it will be rather fun To watch when others work and I have done My pleasant lot will be to sit and doze While others pick the greenfly off the rose And others hold that everlasting hose!



#### **RUTH BROWN MEMORIAL SERVICE**

Ruth Brown lived for many years in The Square, and recently a memorial service was held for her at St Mary's. The Whimple News has seen the document of what was said at that service and we have extracted some details from that below. It is a combination of a précis and quotes from Ruth's own dairy that she kept. It makes for some interesting reading and helps us to realise what a tremendous contribution Ruth made to Zaire in her 25 years there, plus an appreciation of the conditions under which she worked.

Ruth responded to an appeal for missionaries to go to any part of the world, in 1951. She was offered a position in the Belgian Congo (now Zaire). After a four-month course in Brussels that improved her French language, Ruth then studied tropical medicine in Anvers. She left England in November 1953 on a cargo ship, finally arriving at Pointe Noire, Brazzaville on her 39th birthday,19th December. Her journey continued by launch up the Congo River, and on 1st January 1954, Ruth transferred to a train for a week's journey to Elizabethville.

Ruth was based at the Songa Mission Hospital and Leper Colony. Her diary says

"They are situated on a sandy plateau about 200 feet above sea level with savannah-like tropical climate, but fairly cool nights, and surrounded by mango trees and banana plants, and not far from rivers Lomani and Lualaba which join the Congo River.

There is one large building divided into two wards, one for men and one for women and children. Between these two wards is a sort of very small dressing room cum office on one side, and the main door of the building on the other. At that time, there was no running water.

There were very few bedclothes, not much linen at all, and very little equipment. All the patients seemed very poor; some slept on mattresses or grass mats on the floor between the beds, and relatives slept under the beds at night. Sometimes they slept with the patient if nobody was around to turn them out, but most of the mothers slept with their sick babies and very small children. Altogether there were about 100 beds – of course many more patients than beds.

The other trained nurse, Thelma and I used to take it in turns to visit the leper colony twice a week to supervise the distribution of medicines. We used to check patients who were not able to leave their hut – some were very disabled, maimed with ulcerous sores on hands and feet, and some were blind. It was all very sad to see them.

Two young men I remember very well; one was not only lame with very bad feet, toes and fingers missing, but he was also blind.

His friend also had some toes and fingers missing but he managed to lead the blind man with a stick around the paths. We used to visit the blind man regularly and help him out with food, blankets and clothes. Before returning to the hospital after visiting the leper colony, sometimes we would go down to the river and have a swim and a wash. We all used the river for all sorts of reasons – bathing, swimming and washing clothes.

Years later, when I had a car, we used to wash it on the riverbank, and some of the children from the leper colony would come and help me. When I used to ride my bicycle home, quite often several children would run behind me and when I got to the hilly part, one or two of them would try to help by pushing me up the long slope to the hospital. It was great fun for them and I loved to see their happy smiling faces. "

Ruth's work over 25 years became legendary in Central Africa. In addition to her work at the hospital and as a missionary, she was able to pass on her very considerable medical knowledge through the setting up of two Nurses' training schools. At times when there was no doctor at the hospital she performed several successful operations.

We are grateful that she has left us her memoirs. Ruth's life of service and her Christian faith touched so many.



#### Parish Plan Update

More than 100 people attended the Parish Plan update meeting in the Victory Hall in June. Speakers from the Community Council of Devon gave a presentation on how they can assist rural communities and local organisations, and how CCD will assist with delivering the action plan. Detailed results of the survey carried out earlier this year were on display together with possible actions, and those present were asked to record their views on how these might be prioritised.

The steering group is now drawing up the action plan which will in due course be adopted by the parish council which will become responsible for its implementation and monitoring. # **RENAISSANCE** SOUTH WEST museums for changing lives

#### CIDER WITH ROADIES AT THE HERITAGE CENTRE

On Thursday 27 September 2007, Whimple History Society will be hosting a unique event that combines a blend of the Arts, horticulture and an appreciation of local heritage. This is a very interesting event for Whimple as it creates a strong link back into our cider history and will help people understand, and actually see in action, the cider pressing process. Thanks to the generous support from the Museums Libraries Archives Partnership and Renaissance South West, we will be hosting a great afternoon that combines actual apple pressing, information, advice, and entertainment. Entry will be free thanks to this funding.

The purpose of the afternoon is simply to provide a great community event, to give you a chance to enjoy the entertainment, to find use for your old apples and to encourage you to grow more. The Heritage Centre will also be open that afternoon, giving you the chance to remind yourself about the cider history of our village over the years.

The actual pressing will be carried out using 'Pomona', a trailer-mounted cider press which will be parked at the rear of the Heritage Centre for the afternoon of the 27 September. The plan is for anyone to bring their apples to 'Pomona' and have them pressed and thus turned into apple juice. 'Pomona' will be available from about 1.00 p.m. (exact times to be clarified on posters) and all you need to do is to turn up with your two buckets of apples (experience has shown that a limit has to be applied). A rough rule of thumb is that one bucket of apples will press down to make half a bucket of juice. You then have the choice to drink it as apple juice within 3 days, or freeze it, or make it into cider, cider vinegar or apple wine according to what recipes you can lay your hands on! Low cost containers are provided, or you can bring your own. A modest 'pressing' charge of 50p per litre of apple juice will be made. You can't say fairer than that!

The event is not just about apple pressing, - The Common Players will be giving an entertaining performance called 'The Big Squeeze' during the afternoon as the pressing is carried out. 'The Big Squeeze' is suitable for families and is based on mummer's tales and stories told by troubadours complete with live music. We are hoping to involve the Primary School during the morning, when one of the Players, who is a qualified teacher, can work with the children and bring this part of our heritage to life for them. If you want more general information about this event, there is a very good website on www.ciderwithroadies.org.

We are very excited about this visit, as it was one of the few dates still free in the touring calendar. Ideally we would have loved it to happen in the school holidays, but we have had to juggle opportunities for funding and the availability of the Cider With Roadies team. We hope that many of you can make the afternoon!

#### Dotty about the station

It was quickly apparent at the Village Plan meeting recently held at the Victory Hall that among the high priorities perceived by those who attended was the railway station. For those who were unable to be there that evening we were treated to a presentation by several folk well placed to set out the route map for achieving some of our ambitions for the village, and also the now familiar display boards reflecting the responses to the questionnaire. There were about five topics identified and from the emergent list of actions we were asked to prioritise them by placing a coloured dot in one of three boxes — High, Medium or Low priority. Hence the title of this piece. By the time I reached the 'transport' board through the throng the 'Preserve our railway station' was densely filled with dots in the High box.

The familiar truism comes to mind: - use it or lose it, so perhaps you would be interested to know that quite a lot of people do use the station. It is certainly used relative to the size of Whimple. The question is - will that be enough? I have just returned from the station on a weekday late morning and saw eleven people get on the Exeter train. You might expect a modest gaggle of commuters on the morning and evening services but it is becoming clear that there is a significant, if random, use during the day.

Last month I found myself on the station one early morning to catch the second train of the day - 6.57am. It was a very pleasant experience to enjoy the air and the early sun as about three others whiled away a few minutes. I was probably not fully awake but I thought I heard the announcement heralding the train's arrival say, "Platform one for the 6.57 to Budapest - calling at Feniton, Honiton, Waterloo, Paris and Vienna".

As it happened I was going to Budapest. I just wanted to see if I could - from Whimple. And you can. I reached the Hungarian capital by lunchtime next day. To help focus attention on our station, what is the furthest destination any resident has reached - from here and using reasonably consecutive services? Or what is the most journeys in a year anyone has made? Or indeed have you any other ideas that demonstrate the use and importance we place on Whimple station?

# GUARDING GARDENS

We are a nation of gardeners and when 60 per cent of burglaries happen through the rear or side windows and doors, making your garden secure will help keep thieves out of your house. Here are some top tips for guarding your garden.

**Fences** should be kept in good condition. If they are falling down or there are holes then a burglar can get through.

**Garages and sheds** should have locks on their doors, and kept locked at all times. A heavy duty padlock, hasp and staple would be ideal, and a mortise lock for garages are a solid investment.

Out of sight is out of mind: many thieves are opportunists so keep your valuables locked away.

Hedges, prickly bushes and dense plants can stop intruders getting into your garden and into your property. They may be all the protection your garden needs. You could try one of these:

- **✦ Holly** only the most determined intruder will want to clamber over its spikes.
- → Prickly bushes Try the shrub 'Rose Rosa' for its excellent ground cover and extremely thorny stem. Hedges can be the perfect fences Blackthorn is a good one it is very dense and can grow over three metres. But be warned, don't let your garden grow too high outside the front if a hedge is over three feet then an intruder can hide behind it.
- → Outside security lighting can be cheap to install and low energy light bulbs can keep running costs down.
- **★ Lock up** expensive property such as garden tools, furniture or ornaments. Bring them inside if you don't have a shed or garage.
- → Mark your belongings with your postmark and house number. There are plenty of ways to do this, engraving is good way of keeping your mark permanent.
- + Photograph your property so that you can provide a good description should anything ever get stolen and help aid identification.




