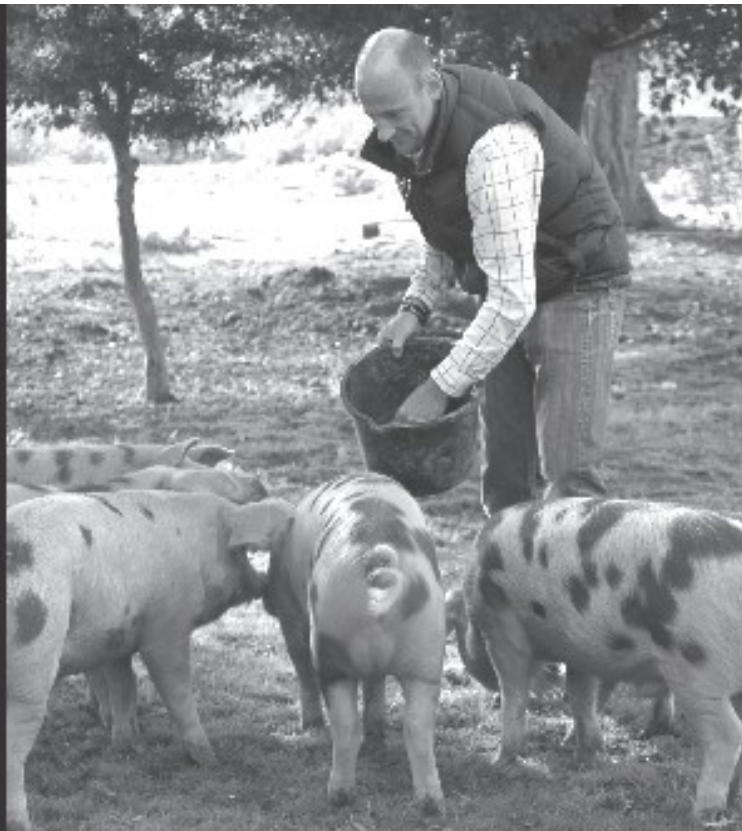

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Whimpe Post Office News



As we welcome in the new year we can't help but wonder what the future of our Post Office holds for us. Just before Christmas we were informed that National Savings and Investments were planning to move business away from Post Offices and will stop their customers managing their accounts in branch. Already we are unable to open new accounts and, as from 21st May, Investment Account holders (that's the account with the grey savings book) will no longer be able to operate their account with us. If you wish to keep this account you will have to go on line.

As from 27th July NS&I Easy Access savings accounts(that's the one with the blue card) will no longer exist and savings will be transferred to a direct savings account with NS&I. If you have either of these savings accounts and you would like more information on how you can still access your savings through the Post Office and would be interested in moving your savings to one of the Post Office Reward Saver or Instant Saver Accounts then ask us for a leaflet and we will help you. As an incentive the Post Office has agreed to match the Bank of England base rate changes until Jan 2013.

As you can imagine Christmas is a very demanding time for us, and we see lots of local people who maybe are our customers just once a year. As a village we are very lucky to still retain a Post Office in the traditional sense. Some of you may have heard of the term 'Post Office Local'. These are outlets appearing in garages, shops and even vets, who are able to offer a limited service and can only exist along side another business. The only advantage is they often have extended opening hours.

We can see a time when a Post Office such as ours will be a thing of the past, but we want to continue to offer the comprehensive, professional services we feel this village deserves. But this can only be achieved with the support of the whole village . So if you only come to us once a year, please remember we are here all year round and we offer banking services, phone top ups, bill payments as well as a comprehensive range of greetings cards, and postal requirements and at prices that might surprise you.

We discovered Ella selling her home-made Granola at the local food fayre that was held in our village hall. Her product was so popular she was soon sold out. She is such an enterprising young lady with a superb product that we are very excited to announce that we will be stocking Ella's Granola in the very near future.

The 'Book Exchange' has re-opened, and we would like to invite you to take advantage of the great range of books that we have at the moment. If you have a book that you no longer need, please leave in the basket for someone else to enjoy and at the same time you could pick up another one. Just leave a small donation each time you do this and you will be helping the Scout Hut Fund at the same time.

A very happy new year to our existing and new customers alike.

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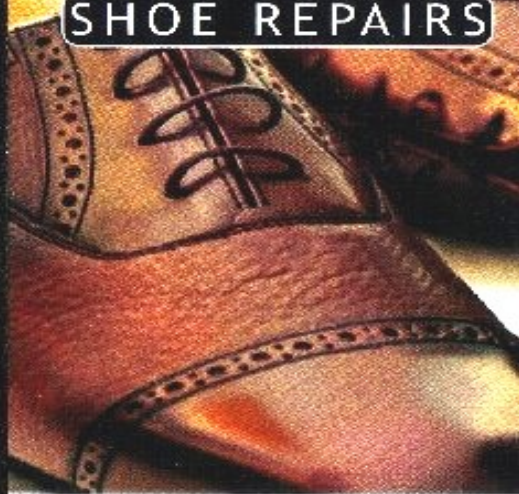
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WTUG Perhaps we should call ourselves something that indicates we would like to use the train more if only it was convenient! Those who find the current timings helpful will be less interested in our efforts I guess. Unlike other sections of Devon's railways, passengers east of Exeter have no formal voice. This is likely to change with the suggestion afoot that there should be a group set up representing the interests of Pinhoe, Whimple, Feniton, Honiton and Axminster. Honiton is already into this with its Mayor, Chamber of Commerce and the MP working together with DCC and Network Rail seeking improvements. Our own grassroots efforts are not far behind and will be involved more closely in future. Having met with the Train Operators and County Officers, the signs point clearly to our MP and I am trying to set up a meeting with him in January. I shall try to see Mr Ben Bradshaw too; not only because Exeter needs to understand the issue but three MPs seem more useful than one (?). By the by, I note the Honiton Road Park and Ride is usually full, so evidently edge of town facilities are in need of further development; I hope this can be done using trains.

I hear tantalising rumours that in the short term there is room for one more return service to stop at Whimple; and that eastbound it might be the sought after 17.30hrs. However, the current timetable lasts until December 2012 so nothing until then at least.

BECOMING A COUNCILLOR: READING, READING, READING

As you can imagine, dear reader, whole forests are chopped down in the name of Bureaucracy or Democracy, and the pulped and processed contents thereof are then dumped in my pigeon hole at the Council Offices – or so it seems to me. My first Christmas as a councillor will always be marked in my memory as the one where Santa's sack spilled over with copies of a 265 page document, one for each councillor – albeit the odd tree was saved as they hadn't been wrapped in fancy paper. So, whilst you were settling down by the fire with the latest Terry Pratchett or Dan Brown, I was starting to plod through the consultative draft of the Council's 'Local Development Framework'. It wasn't long before my cracker hat began to droop in sympathy with my eyelids.....But NO! I had to stay awake so that I could give you a brief outline of the plan, as it might have quite an impact on us all, if the Government's 'Localism Bill' gets through Parliament unchanged. Any Council which does not have an agreed framework in place would then be unable to prevent developers from building more or less wherever they chose, so, clearly EDDC must act fast.



For the most part the document is an overview of the whole of East Devon and as such it deals in generalities and aspirations with not a great deal of detail as to how its aims are to be achieved.

The content is broken down into four sections: Setting the Context (Chapts 1-5), The Strategic Approach and Policies (Chapts 6-20), Development Management Policies (Chapt 21) and Neighbourhood Planning (Chapt 22). Chapters 7-15 deal with a detailed discussion of the West End and Cranbrook (Chapt 7), the individual larger towns (Chapts 8-14) and smaller towns, villages and countryside (Chapt 15). Because of Whimble's modest size - apart from its designated status as a 'core village' - it is not singled out for much scrutiny, so I have had to pick through the document to glean some idea of the significance of the plan for Whimble. To this end the best chapters were the introductory ones - 1 to 5 and chapter 15 on smaller towns, villages and countryside. Chapter 22 is perhaps the most important. It deals with 'neighbourhood plans' where the responsibility and initiative for development lies very squarely with the Parish Council and the District Councillor. The neighbourhood plan must show how the parishes intend to implement the EDDC's strategic policies, which cannot be ignored. On the other hand, they can choose to change all or any of the development management policies. The important guideline here is the Localism bill. One encouraging element of the neighbourhood plan is that it would be possible for individual parishes to combine with each other to create a larger (e.g. ward sized) plan which, in our case, would have the merit of combining the talents of the two Parishes Councils in the Ward and create a wider outlook on our planning.

The clerk to the council holds a copy of the new plan, as do I, so either of us can give a sight of it if you are interested. Alternatively it is online at the council offices on www.eastdevon.gov.uk/localplan. You are welcome to make comments to the council about the plan until 31st January 2012

Now Christmas and New Year festivities are over, we shall be working hard at the Parish Council to ensure that we get the most from this document to safeguard the future of the village. As you know, several large organisations, such as the National Trust, have voiced concerns about the lack of safeguards in the Localism Bill for what they call the 'general countryside'. Whimple and Talaton do not have the protection afforded by being in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, as enjoyed by large parts of East Devon, so if you have concerns about what might happen to our immediate area – and what should be done about it – please do not hesitate to contact me, the Parish Clerk or the Council.

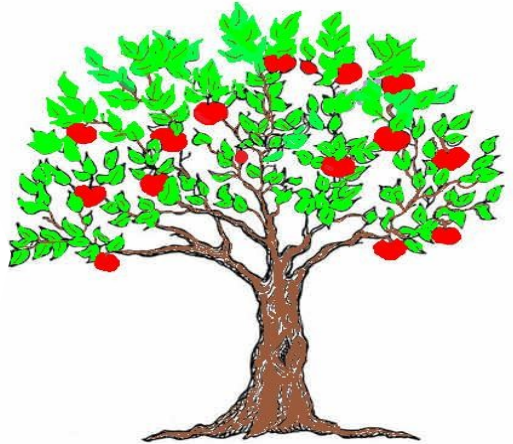

The Scout troop in Whimble has been growing over the last year and at present we stand at 30 members between the ages of 10½ and 14. We have been doing a number of great activities from canoeing to camping to hiking and beat-boxing and of particular note is the training that is going on with six of our older members to try to get into a team that will be doing the Ten Tors event this year in May.

These young people gave a talk to the W.I in January explaining the process and what was involved in the event and I think it opened their eyes to some of the challenging things on offer in Scouting these days. The Ten Tors event will see the team conduct a 35-mile route over two days all across Dartmoor being responsible for their own navigation and carrying everything they need for their time during the event.

The upper age limit for Scouts is 14 and as a result our current Year 9 group of 13 - 14 year olds have just left the Scout troop to form our new Explorer Scout Unit. This now leaves space for the steady stream of new members coming up from Cubs plus those people who have been on our waiting list for many months. I will be running the new Explorer Scout unit and as a result this will leave both the Scout and new Explorer Units only having one uniformed Leader. This can certainly be a challenge when work or other commitments prevent the Leader attending. We want to be able to offer our young people an uninterrupted programme of events and so we are looking for anyone who is interested in volunteering to train up to be additional leaders. It's not too onerous a task and requires a small amount of flexible commitment to attend the necessary training courses, but it's very rewarding to see the young people enjoying activities they may otherwise not get the opportunity to do and to see them grow as individuals. It's also great fun and an excuse to spend time outdoors and doing the things you could only otherwise get away doing if you were still a child!

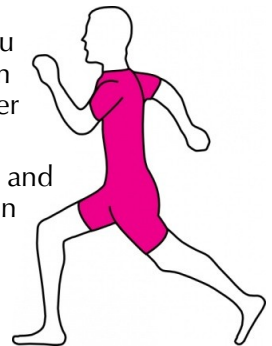

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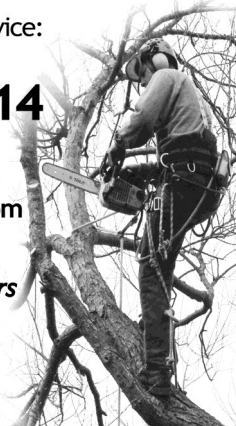
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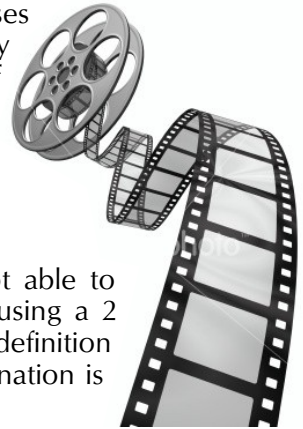

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CRANBROOK UPDATE – JANUARY 2012

Phase 1 - Younghayes

EDDC has invited representatives from local Parish Councils to a series of quarterly meetings designed to keep us all updated on the progress at Cranbrook. The first meeting took place on 11th January 2012.



The first point raised related to the delay in opening the two new roundabouts and Parsons Lane on the Old A30. Works were originally scheduled to be completed before Christmas. We are advised that the temporary traffic lights will remain for a further 2 - 4 weeks while problems with street lighting and speed limit signs are addressed. However, it should be noted that work is due to start on the new Clyst Honiton Bypass within the next month and works on the Sainsbury's Intermodal Freight Depot and the Energy Centre are due to start in the spring. All of these will cause further delays on the old A30 close to the airport for several months.

Cranbrook Infra Structure.

The main local route through Cranbrook linking the two new roundabouts has been completed. All the sewers are in place. Cables for mains electricity to be supplied by the new Energy Centre to be situated east of the airport are also in place.

Street naming has been completed and Street numbering is currently in progress. When completed in February the Post Office will issue Post Codes.

You will see the framework of St Martin's Primary School and the Multi Purpose building as you pass along the old A30. These buildings are due to open in September 2012. A planning application for the new Railway Station is imminent.

Advertising and Publicity.

Aylesworth Fleming have been appointed as Advertising Agents. Advertising for house building and house sales will be launched in April.

The plans for the first 1,120 homes have been validated and are now available to view on EDDC website.

A logo specifically designed for Cranbrook will appear on all the advertising signage, hoarding and flags giving Cranbrook a distinctive identity. The logo will also be part of the final street naming signs.

For more information a newsletter 'Cranbrook Connect' will be available to local residents on-line or from local outlets very soon. Otherwise go to EDDC's website.

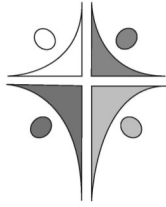

I also said that we needed your input to the planning process and that we would circulate a fact sheet and questionnaire to each household early in the New Year. Hopefully, these should have been delivered to you with this copy of the Whimple News. Please read the fact sheet and complete the questionnaire. We cannot make the Church what you want it to be unless we know what that is.

There are spaces on the questionnaire so that up to four people from each household can answer individually. We do not assume that just because you live together, you will have similar responses to the questions. If there are more than 4 people in your household who wish to respond, then additional copies of the questionnaire will be available in the Post Office. Also if for some reason your household did not receive a copy of the fact sheet and questionnaire, please pick one up from the Post Office and complete the questionnaire. The views of everyone in the village are important to us, including those who simply tick that they have no interest in what happens to the Church.

We have a team of people who are planning to collect the completed questionnaires from you between 17th and 26th February. Hopefully that will give you all enough time to fill in your responses. Once completed simply pop the questionnaire back in the envelope in which it was delivered and it will be ready for collection. If you do not want someone to call and collect the questionnaire from you or it is not convenient for this to happen, please simply drop it into either the assigned box in the Post Office or the one just inside the door of the Church. We are hoping that all completed questionnaires will be returned to us by the end of February.

Our intention is that we will let you know, through subsequent articles in the Whimple News, what our analysis of your responses tells us about what the village wants from its Church. We will then also let you know what the PCC will include in its plans to meet those needs.

Thank you all in advance for taking the time to take part in this survey which we, on the PCC, believe is important for the village. And a big thank you also to Ed's team of Whimple News deliverers for distributing the questionnaires and fact sheets with this edition of the Whimple News. We appreciate we have complicated your task this month and are very grateful to you.

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Whimble School Choir

If you go down to Sainsbury's today, you're in for a big surprise.....

As so it was, I guess, for many shoppers who prepared to face the weekly shop in the run up to Christmas.

As it turned out for them, they were to be entertained while they shopped.

As many of you know, I run a school choir at Whimble School, which has been going for 7 years. Over the years, the numbers have fluctuated, but stayed within 15 - 25 members. The choir is open to all children from Yr2 (6-7) to Yr6 (10 - 11), for a small fee.

The numbers have climbed over the

last couple of years, until we reached the highest yet last term - 46 children. As I'm sure you're also aware, Whimble School is fairly small, with just over 100 pupils - about 30 of whom are too young to come to choir, which means that out of approximately 70 eligible children, 2/3 come to choir each week!

Many of the older children have been in the choir since they were year 2, so are very confident singers, and familiar with the kind of complex songs I teach them.

Last term was no exception. For the Sainsbury's 'gig', I chose a couple of songs from the previous half-term's work on 'animal' songs, plus a selection of Christmas ones. A couple of the songs split into four parts, which the children manage with ease. Another - 'Masters In This Hall' is a very old carol, with 'Old English' words - full of 'thou's, 'thee's and 'doth's, but again they managed well, though 'Gabriel' was definitely their favourite - full of jazzy rhythms and cool words, again split into four parts. The sort of song you can't stand still to!

One of the remarkable things about this outing, was that although it was a Saturday, when many people have other commitments, 43 out of the 46 members were able to come along, which was fantastic. Dressed in our daffodil yellow choir sweatshirts and T-shirts, we filled our allocated space in the atrium entrance, and while we were careful not to impede the shoppers' access, we were such a hit that many people stood and listened, making access a little challenging for some.

It was great to see friends, staff and villagers there to see us, and we thank you for all your support and encouragement.

Supported by Tim Wood, a good friend and fellow musician, on the piano, and helped by the many parents who brought their offspring and did the honours with collecting boxes, in just over half an hour, we raised £133 for the 'Friends Of Whimble School' and had a blast!
