

Dear Whimple

I, Rory, and my wife, Sharon, are delighted to be the new owners of Whimple Stores and my daughter, Sabrina, is the Manager who is responsible for the day to day running of the Stores and the Post Office. We also have Karen, Lynn and Judith as our regular staff. Dulcie has left as she also has a full-on job in Honiton but we will miss her dynamism!

Thank you to everyone who has popped in to the Stores and given us a very warm welcome.

Our first few days have been a baptism of fire; understanding the suppliers, newspaper routines, the Post Office and keeping the stock levels up to date so that the people of Whimple can enjoy fresh and locally sourced food.

Mark's and Jenny have been marvellous to us, by helping with the transition and making sure the Stores and the Post Office continue to run smoothly.

Over the next few months, we will settle in and understand the needs of the community before putting our own identity into the Stores. We have made one immediate change by introducing a new till system that has both integrated scales and a card machine, which will make checking out a bit faster. We have also closed the Post Office on Sundays.

The Post Office requires specialised training which limits the availability of staff that we can employ for Sundays. We will however continue to provide stamps and small cash (up to £20) withdrawals at the Stores till.

Mark and Jenny's ethos of fresh locally sourced food will continue and we will try wherever possible to reduce plastic packaging or to ensure that the packaging used is easily recyclable.

If you have a favourite food or drink and we are not stocking it, please ask and we will see if we can get it for you. Also, if you want something in bulk (e.g. cases of wine or packs of soft drinks), we can add it to the wholesaler shopping list and usually have it for you within the same week.

We will continue to work with Whimple event organisers to sell tickets and to sell products that benefit local charities such as handmade greetings cards. We will have one charity collection box on the counter each month and rotate the boxes across the charities that ask for our support.

Post Office

The Post Office provides a wide range of services. Particularly useful at this time of year for relatives is the One-for-All gift cards. These can be used in a wide range of shops and online and resolves the issue of not knowing what to buy as a present. If you are an employer, you can give up to ± 50 gift cards to staff without it counting towards income tax.

The Post Office also does a range of banking services including cheque deposits. Please ask for an envelope if you wish to use this as it has to be completed with your bank details before we can receive it.

Customs labels are also very important. We can provide you with blank ones and advise you which one to use for the destination of your parcel in advance. Virtually every international destination requires a customs label and some of our EU expartner countries are being very pedantic about how forms are completed, resulting in some parcels being returned from those countries. We can help you with form completion.

Finally, please add your return address (house name or number and postcode) to parcels and important envelopes as we will receive anything that has been rejected by the destination country but cannot be returned to the originator. We have a bulbous shaped parcel on our shelf that is in limbo as it has no return address. This makes a sad situation for both the sender and the intended receiver.

Sabrina has been working closely with us to ensure that there is continuity and knowledge to support the demands of the Post Office in the run up to Christmas.

If you have lived in the village for a while, you will remember what a great shop it was when Pat and Fred ran it. Graham and Karen were amazing but sadly things declined a little when he got ill. It can be very physically demanding as well as all the other roles you have to play so if you are not well it must have been so difficult for them. We have never underestimated how important the Fowles role was in keeping the village shops going and their predecessors and we feel proud to be added to the list of people who have run the shop and proud to have brought the shop back to its former glory.

Thank you for all the kind messages and, although it has been hard work, we have enjoyed being such a key part of the community. We are looking forward to finally being able to use our holiday money and have a bit of time off.





Over the last few months, we have been reviewing the feedback we have received from our patients, either from our Virtual Patient Participation Group (vPPG), the GP Patient Survey, or the various other ways you have made contact with the practice.

We hear your concerns and frustrations about the difficulty in accessing our services, and we are working hard to make this better for you.

We will shortly be introducing a new automated telephone system which will allow patients to book, cancel, and find out the details of their upcoming appointments at any time of the day or night. Along with this, we have also introduced 8 additional phone lines in order to increase our capacity to receive and make telephone calls. Our aim is for this improvement to reduce the telephone waiting times and for your contact with us to be more efficient and accessible.

SAVE THE NEW FOUNTAIN UPDATE

Whilst we are waiting for the decision on the planning application for the New Fountain Inn, it has been proposed to send the letter below from the residents of Whimple. Please read and, if you concur with its sentiments, please add your name to the list.

A big thank you to Sabrina in Whimple Stores, who has agreed to display the letter in the shop for you to access easily.

'This letter is being sent to you from over ***** hundred residents of Whimple. It demonstrates the detrimental effect that the closure of the New Fountain Inn is now having on our community, and that we are desperate to have the New Fountain Inn returned to the thriving hub it once was.

Now that the winter months are here, the closure of one of our community spaces, is really beginning to affect us all. Whimple is a very social, proactive, vibrant village and we need spaces to meet and socialise. With Covid restrictions now lifted we are keen to attend the many clubs and societies that Whimple has to offer - many of which met regularly at the New Fountain Inn. It is causing great frustration to many of us that villagers are not able to resume so many activities that they have been deprived from for so long. Pensioners that used to meet regularly at the New Fountain Inn are remaining isolated, and so many are expressing their distress at the commercially unnecessary prolonged closure of the New Fountain Inn. We are very fortunate to have the Thirsty Farmer pub in our village and this is being well used and supported by many; but both pubs offer something different and both are precious and vital to our broad community.

The planning portal has over 300 objections and not a single supporter for redevelopment. No evidence has been supplied for its long-term lack of viability. It defies logic that the pub is not operating as a going concern, when so many need it to be reopened and 2 surveys across the whole village show that the vast majority of the residents support the re-opening New Fountain as soon as possible. There have been several parties showing an interest in purchasing the pub, including the Plunkett Foundation mentored Community Benefit Society - Save the New Fountain (Whimple) Ltd. The community purchase and operation of the pub is supported by the wider community who all strongly believe the pub is essential and viable now.

The building of New Fountain Inn is deteriorating as the months pass and this seems to make a mockery of it being in a conservation area. The owner of the premises left Whimple several years ago and it is shockingly clear that he has no interest in the future of our village and our well-being. So, we ask you as the villagers of Whimple, as a matter of urgency to refuse the applicants planning proposal, which will then hopefully allow to pub to be sold to one of the several interested parties so that we can use our wonderful village pub once again'

Also please don't forget to buy a 'Save the New Fountain', mug and calendar, ideal stocking fillers. We are raising funds for some legal costs that we have incurred already and potentially may need access to in the future.

An interview with Annie Bassett

Annie is mainly recognised for her ground-breaking career within the male dominated world of professional football in the 1980-90s. However, her life and career presented her with constant challenges. She has recently been encouraged to write her story, and the book is on its way. I asked her just ten questions, but they provide a glimpse into what we can expect.

Q1 Annie, you came from quite humble beginnings, with your parents running the village shop. What advice did they provide that has stayed with you?

We lived over our village shop - I liked to work there with my dad. I left school at 15yrs and went to work in an office. I loved it. Dad emphasised the basic requirements of good business practice which applied to our shop. Dad said to me 'For business to be a success, there are certain methods you must apply, whether it's a little shop like ours or it's a big international company.' He was my first mentor. I applied his advice wherever my career took me.



Q2 Your career has changed direction many times. Can you identify a common theme of how these opportunities arrived?

Well yes, I have been very fortunate. Looking back, it feels like chance, being noticed for some reason, I never knew what. I have always felt other people to be more interesting. I always ask a lot of questions, perhaps I am just nosy! I like people, I like them to be happy. I never had any job interviews in my football career - people seemed ready to give me an opportunity.

Also, some personal circumstances required me to make decisions and changes. Opportunities must be taken even if you're scared or lonely. One friend summed me up, he said 'You have gone from barmaid to Business Woman of the Year.' - quite true! I was learning from business all the time from every new experience – I worked hard and gained respect. I am considerate with colleagues, putting myself in their position, helping us both to move forward. I feel extremely humbled by the opportunities I have received.

Q3 How were you spotted then? Were there any moments that were particularly significant?

Well away from business I loved singing, particularly opera - Puccini is my favouritewith Dad on the piano. It's always been an important part of my life. Often folk would thank me personally for the music and my voice. Two special moments were: Singing Carols at a large business dinner, a gentleman approached me, apparently a Director of Reading Football Club. He knew I worked in marketing, and he offered me a six-week consultancy job for the club. It went well and six weeks later I was offered the position of Commercial Manager, later promoted to General Manager; and history was made in the football league – A Woman! A second moment - singing in Christchurch Cathedral, Oxford, a Director from The Paris Music Conservatoire approached and offered me a three-year scholarship in singing. That would have been my real dream come true - I was delighted to be offered this, though I couldn't accept, I had four children to consider, and they were always my priority.

Q4 Are there any other dreams you <u>did</u> manage to fulfil?

Always my dream, my life dream, was to go to France, to live there. Later in my career I was working as a business trainer and mentor in Ringwood, Hampshire. I decided to retire and do it! Totally out of the blue, at my leaving lunch, the company offered a proposal for me to write the courses in France and return to the UK at regular intervals to teach and mentor. Commuting from France to Ringwood, I never thought I would do that, but I did! While living my dream at the same time.

Q5 Going back a little, after nearly 20 years as a leading woman in the Football Industry, you chose to work for The Marie Curie Cancer Care. What led to that decision and what did you learn from this position?

I'd been commuting to Fulham Football Club for seven years from the New Forest and I wished to work closer to home. I would have to face my first interview with Marie Curie – national charity, in my late fifties! The application form requested a list of qualifications – I had none, I'd even failed the 11+ twice! Instead, I listed my employment history which would give them insight into my strengths in the workplace. After two exhausting interviews, I got the job as Area Manager of Wiltshire and Dorset.

The position taught me a lot about compassion, care, patience, the importance of listening, as well as knowing what to say and how to present the upside of any situation.

Q6 You've had so many promotions and successes. What was your motivation?

I always take real interest in the people I will be working with, understand their strengths and use them to benefit the business and the person. Throughout my career my decisions were seen as – difficult, expensive, impossible etc. I was controversial and believed in these ideas, pushing them through the system, never asking for money, rather finding sponsorship or support from elsewhere. I always have vision wherever I go – 'When that is done, we can do that ... and that.' We were very successful with our fundraising, more thinking 'outside the box'. We did it differently – it included football and nightclubs!

Q7 Were there any changes of career that made you feel uncomfortable or out of your comfort zone?

Yes, I noticed an Associated Directorship in Business and Marketing at the Isle of Wight College. The application form was lengthy and asking for qualifications. Once again, I listed my work history. I had three interviews, so gruelling. 'You are mad' I was told over and over, 'It's a place of learning'. Ten times I read the question paper and everyone else was writing. After the eleventh read, I realised they were all business questions, not academic. I answered them all, and I got the job.

Q8 What are some words of advice to young women, or men, wanting to further their career in business?

- If you really want to work, there is always work out there don't be too proud. Just do the job, it may lead to a bright future, as it did for me.
- It doesn't matter if you fail, it matters if you don't try. Don't say 'No, I can't do this.'
- Don't be afraid to have a go at things you've never done before. Embrace every opportunity that comes your way, no matter how small.

Q9 Now you are officially retired, what gives you pleasure and keeps you busy?

I enjoy being at home and in the garden. Walking is a daily outing. I still do some choir singing. Opera will always be my first love and preparing for this interview I found my old musical scores, Puccini- Delibes Flower duet, even my old Joan Baez book. Nostalgic memories, thanks to Whimple News!

Q10 Finally your book, how do you feel about it?

Getting started was the most difficult time, I felt overwhelmed. Now the pieces are coming together, it's flowing. I am at last thoroughly enjoying the storyline as it unfolds. I hope you will too was this really me?

Hello my friends,

I believe there are thin places in the world (I don't mean places where we feel slimmer although if there was such a place I would get a membership); I mean places where the barrier we impose between the divine and our ordinary world seems somehow less concrete, where the presence of God feels closer. Have you ever experienced a place like that?

These thin places can be anywhere, it really depends on each one of us. I feel them not only in our beautiful churches but also in the wild places, by the rivers which thunder like growing organ pipes and in the great green woods with trees like columns holding up the cathedral sky. They are at their most powerful when a 'thin place' meets a 'thin time', a time of some special significance: some mornings I unlock the church in Whimple and come into that early silence with sunlight slanting through stained glass. Motes of dust dance to the music of the universe that only they can hear. That is a collision of a thin place and a thin moment, just then and there in perfect harmony. The world hasn't changed by my eyes, I see it more clearly for just that instance and my heart lifts.

Christmas is one of those moments. Christmas with its powerful parables, myths, metaphors, and symbols presents us with a giant welcoming gap in the boundaries of our minds. As veils fall away and we are able to recognize the sacred in ourselves, in one another, and in the world around us, to see more clearly the reality of the LOVE that we call God.

I think many of you here will know deep down what I mean. Children feel it most keenly, the almost uncontainable joy of it runs through them like an electric current, building and building. Then as we get older, we get more jaded by life, more cynical, but usually, even for the hardest of us, the 'thin place and time' still breaks through into our lives at Christmas.

I believe that is because when angels and heavenly hosts, the brightest of stars in the sky and travellers from distant lands meet the reality of an unmarried young girl, a frightened old man, a paranoid King, poverty, persecution and unparalleled violence all coming together in the son of God made human. All for love, it created an event which was, which is, so powerful it echoes down to us right here and right now. Our ability to see the glory may have been damaged by the world in which we live but it still pulls at us, it still seeps into our lives choked by consumerism, cynicism, mistrust and selfishness.

You see, no matter what you believe about God, Christmas pulls you in to times of laughter, celebration and generosity and as the scales covering our eyes are healed by the proximity of the Divine we open ourselves to the wonders of life. We can see once more the beauty of all that life can be. Christmas with all its nostalgia and sentimentality is a place where we can become, if only for a moment or two, all that we are created to be.

This year at our churches at Christingles, Carol services, Crib services, PJ Services, nativities and all we do, we are going to do our very best to open up some of those 'thin places and times' with carols and candles, with prayer and laughter, why not come along and see if this year, among all of the struggles and worries we have all been through, you can feel it afresh.

Then as Christmas passes into New Year, we might carry that thin place and time in our hearts and pour out that blessing into the world.





A Window on Whimple's Weather July to October 2021

There was no space for our regular weather summary in the last edition of Whimple News, so this time we have a summary covering all four months from July to October. This has been compiled from Whimple's two weather stations, one from Slewton Crescent and the other from Cobden Lane, both live streaming local weather data;

July – This was a good growing month – warm and fairly wet! We recorded 104mm of rain – slightly above the monthly average, while temperatures averaged a pleasant 24°C during the day. After a couple of warm dry days, it was fairly unsettled until the 12th, with some heavy rain on 4th and 5th. But from the 13th summer returned with a dramatic heatwave – and temperatures peaking at a sweltering 32.7°C on the 21st! On the 23rd the hot spell was broken by thunderstorms moving up from France giving a very wet day on the 24th. The last week saw near average temperatures, occasional rain, and pretty windy on the 28th and 30th as fronts rattled through.

August – A month of more cloudy weather, but drier than July and temperatures around average. The first nine days of the month were rather unsettled, with brisk westerly winds from the fifth. This period culminated in some heavy showers on the 9th. Although the next two weeks were mostly dry, they were occasionally rather dull. The 21st was wet but then during the 22nd pressure rose strongly across the UK to give a week of fine, warm, summery weather. It was warmest on the 26th with a pleasant 24°C, though a cold front came through from the north-east that night chilling the air to only 7.4°C by dawn the next day. Although pressure remained high, the last two days of the month, including Bank Holiday Monday, were stubbornly dull in a cool north-easterly.

September – The month started warm and dry with some sunshine, the seventh being the warmest day with temperatures reaching 28.2°C, well above average. However, the rest of the month was less settled with some days warm and sunny intermixed with showers. The last week in September was particularly windy; with a recording of gusts up to 52kph in Whimple on the 27th. The month ended with temperatures dropping during the day to 15°C and at night; 5°C. Rainfall was above average with 88mm recorded against a monthly average of 60mm. Total sunshine was very slightly above average for the month.


October – A week of unsettled weather, with Met Office weather warnings for the area and heavy showers, started the month. Then a week of warm, sunny weather gave hope for an extension to summer!

This was short-lived and the settled weather gave way to storm Aurore delivering thunderstorms including intense rain on the 20th (nearly 45mm of rain in one day), accompanied by more weather warnings and strong winds. Whilst 'whirlwinds' were reported in Widnes on that day; Whimple fortunately avoided such extremes! This all contributed to make the month one of the wettest Octobers for years, with over 13 rainy days leading to total rain of 177mm, well over double the average. The month was quite mild with average sunshine.

When you see nearly 200 countries working together to help save 'life on earth' at the Glasgow COP26 Conference, it fills one with a sense of optimism.

It was clear that not all countries were in total harmony but there was a consensus.

There are two points to take from this conference. Whimple is not immune from the effects of climate change. The second point being, working together for the common good is key to our village over the coming years, including the threats of encroaching developments. This is particularly relevant as the creation of our Neighbourhood Plan moves forward. The faster the process, the greater the strength of protection, moving forward.

New Fountain Inn Application 20/2481/FUL

The appeal has been submitted and is now waiting for a suitable Planning Inspector to become available. Once an Inspector has been allocated a full timetable and procedure will be available and the official consultation will begin. In order to raise funds to help cover legal fees, Save Whimple's New Fountain Inn group will be selling calendars and mugs at various village events over the coming months. Please support them if you can and save this vital village asset.

Cranbrook Community Governance Review

The matter of the Community Governance Review in which Cranbrook Town Council looked to review and expand its boundary was discussed at the EDDC cabinet meeting on Wednesday, 3 November 2021, following consultation with all affected parishes and with consideration of the current status of the Cranbrook Plan.

The matter has been put on hold until the government inspector has defined the future expansion areas for the town. Current indications are that this report will be received around the end of the year. For this reason, EDDC councillors voted for the boundary review to be discontinued and invited Cranbrook Town Council to reapply for it at a later date, after the Cranbrook Plan has been signed off. One further reason for postponing this review was due to the overwhelming support of almost 1500 signatories to a petition that was instigated by POW&R group asking EDDC to halt the expansion of Cranbrook and to fulfil its promises to those that live

there by delivering the Town Centre and amenities it had promised many years ago. A big thank you to those who have signed the petition and it is not too late to lend your voice to this campaign by going to www.change.org/cranbrookexpansion or scanning the QR code. The postponement gives Whimple a little more time to move forward with its Neighbourhood Plan.




Neighbourhood Plan

POW&R Group are now very active in working with our Parish Council to create the Whimple Neighbourhood Plan. There has been a great deal of preparatory work undertaken, including a new questionnaire to villagers and consultation letter ready to be sent to over 100 organisations, statutory bodies, local businesses and some national charities. A basic framework has been developed to build the NP, which will be based on the feedback as a result of the consultations. The principal consultations will be by the questionnaire to each resident of the parish, plus the special village consultation day, details which will be announced in the coming weeks (possibly even by the time this goes to press!).

It is fully appreciated by POW+R Group and the Parish that a consultation was undertaken in 2018, however the planning environment has significantly changed over the last four years. This has included threats to our village by the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan, the creation of the Clyst Valley Regional Park, the Planning White Paper and its impact on development in East Devon, and the emerging Local Plan for East Devon. Finally, the four extensions to the enlarging of Cranbrook, which is currently being examined by the Government Inspector. The critical issue is the potential incursion into Whimple Parish of further developments of Cranbrook.

There is now a strong team led by Councillor Denise Dearden supported by Councillor Sarah Johnson plus myself from POW+R Group. As a team we have already met and continue to liaise with Angela King (EDDC Planning Officer for NP's). In addition, a number of villagers and the professional team members with experience in Town Planning and Project Management within the POW+R Group are working on the Plan. It will be evident that once the feedback is gathered then the work will be shared on the evaluation and presentation of the findings, together with developing the policies needed to protect and enhance our village for the future. The final 'made' plan is a legal document that will stand in its own right.

Previously developed land in Devon must be prioritised for new homes

Across the county, new homes are encroaching on Devon's beautiful countryside, yet there is a far better alternative to concreting over our green fields and one that makes more sense than the wanton destruction of valuable farmland. New research by the national countryside charity CPRE shows previously developed or brownfield land could accommodate 1.3 million homes, but this precious resource is being largely ignored. The research concludes that housing developers are "gorging on precious greenfield land with an ever greater appetite".

In East Devon, members of the local branch of the charity, Devon CPRE, have seen the new town of Cranbrook steadily expand in recent years. Green space around small market towns like Honiton has also been sacrificed to yet more housing. Aside from the issues of the design and quality of many of these new builds, why are developers being allowed to eat up one of Devon's most precious resources - its countryside - whilst brownfield land is left to go to waste?

Nationally, the proportion of brownfield housing units with planning permission is the lowest since records began – down to 44% in 2021 from 53% in 2020 – and the actual number, at 506,000, is the lowest for four years.

In most parts of the country, the amount of brownfield land available for new development has gone up. In the South West, the picture is slightly more encouraging - but not much! The CPRE research shows that across the South West region there's capacity in 2021 to build 68,081 units (houses) on previously developed land. Last year, the comparable figure was 69,355 units so a small percentage of brownfield land has been developed for housing since 2020. However, there's still a tragic waste of potential building plots and we believe these brownfield sites should be used first before any more green fields are encroached on. Based on this data, the Government certainly can't claim the use of brownfield land is being prioritised!

At the Conservative party conference in the autumn, the Prime Minister stated that no more development would take place on green fields. We, at Devon CPRE, will be holding the Government to account and demanding an end to the unnecessary destruction of our countryside. How? By calling for new national planning policies to prioritise brownfield development in local plans.

In all other areas of our daily lives we are encouraged to reduce, re-use and recycle, why should land use for housing and development be any different?



A local farm that's 'Gotta Lotta Bottle'

Who can remember the days of the great British milkman? When you might be gently awakened from your slumber by that tell-tale 'clink' as the milk bottle was placed on the doorstep? Forty years ago, nearly 90% of the UK population had milk delivered to their home but by 2013, there had been a drastic decline in doorstep milk deliveries with only 3.2% having their daily pint delivered.

Sadly, Ernie may well have driven his milk cart off into the sunset, but there is hope. In recent years, the UK has been experiencing a revival in farm to doorstep deliveries and East Devon is no exception. With supermarkets selling milk cheaper than bottled water and with dairy processors cutting prices paid to farmers, some local farms are taking matter into their own hands and taking control of how their milk is processed and delivered to customers.

One such farm is Oak Park Dairy at Clyst Hydon, a family business that spans generations. The latest custodians are brother and sister team, Matthew and Emily Mitchem, who have been entrusted to take the farm into a new future of sustainable farming. Emily is in charge of the Oak Park Dairy 'girls', a herd of Holstein Friesian and Jersey cows. Because the two breeds have their own very special characteristics, they produce a blend of milk that has perfect flavour consistency.

It is at this stage that Matthew then takes over. In his on-farm dairy, he gently pasteurises the milk which he then bottles into the farm's own beautifully branded glass bottles. Because Matthew does not homogenise the milk, you will always get that lovely thick layer of rich cream rising to the surface - just like milk used to be! Then he and his team of milkmen and women are on the road in the early hours to ensure the milk arrives on your doorstep before 7.00am, just in time for your muesli or morning coffee.

The Mitchem siblings are also keen to fulfil their duty to be as sustainable and environmentally friendly as possible. "Our milk is processed using 100% Green Energy" says Matthew "produced on our family farm through renewable sources. In 2014 we built our own Anaerobic Digester that utilises our cows' manure and produces energy to supply not only our operations here at Oak Park Dairy, but also supplies back to the National Grid".

Hundreds of local households are already converts to the Oak Park Dairy ethos and their growing delivery round. And it is no surprise that Matthew and Emily have been rewarded for their hard work with numerous Gold awards from Taste of the West.




