



With a wide variety of music being performed, including some past conductor's work, it promises to be a lovely evening. Admission is free, and there will be a retiring collection in aid of Kidney Research UK. Come along and help us celebrate.

EAST DEVON COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

After a year in the job it is time to drop the 'on becoming' part of the title of my report, although every meeting reminds me that I am still pretty wet behind the ears. Speaking of wet, a word of warning to those even dafter than I am: put a non-slip mat in the bath when you take a shower! An embarrassing incident involving a bonny young lady paramedic and – even worse – a bonny young firewoman helping to get me out of the bath, cold, wet and covered in little more than a towel left your Councillor without a shred of dignity and a severe whiplash injury. This has kept me out of circulation for a while.



This report just looks at the item on everybody's lips -Cranbrook and its potential for your community.

If you go down the old A30 towards Exeter you can't fail to see the houses going up at the roundabouts. A fortnight ago a large group of District Councillors had a guided tour of the site. It was the day after the torrential rain that refilled the county's reservoirs, and we were made very aware of the low lying nature of the site! We were confronted by large lakes of muddy red water everywhere (maybe the builders should have started with The Lake which will be a central landmark as well as a reservoir for water run off). Despite this there has been a lot of progress. There is a roof on the main school building: by September it will be open for the children from Clyst Honiton. The railway station is being laid out; the car park raised by more than a metre to ensure it will not be flooded. In fact they seem to be raising the height of the whole site! The show homes and the sales offices are finished and on the 12th May they were open at 6.00am for potential customers - with Buck's Fizz on offer! (We didn't get any). The districts in the town have been determined and, as you know, some of the street names have been decided and road signs installed - albeit blanked out at the moment. The power station is being developed, as is the Clyst Honiton bypass which feeds into Cranbrook. The multipurpose building that will house the Town Hall, Council offices, Library, and gym already has its roof on. The main roads and sewers have been built and the streetlights have been erected

We also visited the Flybe site to see how this complementary development on the edge of Cranbrook is getting on. The flying school is already in action, construction of the hotel next door has started and lots of other buildings are also taking shape. Finally we explored the 'Bridge to Nowhere' over the M5 and the developments at Junction 29 where bus shelters are erected and roads are appearing that will lead to even more development.

All in all, it is exciting to watch the embryo of a town growing from the green fields and farmsteads that were there before and we must hope that it matches the planners' dreams. By this time next year there will be a community up and running and it is now possible to imagine a town here. The developers expect to build 170 houses by Christmas, and they will add about 450 houses each year.

Over time Cranbrook will create some 1,200 jobs (shops, teachers, health workers, town maintenance, doctors' surgeries, park rangers, small businesses). These will be jobs created by the town itself, quite apart from the hundreds that are to be generated by the 'multimodal park', the Flybe Academy and the Science Park. The town will have a shopping centre to rival Honiton or Exmouth and eventually there will be a town council and possibly, a new District ward.

This all sounds wonderful, but things have a way of not turning out as planned, and Councillors are musing about what the *reason* for a new town of this size will be. All the towns in Devon have grown over centuries starting with a market, an industry, a mine, tourism or the railways, not just a plan in a government minister's head. The Council wants Cranbrook to be a community in its own right too and not just a suburb of Exeter, but what's it all *for*? Answers on a postcard, please.......

Incidentally, Cranbrook is supposed to be a "green" town: it has been named after the stream running through it – "the brook of the cranes". Wouldn't it be wonderful to see those majestic birds exploring The Lake one day? The Council are determined to keep the mature trees and some of the landscape, and the Council's tree officers will be taking members of the public around the site on July 2nd to look at the work they have been doing. If you are interested, phone 07814-477-422 for details to book a place on the tour and see for yourselves how Cranbrook is coming on.

Jubilee Community Award Whimple Won!



On 17th May the Chairman (John Griffiths), Vice Chairman (Sue Ayres) and Clerk (Gerri Turner) of Whimple Parish Council were invited, along with all other East Devon Town and Parish Councils, to attend a Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebration Town and Parish Awards evening at East Devon District Council, to recognise local achievements. Parishes were invited to provide details of projects they have led or helped to deliver.

There were 3 awards in each section:

- Community Award best achievement of a council in the last 4 years which has directly benefitted the local community.
- Youth Award best council initiative that has directly benefitted young people.
- Future Project Award the most exciting plan(s) already in the pipeline.

The entries were judged by an independent panel of judges who were looking for ideas which were innovative, demonstrated partnership working/community involvement, achieve value for money and of the greatest benefit to the community.

Whimple Parish Council nominated the regeneration of the Parish Field in the Parish Council Community Award section – and WON!

The judges said "This project was impressive as it involved the whole community and it was given to Whimple for the regeneration of its parish field for the benefit of the whole village."


The Chairman was presented with the special award and £100 cheque.



The parish field, close to the village centre was grossly underused with untapped potential as a community space.

A local youth group approached the parish council for help in improving facilities within the village. This led to plans, fund raising and a successful lottery grant bid.

The project was completed in 2009, the field now has – a cycle/walking/running track, 12 piece trim trial, BMX cycle humps, extra seating, signage and litter bins.




The Bells, the Bells!

2012 months later, here we are in the year 2012....

17th October 1843 was a sad day, the Revd Canon Thomas Heberden died in Whimple, he was 89 years old and had been Rector for nearly 57 years. Six weeks later on 29th November 1843 Revd Lloyd Saunders became the new Rector of Whimple. Queen Victoria was on the throne and the Prime Minister was Robert Peel. Revd Lloyd lived until the 23rd December 1898, by which time he was 84. Lloyd was very evidently someone who made things happen and carried people with him. Within less than seven months of his arrival in the village, Whimple found itself in the midst of a whirlwind of activity and construction; the outcome of which have continued to positively shape and touch the lives of thousands of local people in succeeding years. On 8th June 1844 the Vestry Book records that a meeting would be held on 15th June 'for the purpose of considering means for increasing the present accommodation of the church.'

The present school did not exist, but there was a 'school room' in the village, to which parishioners were invited to attend the meeting. More meetings were held in the school room over the coming months and perhaps it was the venue for these meetings which got Lloyd thinking about the education of village children, and how a new school could be built.

It is interesting to realise that on 29th July 2012 it will be 2012 months from the first anniversary of Lloyd's appointment as Rector. On 29 November 1844 he had been the Rector of Whimple for just a year and yet plans for a new church building were already well on the way to being settled. He was doubtless thinking of other ways of helping the village. If the vision for a new school was in Lloyd's sights by around Easter 1845, then by Christmas 2012 it will be 2012 months since that happened (167 years and 8 months later). There is an element of conjecture about this, but as within seven months of Lloyd arriving in Whimple the project to considerably enlarge the church had started, it doesn't seem implausible to think that within less than eighteen months of his arrival the vision for a new school had crystallised.

Before the new church building had been fully completed another formal meeting was fixed for Thursday 15th July 1846, again at the school room. The agenda was set for the purpose of taking into consideration the building of the churchyard wall and to consider what should be done to the Poor Houses. Minutes state *'it was also resolved that the Poor Houses be given up for the purpose of constructing School Rooms and a School Masters House one room being reserved for a Vestry room.'* At the meeting it was agreed that plans should be drawn up. We know that the Poor Houses adjoined the Churchyard and the original intention was to create a new Vestry room as part of a new build, which suggests the site was close to the church itself. Three days later on 18th July 1846 notice was given to sell the Poor Houses and a Garden *"to be applied as a site for a school to be under the management and control of the minister of the parish for the time being and to be open to inspection from the inspector or inspectors appointed or to be appointed by Her Majesty or her successors in conformity with the Order in Council bearing the date the 10th of August 1840."*

For some reason which is now unclear the proposed site was then felt to be unsuitable. It is clear that just a few months later it was Lloyd who identified a different site for the school. This notice was issued: "A meeting will be holden in the School Room on Monday 5th April at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to take into consideration the application of the money arising from the sale of the poor houses to the purpose of building a school and also to consider the proposition of the Revd Lloyd Saunders to grant a site of land for the school upon the Glebe in exchange for the portion of garden now reserved for that purpose behind the Poor Houses".

At a Vestry meeting on 5th April 1847 Lloyd proposed "to convey to the minister and churchwardens for the time being, so long as they shall continue to be members of the Church of England, the Plot of ground No 495 in the Title Map, being part of the Glebe, as Trustees for the purposes of a school for poor persons to be called the Whimple National School and for a residence for the school master or mistress and for other purposes of the said school and for no other purposes whatever..."

Lloyd evidently had the right to make such a proposition. It was accepted. As part of the transaction, the portion of land and Poor Houses which had been earmarked for a school site was conveyed to Lloyd (in his capacity as Rector), and it was also agreed that the £120 which had been raised by the sale of the Poor Houses would be added to the fund for building the new school.

Now there was a real head of steam and it was time to get on with the next stage of making the necessary applications for a new school. On 5 April 1847 "It was moved by Captain Buller and seconded by Mr Brook that the.... proposal be adopted and that the Revd Lloyd Saunders be requested to undertake the correspondence with the Poor Law Commissioners and the Committee for Education in order to carry the Jabovel arrangements into effect."

It has emerged that sometimes by the time things had reached the stage of being discussed in formal meetings considerable practical progress had already been made! Although the formal motion was agreed on 5th April 1847. records at the National Archive show that the application made for the new school was dated and signed on 29th March 1847. This means that a week *before* the Vestry meeting which formally requested Lloyd to undertake the work and correspondence to "carry the arrangements into effect", the key deed had in fact *already* been done and vital documents had already been signed!

The school was then built at the cost of £745, of which £126 was given by Government and the National Society; and at the start it was attended by 40 'mixed scholars'.

The rest is history, as they say! It seems a fair assumption to suppose that Lloyd would have been gratified to think that around 2012 months after he and others started thinking about a new school in Whimple that very same school would be an outstanding, thriving and much loved village school with nearly 110 pupils in 2012AD; and that Whimple Church would be a much loved place of Christian worship and community.

St Mary's Church - Village Survey

In the last edition of The Whimple News, I mentioned that completed questionnaires were still coming in. Our final tally was 282 questionnaires returned with responses from 497 people. That represents a return of about 38% which, in a general election, would be considered a reasonable turnout. So thank you to everyone who completed their questionnaires and returned them to us.

I am sure you all appreciate that there is a lot of data to work through and it will be a little while before we are in a position to draw conclusions. However, probably the most positive thing from our perspective was that 443 people indicated that they are interested in what happens to St. Mary's Church. That in itself gives us huge encouragement. Also a resounding 366 people (82% of the 443) indicated that they considered the wider community has a responsibility to help maintain the church as an iconic building in the village. And 351 (79% of 443) indicated they would support updating the facilities inside the church such as: heating, lighting, lavatories, disabled facilities and kitchen.

Updating the heating is high on our agenda as extremes of temperature and moisture, particularly in the winter, are not good for the fabric of the building. Also if we want more community use of the building, for concerts, etc. a better heating system would make the venue much more amenable. However, many of you will be aware that in the last budget the Government decided to impose VAT on changes to historic buildings with effect from 1st October 2012. Consequently, if we wish to upgrade our heating, we will need to do it fairly swiftly or the bill will increase by 20% i.e. potentially additional thousands of pounds. Consequently our focus is on that as a matter of some urgency.

The questions that asked for written comments e.g. how the church can be more relevant to the community, styles and times of services, how the building can be made more fit for purpose and other matters that may be helpful to the PCC, elicited over 350 comments, many of which were quite long and detailed. We have therefore decided to allocate these to small teams to work through to see if there are common themes, areas where we could do better or good ideas that we can take forward as initiatives for the community. It may take a little while to work through these comments and while, even at first glance, it is obvious that whatever we do or not do we may not be able to please everyone all the time, there are undoubtedly some things that we could follow up that would be positive for the village as a whole.

As the analysis of the responses progresses, I will keep you informed about how we are getting on and what we intend to do in response to your comments and helpful suggestions.

Wasters of Whimple

Many of you may know that Wasters have been promoting a solar power campaign across the village over the past 2 years, in order to reduce our carbon emissions and make us less reliant on fossil fuels. It all began back on 10th Oct 2010 with a meeting in the Victory Hall. Since then about 30 domestic installations have taken place, so far saving roughly 36,000kg of carbon pumping into our atmosphere!

Whimple, being 'so far south', is blessed with strong sunshine (though you may find that hard to believe sometimes)! A number of people have asked me how my panels are doing, partly out of curiosity and partly to compare their production to others. If you have panels, it is important to 'benchmark' their performance with similar nearby installations, to check they are working properly. But also the data is a fascinating history of Whimple's wonderful sunshine – so hopefully will be interesting to other Whimple News readers too!

(Note all values are per kW, so are not dependent on the size of my panels.)

Sunshine / weather review – My panels only went up last October, so my sunshine stats only extend fully from November. It can be seen from these figures, that generally November and December were duller than normal. In fact the dullest day was 14th November (0.1kWh/kW) while the dullest week was between Christmas and New Year (2.5kWh/kW). January and February were slightly sunnier than normal, then March was fantastic! One of the sunniest and warmest ever apparently, with unbroken sunshine for 8 days from 23rd to 30th (46.6kWh/kW). Sunniest day in the last 6 months was 1st April (6.2kWh/kW). But then the rest of April was lousy! Much cloudier and wetter than normal.

Solar PV review – to compare my figures above against yours, you need to multiply them by the quoted maximum kW that your panels can produce. My panels are unshaded and face almost due south (200°) and incline 42°. From other data given to me, SE-facing or SW-facing are likely to be about 10% less and due east or west facing may be up to 50% less. Next review will be in 6 months time, with a whole year of data! 




