Happy 2023 to all of our Customers.

As I write, we are putting the last bits and pieces of the Post Office away ready for collection by Post Office Ltd. We are truly sorry that the closure of the Whimple Post Office counter will have an impact on our customers but we could not continue to subsidise its operation out of the Stores funds, particularly when the cost of electricity for fridges, freezers and lights has trebled with more increases expected in April.

We have leased a machine from Payzone that replicates most of the bill payment, council tax payment, and electric top-up functions that were available at the Post Office. We are selling the main types of stamps and we are providing cash withdrawals. In the future, we hope to provide a parcel drop off and collection service.

We can also provide a cash deposit service with the money transfer taking place within 24 hours.

Our attention can now go onto making further improvements to the Stores, increasing certain food and drink ranges and potentially installing a dedicated drinks fridge. Keep an eye out for changes.

We had our second Christmas here in Whimple and have been truly touched by the number of greeting cards we received from our customers as well as some gifts. This has sealed the welcome we received from the Whimple village a year ago and we feel we are now a true part of this wonderful community.

At the Christmas Carol service, we decided to open and serve mulled wine and hot chocolate with 50% of the takings going to the Dementia UK Charity. We thought that we would serve around 20 cups. We ended up selling 80 mulled wine and chocolate drinks but ran out of the mulled wine towards the end of the queue. Sorry to those who missed the wine, we will increase the stock for next year.

We are trialling taking a regular milk supply from Oak Park Dairy (who advertises in this publication) which will complement the regular milk we receive from West Country Milk (Freshways).

Oak Park Dairy milk and cream products are rich and smooth and have a distinctive flavour probably generated from the absence of high-volume processing. The milk and cream sells in returnable glass bottles (deposit required) and costs more than standard milk but is well worth it. We will have samples available for you to taste before committing.

We like to stock ranges of foods to celebrate key calendar events such as Chinese New Year, Valentine's Day, Easter, Mothering Sunday etc and usually dress our window to give a hint about what is coming. It is worth having a look at the window to see if you want to try out something different for dinner.

Please try to shop local wherever possible. Despite shortages elsewhere, we have a good supply of eggs thanks to our local suppliers.

We have a range of fresh vegetables and we have a lot of products at similar prices to the main supermarkets. All this with the added benefit of zero car miles, free parking, a joke or two and a quick chat about almost anything!

Finally, we would like to thank everyone for the generous donations made to our charity collection boxes on the counter, for buying the Whimple Primary School Cards with over £300 raised in 2022 and for buying our other charity greetings cards raising £68.



The Mural in Whimple Church



About four years ago a black and white image came to light in the Heritage Centre; a copy of a painting which had reputably existed at one point in Whimple Church. This isn't as surprising as it might seem as, during the medieval period when very few people could read, it was common practice to paint images of saints on Church walls as a teaching aid and example of how ordinary human beings could strive towards exceptional virtue. These images were commissioned from travelling artists who worked to a pattern usually using cheap, locally available clay pigments.

The image shows St Christopher carrying Christ across the river. He was a particularly popular saint and was typically placed opposite the south door so that he would be seen by anyone entering the church. This was important because seeing St Christopher was believed to protect a traveller from the likelihood of a sudden and therefore unshriven death that day; a possibility much feared during medieval times. St Christopher was also especially popular in rural areas, amongst manual labourers, because his act clearly suggests that physical effort can, in itself, be valuable in the service of Christ. The two figures at the bottom, whose names are now unknown, are believed to be the donors of the mural.

It isn't easy to determine the date it was painted. The range of feasible dates extend from around 1400 when the church was built to 1540 when the effects of the Reformation meant that wall painting began to disappear. The design of the mural is based on a woodcut imported from Germany in 1423 and thereafter widely copied within the UK. The style of clothing, hair and the presence of the ships and mermaid in the design all take us towards the end of the fifteenth century therefore 1500 would seem a reasonable suggestion.

The mural was likely hidden under plaster and largely forgotten during the Reformation. We do know that Whimple Church and many other parish churches nearby suffered the destruction of their Catholic images by the new Protestant movement. If you take a look at the remains of our Rood Screen near the bell tower, you can see how the saints were 'defaced' rather than completely destroyed – an act that was peculiar to English iconoclasm.

In 1845, when St Mary's was extended, a new south aisle was added and part of the original north wall removed. It was at this point that the mural came to light. Rather than allowing it to disappear completely, John Hayward, the diocesan architect, copied the mural showing how it was placed between the two windows. Apparently, there was also an image of St George between the next pair of windows but it had deteriorated beyond the possibility of useful copying. Hayward's friend, Lt Col William Harding, fortuitously included the painting in the Exeter Diocesian Architectural Society's *Transactions*, a copy of which was found discarded on the floor of a barn in 1940 and sent to the sister of the vicar of Whimple Church. We were able to find this in the Rectory and finally we had a coloured reproduction of the medieval mural.

A copy now hangs appropriately on the wall opposite the south door. It is amazing to think how much luck was involved in enabling its recovery. If you do go along to have a look – there are some curiosities I would love to answer. Why are the windmill sails in that position? What is the figure under St Christopher's left elbow doing? Why does the male donor have a black thumb?

A Window on Whimple's Weather - November/December 2022

Another year has whistled by for Whimple's two weather stations, with lots to report.

After the record dry and warm summer and then fairly dry weather continuing into September and an exceptionally warm October, all changed at the end of the year with a very wet November and very cold start to December.

November – This month was exceptionally wet, with over 200mm of rain, more than twice the average. A series of low pressures moved in on brisk south-westerly winds with peak gusts on the 7th, when some minor damage was reported in the village, mainly to trees. The first two weeks were also very mild, especially on the 13th with a balmy 17.3°C, before temperatures fell back to nearer normal levels. The only frost of the month at -1.8°C was early on the 19th before it turned very unsettled again, with flooding on the 21st as over an inch of rain fell that morning when a deep low crossed from the west. Pressure rose strongly in the last two days of the month heralding a move to winter.

December – Temperatures this month were more than 5°C colder than November, with the first 17 days unusually cold. Sadly precious little snow fell, apart from a small amount on the 10th, and the coldest temperatures for more than 10 years reached a bitter -8.2C at dawn on the 16th. Early on the 17th a bit of treacherous rain froze on pavements, until the easterly and northerly winds suddenly switched on the 18th back to southerly allowing much milder weather to arrive – but also rain. The 19th was a very wet and windy day, but at least it was comfortably mild. It stayed unsettled and mild through to Christmas, with some rain every day for the rest of the month. At least Boxing Day was mostly dry and sunny – perfect for a walk around the village or further afield, and it stayed dry in The Square on New Year's Eve, after a rather dull

Puppy Raising 2023

With the start of the New Year comes the first days of new beginnings, new adventures and new experiences. This year, why not do something really special? When we say volunteering for Guide Dogs is life changing, we're not just talking about the people we'll support. You'll gain new skills; build confidence you never knew you had and have amazing experiences that you genuinely couldn't find anywhere else.

There are around 2 million people living with sight loss in the UK. Guide Dogs, a UK-wide charity with a community team based in Exeter, supports people with a visual impairment to maintain their independence and live the life they choose. There are lots of different services on offer, ranging from volunteer-led services such as My Sighted Guide through to the support for children and young people, access to technology, and the iconic guide dog service.

This year, we are urgently appealing for new volunteers to sign up as Puppy Raisers. This means looking after future guide dogs for the first year of their lives, socialising them and giving them a loving home. Many of you may think saying goodbye to your pup would be too difficult, but our volunteers say nothing beats the rewarding feeling of knowing you have played a huge part in changing someone's life. Terry describes the moment he said goodbye to the first dog he fostered:

"We were really attached to the first dog we fostered, Carli. However, we get to see her with her owner and that makes it all worthwhile. We went to our local centre and Carli came to greet us but immediately returned to her owner's side as if to say 'I've got a job to do'. Carli has given her owner the opportunity to go to university and live a full life."

Sometimes, the first step can feel daunting, but if you're volunteering with Guide Dogs, our welcoming and supportive family of both staff and volunteers are walking alongside you throughout.





The POW+R Group continues to be proactive in protecting our village from anything that would harm the distinctive character of our community and our rich agricultural and architectural heritage - our way of life to some extent. It is one thing to write about our special traditions, but it was a joy also to be present at this year's Whimple wassail. A traditional ceremony to encourage new growth and a bountiful harvest of the apple trees. It usually takes place on Old Twelvey Night, the 17th January, linked to the Gregorian calendar in 1752. It started outside the New Fountain / Heritage Centre and proceeded, with lamps, to the first orchard where the Wassail King and Queen were to toss old apples and toast at the apple trees, sing a few lines of a traditional verse, all in good pagan spirit, to encourage a good harvest. Of course, there was some cider, and then off to the next orchard for more cider and then to the Cricket Ground for some more cider. It was quite a gathering, certainly over a hundred. Critically, it is these fields that need our protection from the avaricious desire to build more homes in our village.

East Devon Draft Local Plan 2020-2040.

The guiding principles to POW+R Group is the fundamental belief in selfdetermination for the citizens of the Parish of Whimple, and the principle of localism. It is the policy of the Government that power should be exercised at the lowest practical level - close to the people who are affected by decisions. The objective being to enable the entire Parish of Whimple to have a direct and strong say in the way the village and wider parish develops through the creation of a set of policies and community directed actions tailored to the demands, needs, concerns and desires of the local people. This is the purpose of a Neighbourhood Plan. Through recent consultations that many villagers completed both in person and online, vital feedback has been gathered around the specific items affecting Whimple, with reference to various plots of land in and around the core village. This provides additional evidence when creating our own Neighbourhood Plan. Apart from our normal article, POW+R Group added a flyer, which we know had an impact on the number of responses to the East Devon Local Plan for 2020 to 2040. In addition, another independent group from Whimple produced a further flyer with more details to focus on. It must be stated that the online survey did take a great deal of time going through each separate section.

POW+R Group submitted a five-page report to highlight what is considered appropriate for our village and our 'Red Lines'. Critically, it is accepted that there is an appreciation that villages will evolve and grow, however there is a strong desire to keep developments to less than 10 dwellings. The acceptance is to ensure conservation and enhancement of the natural historic and built environmental.

It is also on the proviso that the maximum number of new dwellings would be 10 dwellings per 5 years, up to 2040. There would be an expectation that 50% would be affordable. This is in line with the feedback from your responses to the Village Questionnaire and feedback given on post-it notes at the Village Consultation in the Victory Hall last February.



We are aware that the EDDC is pushing for substantial levels of development on the western side of East Devon, with these including a second new town and local employment growth. What they say is that the focus on development is being directed to the towns and villages with the greatest range of services and facilities.

Whimple Neighbourhood Plan - We are now moving forward with pace, knowing we have more to undertake in completing some of the vital sections and policies. As the EDDC develop their Local Plan we must be ahead and get our draft complete, slightly later than anticipated, by Easter. We will then present the plan to Whimple residents for your observations and suggestions, before proceeding to the final version and village referendum. It so important to get this right first time, and if it takes another month, so be it. We are happy to take any further comments from villagers.

Communication Mast - POW+R Group have made a formal objection to the proposed installation of a 18m (58ft 6in) monopole, supporting six antennas, which has now been reduced to 16m (52ft .6in) but our objection still remains.

Post Office - There is no doubt that a Post Office in the village is a valuable asset, but that asset has costs attached to it. It is appreciated that the financial package by the Post Office offered to typical village stores is insufficient to cover overheads. It is a huge loss to our community to no longer have this service within our village and I am sure we will all miss it greatly.

The New Fountain Inn - In a recent visit it was clear that the New Fountain is taking shape, as work progresses to achieve an open day at some time during March. It will be great to have this historic pub back, as part of our village community with Lee taking the helm.

Thirsty Farmer - The POW+R Group are deeply sad to see Donna and Marc Slater, move on after five years at the helm. They have done a fantastic job and have taken the pub into a higher league of excellence in customer service and food, receiving this year a Taste of the West Gold Award, in the South West. The high cost of energy has made a difference to their business strategy.

Cranbrook Expansion - As an ongoing measure we are still monitoring the developments at Cranbrook that have an impact on our village. This includes what are known as SANGS - Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace - which provides residents of Cranbrook recreational sites for walking, informal games, dog exercise etc. This will be ex-agricultural land and woodlands. A number of acres will be within our Parish. In theory they act as a 'buffer zone' between Cranbrook and Rockbeare and Whimple and help to provide vital distinction between the settlements.

By the time this edition of the News reaches everyone, January will have come and gone and we will have had our first meeting of the year which was the AGM held on Tuesday 31st January 2023. It was good to be able to report on a year without disruption and a full programme of events. More details in the next edition and hopefully more information of the events we are planning for 2023.

In the last edition of the News, I should have reported on the very interesting and informative talk we had by Dr Robert Dunn from the Met Office. Despite the awful weather that night, his talk on Climate Change attracted an excellent audience. Clearly a subject of much interest to us all and we were shown a whole range of graphs and other information showing things have changed over many decades. All in all a very informative talk

One of the two key events in every year is our Annual Spring Plant Sale which raises much needed funds to cover the running costs of the Annual Flower and Craft Show. This year we are having to run this event on a Sunday afternoon and the date is Sunday 21st May and will be in the Village Hall.

The Annual Flower and Craft Show is planned for Saturday 12th August 2023. We will be working on the new schedule in February and will endeavour to have it ready for the plant sale in May. As reported in the last edition of the News, we have already agreed the subjects for the photography Classes. All the classes are for a coloured or black and white print, maximum size being 6" x 8", or 150mm x 200mm. The titles for this year are: 'Silhouettes'; 'Clouds'; 'Pond Life'; 'Bark'; 'Laughter'; 'A Gateway'; 'Mischief'; 'A Non Flowering Plant Subject' (e.g. Ferns, Fungi, Mosses, Leaves etc); 'Sunset' and 'A Landscape'. Hopefully there are some suitable titles for all those keen photographers we have in the village!

We are looking forward to another full full programme of events this year and, as and when we have more details, they will appear in a future editions of the News. Details of all our activities are on our website, www.whimple-vpa.co.uk so do take a look there.



Let's Talk Whimple

We are still meeting on Tuesday mornings 10am to noon at The Pea in the village square. Anyone is welcome to join us for a cuppa and a chat.

We recently had a very interesting visit from Ottery Help Scheme. The charity has been running for 30 years and has evolved from some volunteers providing transport for patients of the doctors surgery to the constantly evolving support network it is today. They are keen to reach out to villages and Whimple is covered by the services they offer. If there are services you would like to see in Whimple they would value your feedback.

They still offer transport services – a return journey to RD&E hospital will cost you £20 if your visit is under two hours and the driver will wait for you and drop you door to door. You can even hire the wheelchair adapted minibus.

Other services they offer are:

- Befriending volunteers will ring you or visit you at home if you feel isolated.
- Bereavement support volunteers are trained to offer support in person or by phone.
- Memory café monthly groups supported by trained staff are held at Ottery cricket club.
- Friendship group monthly support group for those looking to form new friendships.
- Activity groups promoting connections and wellbeing.
- Seated exercise classes, nail cutting services, wellbeing trips
- Time for you support service for carers enabling carers to take a break
- Form filling help to fill in forms such as attendance and carers allowance if you have any type of disability or illness that has meant you have needed support for 6 months or more.
- They also provide chargeable services such as cleaning, shopping, meal planning, food preparation, enabling visits and help with household paperwork.
- Free legal clinics 30-minute free consultation-next clinic 16th Feb-phone 813041
- Guide to supporting someone with Dementia useful contacts around our area

We also talked about the mental health wellbeing coaches available at Coleridge medical centre and the drop-in support at the Silver Otter café on a Friday.

There was also a reminder that the fire service offers free safety checks which are available to many people and families and provides some great advice to stay safe in your homes.

JUST TEN QUESTIONS

Having recovered from her extremely busy Cotley Christmas, Helen Bowker spared a few minutes to chat about the changes in farming over the years.

Q1 Can you tell me a bit about your childhood and whether you always saw yourself running a farm? I really spent all my childhood outdoors with my father, Raymond Burrough at Gateshayes Farm. I learned a great work ethic from him, as well as a love for this way of life. I didn't really see myself doing anything else apart from farming. I went to university and worked away for ten years, but came back to Whimple in the early 90's.



Q2 How would you describe Cotley Farm? Gateshayes is really the main part of the business and Cotley is a diversification of this, a small seasonal enterprise. We started growing Christmas trees in the early 2000's. We started selling about 30 and gradually increased sales over the years. Cotley Christmas is mainly a fun time of the year when we get to meet lots of people. We're providing a traditional offering to people as an alternative for their Christmas shopping as well as hopefully a memorable experience on the farm.

Q3 Is running a small, family run, local farming business still a viable way of farming in the present economic climate? Well, we do farm at Gateshayes & Cotley, plus we rent other land. However, we are unusual in that we are a mixed farm. Over the years the drive for efficiency normally means that farmers specialise more and more. However, we have always felt that it is important to have variety and this has worked for us over the years. In 2001 the foot and mouth epidemic put severe pressure on our business and prompted us to explore diversification. Also, it suits our personalities to have variety.

Q4 Has Brexit had a positive or negative effect on the farming industry?

Short Term it probably helped because of the drop in the pound, causing the value of our products to go up. However, longer term we are very concerned over the trade deals that the Government is negotiating. We have very high welfare standards and regulations in this country. Bringing in food from other countries with lower levels of regulation is consequently less safe and could undercut us. It is very frightening. Commodity production is very volatile. For example the pig industry has almost been decimated since Brexit. Farmers are having to look at diversifications such as solar farms, to secure a regular income.

Q5 And what about the climate? Are you noticing a need for changing your methods?

The weather is definitely more impactful now with excessive rain or long droughts. We are part of Arla, a cooperative for selling our milk, so we have a particular sustainability agenda. As part of this we audit our energy and resource use. Therefore, through different areas of sustainability we are improving our carbon footprint. Today the cow is seen as the enemy and though methane is a damaging gas, interestingly there are 28% less cows in this country than thirty years ago.

Our regional climate is not suitable for growing a lot of arable crops. Also, in the west country, there is so much land you can only grow grass on (and Whimple clay is certainly not ideal for growing vegetables!!). So, we try to have a very grass-based feeding system for our livestock to make responsible use of the land with regards to climate change.

Q6 Are there any important changes or regulations that you would like to see in place? Less regulations probably! With our cooperative we are being asked for more information all the time. This is good as it makes sure things are done properly but it is time consuming. We are happy to do this as long as we aren't penalised by cheaper, lower quality foodstuff being imported.

Q7 Having just attended my first Wassail, it's obvious that Whimple's cider heritage is still an important part of village life. How are you keeping this bit of farming going? The lovely orchards were planted at a time when everything was handpicked. So today the whole topography is not suitable for machinery, and sadly they are now totally uneconomical. However,our participation in an environmental scheme has enabled us to plant 800 trees in the last 4 years and they have now been converted to organic status. We believe the traditional orchards define the heritage of our village and are a rich source of wildlife and we are committed to trying to maintain them.

Q8 I can't interview you without asking about the reindeer! So, for those WN readers who haven't heard your story before, how did it start? We belong to the British Christmas Tree Growers Association and I visited a farm in Swansea in 2008 that had reindeer, and just fell in love with them. We were used to dealing with large animals and you manage reindeer in a similar way to sheep, so we had the confidence to be able to look after them. We started with two and now have six. They can't be tamed like a horse and they like their own space. They still have their wild instinct and I suppose they are a halfway house between a pet and a farm animal. Really, having reindeer transformed the business and gave it something special.

Q9 What are your plans for Cotley Farm for the future? There are a lot of changes ahead in farming, so we never stop investing otherwise we go backwards. Also, we have always tried to employ local people from the village and this has been a great link with the local community for us. We provide flexibility with hours and part time work and it's important to us to continue this. We are continually adapting and aiming to provide an enriching experience for visitors within a working farm.

Q10 Finally, why is Whimple special to you? I was born here and have strong family connections. (My mother Margaret Burrough, still sleeps in the bedroom she was born in at Gateshayes Farm.) We are very blessed to live here and thankful to my grandparents for enabling us to move into Cotley. Whimple is an exceptional community, it's very pretty and in a great location. We do have some of the best views from Cotley Farm, I feel very privileged to live here.



The NHS is under immense pressure at the moment, and we cannot continue to provide safe care and a limitless service in General Practice.

We have experienced many days when the urgent demand is much higher than the capacity of our doctors and nurses, but in the last few months demand has exceeded capacity on a daily basis.

We always aim to provide safe care. Safe care for Coleridge Medical Centre means that our Duty Doctors - whose job it is to manage all of the demand for same day medical appointments - should have no more than 40 patients in a day.

In the last few months, our Duty Doctors have had urgent, on-the-day lists that have been more than double this, with an average of 95 patients in one day. This has reached well over 100 in the last 2 weeks alone. This does not allow for sufficient breaks or unseen GP work such as home visits, prescriptions, test results, sick notes, reviews, etc. These numbers do not include routine appointments, or the urgent appointments picked up by our fantastic Nurse Practitioners. For the wellbeing of our patients and all our staff, this is no longer sustainable for the practice to maintain.

Coleridge Medical Centre – as do many other surgeries – will now be setting a daily limit on how many patients we can book for urgent on-the-day assessments. Once we have reached this capacity, our team will be asking patients to contact other parts of the NHS whose role it is to provide urgent help (such as 111 or 111 online), or to call back on alternate days.

If our patients can use our urgent on-the-day capacity carefully, then we hope that we will have enough urgent appointments to offer. This means:

- Not asking for an appointment that day if your problem is not medically urgent. Most things can and should wait for the next routine GP appointment.
- Using www.nhs.uk, pharmacies, and 111 for minor illnesses and how to manage these at home. Much of the additional demand we have had in recent weeks is patients calling in the first few days of minor illnesses which, most of the time, can be treated successfully at home until the normal period of symptoms passes. For example, it is normal for a cold to last up to 3 weeks. The amount of calls we receive for these self-limiting symptoms means that we can't provide a safe service to the patients who do develop more severe symptoms or have serious medically urgent problems.

If all our patients use our urgent on-the-day appointments responsibly, we will have the capacity to get to all of our patients with serious medically urgent concerns. When we do reach our capacity for urgent on-the-day appointments, we will ask patients to contact other services who can help, such as NHS 111, pharmacies, MIU, etc.

Staff have been asked by our clinicians to provide this information to patients. We understand that this is a change to how the practice has been operating for the last 2 and half years, and we continue to appreciate your support and understanding towards our staff.

We thank you for supporting us in this change to ensure that we can be there for you when you need us.

I am pleased to be able to start the year with some good news, which is to report that the application for a giant solar installation at Marsh Green, East Devon has been

refused. We were pleased to help local residents fight this proposal to cover up yet more of our green fields with solar panels, but we have to wait to hear whether the applicant will go to appeal.

I would like to thank all of you who responded to our questionnaire, we are still fully analysing the results, which will be announced in the next newsletter, but it is clear that you fully support our campaigning to prevent too much development swallowing up so much of our green spaces. Many Devon members now live in close proximity to a solar installation, which is unsurprising as we now have at least 70 large solar farms in the County, with yet another application submitted recently at Willand, Mid Devon.

We continue to keep our planning consultant very busy with a variety of other issues. During the first two weeks of this year we have already submitted a response to the East Devon district draft local plan consultation


