FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

Too quick despairer wherefore wilt thy go?

Soon will the high Midsummer pomp come on Soon will the musk carnation break and swell Soon shall we have the gold-dusted snapdragon Sweet Williams with their homely cottage smell And stocks in fragrant blow

In England, Midsummer day is on the 24th June, the feast of St John the Baptist and oddly comes three days after the Summer Solstice which falls on June 21st, and is the longest day. Poets and music composers have all been inspired by that day. Shakespeare with his Midsummer's Nights Dream as well as Mendelssohn. How many weddings have resounded with the wedding march 'Here comes the bride'? Strangely it does not seem to be favoured at all by modern brides who prefer the organ symphony of Vidor. It has such wonderful vigour.

June has other important Saint's days - St Paul and St Peter on June 29th. We are so lucky this year at our parish church of St Mary's to have the choristers of the cathedral church of St Peter in Exeter give a concert on June 17th. What a treat that will be and no doubt the church will be full to the rafters. The concert will be followed by a Strawberry Fayre at the Old Manse in The Square, on June 24th. Its aim is to raise funds for the Exeter Cathedral choir tour of America. What a wonderful experience that will be for our young choristers. All we have to do now is ask our friends the weathermen at the Met Office to guarantee good weather, also for our own church fete which will be on June 10th and this year it will be at Hindstrete.

June is also the month of the rose. ROSES...they bring sweetness and magic into our lives. Exquisite in shape with a never-ending variety of tints and such subtle fragrance. They make us forget for a while all our cares and woes. One single rose can bring happiness if we know how to appreciate it fully. It is the flower of the gods; it has been beloved by poets in every country from the days of the troubadours right down to modern times. It is the messenger of tenderness and love, the flower of mystic love and the symbol of purity. I found this touching poem in Olde English from the Middle ages :-

> As the fresche Rois of colour reid and whyt Forgive thou dois hurt is thyne honesty Considering that no flour so perfyt So full of vertew, pleasans and delyt So full of blissful angeilik bewty Imperiall birth, honour and dignite

I love the common wild rose , rosa canina, or briar, or dog rose. It was called dog rose because it was formerly believed to cure rabies. It is undoubtedly the most conspicuous and most beautiful of midsummer hedgerow flowers. In Devon they cascade over hedges with gracefully shaped branches. The wild rose flourished in ancient Athens and in the Iliad (written by the legendary Greek poet of the 8th century BC, Homer the blind minstrel who also wrote the Odyssey), it features as the flower of Aphrodite the goddess of love who cured Hector's wounds with the oil of roses. The rose descended from Aphrodite to Eros and then became the sacred Rosa mystica of the Virgin Mary. With its sharp contrast of sharp thorns and delicate scented flowers the wild rose becomes the symbol of that true love which survives happiness and adversity alike for it symbolises both pleasure and pain.

Shakespeare has an epithet along these lines -"Roses have thorns and silver fountains mud" and Rupert Brooke's couplet is almost legendary "Unkept about the hedge blows an English unofficial rose". Of course it is the heraldic rose of England.

Then comes hot July, boyling like to fire That all his garment his had cast away Upon a Lyon raging yet with ire He boldly rode, and made him to obaye; Behind his backe a sithe and by his side Under his belt he wore a sickle circling wide

This is the month for picnics, when the weather is set fair and the ground quite dry. It is perfect to spread out the rug on a newly-mown field and to sit back for a while and feel you are part of the countryside, smelling the grass and the hedgerows and listening to the sounds of the insects around you. I remember the days when we lived in London and went to the beauty and peace of Glyndbourne and we shared our hamper full of exotic food and champagne with friends who came for an evening of music, the music of the first act still ringing in your ears. I found it most amusing and eccentric to wait on Victoria station all dressed up in our evening finery. It was certainly an evening to remember for its 18th century touch. I also remember with great tenderness how we spent our time picnicking along the French roads on our way to the Pyrenees and Spain. We both liked the simple things in life and that is exactly fifty years ago, on our honeymoon!





Whimple Heritage Centre A Plea from The Curator



The Heritage Centre belongs to the people of Whimple, be they lifelong residents or new residents. If you have been into the Centre I think you will agree that it is an asset to the village and that villagers can be justly proud that we have such an attraction celebrating the history of the village and keeping the memories alive for all generations to savour.

If you haven't been to the Centre you won't know what I am talking about but if you could take 10 minutes to visit and look around then I think you would be proud to talk about the Centre and recommend it to others.

A number of people in the village are already helping in one way or another, and we need to get more people involved. The work can be very interesting and there are a number of ways in which you could help. You don't have to be a member of the History Society to join in.

- We are looking for Stewards who can be on duty when the Centre is open. The maximum time for this is two and three quarters of an hour (10am to 12.45pm or 12.45pm to 3.30pm) on a Saturday between April and September. This is not onerous and you usually get to meet an interesting selection of visitors. You don't have to have an in depth knowledge of the exhibits as we have the facilities to provide more information on request.
- We also need people to assist with the filing and sorting of archives. You may be surprised to know that we get enquiries from all over the world, via our website, and we need people to research and respond to these. We have a team of four who do this at present. Their ages range from middle fifties to early nineties! If you are keen to learn about the village and its history and keep the Heritage Centre alive then why not consider giving us an hour or two of your time each week. You may be very surprised how rewarding this can be. Our current team tell me that once they get immersed in a research project they just can't stop reading more and more on the subject!

- Thanks to the Heritage Lottery Fund we are now starting a project to put all our archives on to computer. This will not only allow the items to be looked at without using the original documentation but also, in the longer term, enable us to put selected records onto our website. So far two villagers have volunteered some of their time to help with this and they are doing an excellent job. But we need more people to help with this project too.
- The Heritage Centre is a great asset to the village and you may be all for it but, unfortunately, it doesn't run itself and it gets dusty just like any other building. We need a number of people to run round with a vacuum cleaner every week and if you are prepared to help please contact me.
- The Heritage Centre is run by the History Society. We have a number of experienced Committee members but we are always on the lookout for new (and dare I say it younger) members. If you feel that you could contribute to the running of the Society and the Heritage Centre then why not become a member and put your name forward for selection to the Committee at the next AGM. New ideas are always welcome and we are a 21st century History Society.

HONITON AND DISTRICT RING & RIDE

The Honiton Ring and Ride Bus transports people from their doorsteps to Honiton, and other destinations such as Exeter and Sidmouth.

Until a few years ago only elderly or incapacitated people could use this bus. The Department for Transport has removed this limitation, and many people are eligible to use the bus, whatever their age or circumstances, provided they have no other transport available.

For instance in one area, the Ring and Ride bus is being used by a young mother to go to town, after she has taken her child to school, because she has no car or other means of getting out to do her shopping, etc.

The Ring and Ride Bus is also available for private hire by certain groups of the community.

Honiton Ring and Ride currently needs volunteers.

Volunteers are needed for driving the minibus (for which full training will be given), also fundraisers for promotional activities and publicity work. Office staff are needed to occasionally man the telephones.

There is an opportunity for young people to get involved in fund raising, and use this as a topic for community projects and course work.

Representatives from Ring and Ride are happy to come out and take part in village events to promote and explain the service.

Although the Ring and Ride has its headquarters in the same office as TRIP, they are two separate charities offering different services to the public, but both organisations have community service as their core purpose.



THE NATIONAL BLOOD SERVICE

Eighty six donors attended the last blood donor session at Feniton School. This short article describes what is involved in giving blood.



Who can become a blood donor?

Anyone aged between 17 and 60 (before your 60 birthday), who is healthy and not subject to certain medical conditions.

What types of blood are needed?

All types — especially the most common ones because they are the ones most in demand.

How much time is involved?

It takes around 45 minutes from booking in at a session to the end of the rest period. Donors are normally invited to donate two or three times a year. Appointments which shorten the waiting time are also now available. To book, please call 0845 7 711 711.

Where can I give blood?

Sessions are held in villages, towns and cities up and down the country throughout the year. When a session is to be held in your neighbourhood, you will be sent an invitation giving you the date and location.

What happens when I give blood?

When you arrive at a session a drop of blood will be taken from your finger and tested to ensure you are not anaemic. You will also be asked a few questions as to the state of your health. The actual donation, supervised by a trained nurse, will take about 10 minutes, then after 15-20 minutes rest and light refreshment you will be able to go home or back to work.

Does it hurt?

Giving blood is a simple procedure and most donors feel only the slightest discomfort.

Is there any risk?

There is no risk of being infected in any way. All the equipment used is new and is never reused.

What will I get out of giving blood?

Mainly the satisfaction of knowing that you are helping to save lives. But you will also find out your blood group and there is always the tea and biscuits after each donation!

How do I enrol as a blood donor?

Licensing Matters (or the problem of twelve TENs?)

Last November the Licensing Laws changed. There was much publicity at the time about pubs staying open 24 hours a day, and night clubs employing licensed bouncers. What is not so well known is that these new laws are having a far-reaching effect on other, much smaller, premises such as our village hall.

The Victory Hall now has a new-style entertainments licence, but that licence has come with a raft of new rules and regulations that seem to us to be far more appropriate to a big city-centre establishment than to a village hall. Although we will be seeking clarification of some of the issues, the outcome is likely to be that users will have to take on certain new responsibilities, and there will be more paperwork. For example, it appears that a 'supervisor' must be nominated for every 'pay to enter' event who must carry out a number of safety checks before the event starts, and then remain there as long as the hall remains open. The nomination must be confirmed in writing by both parties.

This is just one of the new legal requirements, there are several others. It may appear that the trustees of the hall are becoming much more finicky about what can and cannot take place in the hall, and seem to be introducing much more 'unnecessary' paperwork. But please bear with us as we try to keep the bureaucracy to a minimum and stay within the law.

Another issue that has arisen as a direct consequence of the new law is to do with variations to the terms of our licence; for example for the sale of alcohol, or to extend an event beyond our normal hours (11am to midnight - or to 10.30pm on a Sunday). Every such event requires the organiser to get a new-style temporary licence called a 'Temporary Event Notice' (TEN) from East Devon District Council. Only twelve TENs are permitted in any calendar year.

The law has become much stricter. In the past there have been 'pay to enter' events where people attending have been given a glass of wine. Under the new law the organiser would have to obtain a TEN for that event in the same way as for a full commercial bar.

This has already created a problem for us as there have been far more requests for TENs than we had expected. With only five months of this year gone, we have had nine TENs applications leaving us with only three for the rest of the year. It is clear that in future we will need to ration the number we can accept, and perhaps discourage the 'free glass of wine' approach as this will prevent others from having a full bar, or an extension of hours, at a subsequent social evening. Certainly BYO (bring your own) may be a better option

Despite the difficulties that stem from the new law, the trustees still aim to provide you with the best possible facilities for your events in our village hall.



'Silent callers' face fines

Telecoms regulator Ofcom is threatening fines of up to £50,000 for companies behind the growing problem of silent calls.

The calls, during which there is a silence at the other end of the line when the phone is answered, are made by automatic systems used for telesales, marketing, research, debt collection as well as other financial services.

The system rings numbers from a list until they get a reply, and at this point the call is switched to a call centre-operator - if one is available. If not the line simply hangs. Scanning systems compiling lists of numbers do not even bother to get an operator: they simply register the phone as 'live'.

Complaints to BT about silent calls are currently running at 80,000 a month, and a phone owner receives an average of six calls a month.

An Ofcom statement says the organisation will take 'swift and decisive' measures to ensure companies comply with a new set of requirements for call systems. These



require that no more than 3 per cent of the live calls can be silent. Also, if no operator is available within two seconds, then a brief message must be played containing the name of the organisation responsible - which, as Ofcom pointed out, is not necessarily the same as the one actually making the call.

Ofcom said that if a phone company cannot help phone owners prevent silent calls there is a complaint line at:
