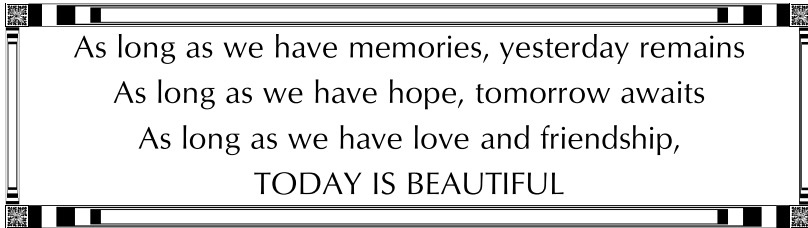
Thanks for all the news and views submitted for this issue. Do keep them coming and let any team member have your thoughts on how Whimple News might improve.

MILLENNIUM DOME FIRST IMPRESSIONS

As some people may have heard I have been given a job at the Millennium Dome and I thought it would be a nice idea to write down my first impressions to tell Whimble more about it.

I have now seen it first hand, inside and out and I can tell you - it is amazing; firstly the size - overwhelming - the height of Big Ben and apparently the diameter would allow the Eiffel Tower to lie down inside; and it has the biggest roof in the world and can be seen from space - it is big!

Details were recorded in a garden in Whimple.

It must be emphasized that rainfall will vary over a short distance especially in heavy showery weather and the location of the rain gauge.

I have records covering 30 years. The average rainfall over those 30 years is 33.19 inches, therefore it is obvious from the above we have had two very wet years. Does this support the prediction of the Met Office of warmer, wetter years?

1999 produced some remarkable weather. Five months were below average rainfall and five were above. It was the second highest yearly rainfall in 30 years (the highest being 1974 at 45.40 inches). September was the second highest monthly rainfall in 30 years (the highest being January 1974 at 9.09 inches). December was the wettest December in 30 years at 7.24 inches.

I regret metrication hasn't reached this neck of the woods yet!!

Xmas is not Xmas in Whimble unless you have the carols in The Square and the annual pantomime from the Whimbletons. It is the time of year that braver souls than me, dear reader, cast off their inhibitions and tread the boards of theatre-land for a couple of nights in front of their peers and fellow villagers. It is the time of year that apparent pillars of society cake their faces in make-up, throw on the best clothes that Oxfam (or the wardrobe at home) can offer, and perform lines that have been committed to memory over many evenings of hard toil

This year was to be no different. The thing that I always love about this village pantomime is the creativity and enthusiasm that Peter Bolwell puts into the script. Everything rhymes - well, it does on the script but sometimes the cast help it along a little (which is all part of the fun). Audience participation is mandatory, (oh no it isn't, oh yes it is!) and Alison Griffiths as the Story Teller walked amongst the audience at the start, to ensure that we understood our responsibilities. We were encouraged to test our cheering and booing skills, and gifts of great largesse were scattered amongst the audience as rewards for the best.

Maddy Colin did an excellent job as young Cinderella and displayed great stage confidence throughout the evening as the rest of the cast clung valiantly to what they remembered of the script. Ian Reynolds and Paul Colin gave of their best as the Ugly Sisters - such legs, such melodious voices, such public enjoyment at wearing ladies clothing!!! Julie Reynolds was a very effective Step-Mother to the Gruesome Twosome, wearing what appeared to be a rotating black and white wig to great effect.

As one of 'The Three Must-Get-Heres' Richard Styles gave us a song with audience participation, which was fun. He also proved to have tremendous skills in moving the fireplace, and took every opportunity to demonstrate it to us. Miles Leonard, as another 'Must-Get-Here', shared with us a French accent that was either based on the patois of the Central Massif, or somewhere north of the Thirsty Farmer. James Causley brought youth and vigour to the trio, and kept the average age down a little - which they badly needed.

"WE ARE SURVIVORS" (For those born before 1940)

We were born before television, before penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic contact lenses, videos, frisbees and the pill. We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens; before dishwashers, tumble driers, electric blankets, air conditioners drip-dry clothes and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together (how quaint can you be?). We thought 'fast food' was what you ate in Lent, a 'Big Mac' was an oversized raincoat and 'crumpet' we had for tea. We existed before house husbands, computer dating, dual cars, and when a "meaningful relationship" meant getting along with cousins, and sheltered accommodation was where you waited for a bus.

We were before day care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yoghurt, of young men wearing earrings. For us 'time sharing' meant togetherness, a 'chip' was a piece of wood or fried potato, 'hardware' meant nuts and bolts and 'software' wasn't a word.

Before 1940 "Made in Japan" meant junk, the term 'making out' referred to how you did in your exams, and 'stud' was something that fastened a collar to a shirt and 'going all the way' meant staying on a double decker to the bus depot. Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. In our day, cigarette smoking was 'fashionable', grass was mown, 'coke' was kept in the coal house, a 'joint' was a piece of meat you ate on Sundays and 'pot' was something you cooked in. 'Rock music' was a fond mother's lullaby, 'Eldorado' was an ice cream, a 'gay person' was the life and soul of the party and nothing more, while 'aids' just meant beauty treatment or help for someone in trouble.

We were born before 1940 - must be a hardy bunch when you think of the way in which the world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder we are so confused and there is a generation gap today

BUT - By the grace of God . . .

we have survived.

The Year 2000 - Why?

So all the parties are over, the fireworks have exploded, the Champagne corks popped and the sore heads recovered. What though were we celebrating?

The sole reason for all of the celebrations was to mark the year 2000. That is the beginning of the 2000th year from the birth of Jesus Christ.. But did Jesus Christ really exist and was Jesus Christ who he said that he was?

In answer to those questions just consider this:

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another obscure village where he worked in a carpenter's shop until he was thirty. He never wrote a book. Magic Carpet



Magic Carpet is an Exeter based charity who provides creative activities for people with special needs in and around Exeter. We currently run six regular arts and drama sessions for people with learning disabilities and during 1999 we ran sessions at the West of England School, a Family Centre, a secure unit for children, St Petrocks and for the 729 Club in Honiton. After talking to people we felt there may be a need for an art, drama or music group in the Whimple area.

To make a group practically and financially viable we would need to have about 18 regular members, although we may be able to begin with a few less people.

With your support we may be able to start a group which would offer creative and social opportunities for people with special needs in your area.

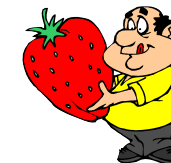

So, make a note of the dates of the above events and more details will follow through the year, and we hope to see as many of you as possible at them.

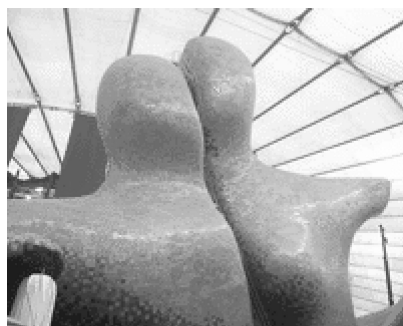
