



The winter months are much maligned mainly because there is not so much light in our lives. It is probably for this reason that two important festivals during the dark months celebrate light Christmas with the guiding star of Bethlehem, then the feast of Candlemass celebrating the blessing of candles. There is a Chinese proverb which states "Do not worry about darkness, light a candle". The candle vigil in The Square on New Years Eve was a very moving experience for all those who took part and many expressed the wish that it should be repeated. I hope it will be.

In the first chapter of The Bible, in Genesis, God said "Let there be light and there was light, and God saw the light that it was good and God divided the light from the darkness".

In the 15th century, the Polish astronomer Copernicus was seeking a new theory of the heavenly bodies and found that the planets, including the planet Earth, revolve around the sun. In the 16th century, the Italian scientist Galileo found out about the oscillation of the pendulum which proved Copernicus' theory of the revolving planets. Up till then it was thought that the planet Earth was completely flat and one could drop off the end of the earth. When Galileo pronounced his famous words "E pur si muova luca tua radium" (and yet it moves), he was put under house arrest and accused of heresy. In the 17th century came the Englishman Newton; his great discovery was that light was not white as previously thought, but could be separated into a sequence of coloured components forming the visible spectrum. Everyday from my window in The Square, I observe with great pleasure that the light of day is expanding and it affects not only human beings but the birds in my garden too. We had some really sunny days lately and the birds are very active and carry out their house-building operations. Gradually their songs become louder.

Among the notes of numerous birds, I recognise the songs of the thrush, blackbird, wren, robin, great and blue tit. The cock-chaffinch looks especially gay just now in his Spring coat and his song is easy to identify for it ends with an emphatic flourish. By the sitting-room window, I have placed a small feeder and it is so very entertaining to watch the sparrows having a wonderful time. They love to bask in the sun and use the window-boxes as sand baths. In some parts of the country they are called 'dunnock' a word meaning duncoloured bird. They squabble quite a lot over who is going to have the best nuts; their song is a tuneless ditty.

We had a few frosty mornings, followed by bright sunshine. The sun has really a great power, so many of the Spring flowers respond to its warm rays by opening wide, the cellandines, anemonies, aconites unfold their bright little heads and when the sun goes, they shut up. The primroses are starting to thicken up in their mossy clumps and crocii open their cups wide to soak in the sunrays. There is one thing I really look forward to every year as the daylight expands and that is the dawn chorus. Just as the birds sing less in the dark cold months of the year, they also start late if a heavy overcast dawn retards the lightening of the sky.

Likewise I have also observed that human beings are affected by grey skies. People are more likely to smile and be happy with a large percentage of sunshine. The sun lights our days. I am so very lucky to live in a house where the Winter sun comes pouring in every window. Everything looks so much better than on a gloomy day. The sunshine is luring me outside and I get the full benefit of

The Society hopes that everyone who lives within the boundary of the village will attend there at that time to be included in the photo.


There is ample car parking at the Sports Field.

NEWS FROM P.O. CORNER

Spring is on it's way ... the bills are coming in and the price of posting the cheques will be going <u>up on April 27th</u> not early April as previously advised.

The most common question of the last two months has been "Is this Post Office really under threat of closure due to the action proposed by the D.S.S.?". The answer is "Yes" and I will try to explain why.

- Fact 1 The D.S.S. will pay benefits, pensions etc into bank accounts (or similar) from 2003 onwards and save money, by not paying me!
- ? Mystery 1. Some people do not want, some cannot get, and some (e.g. bankrupts) are not allowed, bank accounts.
- Fact 2. The D.S.S. state you will still be able to get your cash over the P.O. counter if you want.
- ? Mystery 2. How is payment :DSS to Bank to P.O. to You cheaper than DSS to P.O. to You?'
- Possibility 1. Bank & P.O. act for nothing (we close), you get reduced benefit (no chance) or DSS pays -nothing saved.
- Possibility 2. Savings are made by reduction of fraud due to payment direct into bank maybe but extra layer in delivery of cash increases opportunity for the clever fraudster.

My Conclusion and Belief: The D.S.S. must be relying on the majority of benefit recipients not bothering to collect from the P.O. once the cash is already in the bank; this seems likely and it follows that payment of many bills will be by direct debit from those bank accounts.

Now if I am right the loss of business will be such as to close some 8000 POs - and that includes this one, it will simply be financially unviable.

The only way forward for the threatened P.O.s is to have as many of our customers as possible still using the P.O. to collect cash (by way of cashing cheques from the accounts into which the government has put the money), pay bills etc; there are already a dangerous number of people using the system the way the government wants.

Of course the P.O. is used for many other things which make for convenience to villages such as ours:

Royal Mail sorting office so you can collect any undeliverable mail from here rather than go to Exeter; post Registered Mail from here; return mail order items; hold mail whilst away; collect mail early if required. etc. will go if P.O. goes; Fred grew up in rural Leicestershire. His mother had a grocery shop in London during the war. He qualified as a horologist and for thirty two years was a watchmaker and jeweller.

In 1985, on return from Australia, he and Pat bought Whimple Stores. At that time the shop carried less stock, did not extend into the hardware section and was closed on Sundays. He has tried to carry as wide a range as possible and attempted to get an item if he does not already have it.


Soon after he arrived a lady in the village asked him for a pair of braces and was disappointed when told he did not keep them. However, Fred knew he had a pair, still new and boxed, that he had been given as a present. That evening he took them to her home and gave her them, no charge. She was greatly surprised at the speed of service!

Fred is now looking forward to a long holiday in Australia meeting up with old friends. Meanwhile he has bought New Inn Cottage and is making considerable alterations there so he will still be with us in the village.

We say thank you to Fred and Pat for providing Whimple with such an essential service for the last 15 years.

Fred's son Graham however will continue to run the store, while the Happy Shopper is to be converted to residential use. Those of you who use the Pharmacy service will be pleased to know this will continue at Whimple Stores.

In the life of our ever-changing village another change is soon to take place.

Fred and Pat Fowle are to leave Whimple Stores, a shop which has seen many changes over the years. Being located in the centre of the village it has witnessed shops in the surrounding area change use and eventually close, but has itself survived to serve Whimple's residents with their basic needs.

In 1905 it was one of four bakeries serving a small population dependant on the village for all its services.

It seems the premises are about 400 years old and built of cob. It was far smaller then. The original front area, with only one small window where the bay is now, extended to the end of the present sweet racks. Beyond that was a yard and stable for the horse.

Fred's stockroom area once contained a Doctor's and Dentist's surgeries and his lounge was once a Tearoom. Older residents remember sitting in the porch where the door and noticeboard are now, using it as a waiting room for the surgery.

Counter facilities; Banking services (Lloyds/TSB, Co-op, Girobank and soon Barclays; Foreign Currency; E 111s; N.S.B. special stamps; SWEB key recharging; etc etc. - all threatened however.

A BIG THANK YOU to those that signed the petition - if, in spite of continuing government pressure, you all carry on getting your cash and paying bills etc at this P.O. then it WILL survive.

The old but oft repeated adage <u>use it or lose it</u> has never been more relevant.

Sorry the above is so long but I thought you might like to know how I see the governments thinking - the government which when asked a question answers as would a member of the cast of the Vicar of Dibley' - "No, No, No, No, - Yes!"

Just to douse one rumour - "she who must be obeyed" and I have as yet no plans to move from where we now reside but the bolt hole is ready if things take a turn for the worse!

Finally I wish Graham and Karen all the very best of luck in Whimple Stores, and the very happiest and longest of retirements to Pat and Fred who have worked their socks off to keep the shop as one of those that has everything a village could need - a sincere good luck wish to you all.

Exeter Shopmobility



What is Shopmobility?

Shopmobility provides manual and powered wheelchairs and scooters to help people with limited mobility to shop and use the Exeter City Centre facilities.

Who can use it?

Shopmobility is for anyone, young or old, no matter whether their disability is temporary or permanent. Shopmobility is available both to residents and visitors in Exeter.

Where is it located?

The Shopmobility Centre is located in the multi-storey car park in King William Street close to the High Street, Sidwell Street and the main shopping areas of Exeter. Parking for people with disabilities is available.

How do I use Shopmobility?

It is advisable to book wheelchairs and scooters in advance either by calling at the Shopmobility centre or by telephoning. Booking will ensure that a suitable vehicle is available.

At the Shopmobility centre you will be met by a member of staff who will complete a registration form with you. On your first visit please bring some identification.
